





Editor's Prescription

After our good, but unrewarded, performance at Oldham three weeks ago we returned to winning ways by beating the then league leaders, Leigh, more convincingly than a 19-11 scoreline would suggest. It was scant reward for the result at Leigh earlier in the season when poor refereeing robbed us of at least a share of the spoils. Not many sides have three tries disallowed in the first ten minutes of a match as we did on that visit to Hilton Park. Our victory was made sweeter by the knowledge of Workington's defeat which virtually condemned the West Cumbrians to third division football next season while ensuring our position in the second division.

I was not at the match at Crystal Palace last Sunday because of work commitments but I am told that we played well, despite losing. However, the fact that we had two players on International duty with Wales and our regular, and reliable, goal kicker out with injury proved eventually to be too big a handicap. Again, however, we took consolation from Workington's comprehensive slaughter at Rochdale, as this removed even the mathematical, albeit remote, possibility of relegation.

I would like to take this opportunity of congratulating Barry Williams on scoring his first International try against France, to add to Rob Ackerman's Welsh try against Papua New Guinea earlier in the season. It must be said that the Raiders' Internationals have made their mark this season, and we hope that Mal Reilly and his staff have taken notice of their performances.

Today we welcome Oldham to Gillford Park and we hope to reverse the result of only a few weeks ago. We remember their last visit to Carlisle for the wrong reasons as we have still not forgotten, or forgiven, the ludicrous penalty try that was awarded to them. Since then we have lost twice narrowly at the Watersheddings.

Much has been said in recent years of the large gap in standards between the first and second divisions. Last Sunday, I saw a third division match, my first. It would not be untrue to say that I have yet to see our second team play as badly and with such lack of skill as I witnessed. Embarrassment prevents me from saying which match I saw some 40 miles to the west of Carlisle, where the home team were playing the league's newest recruits, but I witnessed 80 minutes of football that were mainly devoid of any skill and largely commitment, and I rejoice that we shall not be watching such garbage, and that is not too strong a word for what I saw, next season.

It is probable that today is the season's swansong for our Kiwi forward, Hitro Okesene. He will be remembered for many attributes, not least his uncompromising tackling and his hard running, but, I suspect, what amazed us more than anything was his touchline conversion of our first try against Leigh a fortnight ago with what was, I believe, his first goal attempt in his three seasons with us!







London Crusaders' late surge to take both points last Sunday effectively closed the door on any lingering hope Raiders may have entertained of a top four placing and a shot at this season's Premierships.

Nevertheless, remembering the pre-season forecasts about the likely promotion and relegation candidates in this first year of the eight-club Second Division, Cameron Bell and his staff can be well satisfied to have avoided the bottom division.

Or have they? In a move reminiscent of those which preceded the setting up of Soccer's Premier League, news has emerged of the secret meetings of the 'Elite Seventeen' — the current First Division clubs plus Sheffield, Leigh and Oldham — aimed at securing a reversion to two divisions. But not a reversion to the pre-1991 two division system with its mystifying fixture arrangements. The proposal to be considered by next Wednesday's meeting of the R.L. Council, will be for two divisions of sixteen clubs each, with four clubs losing their places in the league.

These four would apparently take their place in something like Soccer's Vauxhall Conference alongside leading amateur and development area sides.

It isn't clear yet whether there would be promotion and relegation between the new Second Division and this 'Conference'-style league, but if that is the intention, why not simply adopt what many people felt would have been the obvious solution last year i.e. three divisions of twelve clubs? (Yes, it would mean that Sheffield would remain in the Second Division, but there is, as yet, no law which says that every change in the game must either be proposed by or benefit, either Maurice Lindsay or Gary Hetherington).

A grievance of the First Division clubs has been that whilst they have to pay the 8% levy on their home gates, they receive little of this money back, and that too much of it goes on keeping alive clubs which are not anxious to do more than survive.

A fair point to make, but on the other side of the coin, has the League been as supportive of some of the lesser lights as it might have been?

Take Trafford Borough, for example, who have had problems, mainly financial, with their landlords, Soccer club Altrincham. Failing to attract sufficient local support to stay viable, Borough decided to return to their original home in Blackpool next season. They had unfortunately to postpone their game against Whitehaven but had, with what might be considered a measure of initiative, arranged to play their last four home fixtures of this season at Blackpool Mechanics football ground.

This move would have had two beneficial effects: it would have saved Borough much-needed cash, as Mechanics were prepared to let them have the use of the ground free: it would have let the people of Blackpool know that 'their' R.L. team was coming back to the town and would have helped to build up support for next

But what was the response of the R.L.'s Board of Directors? A flat refusal to allow Borough to play home matches anywhere except at Altrincham!

This refusal has since been modified, so Borough need not play at Moss Lane again. They are still not allowed to accept Blackpool Mechanics' offer, but have been graciously permitted to play home games at — wait for it — Fartown, Huddersfield!

As Barbara Castle used to say when, as Transport Minister she was trying to encourage the wearing of seat belts in cars: 'You know it makes sense'.

It's a great game, but when it comes to administration, here in England we've got guys who come close to making the folk who wrote the rules for the Cricket World Cup look like first-class legislators. The Chief Executive of the League, David Oxley, retires this year, and his replacement will start work next New Years Day. Perhaps the League should seriously consider following the example of the major sports in the USA, where both Baseball and American Football appoint a Commissioner, whose decisions are final.

Such an appointment might help our sport to carry more weight with television, and counteract the servile attitude BBC displays towards Rugby Union. Last weekend we had not only the whole of the Wales-Scotland match, but this was preceded by thirty-five minutes before the game of Union propaganda. And this was only a match to see who would come third in a five-team championship decided two weeks earlier!






