

SILK CUT CHALLENGE CUP 1993

The winners of the 1993 Silk Cut Challenge Cup will receive £36,000, a record purse for the 95-year competition

The draw ceremony for the preliminary and first rounds of the £340,000 tournament will be made at Elland Road, Leeds – the home of Hunslet RLFC – on Tuesday 15 December, broadcast live on BBC's Northern local radio network at 10.30am.

The draw will involve the 35 professional clubs, headed by bookmakers' favourite Wigan who have lifted the Silk Cut Challenge Cup for the past five years.

Of Silk Cut's £340,000 sponsorship investment for the 34-tie 1993 tournament, £190,000 will be paid in prize money, with the remaining £150,000 being put towards the League's Capital Development Fund for ground improvements.

The 1993 Silk Cut Challenge Cup opens with the preliminary round on Sunday 17 January, with the first round on the weekend of 30/31 January. The Silk Cut Challenge Cup Final is staged at Wembley on Saturday 1 May.

Śeats for the Silk Cut Challenge Cup Final are available priced £37, £32, £25, £15 in the stadium, and £50 in the Olympic Gallery.

Silk Cut Awards will again be presented to the Man of the Match in each tie, the 1993 prize being £130 and a commemorative medal for all matches up to and including the quarter-finals, and £300 plus an inscribed memento for the semi-finals.

Entertaining

OLDHAM

An unentertaining, passionless game between Oldham and Featherstone Rovers is about as likely as an act of spontaneous compassion from Michael Heseltine. There hasn't been a poor game between these two teams in years. The main reason is, I think, is that there is always something at stake. This is usually either promotion, relegation, or, as on one unforgettable occasion, the second division premierships. That game was unforgettable firstly because of the sheer theatre of it all . . . a white knuckle ride of emotion from despond to exaltation, with a short detour via bewilderment, and if you were a Fev fan, back to the terminus at disappointment. The skill on show that day matched anything seen in any Rugby League game played anywhere, anytime, in the RFL, that season . . . talking of that game makes it OK to mention Graham Steadman without washing your mouth out in this village, what a game he had - only to have the man of the match award snatched from his clutch in the dying seconds by Des Foy.

It's never been more true than today. With both sides at the top of a dog eat dog Second Division, separated by points difference, and both having been beaten by Huddersfield (who seem to be getting their act together), there is a great deal at stake today.

Team manager at Oldham is the highly respected Peter Tunks, who had a distinguished career as a player, notably with Canterbury Bankstown Bulldogs, Leeds, Sheffield and a short spell with Salford - as well as gaining State of Origin and International honours. The way he is running Oldham, although not unique, is probably the prototype for the way Rugby League clubs (if they have a spark of sanity) will be run for the rest of the Nineties and beyond; payment of players by results, no telephone number contract payments, no spending money they haven't got, and a sound youth policy. This may sound a bit Stalinist (no. the players are not given cabbage soup on training nights) but it isn't. Tunks is quite willing to push the boat out within reason, and resents articles in the press about Oldham's hand to mouth existence, which he insists, with justification, is a fallacy.

Tunks has pushed the boat out, or perhaps it should be the cheque book on a couple of notable occasions lately, as well as doing some astute dealing in player exchanges. He's signed Wally Gibson from Huddersfield, one of the most promising full backs in Division Two for a reasonable fee . . . especially considering that he was valued at a hundred grand at one time.


Tunks has recently raided the ranks of the punt and grunt brigade. He signed centre Nathan Clarke from the Bristol Club and he's being brought on carefully.

On a less exotic note - he comes from a Rugby League background - he's signed Martin Strett from the Orrel rah rah club. They are famous at Orrel. They featured in the TV series on the Beeb, which was meant to compare League and Union clubs in the same community (you got the distinct feeling that they wanted the Rugby Union club to look good) . . . in this case the borough of Wigan. It showed the smooth professionalism of Wigan and the power and skill of Rugby League at its best . . . Rugby League at its most mediocre would have looked good in comparison with what was going on at Orrel, whose contribution was orchestrated by Des Seabrook, their coach. Seabrook is the man who said that Rugby League was a simple game for simple people. Well if seeing him in action was the behaviour of a sophisticated person, then I'm happy being simple. Where does Seabrook's philosophy leave Martin Strett? Did a few thousand of his braincells melt away before the ink was dry on his contract? Of course not.

I'm very fond of the Watersheddings, It's what you might call idiosyncratic (there's a fancy word for you Des). The two tiered stand behind the sticks, and the trip around the dog track after you have paid to get in are an example of this. However my favourite bit of the ground has to be the scoreboard with its clock. This structure (which surely deserves listed building status) has a real 1930s, 1940s look about it . . . straight out of Noel Coward's 'Brief Encounter'. You can just imagine Trevor Howard arranging forbidden meetings there with Celia Johnson. "Dahling". "Yes dahling?" "I'll see you under the scoreboard clock at the Watersheddings, that young Bernard Ganley looks like making a good 'un? "I know dahling". "I know you know"."I know you know I know, and Fiona's beginning to suspect." (enough of this British Post War movie nostalgia . . . Ed.)

There has been a fair bit of swapping and changing at Watersheddings over the last year or so. For example, Duncan Platt has gone to Leigh along with Tim Street. The most outstanding player to have come in the opposite direction being prop forward Mark Sheals. There seems to be a rota system in operation for players, coaches and clubs in Lancashire – no doubt Tim is due to move to Rochdale some time next year, probably in exchange for somebody like Colin Whitfield. Now then, whose turn is it next to be coached by Jim Crellin?

Tunks swapped Iva Ropati, sometime Featherstone Rovers player, for Charlie McCallister. Iva is scoring tries standing on his head for Oldham, whilst Charlie has fetched up at Whitehaven. Judge for yourself who got the best deal.



They were beating the Australian Tourists 23-15 and Don Fox was charging through the pack to score his try and then he was kicking magnificent goals with a leather ball in the mud and nobody pranced on with a sand bucket. The rain continued to pour as I trudged home, but I didn't care. I sidestepped the puddles and swerved through the drops until I got into our backvard. And our lass thought I was a right silly bugger when I came panting into the kitchen looking for my dinner, soaked to the skin and claiming I was Don Fox.

While I was writing this article I was listening to some of my old jazz 78s on my gramophone. As I rooted through some of the old discs I dropped one on the floor. It broke of course, as old 78s have a tendency to do. But just before I consigned this particular piece of history to the bin, I examined the label. 'Hawaiian Sunset' it read, 'Swing and Sway with Sammy Kaye.' Now who the hell was Sammy Kaye?

Last year we had 36 clubs and three divisions. To ordinary mortals the answer was quite clear, 3 divisions of 12 clubs each, 2 teams to be relegated and 2 to go up.

Cries of horror at this, not enough matches, clubs would lose interest. Suggestions that the County Cups should be eliminated. More cries of horror that this old competition should go. After all it is one of the oldest competitions we have, giving the lesser clubs extra income and larger gates.

Clubs at the top of the first division echo Denis Betts thoughts, but after all it is only the successful clubs that 'suffer' this hardship – tough. I am sure many clubs would be happy to be in this 'awful' situation.

As you all know, we have had this system for a couple of seasons with eight clubs in the second. The reason for this being is to create a higher standard and brake the 'yo-yo' system, where one club is too good for the second but not strong enough for the first. Has it worked? I don't think so, so we are back to where we were before – so much for progress. I admit the answer is a difficult one, but one thing I do feel very strongly about is the amount of money going out of our game to try abortive schemes abroad in the international fields before it has taken a national hold in this country.

A new business starting up and becoming successful doesn't immediately go international, it grows by spreading it branches throughout its own country and then thinks about the international market.

Would it not be better if Rugby League thought on similar lines? If Rugby League made certain that new clubs were backed financially, run on proper lines with proven management, setting up coaching schemes, bringing the club to the notice of the general public, before setting up these 'pie in the sky' schemes abroad? Too many clubs of late have wobbled in their first season or two, only to collapse and vanish without trace.

Congratulations to our Chairman, Eric Gardner on being elected to the Board of Directors of Rugby League. He knows he has a hard task ahead, but I am sure his judgement and common sense will prevail and hopefully help our game.

The latest rule change – the 10 yard rule. The defending side must retire 10 yards. Great, good idea, we'll have more open football. Just think for a moment, how is the referee going to control it? If he stands over a tackle when an infringement might take place, how does he have time to run backwards 10 yards so that the opposition is not off side? If he turns his back to the ball and runs back what awful things are going to happen whilst his back is turned?

Let's not tamper with our game too much. Let's think things through. Let you the public say what you think. After all it is YOUR game. Many answers will come up, for and against, does that matter? I think not, let's pick out the best before changing.

IAN CLAYTON TALKS TO THE FANS


This week Jack Sykes takes the hot seat, actually a rocking chair in our front room.

- **I.C.** How long have you been involved with the Rovers?

- **I.C.** Who topped the tackle count yesterday (against St Helens)?
- **J.S.** That's between me and the coach. I will say that Martin Pearson outplayed Tea Ropati, their stand off.
- I.C. What do you think you've achieved with the Blue and White Club? What do you hope to achieve?
- J.S. Once you catch kids young, they'll be there forever. I don't think there's much going for kids under 16 in the community, so I want to interest them in sport. We've got 82 members, from Featherstone and district, and you can go as far as Rotherham and Tingley, and we've even one in Germany. The kids love it mixing with the players.
- I.C. Any potential Rovers players?

- J.S. We've got some very good schoolboy players and Travellers Saints Junior Section players. I'd like to think it was my ambition that one of the kids turned out for the Rovers, that would be a great advertisement.
- **I.C.** You seem to have a lot of girls in the Blue and White Club. Is that a deliberate policy?
- **J.S.** It's open to anybody from 6-14. I would hope that some of the lasses go on to be more interested in the game. Some clubs have women physio's and committee members.
- I.C. What about terms of membership?
- J.S. £10 to join and they get plenty for it. Twelve meetings per year. They have quizzes, days out, discos. We've planted bulbs all over Featherstone, we've cleaned the beck out at the back of the Bullock Stand. We had a highly successful play last year. We like to do things for the community.

Well it's 1992 and you can buy the Russian Baltic fleet for that much, but Rugby League transfer fees and house prices have been badly affected by the fact that people are being careful these days, so Gibson went to Oldham for a lot less.

Gibson, along with plenty of others could be affected by the proposed alterations in the overseas quotas. It is likely that the quota might be cut to two. The theory is that overseas players are keeping British players from becom- Wally Gibson in his days at ing all that they might. There Huddersfield

is even talk of banning overseas coaches for the same reason. Strangely, one of the chief supporters of these arguments is Alex Murphy. You may remember that it was Alex who flew Michael O'Connor and Paul Vautin back specially to play in a Wembley Cup Final, in which Saints were soundly tonked and in which the two Australians were more or less spectators.

If a player is good enough and is local, then a club will sign him, it's common sense. If there is a paucity of local talent then there must be other reasons . . . the recent victory of the Hull Academy side over the Illawarra tourists, suggests that perhaps these reasons are being addressed.

In any case, our old friend 'market forces' (cut the Thatcherisms out . . . Ed.) could change the shape of player migration in the next couple of years with the admission of the Perth Pumas, Queensland Crushers, North Queensland Cowboys and the Auckland Warriors from New Zealand, into the Winfield







Media Matters

BY CHRIS WESTWOOD

"Hi, I'm Ikram Butt and I'm a Rugby League Player"

So began a recent edition of 'Eastern Eye', the Asian magazine programme on the box, a couple of weeks back.

Besides being something special as a player . . . don't tell me you don't hold your breath every time he gets the ball, or shake your head incredulously every time he squirts out of yet another four man tackle as if he were covered in Teflon . . . Ikram is important because he is Asian. In a sport proud of its multi racialism it shouldn't be remarkable . . . and soon it probably won't. Ikram Butt by being the type of player and the type of bloke he is will have had an important hand in

The programme was tightly, but informally put together. No image or word was wasted, but there was no commentary. The participants were allowed to speak (eloquently) for themselves.

There were some powerful images, all of which made you feel good about being a Rugby League person; Ikram appeared out of the darkness, a solitary figure on a running track and told you who he was, superbly understated, there was Ikram working with Batley School teacher Sally

Cooper at Mount Hirst school, who incidentally comes from Oldham, taking a coaching session and everybody loving it, there was the range of expression on the kids' faces during their trip to see their hero play for Rovers – interspersed with some gritty ground level action shots, all encapsulated within a tightly timed slot in the programme.

I spoke to Ikram about his involvement in the programme and what he thought it all signified.

"I was approached by a researcher for 'Eastern Eye' who had seen me in action and the idea of the programme seemed to have a lot of possibilities. I didn't hesitate to get involved. It was great fun, but got a bit out of hand when the kids got a bit overexcited when the cameras came. I felt a bit daft doing that opening shot because I'd only run twenty yards and the director told me I had to look shattered, but I thought it looked very effective. The programme was better than I thought it would be, particularly the action shots mixed in with the crowd shots of the kids, who seemed to get the rest of the crowd around them excited with them".

"Sally Cooper, who teaches in Batley asked me to give her a hand teaching her kids, because a large proportion of them are Asian. Using me seems to have done the trick. The kids seem to have lost their inhibitions because they can relate to me . . . if I can do it, they can. Although my involvement is connected mainly with helping Asian kids to enjoy and I hope become good at Rugby League, I want to encourage everyone no matter what their ethnic origins".

Playing for Featherstone Rovers is important to Ikram. "I could have been playing with Leeds reserves and noone would have heard of me. By coming to Rovers who are a small club, but famous, I've had a chance to excel, and show Asian kids that Rugby League could be the thing for them as well. That's one of several reasons why Rovers must go up next season. Rovers will get more media attention, especially on Satellite TV and Grandstand. I was disappointed that Rovers weren't on Grandstand last week. I thought our game was the tie of the round with the chance of a division two team beating one of the more fashionable division one sides. Seeing me play Rugby League on telly should encourage Asian kids and make them feel good about being involved."




