



SIMPLY THE BEST

No. 11 - BRYN GOLDSWAIN

Bryn Vernon Goldswain was born on 3rd August, 1922 in Methyr Tydfil, South Wales. His family later moved to the mining village of Abercave and it was there in the local side that he first played competitive rugby.

Of course this was Rugby Union and Bryn was progressing well in the 15-a-side code, when his studies in accountancy took him to London, where he tried his luck at soccer and actually had trials with Wolverhampton Wanderers.

During the Second World War, Bryn served with the R.A.F. and played rugby once more, regularly turning out for the Bomber Command team. It was at this

time that he met Ted Bedford, of Hull K.R. and, on his recommendation, he was invited to go for a trial with the "Robins" and after a few games, was signed on.

Bryn transferred to Oldham in July, 1949 and started the 1949-50 season in his favourite loose-forward position and after just two games, was made captain of the club.

He was capped by Wales many times and also became captain of his National side.

Bryn was a very skilful player and a natural leader, so his choice for the captaincy at Club and National level, came as no surprise to the Oldham supporters.

On the field of play Bryn's attributes included being a superb ball handler and having the ability to kick well in open play with either foot, as well as being a reliable goal-kicker, if ever the maestro W. B. Ganley was out of the team.

His last game for Oldham was at Barrow on 2nd April, 1956, so Bryn just missed out on the glory years that immediately followed. However, I have lost count of the number of times older supporters, officials and players of the club have told me that the seeds of that great team were sewn when BRYN GOLDSWAIN joined the club.

FROM the BOARDROOM

CHAIRMAN JAMES QUINN

I have a feeling many Oldham people might be on the terraces for the first time today for a long time - or the second time, perhaps, if they were attracted out last Sunday to watch our new wing pairing of Darren Abram and Nigel Heslop in action for the first time.

The regulars, who follow us through thick and thin, will have

heard what I am going to say today many times previously but, for the benefit of the newcomers, I would just like to say one or two things about what we are trying to achieve at Watersheddings, in the hope that a bit of background knowledge will help to retain their interest and that they will be keen to come again, their appetite for Oldham Rugby having been aroused.

Our five-man Board of Directors is a relatively new one, but we are totally committed, as is coach Peter Tunks, to guiding the club out of its present financial difficulties and into a bright new future. The club's debts must be paid off and will be paid off. We owe that not only to the club's

creditors, but to the club's credibility in the local community.

With that in mind, we are currently involved in negotiations with many bodies and organisations in the hope that we can sell off five acres of our Watersheddings complex, to pay off the debt and then acquire sufficient financial aid from Local, National and European grants, to redevelop our stadium, so that it can be used by the public at large and especially by handicapped people via the Oldham Owls, the local sports club for the disabled.

Throughout these talks we are getting a lot of help from a lot of people and I would like to place on record the Board's gratitude to such bodies as Oldham MBC, Oldham Owls, McColl of Manchester (Architects and Designers), Local MP's and civic personnel and many other individuals, too numerous to mention by name. We even had, last week, a visit by a deputation from the Heritage Department to look at the Watersheddings ground and see at first-hand the amount of work that had to be done to upgrade this famous old stadium, to take us into the next century.

On the football side we are making a determined bid to build a side for the First Division and, here again, I must pay tribute to the work of Peter Tunks and his coaching staff. Peter is working on a shoestring budget and he is doing a marvellous job behind the scenes, to create a squad that will have a realistic chance of holding its own in the top flight, always assuming that we win promotion

His latest signings, Nigel Heslop and Darren Abram, will be excellent additions to his squad. I was unable to see their debuts last weekend because I was away in South Africa, but I am sure both will quickly become firm favourites of the Oldham crowd, as Peter continues to build a back division that will be full of flair and football, to say nothing of genuine pace.

Whatever the result of today's tie, there is an awful lot to look forward to at Watersheddings. We must clinch promotion mathematically and then we have to ensure that we finish off the season in style, with and appearance at Old Trafford in the Premiership Finals. Anything else, such as a win in today's Cup tie, would be a bonus.

Off the field, we are very excited at the way things are going to give the club a bright future. On and off the field there should be plenty to enthuse about over the course of the next few months. I sign off as I started - with the hope that our "new" fans enjoy what they see today and come back again to support us for the rest of the season and beyond.



Halifax in 1989. Very fast explosive player, he was a Great Britain Tourist in 1988. Former Leeds player. Occupation: Financial Consultant.





PREVIOUS ENCOUNTERS

Today's Third Round Silk Cut Challenge Cup tie, at Watersheddings, is bound to stir memories of a similar clash on 16th March, 1986, when Oldham beat Bradford 6-1 to move into the Semi-Finals for the first time in 22 years. Bradford were winning 1-0 as the tie edged to its final 10 minutes and this was how I described what happened next: "Glen Liddiard, all the way from Sydney, Australia and playing as an amateur because he was too young to take



pay, flashed into action with Oldham trailing 1-0 and time running out fast.

"His one decisive break in a defence-dominated tie on a gluepot pitch, fashioned the only try for big brother David and put Oldham only one game away from their 50-year Wembley dream.

"What a magical moment it was for Oldham - and for the Liddiards.

"There were only seven minutes left and Oldham were toiling to burst open Bradford's brilliant defensive screen. David Liddiard put a kick into touch on the full, but Ian Sanderson won a strike against the head, Ray Ashton was allowed to set the attack moving from the side of the scrum (did he knock-on?) and Mike Taylor surged forward to the Bradford 25-yard line.

"From the play-the-ball, Oldham moved the ball sweetly across the face of goal via Terry Flanagan and Tom Nadiola and Glen Liddiard flashed into the gap, drew Keith Mumby, and sent full-back David racing joyously to the posts. Oh, brother!"

It is interesting to recall that David Hobbs was a key member of the Oldham pack that day, while Ian Sherratt was Bradford's substitute forward.

Robin Whitfield of Widnes was the referee and the tie was watched by a crowd of 6,918. Brendan White dropped a goal to break the deadlock after 69 minutes and no one would have been surprised if the one-pointer had proved enough to take Northern through.

The rival bosses had this to say afterwards - Frank Myler (Oldham): "I would have been a little bit sick if I had been Barry Seabourne. His lads gave him 150 per cent, but we kept plugging away and we just deserved to win in the end. This is a great day for the Oldham club and we hope the whole town will get behind us in the build-up to the Semi-Final".

Barry Seabourne (Bradford): "Disappointed, obviously, but we went out to a try that was fit to win any Cup tie. I'm glad it was a cracker and not a scrabbled affair. That would have made it doubly hard to take".




