

SIMPLY THE BEST

No. 8 - BOB IRVING

Today our look back at some of the great Oldham players of the past, features the outstanding Oldham forward of the late 1960's and early 1970's . . . BOB IRVING.

Bob signed for Oldham in January, 1965, at the age of 17 and by the end of the 1964-65 season he had already made 11 appearances in the first team. Before joining Oldham, he played for the Saint Joseph's amateur club in his home town of Huddersfield. In the ensuing years many clubs, especially from the white rose county, would regret losing out on the initial Irving signature.

Bob was a classic "running" second row forward, with a good turn of pace and the strength to push off defenders and crash through tackles. After receiving the ball on the burst close to the line, there was many

a full-back who would just be carried over the line as Bob completed yet another touchdown.

Representative honours soon came Bob's way, first at Great Britain Under 24 level and eventually full County and International recognition followed.

For the majority of the time Bob spent with Oldham, the form of the team was indifferent to say the least and notwithstanding the heroics of team-mates such as Martin Murphy and Ken Wilson, no trophy or medals would come to Oldham, or Irving, during this period. Indeed it is testimony to Bob's talent that, in 1969-70, when the club finished next to bottom of the League, he was still selected for the 1970 tour to Australia and New Zealand by Great Britain.

On leaving to join Wigan in September, 1973, Bob had played over 250 games for Oldham and scored over 70 tries.

As I have stated earlier, Bob Irving was a "Runner". The sort of player that excites and thrills the crowds. When in combination with a ball player in the style of Geoff Fletcher or Frank Foster, his strength and speed were utilised to devastating effect. Over the years Oldham have been blessed with some fine second row forwards such as Bob Sloman, Sid Little and Andy Goodway (Internationals all).

An esteemed list to which to add the name . . . BOB IRVING.

FROM the **BOARDROOM**

CHAIRMAN JAMES QUINN

WHAT do YOU think about Summer Rugby? I make no apologies for continuing the debate in this column this week because I feel passionately about it and I also feel that, in the past, too many issues in Rugby League have been touched upon and then pigeon-

I want to try and keep up the debate on the benefits of a season

running from March to October and I would like to know your views about it. If you would like to express a view, for or against, or perhaps a "don't know", please drop me a line at the club. I cannot promise to reply but I can promise that all the points of view will be carefully monitored and considered and I will certainly take them all into account because, after all, it is the views of the paying spectators which count most of all.

I got the opportunity on a recent Boots 'N' All programme to express my views for summer rugby and I was also given the opportunity to have my say in the Oldham Evening Chronicle, the Manchester Evening News, the Rugby Leaguer, the League Express and even the free paper in the Rochdale paper, the Express.

I have written to Maurice Lindsay, the Chief Executive of the Rugby Football League and now I intend to write to every chairman of every club in the League, asking for views and encouraging support for consideration to be given to what I consider to be a very important topic for the future well-being of our game.

It is also my intention to put together a dossier of facts concerning League attendances during the recent freeze, the number of matches postponed, the number of games clubs have had to squeeze in over a given period (two a week in many instances) and the crowds on midweek evenings in mid-winter compared to Sunday afternoons.

It is easy to form opinions of the heart but in Rugby League, as in most walks of life, opinions on topics of the day are best formed by the head or, alternatively, by facts.

Once I have got all the facts to hand I want to go straight to the Rugby League's Board of Directors with my proposals and submit the facts in support of my case.

As I have said before I know there would be problems associated with summer rugby, but at this stage I think it would be harmful to get bogged down in detail. Let us first examine the PRINCIPLE and then we can worry about the PRACTICE once we have decided that summer rugby would be a good thing.

Some people have pointed out that there would be a problem with the change-over of seasons in the first place. We now finish about the end of April so, do we carry straight on with the new "summer" season, or do we wait almost a full year before starting the summer schedule? A year would be far too long to close down. Neither would it be a good idea to carry straight on with a summer season at the end of a winter season.

I would think we could best beat that problem by phasing in summer rugby over a period of. for example, four years, gradually putting back the start of each season year by year until the season had been shunted from September to April to a new schedule from March to October or thereabouts.

There are lots of ideas to be put forward and lots of issues to discuss in relation to summer rugby, but I want the talking to continue and I want YOU, the fans, to take part. Please think about all that has been said in relation to summer rugby over the last few weeks, then think about the cold dark nights of winter, and drop me a line with your views.







Once again the R.L. Challenge Cup ties are upon us and the main question on the mind of all supporters is, will the Wigan dominance of the competition be broken at last?

One really has to admire the sheer talent and professionalism of the men from Central Park, as they set off in search of their Sixth Consecutive Challenge Cup victory.

Of course, up until the recent Wigan success, the record for the number of consecutive Challenge Cup Final appearances belonged to Oldham. This was back in the pre-Wembley days of the 1920's, when the trophy was won in 1925 and 1927 and the club were beaten finalists in 1924

In all, the club has reached the final on seven occasions, starting with the famous victory over Hunslet in 1899, when the Cup came to Lancashire for the first time. The match was played at Fallowfield, Manchester and the winning score was 19-9.

The next time the final was reached was in 1907, when Oldham finished second best to Warrington in the match played at Broughton. The score was 17-3 and one of the star players for the "Wires" was Sam Lees Jnr. who had, ironically, been signed from Oldham earlier in the sea-

The biggest upset concerning Oldham in a final came in 1912, when the "Roughyeds" were redhot favourites to win but, alas, went down 8-5 to a workmanlike Dewsbury side at Headingley.

So it was on to the 1920's when the club became real Challenge Cup specialists. In 1924, the final was lost to Wigan at Rochdale by 21-4, but the following year, Hull K.R. were defeated at Headingley by 16-3. Oldham made it three finals in a row, losing out 9-3 to Swinton again at Rochdale but revenge was soon forthcoming and in the 1927 final at Wigan, Oldham defeated the "Lions" by 26 -7.

PHOTO FEATURE - Sadly the 1927 victory remains the last appearance of Oldham in a Challenge Cup Final. However, in spite of having some dreadful luck in the competition, I don't hold with the view that the club is destined never to reach Wembley and it won't be too long before the Cup is once more being photographed on the "Sheddings" steps, as in 1927.



PREVIOUS ENCOUNTERS

Surprisingly, this is only the second time Oldham and London Crusaders have met this season. The last time was on the opening day of the season on 30th August, when Oldham won 27-12, thanks to an accomplished first-half performance.

Halafihi and Atkinson scored tries for Crusaders with Smith and Pitt each landing a goal.

For Oldham, Tommy Martyn kicked five goals and a drop goal, while tries were scored by Stuart Cocker (2), Mark Meadows and Sean Devine.

Cocker was signed to sniff out tries and he obliged with a couple on his debut. Iva Ropati, the other centre, made many long breaks on the way to landing the Man of the Match Award.

By following Martyn all over the meadow, Cocker scored tries in the 20th and 80th minutes, but the alarming drop in the standard of performance after half-time was a worrying feature.

Oldham were well in control in the first half, when Mark Meadows had a tremendous spell as a second-row runner, dashing into the gaps off a stream of passes from skipper Richard Russell.

Martyn's kicking game kept London pinned in their own quarter and although the visitors tried to play more football in one match than they did in six last season. Oldham were in command.

London's fight-back in the second half was as dramatic as it was unexpected. Sean Tupaea was given a rest at half time and with him went Oldham's defensive pattern.

Within four minutes, London had cut Oldham's lead to one point and for the next 25 minutes Oldham struggled badly. They missed Tupaea on defence and the injured Martyn on attack and the game was wide open until the last 10 minutes when the home side, strengthened by the return of Martyn, ran in 14 points to breathe easily for the first time in the second half.

Even the try that killed of Crusaders was a fluke. Martyn, Sheals and Maxwell all hacking-on a loose ball, before Devine was awarded a dubious-looking touchdown.

At that, London heads dropped and Martyn capitalised on yet another handling error, to send Cocker dancing in for his second on the stroke of full time.




