





FAVOURITES DRAWN AWAY IN REGAL TROPHY ROUND TWO

The three most fancied clubs to succeed in this season's £330,000 Regal Trophy were all given tough away matches in the draw for the second round made on Monday, 9th November 1992.

Favourites, Wigan, looking for a record sixth title win this time to back up their £100,000-plus winnings already in the bank, have to travel to Hull Kingston Rovers while St Helens, only once past winners but one of the top three best bets this season, are away to Featherstone Rovers. Current League leaders and twice previous Trophy holders, Bradford Northern, have the toughest task with a visit to Warrington — four times past winners.

London Crusaders, who caused the biggest upset in last weekend's first round by beating Yorkshire Cup holders, Wakefield Trinity, also got an 'away ticket', this time to Leigh. The big Yorkshire clash will be at Hull who are drawn at home to Halifax.

Chairman's Chat

We offer a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of Oldham for what promises to be a very hard match today. We also welcome back our own supporters who surely must be suffering severe withdrawal symptoms, since our last home match was six weeks ago on 4th October when we defeated a strong Hornets team.

Despite the lack of home action, our visits to away fixtures have been very fruitful. We demolished "Murphy the Mouth" s men at Huddersfield on 11th October with clinical efficiency. When I saw his angry puce face, I was happy to remember, several years ago, Murphy urging his "Super Saints" to "run at the dwarfs in the middle" during that 112-0 nightmare.

We followed this with an unlucky 18-18 draw at London Crusaders on 1st November, a match that will surely be long remembered for the team coach breaking down in London and the players arriving 1 and a half hours late, having changed on the bus.

Last Sunday we beat Bramley 16-12 at McLaren Field, a margin that even the Bramley Directors agreed flattered their own team.

The common thread through all of these excellent away performances has been our defence. A mixture of "big hits", brilliant cover defence and, at Bramley, some amazing "gang tackling" which on one occasion ran one of the Bramley forwards a full 30 yards back down field.

I thought that the Cumbria v Australia match was "Summat and Nowt". The Australians won comfortably without breaking a sweat. They were always bound to win against a Cumbria team weakened by a number of last minute withdrawals. They could, however, have entertained a good Derwent Park crowd with a demonstration of their undoubted skills. Instead, they treated it as a bit of a training canter, and merely did the minimum to ensure a comfortable win.

The match at Wembley was, however, a totally different affair. The atmosphere was almost unbearable, the pre-match entertainment world class, and the game itself a perfect example of two well matched teams giving 120% effort. True, there was only one try, the British attack predictable, and we lost! The point is that four years ago the match would have been won by the Aussies in the first twenty minutes, and the eventual margin would have been thirty-odd points. The fact that only a missed tackle decided the result shows how far the G.B. team has come. Let us hope that we can sustain and build on the self evident improvement and even now start to inject a bit of good British improvisation into the game.

I am reliably informed that we have a number of new supporters from the Scottish Borders at this afternoon's match. To our new supporters I say welcome to Rugby League. As I know that many of you are Union supporters, the rudiments of the game will be well familiar to you. One difference I am sure you will notice is the non-stop action and the refusal of "League" to treat the scrum as some type of esoteric art form. We, rightly, in my view, treat the scrum as a device to penalise the offending side by denying them possession and allowing a different pattern of backs oriented play to take place. We believe that the Rugby Football Union has, in its scrummaging fetish, pursued a negative and sentimental conservationist attachement to the Eton wall-game.

Again, to our new supporters, I would like to explain that Rugby League is essentially an amateur game. Only around 1% of the teams playing League are professional paid players. As to the entertainment value, that of course is a matter of your opinion. I hope that you enjoy this afternoon's match, and that we form a regular part of your weekends' sporting entertainment in the future.

Finally, and most importantly, I hope that our sponsors this afternoon, Biffa Waste, enjoy their afternoon's entertainment. Their contribution to the well being and hygiene of the city needs no enlargement from me. Thank you for sponsoring the Raiders. Whatever the result, and I hope we can win for you, keep up the good work in the City, and thanks again for your support.

CORPORATE SUICIDE

As you may know the Rugby League has a new Chief Executive. David Oxley the previous incumbent, has recently retired after several years at the helm and I am sure that you will join me in wishing him a long and peaceful retirement. His successor is Maurice Lindsay, erstwhile Chairman of Wigan. Laying aside my reservations about the appointment of someone so obviously intimately connected with one club I, therefore watched his first televised interview (on BBC Sportsnight on Wednesday, 27th September) with some interest.

I was less than comforted by his insistance (and it was repeated in a newspaper inteview some days later) that there should be not one, but two sides in London. We played at Crystal Palace recently. In a ground with a capacity of over 20,000 and in a city of 9 million people, there was a derisory attendance of 500 according to the press. To put out a team every week London seem to have access to an unlimited supply of antipodeans and very few natural Britons seem to turn out for them on a regular basis. In fact I wonder why the Australians brought a team over for the World Cup final as they already have a side over here! This is not the basis for developing a second side in London, especially at a time when the Rugby League should be conservative in 'home' territory in these recessional times. In the same TV interview, Lindsay seemed to accept with fatalistic resignation the possibility that some of the struggling clubs should fall by the wayside.

Are these sentiments that should be expressed by 'our leader'? I think not. Perhaps Mr Lindsay should engage his brain before opening his mouth in future. He could also speedily heal the potential damaging rift between the RL and BARLA. To think that this squabble is still smouldering on is quite incredible and is a credit to neither organisation.

MARK SHEALS — Rugged, hard-working prop, who joined Oldham in a three-for-one exchange deal with Leigh in the summer of 1992. To Leigh went Tim Street, Keith Newton and Duncan Platt as Oldham boss Peter Tunks finally got the man he had been chasing for more than a year. Won a Lancashire cap last season but missed his county debut due to suspension.

SEAN DEVINE — A 22-year-old scrum-half, whom Oldham boss Peter Tunks also recruited in an exchange deal. This time it was with St Helens, Oldham receiving £50,000, Devine and back-row forward Paul Jones for Great Britain under-21 forward Chris Joynt.

MARK MEADOWS — A second-row forward, who had seen service with Swinton and Trafford Borough when Tunks snapped him up on the eve of the 1992-93 season from the new Blackpool Gladiators club, who took Sean Allen in a straight swop.

HUGH GUMBS — A young winger from Yorkshire who signed for Bradford Northern when David Hobbs was boss. Had a spell with Batley and then signed for Oldham as a free agent in the summer of 1992. Went to Australia that summer in the Students World Cup.

STUART COCKER — Yet another of Tunk's famous wheeler-dealer signings, Cocker joined Oldham in the deal that took Neil Flanagan and Des Foy to Fartown. A try poacher . . . Well known for his scoring habits . . . Stuart scored twice in each of his first two games for Oldham against London Crusaders and Carlisle.

PAUL JONES — At 6ft 3ins and 17 stone, Leigh based Jones had more than 60 senior appearances for St Helens behind him, albeit many of them as substitute, when he signed for Oldham with Sean Devine in the Chris Joynt deal.

BEN OLSEN — This Danish born forward made a name for himself with London Crusaders and signed for Oldham in the famous swop-shop summer of 1992 with winger, Richard Blackman, a Londoner returning "home" to join the Crusaders at Crystal Palace.

IAN SHERRATT — Former Oldham and Lancashire schoolboy. Left Oldham for Salford and returned last season. A hard grafting prop-forward.

RICHARD PACHNIUK — A 20 year old from Dewsbury with Polish grandparents, Richard started in the "A" team 1990/91 season. A clever, creative thinking type of hooker, he is expected to go a long way.

RICHARD RUSSELL — A local lad who "arrived" home at Watersheddings via Wigan. Played for Wigan on the wing in the world club championship against Manly but is now regarded as stand-off or loose-forward. Creative player with an excellent pair of hands.

STEVE WARBURTON — Steve was the BARLA open age international stand-off season 90/92. He signed for Oldham from Warrington amateur club Woolston and made his debut as a substitute against Hull in the last match of the 90/91 season. Did well and enhanced his reputation further in France. A clever, attacking player with poise and class.

BARRIE McDERMOTT — Strong and powerful despite his 20 years, local boy Barrie is yet another member of the BARLA squad to throw in his lot with Oldham. He is a dedicated young professional and has quickly made enough mpression to earn a place on the bench in Oldham's last season matches.

TOMMY MARTYN — A player of exciting potential, Tommy is the son of former Leigh, Warrington and G.B. forward Tommy Martyn and the nephew of Mick Martyn, who set scoring records as a forward in the early 50's. He is a stand-off or centre, who can "sniff" tries out of nothing . . "Poacher" of the rugby league varity who can turn a match on a stroke.

GARY CHRISTIE — Fast winger and yet another member of the BARLA international youth squad. Oldham clearly believe in youth policy. Gary was top try scorer in New Zealand.

TINY SOLOMONA — A Kiwi of Western Samoan origin, "Tiny" signed for Oldham in early 1992 from Widnes, but did not make his debut until the start of the season because of groin trouble. Has had two groin operations since the turn of the year but is playing at the top of his form now and won the man-of-the-match award in Oldham's first round Lancashire Cup win against first division club, Warrington.

STEVE KERRY — Former Preston Grasshoppers R.U. half-back, turned professional for Salford for whom he was a prolific goal scorer and he topped the RL points scoring list in 1990/91 when Salford won the 2nd Division championship with 427 points. Can play equally well at stand-off or scrum-half and was long admired by Oldham Coach Peter Tunks, before he finally got his man in September 1992.

SEAN TYRER — Son of Colin, the former Leigh and Wigan goal-kicking full-back, Sean followed in his father's footsteps when he signed at Wigan after winning many BARLA youth honours. Played several 1st team matches at Central Park when Graham Lowe was boss, eventually joined Oldham for a bargain £5K in 1991.

DAVID BRADBURY — Signed from Leigh Miners after touring New Zealand with BARLA Under19 squad. David is a strong running loose-forward, who impressed on Oldham's pre-season tour of France.

IVA ROPATI — A member of the famous New Zealand footballing Ropati family, Iva was the top try scorer in the country last year. A new signing for Oldham and an exciting prospect for the team.

SCOTT RANSON — Twenty-four-year-old St Helen's player and the top try scorer from his former club, Swinton. Signed for Oldham in March 1992.

SHANE TUPAEA — Ex New Zealand player. Signed for Swinton then Rochdale. A hard tackling defensive second-row forward.

Well, it's nice to be back again, after a six-week spell without a home match. It's difficult to see how the authorities expect clubs such as Raiders to build up a regular following when such a long period of time can be allowed to elapse between successive home fixtures.

Carlisle are, of course, not alone in experiencing this sort of problem, but that is small consolation to the directors, faced with the task of finding the cash necessary to keep things going.

The game in general is not enjoying a boom period in this country at the moment. First came the World Cup Final, which generated high hopes that Britain might at last manage to put one over the all-conquering Australians. It was not to be, however, and one could debate for a long time whether the right players were selected in crucial positions. After a tightly-fought game a single defensive error led to the decisive score by the brilliant Renouf.

If the Aussies had achieved only a narrow win at Wembley, any doubts remaining about their superiority were completely dispelled at Central Park in the World Club Championship, where Brisbane Broncos proved worthy of taking the trophy Down Under for the first time.

Away from international competition, the domestic game seems far from healthy. At the time of writing, Leigh are awaiting the outcome of a court case to determine whether they will be allowed to stay at Hilton Park for the rest of the season. Swinton have called in administrators to run the club, whose gates have slumped since the club's move to Gigg Lane, and unresolved doubts remain about the reported ejection of Blackpool, Chorley and Nottingham at the end of the season to slim the League down to two 16-team divisions. Next season will also see the introduction of the league's minimum standards for grounds, which will affect a number of clubs financially.

On the playing side, Raiders' draw at Crystal Palace two weeks ago was a fine achievement, given the traumatic circumstances immediately preceding the game. The result was put into perspective last Sunday when the Londoners knocked first division Wakefield Trinity out of the Regal Trophy 30-0! At the same time, Raiders were progressing to the second round with an excellent performance at MacLaren Field. The scant reward for all this is a second round trip to Wheldon Road for a meeting with Castleford, who put out today's visitors Oldham with a 40-22 win at Watersheddings. With their sights firmly set on promotion to Division One, the Roughyeds won't be too upset at having one less distraction in the shape of the Regal Trophy competition to worry about.

Although our visits to Oldham seem always to end in a home win, we can look foward to a tight contest at Gillford Park this afternoon.
