
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

'THE ROVER'

Latest News from Post Office Road

This afternoon, at Post Office Road, we are to witness the most important game of the season to date in the Stones Bitter second division championship race.

Our visitors, Oldham, are now the only obstacle in the way of Rovers bringing the Championship trophy to the club and the outcome of today's encounter may well determine its destiny. Both sides are now on level league points having won 15 games each, but Rovers have the advantage of a better scoring difference and have also a game in hand on Oldham.

With those facts taken into account a victory for the home side would certainly go a long way towards securing the title. Whatever the outcome both sides can take comfort from the fact they will be playing first division rugby again next season as there is now a virtually unassailable difference of twelve league points between Oldham and third placed Rochdale Hornets.

Today's match is the third league encounter of the season between the two sides, Rovers having won the previous two. The last meeting, at Post Office Road, proved to be a tremendously exciting affair that could have gone either way right up to the final hooter. Oldham came up with their best performance of the season and Rovers did well to take the spoils at the end of the day by the narrow margin of 24 pts to 20. However Rovers will need to be conscious of the fact that 'the Roughyeds' have the current longest winning run, in all divisions, of seven matches with six in the Stones Bitter second division plus one in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup from last Sunday when they defeated London Crusaders.

But for some cruel luck in last weekend's Challenge Cup tie against St Helens, Rovers could also have boasted a similar success rate, having had six straight consecutive wins prior to the cup game which although resulting in defeat did realistically represent a moral victory as the Rovers matched the Saints stride for stride in a classic game of rugby league that will be remembered for a long time for the sheer quality of football that was served up by both sides. Four tries were scored by each team and at the end of it all, with Rovers pressing hard on the Saints line, only an extra Paul Loughlin goal took his side through to round two.

In assessing last Sunday's game the aspect that undoubtedly cost Rovers the match was the massive penalty count against them, which with fifteen minutes to go totalled 2 for and 10 against which, taking into account their conduct over the rest of this season, is certainly uncharacteristic as Steve Martin has produced one of the most disciplined outfits for many a year at Post Office Road.

One incident that has generated a good deal of controversy and debate over the past week was when

lan Smales recovered a loose ball and ran off instead of playing it. Viewing it on the video the referee could be forgiven for making the decision to penalise lan although no St Helens player does actually complete the tackle. From the resultant penalty the Saints scored six points when we would have had the ball. Had that been the case then Rovers would be in the second round. Referee Mr Cummings saw it differently – and that's fair enough – it was '50-50'.

What really 'niggles' is that two very similar incidents took place in our previous home match against Swinton and on both occasions the referee of the day, Mr Kershaw, sent the player back a full ten yards to the spot where he was supposedly tackled and was told to play the ball! The writer of this column is of no doubt that the consequence of this particular infringement was interpreted correctly by Mr Cummings, but at the same time can't help thinking that if Mr Kershaw had refereed the game then Rovers would have still been in the Cup. The great game will never command the credibility it deserves until anomalies such as this, which confuse and irritate the paying public, are removed.

PLAYERS

After sustaining a cut over an eye, which turned septic, in the recent game at London, Gary Rose is now fit again and able to resume first team duty from today.

During the week Martin Pearson appeared to be making good progress after the knee strain that side-lined him during last Sunday's epic cup tie against St Helens. Hopes were reasonably high that in-form Martin would be fully recovered in time for today's match.

Another player making good progress is Richard Gunn who is now walking unaided, having had the plaster removed from his broken ankle. The talented hooker could surprise everyone by making a comeback far sooner than anticipated if he continues to progress at his present rate.

RE-ARRANGEMENT

During the week officials of the club were in discussion with those of the London Crusaders with a view to bringing forward our scheduled home game from Friday 9th April to next Sunday afternoon.

The London club appeared to be keen to go ahead with this suggestion but the Board of Directors at Chapeltown Road had, at the time of writing, still to ratify the rearrangement plans.

We hope to be able to confirm or otherwise to you over the tannoy during the course of this afternoon's match.

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

A NEW FACE AT CHAPELTOWN ROAD



Whose imagination would ensure that there would never be any shortage of new but half baked ideas into the new century, should they make it that far?

OK so there's some bad stuff going down at the moment but we don't need to get too depressed (just depressed enough, Ed.) There)s plenty of clouds hanging over other sports as well. The loss of Aldershot and Maidstone from the Football League . . . and the precarious positions of many others, including Premier League clubs, The African National Congress has given the Rah Rah boys permission to stage the so called Rugby World Cup over there. The SARFU are very naive if they think that that's the end of the story. The ANC are now in a strong position, you could say they have the South African Union by the . . . perhaps we shouldn't bring politics into sport not on a match day anyway. Talking of South Africa, welcome to Jamie Bloem, who has journeyed half way around te World almost to be a pro Rugby league player . . . he looks like being a good 'un and we wish him well. I saw a clip of the South Africa - Russia game the other night, both sides look to have made giant strides. But on the other hand things could be done better in Rugby league couldn't they. What's the betting that the forthcoming GB -France game is played in front of 4,000 at Headingley? When they could pack out smaller grounds, or stage the game somewhere like Sheffield, a true development area and the scene of a missed opportunity when the Aussies were over here. New Zealand is a big growth area for Rugby League with a side joining the Winfield Cup soon. Yes, the game is growing in some places. The Kiwis will be here soon. Yes NZ Rugby League fans are finding it impossible to book their Rugby league centred holidays in which they will fill stadia and spend lots of money. I wonder if the 10,000 or so British fans who went to Australia last year had the same problems? You can go on and get deeper into Gordon Brittas-land, but don't bother for now because Oldham are back again for part three of what would be the Royal Rumble or something in the WWF. I watched it the other night, now that's what I call sport. I think the wrestling boys have so much to teach us, particularly with regards the rule, we should some of them the next time the RFL feel like having another tinker with them - in other words probably this weekend. I am particularly fond of the bouts where more combatants enter the ring all the time, until it's full of writhing, sequinned bodies and the last one left standing turns out the lights. This is the direction that Rugby league should be going. Obviously a radical rethink of team strips is required, although I'm sure Ellgren could come up with something suitable for Rovers in gold lamé and maybe games could start with two players on the filed and gradually add people until everyone in the ground is involved. Don't worry folks, I'm only kidding, we don't do daft things in our great game do we? As usual the game is likely to be tight and the stakes are high. Both sides have kept winning but it's been Fev's ability to win by bigger margins, with a defence which knows where it is going at last, providing a platform for some exciting and often ruthless attacking play. Today's game, unless it's a draw, a not unlikely outcome, should render points difference temporarily irrelevant in terms of League placings, but watch for everyone doing their sums again when it gets nearer the end of the season, especially if Huddersfield keep upsetting the applecart. I read somewhere that Oldham are going to do some mega rebuilding work at the Watersheddings. This worries me. Does this mean the end of the double decker stand behind the sticks at the far end? I hope not. This is a truly original piece of architecture. If Chesterfield can have its crooked spire, Pisa its leaning tower, Castleford . . . well just about everything, then Oldham should retain this monument to the corrugated manufacturers art. It should be declared a listed building, or should it be listing building before it's too late.

There is a good chance that when all this is done with and we've played our quota of League games against each other, that our paths will cross again this season. Not in the cup of course, a competition which Rovers were eliminated from last week . . . but what a way to go, never was the cliché 'a moral victory', truer. Rovers and Oldham are more than likely to cross swords in the Second Division Premierships at Old Trafford.

Peter Tunks has done a great job at Oldham, but he faces a problem which Featherstone are going to have to confront themselves next season. This is strengthening the side for the rarefied atmosphere of Division One. This doesn't mean finding and funding extra members of his squad . . . where are the good players? - I know, in the Alliance and Academy sides but these are long term prospects. Newly promoted sides need experienced players to keep them competitive. There is also the psychological and physiological aspect of playing in a more intense, competitive league (yes I know the second division has been competitive, but it's not the same). Rovers' two games against Saints showed us that. The emotional charge of playing and watching Rugby League at that level grabs you by your throat and squeezes your adrenaline out if you, but you want more and that's why getting relegated is such a bummer. We've seen some good competitive Rugby league in Division Two, but it just doesn't compare.



'Super, Smashing Great, Look at what you could have won!"

I have made a ritual out of being a couch potato on Sunday evenings. I walk home from the game, switch on the television, plump up two of our softest cushions and lie back on the sofa to watch Bullseve, then the news and sometimes I'm halfway through Harry Secombe's Highway before I stir. On Sunday last, I trudged back with heavy heart after Rovers' pulsestopping show against St Helens. Images of what I'd just seen played. rewound and fast-forwarded through my head like some kind of Jeremy Beadle 'You've Been Framed' on amphetamines. I automatically plumped my cushions, switched on 'ITV and laid out. After all you can't beat a bit o' bully on a Sunday teatime. A man from Sheffield thought the Islets of Langerhans were in the North Sea and a woman from Kidderminster couldn't throw darts for toffee. Images of St Helens pinching the game continued to whirr in my mind's eye. A man who was 6 foot 7 inch tall won Bully's special prize. Ian Smales was penalised for nothing. And the time was fast approaching when Jim Bowen was going to say 'Look at what you . . .', except he didn't say it. He didn't say it because the lads from Sheffield won a holiday for four in

beautiful Barbados. I was thinking what might have been had not St Helens scored their last try, had not the referee penalised lan Smales. 'Look at what they could have . . .', but then it doesn't matter does it? Featherstone Rovers won a lot of friends on Sunday, they won a lot of respect and also fostered a lot of pride that some would claim has been missing for a long time.

When I was a young lad living in Mafeking Street I used to go to see an old man on our row called Johnny Hope. After every game I gave him my report on who scored and who played well. Every week he would tell me about one great game from Rovers history, the day when in 1906 we beat Widnes in the second round of the cup. He would then start to recite the team of that day, 'Jukes, Randall, Higson, Kellett . . . 'he croaked it out almost tearfully. If I live to be 90. I will find a young lad and ask him to come and give me reports about Rovers matches. And I will tell him about the time when Featherstone Rovers tackled like stags and attacked like whirling dervishes against St Helens in the first round of the cup in 1993. 'Bibb, Butt, Manning, Newlove, Tuuta, Smales . . . super, smashing, great.'

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... As I See It ...

What a marvellous cup match we witnessed last Sunday. It brought back to me memories of some of the greatest matches played at Post Office Road. Such a splendid display by all our players really deserved a draw – but it was not to be. Beaten by the league leaders of the first division augurs well for the future, even if it was a 'one off' match. It was a wholehearted display by every player. However, I thought it a disappointment that the 'Man of the Match' did not go to a home player. The award received the reception it deserved.

Having endured some undistinguished matches, with little atmosphere, it was wonderful to feel the pulsating aura of the ground last week, and to see it nearing the imposed capacity at long last.

I do believe that the cup-tie illustrated how far we have come this season under coach Steve martin. I think he has impressed us all with his thoroughness and attention to detail. When one thinks back to that defeat at Rochdale in September, which was the first match he saw the Rovers play, to the 2 point defeat against St. Helens, the improvement has been tremendous.

One of Steve's pet 'hates' is giving away needless penalties, and he is severe on any player committing these. The biggest difference he has brought about is in defence. Last season we were losing matches although scoring something like 28 points. Whilst the defence has tightened considerably, he has kept the tries coming in a thrilling way.

As an individual, the improvement in Martin Pearson, is considerable. I have watched Martin through from the Alliance side, where his class and ability were always there to see. This season his tackling has become one of his 'strengths'. His goal-kicking has never been in doubt, being able to 'stroke' the ball beautifully.

His speed off the mark and eye for an opening help to keep him among the leading points scorers in Rugby League. If he had not been injured last Sunday would the result have been different?

Another player who has improved his game since joining Rovers is Owen Simpson. Always liable to score tries in up the best of company, his defence has stepped a gear or two as well.

Ikram Butt must be the busiest winger playing to-day. With his roving commission he is likely to see appear on the opposite wing, or taking the ball forward from a defensive position. Little needs to be said about Paul Newlove for his expertise is there for all to see, and he improves every year.

I thought Chris Bibb and Terry Manning rose to the occasion in splendid fashion against St.Helens, as did Brett Daunt, whose confidence is improving with every game.

I have left the forwards to last, because their defence and attack matched the League leaders in every department, one cannot give higher praise than that, with Brendon Tuuta the 'jewel in the crown', what a performance Brendon. My 'Man of the Match'.

The coaching staff under Steve Martin cannot be left out, well done. Keep up the good work. We were relegated in freak circumstances, lets go up in a blaze of glory!

I feel the Club's try scoring record of 31 in a season by Cyril Woolford in 1958-59 may fall this year. Paul Newlove is averaging almost a try a match, and Owen Simpson is hot on his heel. Both are in the 'Top Ten' with 22 and 20 respectively.

Martin Pearson is fast approaching 200 points for the season, also in the 'charts' for goals with 71 and 14 tries.






Aren't You . . . IVA ROPATI?

HE AIN'T IVA HE'S MY BROTHER

Have you noticed how nobody admits to ringing up the club call? It's the equivalent of saying that you watch Eldorado or read Barbara Cartland books. I once rang Rovers call up from the Isle of Arran, in the pathetic hope that we'd beaten Widnes at Naughton Park. It was through the cub call that I first learned that Rovers had signed Iva Ropati. I'd seen Joe Ropati play loads of times and was well aware of the famous New Zealand Rugby family.

Iva brought to the Rovers' threequarter line something they had been traditionally been short of ... pace. Sure enough, despite one or two problems related to naivete and inexperience, Iva got himself amongst the tries. In particular I'll always remember one he scored against Castleford, well you do don't you? Uncharacteristically the pitch was a swamp well worthy of anything they can come up with at Crystal Palace and the wind bit your face with teeth of dirty rain. It was glorious. Despite this the ball fizzed along the Rovers line in a simple yet graceful passing movement that defied the elements and which had Iva Ropati on the end of it. Wonderful.

Iva returned to New Zealand to complete his college studies. He returned to Britain as a Sheffield Eagles player, but moved to Oldham in an exchange deal (all deals are exchange deals these days) which took Charlie McCallister to Don Valley, where he didn't reign long before moving to Whitehaven.

This could be the second time in a week that we have crossed swords with members of the

Ropati family. Iva's brother Tea played for Saints in. last weekend's unforgettable game against Saints, and he's arguably the best standoff playing in British Rugby League at the moment.

As befits a sport which prides itself on its family image, there is a rich history of brothers playing in Rugby League. We are closely familiar here with the Fox brothers. How many kids in Featherstone in the Fifties and Sixties were admonished by their mams to eat their sprouts or they wouldn't grow up to be like Don Fox? Never mind what happened after he moved to Wakefield, Don Fox played the best Rugby League of his career for Featherstone Rovers in partnership with the great Joe Mullaney.


Probably the best known brothers playing Rugby League today are the Walters brothers, Kevin, Kerrod and Steve, who have been such great players for Brisbane Broncos, Canberra Raiders and their State and National sides and no doubt we'll be seeing plenty more of them in the not too distant future. You never know, if The Aussies give Warrington, Widnes and Wigan the sack from the forthcoming tour itinerary because of the World Sevens unpleasantness, then Rovers or Oldham might get a game against them.

From what I could discern at Fev's last encounter with Oldham, Iva has changed considerably since his days with Rovers. He looks to have had a major attack of the upper body strength syndrome and seems to be a better all round player . . . there have been big improvements on the game awareness front. Meanwhile I think I'll have a few bob's worth on Rovers call, there isn't a great deal else to do here on the Outer Hebrides in February. I wonder what the greatest distance is that Rovers Call has been consulted, not that I expect anyone to admit to it.

Tomorrow night the Academy travel to Salford for what looks a hard fixture. Our next home game is not until 20th February when Leigh visit.

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
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Media Matters

Go into any tap room and get involved in a conversation about any popular sport, not just Rugby league, and the talk will stand a good chance of finding its way round to the topic of commentators.

There is hardly a sports fan who doesn't think that he or she can't do better than the velvet tongued oracle who converts action into words on the telly or radio. For some reason commentators are reviled by sports fans, although adored by the blow dried, velvet dickie bowed impressionists of the chicken in a basket night club circuit. Was it a coincidence that Mike Yarwood plummeted to obscurity at the same time as Eddie Waring (and Harold Wilson to be fair) disappeared from our screens? Sporting folklore is studded with examples of the malapropisms, mixed metaphors and gobbledygook uttered by our champions of the sheepskin coat industry. No doubt you'll have your own favourites, like the one from a cricket test match between England and the West Indies, when Mike Holding was bowling to Peter Willey and the commentator said the immortal words, 'The bowlers Holding, the batsman's ', you can guess the rest. Or the snooker commentator back in the early days who informed us that 'for viewers watching in black and white, the pink is behind the green'.

Rugby League maniacs are blessed with first class coverage of the sport on local radio. Probably the best and arguably the most popular is that of Radio Leeds, although I am a big fan of 'Team Talk' on Saturday evenings on Magic (sic) 828. The excellent Terry Crook, Ron Hill,

Tony Chalk . . . who incidently also commentates on Rugby Union for the station (he must have done something wrong to have to spend his Saturday afternoons trying to think of something to say about Old Carthaginians versus Saint Trinians former pupils), provide an excellent service for those at home and the Sony Walkmen, and the switching on of car radios at five o' clock is as synonymous with Sundays as the unwrapping of Oxos at half past twelve.

There are plenty of other ex players involved in broadcasting. Ron Hill, Terry Crook, Ray French and plenty more. Now that players are expected to be much more 'media friendly', we can expect many more to join their ranks as they come to the end of their careers. In Australia Peter Stirling is absolutely brilliant. But what about over here? Well, Garry Schofield does quite well, he's on 'Question Of Sport', as I write this. Mark Preis excellent an communicator and has a future as one if he wants one. However the man who has impressed me, never fails to have something articulate yet blunt to say no matter how shattered or heart broken he is after the final hooter of a test match or cup tie, is . . . Lee Crooks, I'm serious.



David Creasser, in action for Great Britain.

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

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
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OLDHAM

On reading the Rugby Leaguer last week it was of interest to note Phil Clarke, the Wigan and Great Britain loose forward. had a piece printed. Whether this piece is to become a regular event or not we shall have to wait and see. Phil Clarke stated that until someone told him that Dewsbury played at Mount Pleasant, the home of Batley, he'd no idea that the teams shared. He didn't say whether or not he knew where Dewsbury used to play before setting up. Now it strikes me that if one of our promising young internationals and possible future Captains doesn't know this, just how much does he and others players like him know? Other players like him being ones that go to a top first division side like Wigan, straight from being Amateur. Unlike players who start off at such clubs in the third division and then transfer to a top club.

It would be interesting to ask these such players questions that to most of us would be easy. Questions relating to the third division, like who plays at Tattersfield, or Cougar Park? Do these players even know how many teams are in the third division or in the league in general? If they never played for a struggling team, living life from season to season, having to sell a promising talent to balance the books for another season, then they

probably don't know much about life in the lower divisions. These players will probably finish their careers earlier than before, still with a first division club instead of moving on to lower division clubs to finish their careers, like Batley or Doncaster. If they do then they'll never know what life is like.

What is more tragic, though, is if directors and board members of the big clubs don't know what's going on with the lower division clubs. If they don't, they should. Until they do, how can any voting on the future structure of the game or other important decisions be made constructively? Big clubs' directors will look at any major decisions as to how it affects their own club first and foremost with how it affects the League secondly. This is why Rugby League will always struggle from crisis to crisis. Rugby League would be far better off if ten or twelve clubs could compete with Wigan. But unfortunately until more clubs get a bigger slice of the cake, this will never happen.

Last week's match was a fantastic advert for Rugby League and shows that being in the second division doesn't mean life's all doom and gloom. Rovers took the championship leaders and probably the best team in the country at the moment all

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the way. There was no fluke or bad play from St Helens either. On that performance no other side in the first division except Wigan would've stopped Rovers being in the second round draw. Once again the turning point which eventually cost Rovers the match came down to an amazing refereeing decision. If anyone could give me a reasonable explanation as to why Ian Smales wasn't allowed to carry on running, I'd be eternally grateful. On the down side Rovers let a 16-4 lead slip, but to be fair Rovers were starved of possession for twenty minutes, forced to kick out of our own half. Rovers also lost our third of four meetings with first division clubs, but in them all Rovers competed and could have won them all, they certainly weren't disgraced in any. People have asked if Rovers should've gone for goal at the end for the draw, but a midweek trip to St Helens with this afternoon's crucial championship match a few days after. It was all or nothing, unfortunately we got nothing. Had Rovers won then what sort

of justice is there in drawing Wigan away. Great for the bank balance, but when it comes to the cup, Nottingham, Chorley and Batley for a trip to the Semis would do for me. Stuff playing the big clubs, let them knock each other out. But that's the cup draw. Rovers let nobody down and did everybody proud.
