



### **OLDHAM**

MARK SHEALS Rugged, hard-wearing prop, who joined Oldham in a three-for-one exchange deal with Leigh in the summer of 1992. To Leigh went Tim Street, Keith Newton and Duncan Platt as Oldham boss Peter Tunks finally got the man he had been chasing for more than a year. Won a Lancashire Cup last season but missed his county debut due to suspension.

SEAN DEVINE A 22 year old scrum-half, whom Oldham boss Peter Tunks also recruited in an exchange deal. THis time it was with St. Helens, Oldham receiving £50,000, Devine and back-row forward Paul Jones for Great Britain Under 21 forward Chris Joynt.

MARK MEADOWS A Second-row forward, who had seen service with Swinton and Trafford Borough when Tunks snapped him up on the eve of the 1992-93 season from the new Blackpool Gladiators Club, who took Sean Allen in a straight swop.

HUGH GUMBS A young winger from Yorkshire, who signed for Bradford Northern when David Hobbs was Boss. Had a spell with Batley and then signed for Oldham as a free agent in the summer of 1992. Went to Australia that summer in the Students World Cup.

STUART COCKER Yet another of Tunk's famous wheeler-dealer signings, Cocker joined Oldham in the deal that took Neil Flanagan and Des Foy to Fartown. A try poacher ... well known for his scoring habits ... Stuart scored twice in each of his first two games for Oldham against London Crusaders and Carlisle.

PAUL JONES At 6ft 3ins and 17 stone, Leigh based Jones had more than 60 senior appearances for St. Helens behind him, albeit many of them as substitute, when he signed for Oldham with Sean Devine in the Chris Joynt deal.

BEN OLSEN This Danish born forward made a name for himself with London Crusaders and signed for Oldham in the famous swop-swop summer of 1992 with winger, Richard Blackman, a Londoner returning "Home" to join the Crusaders at Crystal Palace.

TINY SOLOMONA A Kiwi of Western Samoan origin, "Tiny" signed for Oldham in early 1992 from Widnes, but did not make is debut until the start of the season because of groin trouble. Has had two groin operations since the turn of the year but is playing at the top of his form now and won the man-of-thematch award in Oldham's first round Lancashire Cup win against First Division Club, Warrington.

STEVE KERRY Former Preston Grass Hoppers R.U. half-back, turned professional for Salford for whom he was a prolific goal scorer and he topped the R.L. Points scoring list in 1990/91 when Salford won the 2nd Division Championship with 427 points. Can play equally well at stand-off or scrum-half and was long admired by Oldham Coach, Peter Tunks, before he finally got his man in September, 1992.

SEAN TYRER Son of Colin, the former Leigh and Wigan goal-kicking full-back, Sean followed in his father's footsteps when he signed at Wigan after winning many BARLA Youth Honours. Played several 1st Team matches at Central Park when Graham Lowe was Boss, eventually joined Oldham for a bargain £5k in 1991.

DAVID BRADBURY Signed from Leigh Miners after touring New Zealand with the BARLA Under 19 Squad. David is a strong running loose-forward, who impressed on Oldham's pre-season Tour of France.

IVA ROPATI A member of the famous New Zealand footballing Ropati family, Iva was the top try scorer in the country last year. A new signing for Oldham and an exciting prospect for the team.

SCOTT RANSON Twenty four year old St. Helen's player and the top try scorer from his former Club, Swinton. Signed for Oldham in March 1992.

SHANE TUPAEA Ex New Zealand player. Signed for Swinton then Rochdale. A hard tackling defensive second-row forward.

IAN SHERRATT Former Oldham and Lancashire schoolboy. Left Oldham for Salford and returned last season. A hard grafting prop-forward.

RICHARD PACHNIUK A 20 year old from Dewsbury with Polish grandparents, Richard starred in the "A" Team 1990-91 season. A clever, creative thinking type of hooker, he is expected to go a long way.

RICHARD RUSSELL A local lad who "arrived" home at Watersheddings via Wigan. Played for Wigan on the wing in the World Club Championship against Manly but is now regarded as stand-off or loose-forward. Creative player with an excellent pair of hands.

STEVE WARBURTON Steve was the BARLA Open Age International stand-off season 1990-92. He signed for Oldham from Warrington Amateur Club, Woolston and made his debut as a substitute against Hull in the last match of the 1990-91 season. Did well and enhanced his reputation further in France. A clever, attaacking player with poise and class.

BARRIE McDERMOTT Strong and powerful despite his 20 years, local boy Barrie is yet another member of the BARLA Squad to throw in his lot with Oldham. He is a dedicated young professional and has quickly made enough impression to earn a place on the bench in Oldham's last season matches.

TOMMY MARTYN A player of exciting potential, Tommy is the son of former Leigh, Warrington and G.B. forward Tommy Martyn and the nephew of Mick Martyn, who set scoring records as a forward in the early 60's. He is a stand-off or centre, who can "Sniff" tries out of nothing . . . "Poacher" of the Rugby League variety who can turn a match on a stroke.

GARY CHRISTIE Fast winger and ye t another member of the BARLA International YouthSquad. Oldham clearly believe in Youth Policy. Gary was top try scorer in New Zealand.

Bad weather played its part in most games last weekend, with many games played in incessant rain. The pitch at Crystal Palace was short of a few camels to go with all the sand!

In First Division matches, 7,683 braved the appalling conditions to see Wigan snatch victory 26-18, against a Salford side containing four ex-Wigan players.

Halifax came out on top 21-20 against Warrington, despite Wires four tries to Fax's three. Widnes lost out 32-30 at the Don Valley Stadium, with Andy Currier grabbing a hat-trick. Bradford Northern lost at home 16-4 against second-placed St. Helens. Carl Gibson earned a 12-12 draw for Leeds at Leigh with a try five minutes from time, but Leigh could have snatched it with a Dave Tanner penalty which went wide in the final minute.

Castleford won 8 -2 against Hull K.R. on Humberside and neighbours Hull lost 6-4 at Wakefield in Friday's Televised game.

In Division Two, Featherstone Rovers hold top spot with an 18-6 victory over Rochdale but Oldham slipped up, losing 17-6 at home to Mr. Murphy's Huddersfield. Bramley shared the points 18-18 with Carlisle and our report can be found elsewhere in this programme.

Only four games in the Third Divsion, with the Blackpool-Chorley Derby match and Dewsbury-Doncaster both postponed with waterlogged pitches.

Ryedale-York still hold top spot following a 22-4 victory at Barrow. Hunslet beat Batley in a close game 17-14. Dean Marwood helped him-

self to 24 points, as Workington crushed Nottingham 68-0, the Town player scoring 10 goals and a try.

Keighhley beat bottom team Highfield 44-10 with John Wasyliw scoring 16 points.

# LIONS HISTORY

P W D L F A 1928-29 6th 36 23 2 11 429 249 66-66%

After last year's heady success and record-equalling season it was, perhaps, too much to hope or expect that the Lions would continue to retain all the trophies won last season but the Blues were still the team everyone wanted to defeat. The only pre-season signing of any rate was Welsh centre Archie Mansfield and, although all the Championship players were available, except for long-serving hooker Henry Blewer who refused to play, as he felt he should have been given a game for his Benefit, rather than a cash allowance.

The season opened with a 24-2 home victory over Wakefield Trinity, followed by a 13-5 success at Rochdale before St. Helens Recs., one of the Cup Semi-Finalists, defeated this time 3-8 but winning ways were soon resumed, with four victories in the next five games, which provided chances over Wakefield and Rochdale. Swinton commenced that defence of the Lancashire Cup with a 7-3 home victory over Leigh but were surprisingly soundly defeated 3-2 at Chorley Road by Wigan, the eventual winners.

Returning to League matters, the Lions were displaying erratic form until just before Christmas, they defeated Huddersfield, the eventual Champions 21-0 and gained an emphatic 23-5 victory at Wigan, gaining revenge for the Cup defeat and keeping the Lions amongst the leading clubs just outside the Top Four contenders.

Swinton's bid to retain the Challenge Cup by appearing in their fourth consecutive final and going to Wembley, where the Cup was to be held for the first time, saw them drawn at home to Leigh who were defeated 5-2, when on 9th February 1929, the Blues played their last game at Chorley Road. The team was: Scott, F. Evans, Halsall (T), H. Evans, Brockbank, Rees, B. Evans, Entwistle.

Turner, Morris (G), Hodgson, Wright, Butlers. In the Second Round, Swinton were drawn at Dewsbury, the eventual beaten Finalists and were defeated 7-14.

On 2nd March, 1929, Station Road was opened and 22,000 spectators saw the Lions defeat Wigan 9-3. The team was: Scott, Buckingham, Halsall, H. Evans, F. Evans, Rees, Atkinson, Strong, Turner, Morris, Cracknell, Hodgson, Butlers. Frank Buckingham scored the first try and Martin Hodgson kicked three goals.

The season ended with Swinton winning eight of the remaining 11 games, leaving the Lions in sixth position, their lowest for five years but, nevertheless, the Lions retained the Lancashire League Championship.

Frank Evans scored 22 tries, Dick Cracknell 18, a record for a forward and Chris Brockbank 11. Martin Hodgson kicked 32 goals and Herbert Morris 31, the lowest individual goals kicked in a season since 1921-22. Frank Evans joined Henry Blewer and Hector Halsall as a player with over 300 appearances, leaving 10 players on the Club Register with over 200 appearances.

Miller Strong and Martin Hodgson represented Cumberland in their two County games; Bryn Evans and Fred Butlers in Lancashire's three games and Billo Rees in two of Glamorgan's games. Billo Rees represented Wales against England and also played with Martin Hodgson in the England v. Other Nationalities game.

Swinton were honoured when Lancashire met Cumberland at Station Road and for the Challenge Cup Semi-Final between Wigan and St. Helens Recs. After the Lord Mayor's show? - still a successful season, maintaining the Lions amongst the premier clubs in the game. County player Bobby Scott and forward Joe Wright were bought to strengthen the squad. Although Albert Jenkins, whose debut in 1920 started the Lions success, announced his retirement, the future still looked very rosy.

In an effort to compete with Australian Rugby League Football internationally at the play-the-ball and to help speed up this operation, the following will now apply for all future games, including this weekend's games: Blatant holding down will be penalised!

The third man "flopper" in the tackle, will be penalised.

Holding of the leg or foot by a defender, to delay the play-the-ball, will be penalised.

The holding of the ball, by a defender, when the attacking player is about to play-the-ball, will be penalised.

The pushing of the player, playing the ball, will be penalised.

### WINNING RUN

Workington Town have the current longest winning run of six matches, made up of five Stones Bitter Third Division games and one Regal Trophy tie.

Rochdale Hornets' winning run ended at five matches, when they lost 18-6 at Featherstone Rovers.

Highfield are the only team without a win this season, after losing all 10 matches - eight in the Stones Bitter Third Division, one Greenalls Lancashire Cup and one Regal Trophy tie.

Daryl Powell needs four tries for a career century of touchdowns for Sheffield Eagles and only two for 100 club

Dean Bell, the Wigan and former Leeds and Carlisle centre, needs one try for a career century in English Club

Alan Hunte of St. Helens needs one try for a career century of club and representative touchdowns.

John Woods of Leigh is within reach of three major milestones. The 36-year-old former Test'back needs three goals for a Leigh career total of 1,000 and eight points to clock up 2,500 for the club.

Woods is also only 15 points short of an overall club and representative total of 4,000, including 421 for Bradford Northern, 613 for Warrington, 194 for Rochdale Hornets, plus 29 in Test Matches.

Woods first signed for Leigh in December,1975 and made a tryscoring debut on the wing at home to Barrow, in an 18-8 Division One victory on 5th September, 1976.

After nine seasons he moved to Bradford Northern and kicked a goal on his debut, playing stand-off in a 32-7 Division One defeat at Warrington on 1st September, 1985.

Two years later he joined Warrington and kicked nine goals, making his debut at stand-off in a 54-4 Division One home defeat of Hunslet on 30th August, 1987.

Another two seasons and Woods moved to Rochdale Hornets. He made his debut for Hornets on 3rd September, 1989, when he kicked a goal in a 36-12 Division Two defeat at Halifax.

He returned to Leigh a year later and began his second spell with two goals at centre in a 26-6 Lancashire Cup First Round home win over Swinton on 26th August, 1990.

Rochdale Hornets and Warrington couldn't agree on a cash settlement for Welsh forward Rowland Phillips, so he has returned to Wilderspool from his loan spell.

Mal Reilly named six newcomers in his squad for last Friday's Swansea International between Wales and England. The shock omissions were the Wigan trio of Shaun Edwards, Joe Lydon and Martin Dermott. Dewsbury are reportedly showing interest in Halifax forward Peter Bell.

Tony Kay is a wanted man in Cumbria. Having just spent a loan spell with Workington, the Barrow centre is also wanted by Whitehaven and Carlisle.

Australian forward Steve Pickett, recently released by Widnes, has signed for Hull K.R.

Salford's former England R.U. centre, Peter Williams, is put on stand-by for the Wales R.L. team, having qualified through his Welsh father.

Meanwhile the "Red Devils" have signed stand-off Steve Blakely from Wigan for £28,000.

In his first major move since taking over from David Oxley, Maurice Lindsay asks referee's supremo Fred Lindop to issue instructions to the merry whistle blowers to clamp down on players guilty of "laying on" at the play the ball.

Salford are the winners of this season's Lancashire County Shield Competition. Their "A" team beat Warrington Wizards 30-13 in the Final at Wilderspool.

Sadly making the headlines for all the wrong reasons was the fact that Chorley Borough 's Peter Marsh has been jailed for two months, after allegedly kicking an opponent in an amateur game last year.

St. Helens winger Les Quirk has been banned for two games, following a recent reserve game dismissal. Bradford Northern have announced a loss of £114,000 on last season.

Hull have told Salford that their enquiries for Mark Jones are a waste of time and he is not for sale.

Veteran utility back John Woods, of Leigh, is ruled out for at least a month with a fractured bone in his hand.

The R.F.L./BARLA dispute is deepening, following the recent refusal by the Rugby League to allow amateur cup games to take place at the home grounds of Wakefield Trinity and Whitehaven.

Leo Casey wants away from Featherstone Rovers, who will be prepared to accept less than the £100,000 asking price for the former Oldham player.

Greg Shuttleworth is in limbo, following a return to his home club Huddersfield, after a two-month loan spell with Bramley. The "Villagers" weren't prepared to make the deal permanent but he is also out-of-favour with Huddersfield supremo Alex Murphy.

Oldham have extended the loan period of Neil Holding to St. Helens, but only after the two clubs agreed on a compensation agreement, pending the agreeing of an exchange deal suitable to both clubs.

Meanwhile, Oldham may well be showing interest in Warrington's Rowland Phillips, following his return to Wilderspool. (See above.)

Oldham again - they are also planning to make approaches to Orrel R.U. club's Martin Strett and Nigel Heslop.

Maurice Bamford is interested in taking Mick Keebles on loan from Keighley for a month and his Bramley club have also signed Sydney St. George stand-off Dave Niu.

Former Kiwi skipper, Hugh McGahan, has been interviewed for the chief executive's post with Auckland's proposed new Winfield Cup team, the Warriors.

The recent two-match test series, between South Africa and Russia, resulted in a two-nil series for the C.I.S. team.

Batley have organised a Dinner for 3rd February, 1993, when the Guest Speaker will be comedian Bernard Manning. They hope it will go a long way to paying the £8,000 transfer fee for Jimmy Irvine, recently signed on loan from Halifax.

Salford are showing an interest in another Orrell R.U. player - goal-kicking full-back Gary Tyrer.



Salford Juniors' Lancashire Cup dream finally ended in the Semi-Final at mighty Thatto Heath. Salford gave 100% to a man, with Gareth Morgan perhaps just earning the Man-of-the-Match but, in the end, they had to settle for just one try from Nick Cooper, as the St. Helens side triumphed by 32-6.

Folly Lane join the "big guns" in Round Four of the NWCL Cup after their tricky Third Round success at Haydock. Man-of-the-Match Carl Shaw scored Folly's try with Mike Hulmes adding two goals, but it was sterling defensive work that prevented Folly from becoming giant killing victims as they won 8-6.

Irlam Hornets came up against the only side to beat them in the Premier-League this season, Pilkingtons Recreation, and they gained ample revenge by 38-6, to stay two points clear at the top.

Third-placed Irlam Hornets "A" closed in on the front runners in the Alliance Division Two, with a very hard-fought 14-0 victory at home to Haydock "A". Man-of-the-Match Ian Potts scored both Hornets tries, with Stuart Shovelton making a come-back after a broken arm, adding three goals.

### SWINTON v. OLDHAM Good Friday, 26th March, 1948

Today is the forty-seventh time that we have entertained Oldham since the war, so choosing a game to feature in my column this week left me with a headache. I eventually chose this particular game mainly so that I could show you the superb programme cover that the Lions used for seasons 1947-48 and 1948-49 - quite a work of art and not without a hint of the national fervour that was till prevalent after the victory in the war.

From the early days of the Northern Union, it was traditional for the Lions to play at Watersheddings on Christmas Day and for Oldham to come to Swinton on Good Friday.

Consequently the two clubs inevitably had a special affinity for each other resulting in the games being played with plenty of spirit and usually before large crowds. In fact this tradition carried on into the sixties (when the Christmas Day fixture was switched to Boxing Day) and only really died out with the advent of two divisions in 1973. In this particular game Swinton won an entertaining encounter 17-13 thanks to tries by Garner, Jones and Warry and four goals by the dependable Ralph Morgan. In doing so they gained revenge for the Christmas Day defeat at Oldham by 12 points to 6. 1947-48 was not a particularly successful season for either club. The Lions were in the process of rebuilding after attaining their worst-ever league position in 1946-47 (twenty-fourth) and Oldham were in a likewise situation. Swinton finally finished nineteenth just four points behind the "Roughyeds" who finished sixteenth. History shows that within two years Swinton were challenging for the Championship and Oldham went on to produce some marvellous teams in the fifties.

In the match programme (featured on this page) the Chairman, Bennett Manson, refers to the international between Wales and France that had been played the previous week. He seems to have been unimpressed with the French referee and states, "Personally I feel that the time is not yet right to give control to visiting referees unless the official can make himself understood to both sides". Now where have I heard that one before? Wasn't there a French referee a couple of seasons ago baffling the Aussies and ourselves? Not to mention Mr. Hale. Manson goes on to congratulate Swinton's international hooker Frank Osmond on a fine performance for Wales and noted that he had won the scrums by an astonishing FORTY-SEVEN to TWENTY-ONE! Fancy having to shout "Feedin'" sixty-eight times in one match! Elsewhere in the programme it was revealed that the great forward Jim Birch, who had played in Swinton's invincible Union team of the pre-1895 era, had died. It was also revealed that Station Road would host the Challenge Cup semi-final between Rochdale and Wigan (a 40,000 crowd was expected) and that there would be a collection at half-time for Johnny Stoddart's testimonial fund - Stoddart having completed 16 years with the Lions.

Once again can I ask for assistance in obtaining photographs and pre-1960 programmes to assist with my club history, If you can't help me yourselves then perhaps you know someone that could? I will offer generous cash or alternatively I will be happy to borrow.




