





Chairman's Chat

their support with a Raiders win.



We were disappointed, to say the least, with the attendance against London. We are, after all, currently top of the second division. NEXT HOME MATCH 10TH NOVEMBER V LEIGH NEXT AWAY MATCH 3RD NOVEMBER V SHEFFIELD The Chief Executive, David Oxley, returned from a four-day visit to Moscow to obtain an up-to-date review of the progress of the 13-a-side code in the USSR

Mr Oxley reported "I attended the inaugural USSR Rugby League National Seven-a-Side Competition which was very successful. The Soviet Rugby League had obtained a 40,000 rouble sponsorship for the event which had been won by a relatively new club from Kazan. The rules which would operate in the inaugural International Seven-a-Side Competition taking place in Sydney 7-9 February 1992 had been translated into Russian and sent out well in advance of the tournament.

"It had been most encouraging to see how intelligently the Soviet coaches had assessed the rules, producing excellent seven-a-side football as opposed to a cut-down version of the 13-a-side game. The main competition had been integrated with a competition involving youngsters from the 24 schools currently playing Rugby League next season. It was also very encouraging to learn that Georgia, one of the most powerful rugby plaving Republics was already playing Rugby League and would become a full member of the Soviet Rugby League operation next season.

"In 1992, the Soviet League would be re-organised in order to operate on an inter-republic regional basis, involving seven Republics. each region would be responsible for developing feeder teams, development amongst voungsters, as well as producing its own referees and coaches. However, for the time being it had been agreed that the organisational and administrative centre would continue to be sited in Moscow. The National Inter-Club Knock-Out Cup, the Regional Knock-Out Cup and the National Seven-a-Side Competitions which had run so successfully during the inaugural season would. of course, continue in the 1992 season.

'Significant strides had been made both in the field of student Rugby League and in the armed forces. Agreement had been reached with the French Rugby League for a Soviet Armed Forces side to play home and away fixtures in the 1992 season against the French Army team.

'Gilbert Dautant, Chairman of the French Rugby League, who also made the visit, confirmed all arrangements were now firmly in place for the visit of the Soviet International Team to France at the end of October when they would play a warm-up match in Paris on 23 October 1991, before making their international debut against a full French International Team at Lyon on 23 October 1991.'



Rochdale Hornets have not won any Trophy since they lifted the Rugby League Challenge Cup in 1922. Their last appearance in any final was 1973-74 when they lost to Warrington in the Player's No 6 Trophy — now the Regal Trophy.

Hornets last won the Lancashire Cup in 1918 and have not been in the Final since their sixth appearance in 1965.

Rochdale are the sixth Second Division side to reach the Final and the third in successive seasons. But the only Second Division side to win the Cup were Barrow who beat Widnes 12-

This will be St Helens' 18th Lancashire Cup Final as they aim for their 11th success. Their last Final was in 1984 when they beat Wigan. Rochdale Hornets and St Helens have not met in the Final before.

Jonathan Davies has scored at least one try in all five matches for Widnes since he returned from his summer stint in Australia. The Welshman's sequence is as follows: 1-1-2-1-1

Davies has also added goals in each match for a total of 21 and 66 points.

David Myers of Wigan and Nick Pinkney of Ryedale-York both ended their try scoring runs at six matches.

Barry Vickers of Carlisle holds the current longest point scoring run covering 16 matches. The fullback's sequence began with eight goals in a 52-14 Second Division win at Trafford Borough on 24 March 1991.

Wigan's winning run ended at six matches when they lost 28-16 at St Helens in the Greenall's Lancashire Cup semi-final.

There is now no team with a winning run of more than five matches.

Nottingham City have the current longest losing run covering 14 matches. City's last win was 20-14 at home to Runcorn Highfield on 3 March 1991. Since then they have lost seven matches in the Second Division last season, six in the Third Division and a John Smiths Yorkshire Cup tie.




