



First Division Football, live T.V. coverage, bigger crowds, loads excitement - yes its good to be back in the Big League.





## Roughy 'eds Recalled

Following on from last season's popular "simply the Best" series, we have a new, similar feature that will appear in all our home match programmes for the 1993-94 season.

"Roughyed Recalled" as the name suggests will be looking back over the careers of some of the many players who have played for OLDHAM R.L.F.C. over the last 100 years.

Since the breakaway from the Rugby Union in 1895 Oldham have had their fair share of internationals, some of whom are sure to be highlighted in this feature, but also there have been loval club men who never managed to attain international or county honours, yet were vital to the successes and continuing existence of the club.

In fact as the season unfolds the Roughveds recalled will include all the differing types of players to have worn the Oldham colours . . . "Big Signings" . . "Local Heroes" . . players with over 10, 15 and 20 year's service . . . one game wonders . . ex Union internationals . . . imports from 'down under" . . . we hope to cover all aspects of the club's playing staff as the season progresses.

Due to the explanatory notes above this week there is only room to feature one player, however in subsequent programmes two or three former "Roughyeds" will spotlighted.

#### No. 1 DAVE PARKER

If ever there has been such an entity as an elegant Rugby League forward, today's spotlighted player would probably be one of the few to merit such a description.

George David Parker signed for Oldham in August 1960 from Manchester Rugby Union Club, where he had been such a success that he had skippered the Lancashire County XV. 





Tonight will hopefully see the start of a new era in the fortunes of Oldham Rugby League Club. We are back in the Big League after a two year absence and an indication of the much higher profile a club can obtain in the top flight is provided by the presence of the BSkyB cameras.

We are delighted to have the TV people with us and delighted, too, to give a big Watersheddings welcome to our new signing from Australia, Bob Lindner.

If everything has gone according to schedule, Bob and his wife and young family will be settled down now in their new surroundings and Bob will be ready to step out for the first time as a member of the Oldham team.

On behalf of the board I must congratulate our coach Peter Tunks for pulling off a coup when he convinced Bob that he had a future at Oldham and that the club was set fair to "go places".

The Lindner signing was Peter's first in a hectic close season and in many ways it ignited the fuse for all the other signings that followed. It may take time for all the new boys to settle down into a combined fighting force – A TEAM – but Peter has done an outstanding job of recruitment despite financial worries that would have brought a lesser man to his knees.

I known from working alongside him, all the anxiety, tension, blood, sweat and toil that has gone into his nonstop work this summer.

The board supported him to the hilt and we must now hope that we possess the sort of squad that can enable us to consolidate in the First Division after winning promotion last time.

It will not be easy. A glance at the records shows that many promoted teams have fallen by the wayside first time out – and that is particularly true of Oldham.

Over recent years we have become the original yo-yo club, moving up and down between the divisions in six of the last seven years.

We failed to win promotion at the end of the 1991/92 season and that was the only year for several years that



have not moved either up or

This time we have invested in a lot of new players in the hope that they will do the trick. They have cost little in transfer fees, but they have to be 'kept', of course, and we have worked out our sums on average gates of 5,000, plus considerable increases in income on the commercial and sponsorship side by virtue of the fact that we are now in the Rugby Football League's front line.

We pitched our average gate estimation at a level which, with luck, should provide us with a bonus if we are doing enough to compete in the First Division.

If we can give value for money on the field I am sure we will win the support of our loyal fans, who have stuck with us through our two season in the Second Division.

It should be a fascinating season of Rugby League Football and we are glad to be back where we believe we belong – in the top flight. Hope you will come along with us.







## Last Time Out . . .

#### with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of March 4th, 1993

Oldham fans must have been shuddering at the thought of going up into the First Division as Bradford Northern cruised comfortably into the Silk Cut Challenge Cup semifinals at Watersheddings last night.

Northern's 42-4 demolition job on Peter Tunk's promotion certainties came only a month after Featherstone's 52-14 hammering of their Second Division title rivals at Post Office Road.

Both games underlined the extent of the work that needs to be done on the Oldham squad before it is facing opposition like Bradford and Featherstone every Sunday next season.

Local fans hoped the black cat that strolled across the pitch shortly before kick-off would give their team some cup luck.

But Bradford's total domination of this one-sided tie had nothing to do with good fortune, and everything to do with extra pace, power, strength, individual ability and intensity of performance.

In Kiwi scrum-half Dave Watson, Bradford had the outstanding player on the field, and one who could ghost through Oldham's brittle defence as if it didn't exist.

Bradford are lucky to have a player like this who can step into the shoes of the injured Deryck Fox, and who has the talent to play equally well at outside-half and full-back.

Watson was the overwhelming choice as the game's best player – hardly surprising when considering he played a major role in most of his side's eight tries.

Bradford are not the fastest of teams, but they possess in Paul Medley one of the quickest backrow forwards of any era.

Bradford led only 14-4 when coach Peter Fox pulled off prop David Hobbs after 50 minutes, introducing the searing pace of Medley to hammer Oldham into submission.

The centres and wings had given

Oldham little trouble, but it was a different story out Wide when Medley opened the throttle to score two long range tries and set up another for full-back Roger Simpson.

Oldham were 24-4 down when Medley made a crunching tackle on Jamie Bloem with only a quarter of an hour left.

The tackle looked fierce, but fair. The South African stayed down with what seemed like a serious neck injury, and the game was held up for several minutes before he was carried off on a stretcher.

Already outclassed and outgunned, Oldham lost all appetite for the contest after that, and fell away alarmingly as Bradford ran in four tries in the last 10 minutes.

This did not flatter the Yorkshiremen, who would have scored a lot more points had they not lost their goalkicker when Hobbs was pulled off, and had it not been for some defensive heroics by Oldham full-back Wally Gibson.

Gibson rescued his side on numerous occasions as Watson, stand-off Neil Summers or loose-forward Dave Heron found gaps up the middle just wide of the play-the-ball.

Even Gibson was powerless to get across to his man when Medley took him on the outside to score the first of his two tries midway through the second half.

But at least Gibson gave his all. His tackling was generally sound, and he was the only Oldham player who looked capable of making a break at this level.

Bloem and Stuart Cocker, the wings, were enthusiastic enough to move inside looking for work, but Oldham were totally outplayed at half-back, and when that happens any team is in serious trouble.

Kerry had a miserable game from the moment he failed to find touch with a first minute penalty – a costly

error that set the pattern of the match

Martyn had to quit at half-time with a knee injury, after which Oldham went from bad to worse as they succumbed to Bradford's pressure and constantly dropped the ball in a nightmare 40 minutes.

And it was asking a lot of Martin Strett to slot into the No 6 job in only his second senior outing against this class of opposition.

Even before Martyn's departure, Summers and Watson controlled the midfield. They continued to do so afterwards, although Medley stole Watson's thunder in the last 20 minutes.

#### **BACK PAGES**

by Michael Turner

The format for the "Back Pages" column for the 1993-94 season, will be to look back at previous encounters between Oldham and the opposition of the day.

In welcoming all our supporters back for what will no doubt prove to be a gruelling season back in the intense competitive atmosphere of First Division Rugby League, that welcome is also extended to all the players, officials and supporters of the Bradford Northern club, who are sure to provide our lads with a stern test this evening.

The old Bradford club was one of the original breakaway teams that formed the "Northern Union" in August 1895. In that first season, of what was to become the Rugby League, the Yorkshiremen won at Watersheddings by 5 points to 3 on October 19th, 1895 with the "Roughyeds" also registering an away victory winning by 7 points to 5 in Bradford on February 18th 1896. An interesting point to note is that the first winners of the Championship in 1896 was another Bradford club called Manningham, who changed

to soccer in 1902-03 when their Valley Parade ground become the home of Bradford City AFC.

For the start of the 1907-08 season the surviving Bradford club also decided to switch to Association Football but there remained enough enthusiasts loyal to the Rugby code that the Bradford NORTH-ERN club was formed.

It would be true to say that Bradford have a reputation for spoiling the party as far as Oldham are concerned. The old Bradford club were Oldham's first ever opponents in the Challenge Cup in 1897 and "Northern" were the first team to visit Watersheddings after the end of the 2nd World War on September 1st, 1945, and were also the opponents in our centenary match in 1976 and for the launch of the share issue in 1989. All these matches resulting in victory for the Yorkshire team. Let us hope that the trend can be reversed for this, our opening home encounter back in the First Division.
