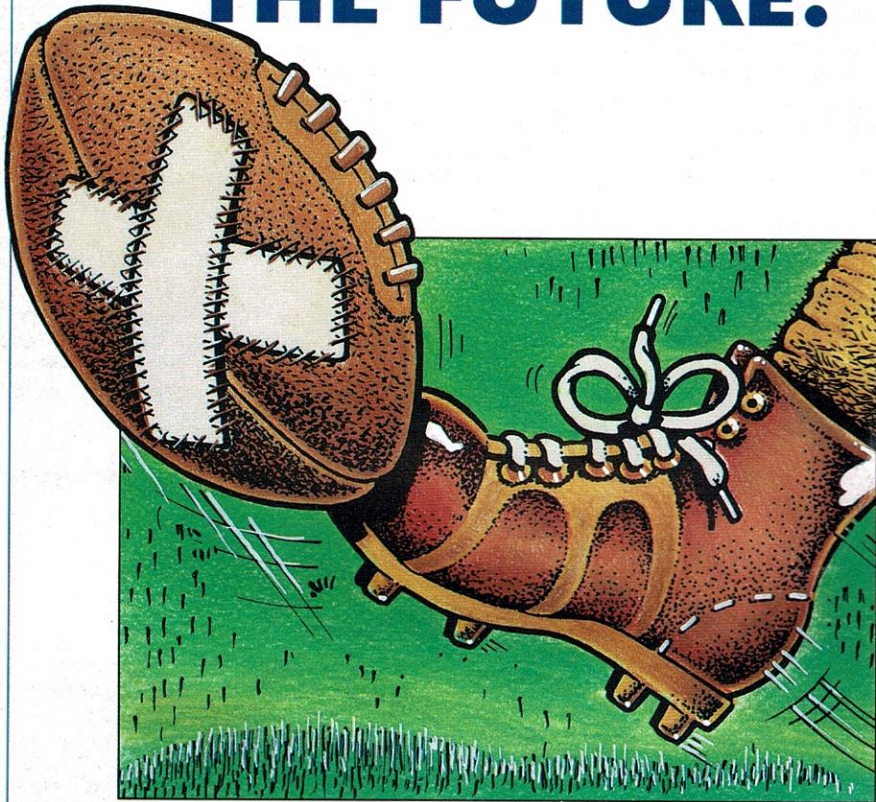

TODAY'S VISITORS

Today we welcome Oldham RLFC to Thrum Hall for the first time since September 1989, when we met in a Second Division campaign which finished with the Roughyeds triumphing in the Premiership, and gaining an ultimately short lived promotion whilst Fax could do no better than a 5th place finish.

A Fax side on the ascendant were to meet a relegated Oldham twelve months later, since when, the fortunes of each club have been very different.

Current coach Peter Tunks, an amiable Aussie state-of-origin player who had a spell with Leeds, has done an amazing job of gaining back the club's First Division status whilst making a profit on the transfer market. Chiefly through astute player swaps which has given him the 'Swap-Shop' tag! His current squad consists of a good mixture of seasoned pro's, young talent and solid squad players, soon to be bolstered by Aussie test giant Bob Lindner — a capture which rocked the Aussie game when announced two months ago. The Illawarra 2nd row forward is sure to add to the gates and the try tally at Watersheddings over the next two years.

Tunks' only problem position looks to be at stand-off where no obvious candidate stands out, although, at the time of writing a deal to take Leigh's goal kicking full back Paul Topping to Oldham looks on the cards, which could lead to either Paul Fletcher (the ex-Castleford full back) or Wally Gibson, a fine, pacey Kiwi signed after a contract dispute with Huddersfield, being given a run out at No. 6. Tunks is not short of options in the three quarters, recent capture from Orrell R.U. Nigel Heslop, the ex-England wing, looked good in the recent Wigan 7's, and David Jones (ex-Wakefield Trinity) should occupy the wing spots, Hugh Gumbs having twisted an ankle in last weeks narrow

victory over Rochdale. Shaun Irwin, signed two weeks ago from Castleford, will likely partner either Darren Abrams or Martin Holden, a promising ex-BARLA international signed from Wigan St Patricks this summer, in the centres.

Whoever wears six, it seems certain that Steve Kerry will wear seven. Kerry was a prolific points scorer during his time at Salford, who fell out of favour at the Willows following the arrival of Craig Coleman. He will no doubt be wanting to prove a point to his critics this season.

'Tiny' Solomon, who figured in this summers New Zealand v Australia test series, will undoubtedly wear eight, Peter Tunks recently describing him as 'the best Kiwi forward in this country', with Ian Sherratt, ex of Bradford and Salford but now in his second spell at Watersheddings, and Paul Groves, the vastly experienced international capture from St Helens making up the front row, Jason Fogerty will miss today's game due to illness.

Andy Goodway looks set for a place in the second row, the luckless forward Goodway started his pro career at Watersheddings, before gaining honours at Wigan, and spent a short time under Doug Laughton at Leeds. His back row partner could be either Ben Olsen or David Bradbury, the young BARLA tourist signed on return from the 1991 tour. Mike Kuiti, another Kiwi who has had spells at Rochdale and Leeds will complete the pack — the former Kiwi test loose forward is another with a point to prove in the top division.

If Oldham can consolidate a First Division place this season it will be the first such time in seven years. As a 'Yo-Yo' club. Bob Lindners influence will no doubt be a crucial factor, as will Peter Tunks' ability to get the most out of a squad with little or no experience of playing together. The first few matches will be crucial to the morale and confidence of the team, and no-one should dare underestimate a side with everything to gain, and so little to lose.

OBITUARIES

Today's match could not be allowed to pass without reference to the sad loss during the close season of the club's Academy Coach Colin Dixon. Full tributes to this most popular of men were given in the "Evening Courier" and the Rugby League press, but Halifax R.L.F.C. wish to place on record their own appreciation of Colin's services to them as player, coach and general personality, and wish also to pass on their commiserations and best wishes to his family.

Colin died in June, just a few weeks after his induction into the Halifax R.L.F.C. Hall of Fame. He saw this as the great honour it was intended to be, and it will ensure that his name will always be remembered, as well as known to future generations of Halifax supporters.

The early close season was generally a sombre time at Thrum Hall with the deaths of two other former players. First was Des Healy, our second-row forward at Wembley in 1949, a match which came soon after his recruitment from Irish Rugby Union. He became a local schoolteacher and later deputy headmaster of St Malachy's at Ovenden, remaining for the rest of his life in his adopted town of Halifax and becoming a prominent member of the Past Players' Association.

We also lost another of the very few Irishmen to play for Halifax when Dave Hickey died on June 8th. Dave was a speedy winger who played for us between 1935 and 1940, being part of our triumphant 1939 Wembley squad. Unlike Des Healy, he returned to his native Ireland after retiring, but retained many friends in Halifax. We send our regards to the Healy and Hickey families too.

HALL OF FAME

The close season saw the opening of the new Halifax R.L.F.C. Hall of Fame in the Taverener's Bar. Sponsored by the Past Players' Association, who put it together, and Courage Brewery, it features photographs of 24 of the club's greatest players, plus several other photos from Halifax's past. Anyone who has still not seen the Hall of Fame can do so on any Thursday evening, when the Taverners is open from 7.30pm onwards.

Efforts have been made to trace the descendants of the early Hall of Fame inductees, but in the case of Archie Rigg so far without success. Rigg, who played at the turn of the century, was a local lad, so quite probably there are relatives in the area. Indeed one of them donated Archie's caps and medals to the club, perhaps soon after his death in 1951. If anyone knows of any relatives, the information would be gratefully received by club historian Andrew Hardcastle.

1902-03 SOUVENIRS

In season 1902-03 Halifax performed the "double", winning both the Challenge Cup and the Division One Championship. To celebrate this marvellous achievement there were produced a number of souvenirs. For a number of years the club has possessed a battered old coffee mug with the names of the players and pictures of the two trophies. Recently Keith Sutcliffe, the great-grandson of one of the 1902-03 heroes Herbert Hadwen, kindly loaned a matching milk jug. It is known that there were other items, such as a sugar bowl. Does anyone know the whereabouts of any such crockery? It would be nice to complete the set!

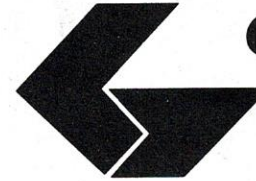

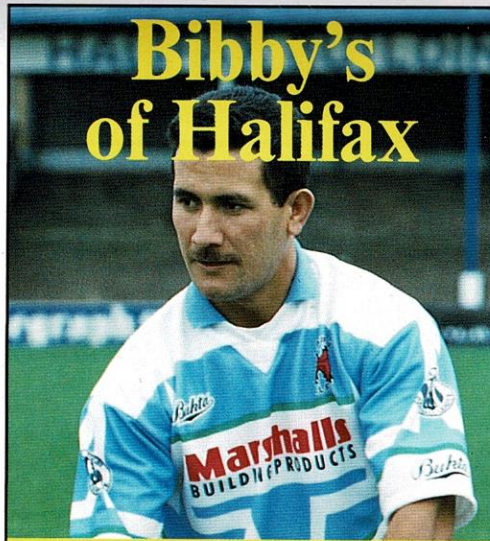

ACADEMY UPDATE

Good Afternoon

Could I firstly take this opportunity to publicly thank everyone here at Thrum Hall, from the Directors right through to the players and backroom staff who have given me such a warm welcome from the day I arrived at Halifax RLFC.

To introduce myself, I arrive at Thrum Hall from the Waterhead amateur club in Oldham. I began my coaching career with the Oldham junior under 11's, whom I coached for two seasons. I then took on the under 15's, and coached this team through to under 17 level. During this period the Oldham juniors club joined forces to become the youth section of Waterhead ARLFC. It was whilst with the Waterhead under 17's that we had so much success, winning all the cups going — Lancashire, North-West Counties, North-West Counties League and we finished the season with the National Youth Cup! Whilst coaching the youth section I also coached the Waterhead 2nd team in open-age football for two seasons, under Ken Wilson, who was 1st team coach. Last season I coached the under 19's in the National Youth League. After winning the National Cup I decided that I needed a change and that the under 19's would be the last season at Waterhead for me. I would not have been able to coach another amateur side as the Waterhead Club was the only one for me — I had enjoyed many good times and met many good friends, therefore I was looking to get into the professional game as a new challenge to my coaching career.

The Academy seemed like an excellent place to start, so I made enquiries as to which positions were still open. The tragic and untimely death of Colin Dixon left an opening at Thrum Hall, and after a telephone conversation with Malcolm Reilly, I made a formal written application. When I finally heard that I had got the job I was delighted to say the least.

Having now trained here for the last couple of months, we have finally got together a squad which I am very hopeful will give all you supporters something to enthuse over! For me to be able to work with such great names as Mal Reilly and Gary Stephens is something else, and both coaches are putting their faith in youth. This, and the commitment that the board are making to the clubs future, has led to some great signings of outstanding prospects, and I look forward to telling you about them during the next few weeks.

We commenced the first phase of the Academy competition at Craven Park yesterday. I wish I had a crystal ball so that I could tell you about a good victory but I haven't — so I'll have to make my comments about that next time. Meanwhile, we entertain Wigan here at Thrum Hall next Wednesday at 7.30 and whatever the result — I can guarantee you a good quids worth of exciting Academy football. The support here for Alliance football is legendary — I hope that we can persuade some of you to become Academy regulars as well.

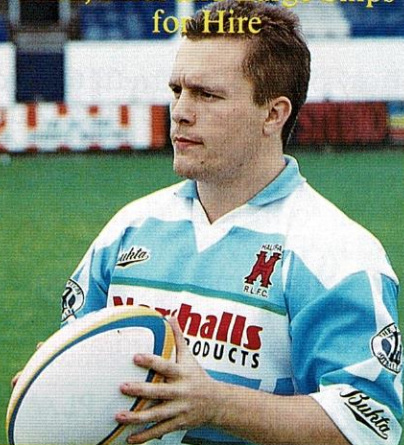

MEMORY LANE WITH OPEN RUGBY MAGAZINE

OCTOBER 1987 — CHANGING TIMES AT OLDHAM

On Saturday the 22nd March 1986 I was at Central Park, Wigan to watch Oldham's Challenge Cup semi-final against Castleford. Sitting in the next seat was Jimmy Knox. On the stroke of half-time, Oldham scored what appeared to be a crucial try, to take the lead by 7-6. The Oldham supporters thought that we were 'on our way to Wembley' for the first time in the club's history. It was not to be, as Castleford came back strongly to win with a convincing 18-7 final score.

Disappointment, disillusionment and disbelief were the thoughts echoed by the many Oldham followers on the sad and silent journey home. In my view, this was something from which Oldham never really recovered, and I got the impression that if any opportunity ever became available to Jimmy Knox, enabling him to become involved with the club's affairs, then he would accept it.

That opportunity became reality on the 3rd June 1987 when Oldham's new board of directors was announced and Jimmy Knox's name was amongst them, the other three members being Greg Pache (35), David Gardener (38), and the club's former chairman Harvey Ashworth.

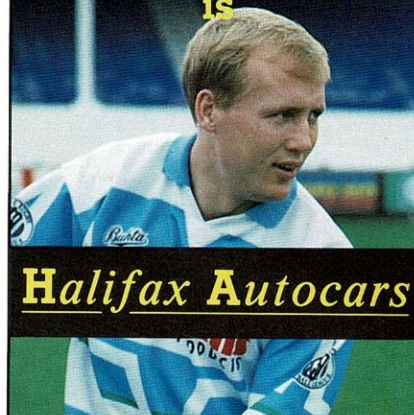
Jimmy Knox is Oldham born and bred, and the Managing Director of a plastics firm. Pache, born only 200 yards away from Oldham's Watersheddings ground, now resides in Warrington where he is M.D. of a steel suppliers. Gardener, a regular supporter for two years, heads a car sales firm, and is also on the board of local soccer club Stockport County. Ashworth is well known to the club and is a wholesale butcher.

These are the four just men who have taken on the liabilities of Oldham R.L.F.C. which currently stand at around £300,000. Faced with ground safety problems and relegation to the second division, the club was tottering on the brink of extinction. However with the help of the new board they hope to realise £250,000 from the sale of £1 ordinary shares in blocks of 25. The club also aims to work closely with the local council in the development of the Watersheddings facilities. These men have 'put their money where their mouths are' and hopes are high according to Greg Pache to 'do a Wigan', although only time will tell.

They have been faced with many problems at the club, and have been helped by one or two members of the previous committee. They have also had to cope with the introduction of the players' new freedom of contract, and the Rugby League tribunal system having just signed Paul Round for £65,000 — more than Oldham had hoped to pay.

On the field the directors have opted for one of Rugby League's new breed of coaches with the appointment of Eric Fitzsimmons and his assistant Iain McCorquodale, as well as the return to the club of popular Aussie Mal Graham. One of the priorities of the new regime has been to examine local talent, as previously many good Oldham based players have been allowed to perform with distinction for other clubs. One of the aims of Eric and Iain is to try and foster a good spirit in the team, and whilst not making wholesale changes, they have added new ideas regarding the responsibilities of each player, and have attempted to give each player a 'job description' in every game.

Eric has been pleased with the attitude of the players and hopes to maintain a healthy competition for places within his squad. He also makes the point that good players do not necessarily make good coaches — but of course there are exceptions. One asset is to have Mal Graham's leadership qualities on the field, and they have been encouraged by a good start to the season. They have developed systems of play which the players themselves believe in, a point which they stress is vital to long term plans.

Everyone connected with the club is confident that Oldham will once again be a force to be reckoned with. Off the field, the directors stress that their commitment is not only on the playing side but aim to make the Oldham club a viable proposition in business terms.

I think the time for change has been long overdue at Oldham. One cannot help but feel confident of success both on and off the field, not only for this season but for the overall future of the club.

JUNIOR KIWIS TOUR 1993

New Zealand's world-rated Junior Kiwis are to make a month-long tour of Britain this autumn highlighted by a first-ever appearance at Wembley Stadium.

The cream of New Zealand youth rugby will meet the Great Britain Academy side for the first time in a full length curtain raiser to the Great Britain v New Zealand First Test under the twin towers on Saturday 16th October.

The Wembley doubleheader is the centrepiece of a nine-match itinerary which opens in Hull on Thursday 23rd September and finishes at Wigan on Thursday 21st October with the staging of the second Academy International at Central Park.

Of the nine fixtures seven will be against Academy opposition, the remaining two versus a BARLA International XIII and a BARLA Presidents XIII.

As well as the two Academy Internationals at Wembley and Wigan, the Junior Kiwis will meet Lancashire and Yorkshire Academy sides, plus the Trophy winners and runners-up in last season's Academy League and Challenge Cup competitions.

Chief Executive Maurice Lindsay said: "This is the most demanding British fixture list produced for a visiting Junior Kiwi squad, meeting Academy opposition for the first time since its formation in 1991. Coupled with the two BARLA representative encounters, the nine-match visit assures that the renowned Junior Kiwis will meet the best of British youth during what promises to be a memorable tour.

"The Junior Kiwis will also provide the Great Britain Academy side with an indication of the strength of opposition to be expected on their inaugural tour Down Under next summer in another major landmark in the short, yet dynamic, history of the Academy!"

LOOKING BACK WITH GARY DIVORTY

Most rugby league players would claim to share, or have shared, a special relationship with their first coach, perhaps fondly remembering the spark of motivation which was fanned by his influence, or remember the discipline and values which were first instilled in much the same way as a sergeant major hones his new recruits into shape. Gary Divorty, however, can perhaps claim a relationship deeper than most, as his first coach was his father! Born in York in 1966, it was at Hatchett Road Junior School where Gary was first introduced to the oval ball.

"When I first went there it was all soccer" he remembers "but my dad was a keen rugby player who played for a local amateur side, and he came to the school to start an under 11's team. At the time I was about 8 years old and I used to enjoy watching my dad play — so I got involved and it went from there."

Interestingly enough, Gary's first position was loose-forward, a spot he has played in throughout his career. Whilst a young boy, he would go and watch his local York side — his hero at the time was Dave Barons, although John Holmes at nearby Leeds was to become his idol as Gary's awareness of the top sides grew.

Leaving Junior School, Gary signed on for Heworth, being one of only two 'Big' amateur clubs in his area at that time, as he explains, "Rugby League in York didn't really pick up until I was about 12 when youth sides started springing up. There was Dunnington and Heworth who were the top sides who went into the West Riding League. So I joined Heworth, and also went through the York boys teams at under 11's, 13's and 16's."

Gary gained County caps and played for BARLA'S national youth team whilst with Heworth eventually gaining BARLA'S highest accolade — becoming a tourist to New Zealand in 1983, alongside such now-famous colleagues as Garry Schofield, Richie Eyres, Dave Creasser and Deryck Fox. On his return, he signed pro forms with Hull, despite an offer from Leeds who were the glamour club of his childhood, and had been the subject of his ambition since an early age.

"Hull and Leeds both wanted me but Leeds didn't offer me a contract" he explains. "At the time Leeds was a bit 'old-boyish', they said sign and we'll see you right but Hull actually came up with a good offer, so myself and Garry Schofield signed with Hull and I ended up having six good years there."

It's ironic then that the situation should go full circle in 1989, when after picking up a Yorkshire Cup winners medal, 2 runners-up medals, a John Player losers, a Premiership losers and a Wembley losers medal with the Airlie Birds, David Ward should come in with a good offer which would take Gary to Headingley at last.

"I didn't want to leave Hull" says Gary, "but they weren't offering contracts, and I needed that security. With Leeds' offer was the prospect of a job (Gary worked for the club lottery) and that was a major factor, in case I had a bad injury which stopped me playing."

By now, Gary was married, and his young family were a priority to consider. Following the arrival at Headingley of firstly Doug Laughton, and then Ellery Hanley (a loose forward) Gary again began to fear for that security.

"It was a great relief to be approached by the Halifax board, and I didn't need much persuading." He recalls, "I spoke to Mike Ellis on the telephone, we had a meeting and that was that!"

Since his arrival at Thrum Hall twelve months ago, he has been a cornerstone in the pack. His professionalism and workrate are highly impressive and his defence is solid. Perhaps the missing link could be a revival of an international career which never quite got off the ground?

"To play for your country you have to first play well for your club", is Gary's immediate thought on that subject. "We've had a good off-season, we've signed some fine players, and all I'm thinking about now is getting back to the business of winning some honours for the club, the fans and myself. What comes will come — for now it's the new season and the first game and that's what I'm thinking about!"
