



Chairman's Chat

Marion Jones, our programme Editor, is constantly peeved that all her contributors consistently write about the same theme. With this in mind, beyond welcoming our friends from Oldham, and fervently hoping that this time we turn them over, I will resist the temptation to talk about 3 Divisions v 2 Divisions, last Sunday's win, and the whimsical constitution of the R.F.L. which, having had the foresight to appoint a Board of Directors, then allows the nonsense of having a debate and a vote on every major decision they wish to implement.

My chosen subject this week is Schools Rugby League Development, and the City of Carlisle's support for it.

We have had a policy of Schools Rugby League Development in Carlisle for six years. Initially this was jointly funded by the City and County Councils, the R.F.L, and Carlisle R.L.F.C. In the first three years it was very much an ad hoc affair, largely dependent on goodwill and the voluntary efforts of a large number of people including teachers, players, and parents. Three years ago the City Council, recognising the value of the sport as regards characterbuilding of the City's youth, voted to take the development under its own control, and funded the appointment of a full time officer. As a consequence of this, and the hard work of the District Development Association, ably led by Local Headmaster Trevor Easton, we have a very healthy set of junior representative sides in the City, and a strong Ladies R.F.C. side. Our under 13 side is not only the scourge of the West Cumbrian sides, they won the curtain raiser knockout competition at Gateshead in the Charity Shield competition in August last year.

There is now a real fear that the funding for this programme may be axed, as the City Council tries to reduce its budget for the 1993/94 financial year. Such a move would at a stroke destroy six years work, and leave the youngsters of the City high and dry, with no role models to follow other than the mercenary full time professionals of the round ball game.

As a parent, and a lifelong devotee of Rugby League, I urge all our supporters to lobby their own ward councillor to ensure that the modest funding of the Schools Rugby League Development is kept in place, and the City's school children are given the opportunity to continue their successful run, and to maintain sporting pride in the City. Do not forget — City Councillors are appointed by YOU, it is YOUR community tax which pays for the services provided by the Council, and YOU hold the whip hand. If YOU believe in Schools Rugby League, YOU can make sure that it continues. The City Council are YOUR servants, appointed by YOU. Make sure that they represent YOUR interests. It is YOUR money that they are spending. Make sure that it is spent on what YOU believe in.

Finally, I would like to thank our sponsors today, B.N.F.L Transport Division. We have given their Manager, Mike Carr, some memorable occasions, and some major disappointments, but they have remained loyal to the "Raiders". Whatever the result today, Mike, and I hope it isn't as bad as the Featherstone Rovers' match you sponsored, I hope that you and your charming family enjoy our hospitality, and the afternoon's entertainment.







MARK SHEALS — Rugged, hard-working prop, who joined Oldham in a three-for-one exchange deal with Leigh in the summer of 1992. To Leigh went Tim Street, Keith Newton and Duncan Platt as Oldham boss Peter Tunks finally got the man he had been chasing for more than a year. Won a Lancashire cap last season but missed his county debut due to suspension.

BEN OLSEN — This Danish born forward made a name for himself with London Crusaders and signed for Oldham in the famous swop-shop summer of 1992 with winger, Richard Blackman, a Londoner returning "home" to join the Crusaders at Crystal Palace.

IAN SHERRATT — Former Oldham and Lancashire schoolboy. Left Oldham for Salford and returned last season. A hard grafting prop-forward.

RICHARD PACHNIUK — A 20 year old from Dewsbury with Polish grandparents, Richard started in the "A" team 1990/91 season. A clever, creative thinking type of hooker, he is expected to go a long way.

RICHARD RUSSELL — A local lad who "arrived" home at Watersheddings via Wigan. Played for Wigan on the wing in the world club championship against Manly but is now regarded as stand-off or loose-forward. Creative player with an excellent pair of hands.

STEVE WARBURTON — Steve was the BARLA open age international stand-off season 90/92. He signed for Oldham from Warrington amateur club Woolston and made his debut as a substitute against Hull in the last match of the 90/91 season. Did well and enhanced his reputation further in France. A clever, attacking player with poise and class.

TOMMY MARTYN — A player of exciting potential, Tommy is the son of former Leigh, Warrington and G.B. forward Tommy Martyn and the nephew of Mick Martyn, who set scoring records as a forward in the early 50's. He is a stand-off or centre, who can "sniff" tries out of nothing . . . "Poacher" of the rugby league varity who can turn a match on a stroke.

GARY CHRISTIE — Fast winger and yet another member of the BARLA international youth squad. Oldham clearly believe in youth policy. Gary was top try scorer in New Zealand.

TINY SOLOMONA — A Kiwi of Western Samoan origin, "Tiny" signed for Oldham in early 1992 from Widnes, but did not make his debut until the start of the season because of groin trouble. Has had two groin operations since the turn of the year but is playing at the top of his form now and won the man-of-the-match award in Oldham's first round Lancashire Cup win against first division club, Warrington.

STEVE KERRY — Former Preston Grasshoppers R.U. half-back, turned professional for Salford for whom he was a prolific goal scorer and he topped the RL points scoring list in 1990/91 when Salford won the 2nd Division championship with 427 points. Can play equally well at stand-off or scrum-half and was long admired by Oldham Coach Peter Tunks, before he finally got his man in September 1992.

IVA ROPATI — A member of the famous New Zealand footballing Ropati family, Iva was the top try scorer in the country last year. A new signing for Oldham and an exciting prospect for the team.

SCOTT RANSON — Twenty-four-year-old St Helen's player and the top try scorer from his former club, Swinton. Signed for Oldham in March 1992.

SHANE TUPAEA — Ex New Zealand player. Signed for Swinton then Rochdale. A hard tackling defensive second-row forward.

So the three-division set-up has gained a repreive even though it may prove to be only a temporary one. It's remarkable how two weekends of frost, together with the threat of fixture congestion, concentrated the minds of club representatives when the vote was taken. It would appear that yet again nobody was prepared to look ahead any further than the next couple of months.

Despite being pleased that three divisions are to be retained, the longer-term outlook for the professional game gives me, for one, little cause for rejoicing.

Although it is generally agreed that refereeing standards are still in need of improvement, the R.F.L.'s Controller of Referees, Fred Lindop, has been made redundant along with another eight of the staff at Headquarters in a cost-cutting exercise.

Chief Executive Maurice Lindsay is reported as talking of a restructuring involving two fourteen-club divisions. This only halfway through the second season of the present three-division arrangement!

What is needed at this time is a period of quiet reflection by all concerned, to be followed by properly thought-out schemes to be considered by all sections of the game — clubs, players and spectators — before any further decisions are made regarding the way the game is going.

One of the points to be considered ought to be the comparitively simple task of getting back to a proper fixture list. By that I mean one in which his or her club at home, at a set kick-off time, every other Sunday.

As a result of the rejection of the two-division proposal, the remainder of the season has suddently assumed much more significance for a number of clubs, including Carlisle. Instead of a placing between third and bottom meaning that next season would be spent in the lower division, avoidance of the bottom two spots is now of paramount importance.

A good start was made last Sunday with a nail-biting win over Rochdale in what at times was an ill-tempered match with too many echoes of the previous encounter between the clubs on December 13th, which was believe it or not, the last time Raiders played a match.

Given the lack of match practice and the inclusion of players who had not had the opportunity to become familiar with their teammates' play, it was a competent performance, even though home supporters were somewhat relieved to hear the final hooter .

Today will see the last appearance this season of Steve Georgallis, who has been such an influence at stand-off. He will be a difficult man to replace, but we wish him well back in Australia. Thanks a lot, Steve.

Today's visitors started the season as most people's choice to gain promotion, and so far they haven't disappointed. It's always hard to get a win against Oldham as far as Raiders are concerned, but hope springs eternal!
