





LEE PENNY. Full back. A first season Academy player who last term made three Alliance appearances (3 tries) then shot into the first team when first David Lyon left for St. Helens, then Rob Myler was injured. He stayed at top level with 21 appearances and six tries, collecting two G.B. Caps at U/21 level against France.

ROB MYLER. Full back/wing. Joined Wire 2.10.89 from Widnes St. Maries ARL. Early season injury cost him the full back spot last season but he came back on the wing after Alliance consistency. Good strike rate at top level with 11 tries from 28 games. Useful goal kicker.

ALLAN BATEMAN. 27 years old centre signed start of 90/91 season after gaining four Welsh R.U. Caps as a Neath player. Now a highly rated League player, 11 tries last season and a rock-like defence, playing well above his weight. Welsh R.L. Caps.

JONATHAN DAVIES. Former Llanelli R.U. and star of the Welsh R.U. International side. Joined Widnes 5th January 1989 producing more headlines than any other R.L. event. Shock transfer to Wilderspool this season. Begins a further stage in a brilliant career with an all-in R.L. record of 141 + 9 apps, producing 1,365 points (89 tries, 502 goals and 5 drop goals).

CHRIS RUDD. 23 years old, 6' Whitehaven born, classy centre signed 1.8.89 from Kells ARL. G.B. U/21 Cap against France. 27 tries and 95 goals from 79 full appearances. Star material but has been unlucky with injuries.

MARK FORSTER. Strongly built local 28 years old wing/centre. Ex Woolston ARL. Testimonial season 92/93. Two full G.B. Caps and 3 U/21. 232 full apps., have produced 94 tries plus three goals.

PAUL WILLIAMSON. 23 years old, 6' 1" centre/wing, came to Wire 1987 from Woolston ARL. Long-term leg injury hindered progress but enjoyed good Alliance season last term, 25 full apps have brought 12 first team tries.

PAUL DARBYSHIRE. 23 years old former BARLA Tour skipper and Wigan St. Pats ARL. Joined Wire December '88. GB U/21 honours. Another career hindered by longterm injury. Has played first team at 1,4,6 and 13 with equal ability and enthusiasm. Needs a good settled run.

KEVIN ELLIS. 28 years old 5' 9" live wire half back. Former Welsh B International when Neath R.U. player. Became pro 30.5.89. Had a good tour of Aussie when partnering Deryck Fox in the G.B. side at stand-off. Irrepressible.

GREG MACKEY. 31 years old Sydney born half-back, ex-South Sydney, Canterbury and Illawarra. Second spell with Wire after two seasons at Hull. Topped the appearances last term with 33.

KELLY SHELFORD. Kiwi International who toured G.B. in 1989. Joined Wire October 1991. Classy playmaker who begins the seasons at No. 6. Figured at 13 in many games last term.

GARY CHAMBERS. 23 years old 6' Whitehaven born prop, now powerfully built. Ex Kells ARL 1.9.89. Steady progress earned him U/21 honours. Good last season. Ready replacement for Neil Harmon.

BOB JACKSON. 31 years old 6' 1" prop/second row Sydney born, G.B. domiciled. Joined Wire 1984 from Fulham. Had a break from the game in 1988 after injury but returned 1990 to continue as one of the best value for money players in the club. Skipper, inspirational leader, well respected and tremendously popular on the terraces.

ROWLAND PHILLIPS. 28 years old 6' 1" 16 stone prop. Neath and Welsh R.U. International. Joined Wire 1990/91. Welsh R.L. International and great crowd favourite whose R.L. career has not yet taken off. Early season form could change al that. Has had loan spells with other clubs. Wilderspool fans want him at Wilderspool.

GARY SANDERSON. 26 years old second rowloose forward. Ex-Thatto Heath ARL. Joined Wire December 1985 with almost instant promotion to first team. Has maintained consistent form as the work horse in the pack and a good one GB U/21 four times in 87/88. Missed 91/92 with injury but returned with 32 apps last season and

became club's Player of the Year.

JOHN THURSFIELD. Warrington born 23 years old hooker, ex-Woolston ARL. Joined October 1986. Consistently good player in the Alliance. Arrival of the super-fit World Class Duane Mann in December '89 left him few chances. Duane has now gone. This could be John's year.

MIKE GREGORY. 29 years old, 5' 11" signed from Wigan St. Pats 1982. Superb player who became established as GB back three player 1987/89. Captained G.B. Tour party to N.Z. and Papua N.G. 1990. Has endured two torturous seasons of injuries and operations. Has returned this season looking strong. Gaining match practice but his class demands a place. A great pro. Testimonial year.

PAUL CULLEN. 30 years old 5' 10", signed 20.11.80., from Crosfields ARL. Toured Austria with GB Colts 1982. Former centre and half back. More recently at 12 or 13. Enjoying the best rugby of his career. Totally committed on or off the field and currently the Club's longest serving player. A fine clubman who deserved his club record Testimonial in 1992.

TONY THORNLEY. 26 years old 6' 1" strongly built centre. Joined 1986 from Woolston ARL. With 48 tries from 109 full apps has a good strike rate for a centre. Injuries when in good form have hindered progress. Useful kicker.

CRAIG TEITZEL. Arrived September 8th from Illawarra Steelers where is the established No. 8. At 6' 2" and powerfully framed, he joins Wire on a one-year contract. Big things are expected from him.



He won one Lancashire cap and was a regular in the Oldham first team until his transfer to Bradford Northern in 1968, playing over 150 games for the club.

Cup Final when Wigan defeated the "Rough-yeds" by 16 points to 13.





Barring any unforseen or major setback, our fans should be able to look ahead to a good season on all three fronts.

If we can achieve our goal – and the early signs are promising – the revenue generated during the season will enable us to service the club's debt.



Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of September 14th, 1992

If the basis of a successful Rugby League team is a powerful front-row and backs who can score, Oldham must be building on the right lines judging by their 33-20- win against Warrington in the first round of the Lancashire Cup at Watersheddings yesterday.

Iva Ropati, the Auckland express, did what he has been threatening to do since he joined Oldham by scoring a match-winning hat-trick

It was the first by an Oldham centre since Des Foy's five against Hunslet in a 48-10 win on January 7th, 1990, but you go back four years to find an Oldham centre who last scored three against First Division opposition and that was Foy's effort in a 54-10 canter at Wakefield on October 26, 1986.

At Watersheddings yesterday it was no canter, but a fiercely-contested tie that could have got out of hand had it not had an experienced referee in Robin Whitfield.

Referees have been told to penalise any challenge above the shoulders, accidental or otherwise.

Whitfield took only a few minutes to warn Oldham and after a series of Warrington offences at the start of the second half he marched prop Neil Harmon after issuing a similar warning to the visitors.

Warrington can blame only themselves because Whitfield penalised Gary Chambers, Gary Sanderson and Harmon in quick succession and his patience was not going to last for ever.

The Wires committed suicide but even at that stage Oldham led 18-10 thanks, in the main, to a stunning performance from their two props, Tiny Solomona and Mark Sheals.

DOMINATED

They dominated the middle of the field in an excellent display of prop power, garnished with some deadly distribution.

They gave a hint of things to come just before half-time when Richard Russell popped up a reverse pass deep inside the Wires quarter, Sheals made the break and Solomona came on his inside to crash over near the nosts.

There was more to come within four minutes of Harmon's dismissal when Solomona broke up the middle, Sheals got with him and Ropati held off the cover to score a thrilling try in the scoreboard

orner

Solomona also played a major role in the third Ropati try when he pushed Russell into a midfield gap and the skipper's overhead pass sent the pacy Kiwi away to to his hat-trick.

Sheals, meanwhile, was driving himself to a standstill in his best game for Oldham so far.

With Solomona a great ally, he carried the ball into the heart of the Warrington defence more than any other Oldham forward, blotting his copy book only when he failed to play the ball correctly and the penalty paved the way for the second of Kevin Ellis's two tries for Warrington.

With Solomona and Sheals setting a tremendous lead, all the forwards working hard and Barrie McDermott and lan Sherratt still to come into the reckoning, coach Peter Tunks has assembled a pack that can cause some shocks this season.

TACKLES

Richard Pachniuk made more than 40 tackles while Ben Olsen, Mark Meadows, skipper Russell and substitutes David Bradbury and Paul Jones contributed much. Jones made his debut in the second half, tackling hard and distributing well, notably when he sent in Sean Tyrer for Oldham's sixth and final try.

Sean Devine was steady at half-back, while Tommy Martyn's kicking was good and his two goals off the touchline rubbed salt into the Warrington's wounds caused by Robert Turner's five failures.

Scott Ranson scored the second Oldham try off a towering Martyn kick and tested Warrington's defence many times in the second half when sent away by Tyrer. Tyrer moved to centre, with Martyn switching to full-back and Russell to stand-off when centre Stuart Cocker was substituted at half-time.

Russell had a splendid game. He led the side quietly and efficiently, worked hard by example and was always looking for the half gap and the telling pass to create play. Ropati was the star back, however, and he established the pattern in the fifth minute when he latched on to a stray Wires pass in his own half and held off Allan Bateman to score in the corner.



Oldham made mistakes in the first half, failed to control the ball, missed tackles and conceded two scrums against the head. Incredibly, Warrington took each of the eight first half scrums, yet trailed by eight points at the interval – statistics which show how hard Oldham worked to cover up their first half failings.

Mann and Shelford exposed Oldham around the rucks, but the home side tightened up after half-time and was stronger out wide, although Tyrer missed Shelford in the build-up to Myler's trv.

Tyrer had the last laugh when he scored in the corner after Martyn and Jones worked the ball to the right flank.

BACK PAGES

Like Oldham, today's visitors Warrington were one of the founder members of the Northern Union, later to become known as the Rugby League.

In the first-ever season of the professional game 1895-96, Oldham managed to do the double on Warrington and ever since there has been many titanic struggles between these two great clubs.

However, whenever the teams have met in major finals, the spoils have always gone to the "Wire"men.

The clubs met in the Challenge Cup Final of 1907 and the Lancashire Cup Finals of 1921 and 1989, each time it was the primrose and blue rather then the red and white ribbons that would be tied to the trophy. This was also the case in the match to be featured today, the 1955 Championship Final.

The match was played at Maine Road, the home of Manchester City A.F.C. on May 14th, 1955.

The final league table saw Warrington and Oldham both with 60 points, with the "Wire" placed at the

top due to a slightly better points difference. In those days the top four teams in the League played off for the right to appear in the Championship Final and while Oldham were defeating Leeds at Watersheddings, Warrington were seeing off Halifax to set up an all red-rose final.

So it was on to Maine Road on a day when the Manchester weather lived up to its rainy reputation, by way of a torrential downpour that reduced the pitch to a quagmire. Such conditions did not make for much free-flowing rugby and a defensive match saw each side

restricted to one try each, Frank Pitchford scoring for Oldham and almost inevitably Brian Bevan touching down for Warrington.

The final difference between the two sides being the two goals kicked by Warrington skipper Harry Bath, giving Warrington a 7 points to 3 victory. The teams that day were:
