

SIMPLY THE BEST

No. 1 - JOHN ETTY

The first player to be featured in our review of some of our former star players is the barnstorming winger of the great team of the late 1950's, namely: JOHN ETTY.

John was originally signed from Batley in January, 1955, as a centre, indeed he had represented Yorkshire County in that position several times and at the time he left Mount Pleasant, was a very popular club captain.



However, as is the case so often today, financial considerations for the Yorkshire club saw John cross the pennines to join the "Roughyeds".

Soon after his arrival at Oldham, John was switched to play on the wing, a move that met with great success, his strength and straight running, close to the line, resulting in many tries. In fact, in the Championship-winning season of 1956-57, he set the current Oldham post-war record of 43 touchdowns, scoring two tries in the final itself against Hull at Odsal Stadium, Bradford.

In all, John played just over 150 games for Oldham and scored nearly 100 tries.

Leaving to join Wakefield in April, 1959, he obtained what to Oldham players is an elusive Challenge Cup winners medal, as Trinity demolished an injury-hit Hull side in the 1960 Final and also went on to register his 200th try in senior Rugby League, in the same year.

John now resides on Lancashires Fylde Coast and still takes an active interest in his three ex-clubs and recently attended the club reunion at Watersheddings.

N.B. Elsewhere in this programme John can be seen in action in that Championship Final against Hull.

FROM the **BOARDROOM**

CHAIRMAN JAMES QUINN

Your support is highly valued. In return, I think it is only right and proper that we keep you informed with what is going on at the club. I can confirm, therefore, that we paid £25,000 for Steve Kerry from Salford and £12,000 for Wally Gibson from Huddersfield.

As the sum of their combined transfer-list prices was £110,000 (£55,000 each), the Board quite rightly felt that it had done a good stroke of busi-

In each case, the payments will be staged to help all concerned because we are still heavily committed to ensuring that the club runs on the right side of the financial line.

We are currently running a tight ship. We have pruned outgoings on staff by £60,000 a year, without any appreciable loss of income. For that we are indebted to the staff who are still with us. Thank you all.

We are coping with our bank overdraft. We are not incurring new debts and, where possible, we are chipping away at the old ones.

The people who want to run speedway on the greyhound track have now submitted a planning application to the local authority and they have also expressed an interest in buying the greyhound stadium lock, stock and

At present Dougle Baker is running the greyhounds for us and a very fine job he is doing, too.

But, Dougle is aware of the situation, which is basically this: if a prospective buyer comes along with the right price we would have to seriously consider it because the debt is still a millstone around our necks and needs to be cleared off as quickly as possible.

I would love to steer the club towards a situation where it was released from the shackles of debt. Then, and only then, could we concentrate entirely on taking the club into a new era.

In the meantime, we have to balance the needs of the creditors with the needs of the team, always remembering that we need to provide an attractive side to bring in the income with which to service the debt.

One is inextricably linked with the other, so it was a source of great pleasure to the directors when home atten-

one is inextricably linked with the other, so it was a source of great pleasure to the directors when home attendances rose from 2,200 at the start of the season to 3,200.

If we can get that figure to 3,500 - and keep it there, or even higher - we should be breaking even. Perhaps you could do us a favour by bringing along a friend, or encouraging others to come and watch our team and the exciting players that Peter Tunks has been able to put into it.

Today's game and the Castleford game next Sunday, in the First Round of the Regal Trophy, are fully sponsored and the two home games after that, against Huddersfield and Bramley, are partially sponsored.

There are genuine signs that our true friends and supporters are appreciating what we are doing both shortterm and long-term. The object this season is to win promotion, preferably as champions.

Any success in cup competitions would be a bonus, but we do not want to jeopardise our promotion push. You need a large squad to do well in League and Cups at this stage of the club's redevelopment, we do not enjoy that

It is the Second Division honours board that must mean most to us this season and, to that end, the players will be rewarded financially if they win the title, which carries with it a prize of £23,000.

If we finish as runners-up, and go up in second piace, there will be no financial benefit to the players - just the

satisfaction of a job well done to get us out of the Second Division.

Talking of the team, you will have read in the Press that we are going to have a more traditional-type kit before very long. I must stress that this kit change is for no other reason than the fact that the supplier has been taken over in the recession and we can no longer get fresh stock.

Hopefully, replica jerseys will be in our Souvenir Shop in plenty of time for Christmas and we are also hoping to have new track-suit tops for the players to run out in when they leave the tunnel. We are looking for a sponsor for this track-suit top so, if you are interested, or know anyone who might be, please telephone the office and speak to the Commercial Department.

Welcome back to Watersheddings for our first home game for a month! After the glut of home matches at the start of the season, followed by such a long stint on the road, one wonders about the wisdom of the current fixture compilation. Indeed by January 1st, 1993, we will have completed our four matches against today's visitors, Swinton. The arguments for and against this tough 8 club Second Division are well known, but to play one club four times in the first half of the season, doesn't seem to make any sense at all.

In previous years, of course, Swinton were always the opponents for our "holiday" fixtures, with the traditional meetings taking place at Station Road on Good Friday and at Watersheddings on Christmas Day or Boxing Day. The last time Christmas Day was used was in 1959 and if, as happened in 1958-59, December 25th fell on a Thursday, there would be three matches in three days. ie, Christmas Day, Boxing Day and Saturday the 27th.

Surprisingly between 1908 and 1913 one of our yule-tide fixtures was Hull Kingston Rovers at home. What a trip that must have been, leaving Humberside on a cold Christmas morning and taking a steam train trip to the other side of the Pennines and not arriving back in Hull until the early hours of Boxing Day.

At the start of this article, I mentioned our glut of home matches in the early season, however in 1911-12 season, Oldham played an incredible five home matches between December 23rd and January 1st. The teams being Leigh, 23rd; Hull KR, 25th; Bradford, 26th; St Helens, 30th and Coventry on New Year's Day.


