

MARK ASTON

Age 26 Height 5.10 Weight 12.12 GB Caps 1

Holds the club records for goals (148) and points (307) in a season, achieved in 1988/89, when he also joined the elite band of players to play and score in every game during the season. Man of the Match in the Eagles' 1989 Divisional Premiership victory, he is the club's all time leading scorer with over a thousand points to his name and ended last season one goal short of a 500 milestone. In scoring 12 goals against Keighley in April 1992, he equalled Roy Rafferty's long standing club goals in a match record. Became the Eagles' second international. appearing as a late substitute in B ritain's defeat of France in Perpignan in 1991 and was drafted into the Lions tour squad last summer, playing four games.

PAUL BROADBENT

Age 25 Height 6.01 Weight 15.09
Signed from Castleford amateur club
Lock Lane in 1987 and has made over
150 appearances for the Eagles. Played
as tour replacement in Australia in 1992
and made two appearances for the
Lions. Has made the Eagles' number 8
jersey virtually his own and figured in
both the Eagles' Divisional Premiership
wins, scoring a try in the 1989 Final.

ANTHONY FARRELL

Age 26 Height 6.00 Weight 14.02 GB U-21 Caps 2

Eagles' £55,000 record signing from Huddersfield in 1989, Farrell was unlucky with injuries during the first two seasons at the Eagles. Last season, however, he was a revelation at loose forward, scoring 8 tries in his 28 appearances for the club. His recent form makes a full cap a distinct possibility in the not too distant future.

DAVID FRAISSE

Age 24 Height 6'2" Weight 14.7 French Caps 13

Signed on a one year contract from Carpentras. A promising career was brought to an abrupt halt in 1990 by a motor accident. Now fully recovered, this powerfully built centre or full back is back to his previous form and Eagles are hoping for great things from the Frenchman this season.

MARK GAMSON

Age 28 Height 5.10 Weight 12.10
The Eagles' second signing, from Leeds
Colts, back in the Eagles' formation year,
1984. One of the most versatile players in
the squad, only the prop and second row
jerseys having eluded him to date. Only
skipper Daryl Powell has played more

games for the Eagles, Mark trailing him by only two at the start of the 1993/94 season. His appearance record includes a club record run of 76 consecutive appearances between 1989 and 1991. Starred in both the Eagles' Divisional premiership Finals at Old Trafford and was a try-scorer in the Yorkshire Cup Final defeat last season. An occasional goal kicker, he is proud of his record of having only once been unsuccessful with the boot.

IAN HUGHES

Age 21 Height 6.02 Weight 15.07 GB U-21 caps 2

Signed from East Leeds in 1991, Ian has quickly earned a regular place in the Eagles' side, playing in 32 of their 35 games last season. Unfortunately, one of the three games he missed, through injury, was the Yorkshire Cup Final, after putting them well on the way to the Final with a sensational 60 yard try in the first round defeat at Halifax. Played in the 34-20 defeat of Oldham in the 1992 Divisional Premiership. Final and was selected to play against France at Rochdale last February.

DALE LAUGHTON

Age 23 Height 6.02 Weight 15.10
One of the successes of the Eaglesl development policy, signed from the Dodworth amateur club, near Barnsley, in July 1989. After a couple of seasons in the Youngers Alliance team, he made his first team debut in 1991 and went on to command a place in the Second Division Championship and Premiership side. Quickly made an impression on the First Division defences, moving up from second row to prop and playing in 30 of the Eagles' 35 matches last season, scoring two tries.

Age 22 Height 4.09 Weight 12.00 Signed from Hunslet after a loan period towards the end of the 1991/92 season, during which he was part of the Divisional Premiership team. Tim is fast and elusive and has a good kicking game, combining to make his one of the game's most promising players. Played in 25 games last season, scoring three tries.





The Directors were very encouraged last Sunday by the attendance of 5,755 for Stones Championship clash with Warrington, A lot of fans came from Wilderspool one of the big advantages of playing in the First Division - but, even so, there was a much bigger turn-out of Oldham supporters than we had at the previous game against Bradford Northern and that was a very gratifying sight indeed for the board.

By anyone's standards it was a good game of Rugby League against Warrington, with Oldham on top in the first half and the Wires coming from behind in the second half to finish deserving winners.

The Bradford game was a thrill-a-minute stuff in which the lead changed hands several times before Bradford snatched victory with an interception try two minutes from time.

Two home games played and two defeats. But I think you will all agree that, in

both games, we competed well. Warrington were the stronger team in the second half, but we gave them a good game and they were glad to hear the final hooter, believe me.

The pity of it all, of course, was that once we got the fans into the ground we could not provide them with the right result. However, I am sure that Peter Tunks and the players will get to grips with the situation and that the right results will come as we progress in the First Division.

Needless to say the directors are keen that the support stays with us. I have said many times before, and I will say again, that Oldham is essentially a Rugby League town. I have no doubt that, if we can build a team to win major honours we won't be talking of 5,000 fans, but of 10,000 fans. There is a lot of work to do, but you can rest assured it is being done.

There will be a lot of topclass rugby league played

on our own ground in the next few months and I am confident that the coaching staff and players will put us on the right road sooner rather than later. They are professional in every sense of the word and it was very encouraging to me to listen to them analysing the Warrington game and highlighting areas in which their game can be improved.





NEW ZEALAND JUNIOR KIWIS TOUR 1993

On Monday 20th September, the Junior Kiwis, currently rated the best Youth Rugby League side in the world, arrived at Gatwick Airport to begin their keenly awaited nine-match tour of Great Britain.

It is the Junior Kiwis' first visit to this country since 1987, and their first encounter with British opposition since 1991, when they hosted a tour by the BARLA Under-19 side. On that occasion, they won the series 2-0, taking the first Test at Greymouth 34-16 and the second in Auckland by the convincing margin of 28-0.

It was twelve months ago, however, that the Junior Kiwis made the world sit up and take notice when they routed the Australian High Schools 36-14 at Auckland's Carlaw Park.

In their 58-match history, the Australians had been beaten only once, 10-16 by Auckland Under-19 back in 1982, and never in a test match. They had already been rocked by the Junior Kiwis in the first Test at Rotorua, which they held on to win 26-24, despite being outscored by five tries to four. Now, one week later, they were simply blown away, even though their coach considered them to be at least the equal of their predecessors in the Australian colours.

Coach Frank Endacott brings five of that successful Junior Kiwi side to Great Britain with him now: wingers Alex Chan and Peter Lima, half-back Taneatua Manihera, second row Joe Vagana, and prop David Fatialofa, nephew of the Western Samoa Rugby Union captain, Peter. Endacott was denied a sixth by the senior Kiwi selectors, who chose brilliantly Manly stand-off Gene Ngamu for their squad to tour this country next month, despite his still being eligible for the Junior Kiwis.

Endacott's squad is a young one, more than half of whom will be available for selection again next year. The captain is Te Atatu utility man Henry Paul, one of a clutch of Junior Kiwi players already signed up for the Auckland Warrior's Winfield Cup squad by coach John Monie. Paul will play full-back for the tourists, and is one of eleven members of the Auckland Under-19 side which won their national tournament to have earned selection. Canterbury, the beaten finalists in that competition, provide a further seven players

Endacott is now in his second year as coach of the Junior Kiwis, having succeeded Bob Bailey and Howie Tamati in the job, both of whom went on to coach the national side. He rates his squad as very similar in strength to that which beat the Australians, although he considers the loss of Ngamu a major blow. He realises, though, that the itinerary planned for his squad is much more formidable than that which faced the 1987 tourists, with seven of the nine matches against Rugby League Academy opposition. The remaining two pit them against a BARLA International XIII and a BARLA President's XIII. As well as the two Academy internationals at Wembley and Wigan, the Junior Kiwis will meet the Yorkshire and Lancashire representative sides, plus the trophy-winners and runners-up from last year's Academy League and Challenge Cup competitions.

"The British Rugby League have done a real job on us," cracks Endacott. "It's the toughest course imaginable. I showed it to senior Australia coach Bobby Fulton, and he said we must be mad to attempt it. But we didn't want it easy, and it'll prove just how good we are, as we'll have to be very durable. It'll sort out the men from the boys."



Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of May 18th, 1992

OLDHAM'S hopes of celebrating a trophy triumph at Old Trafford for the third time in five years nosedived with the 25th minute dismissal of prop lan Sherratt in yesterday's Divisional Final against Sheffield Eagles.

Oldham played their hearts out to make up for the deficiency in numbers, but in the end it proved too much and Sheffield pulled clear in the last ten minutes after being given the fright of their lives

Trailing 16 - 4 at half time, Oldham scored three tries to one in the first 30 minutes of the second half despite sweltering temperatures and exhausting humidity.

When Ged Byrne, Keith Newton and Scott Ranson crossed the Eagles' line to bring Oldham back from the dead, many fans started to wonder if it was going to be 1990 all over again.

Victory on this occasion would have been all the more remarkable because Oldham had only 12 men. but with nine minutes left it was 20-20 and Oldham looked to be the stronger side.

Alas, Tim Street was over-ambitious with an inside pass deep inside his own half and Sheffield snatched possession, never to look back.

Oldham were up against it from the start when the first five penalties of the match went against

There was an ironic cheer from Oldham fans when their side was awarded its first penalty in the 26th minute – only a minute after Sherratt was sent off by Widnes referee Stuart Cummings for a high tackle on Darryl Powell.

I thought Sherratt was unlucky to go. It was the first incident of its kind in a good mannered

The big prop was flying out of the defensive line and, as Powell gave him the slip, he lunged and caught the Sheffield man a blow which was more instinctive than intentional.

Similar incidents later in the game – Farrell on Street and Martyn on Gamson – merely produced penalties and a lecture.

There were worse tackles in the Wigan - Saints match (Hampson on Veivers and Platt on Connolly) which did not bring the ultimate retribution from referee John Holsworth.

Such consistency is highlighted when matches take place in quick succession and referees react differently to similar situations.

Referee Cummings is a young, up and coming official. You cannot buy experience, nor can you assume that there are grounds for criticism merely because he has dismissed an Oldham player on the three occasions he has handled Oldham matches. Some may feel he acted correctly and the vastly experienced Holdsworth was too lenient.

it is my opinion, however, that the young Widnes official over-reacted in the heat of the moment on the big stage and with the eyes of the whole Rudby League world upon him.

Wisely, he would not comment fully afterwards, other than to say: "The Oldham man was sent off for a high tackle. The details will be in my report

to the Rugby League."

It was a devastating blow for Oldham, who had already been knocked for six by the skills and class of the two men who dominated the match — Aston and Powell

Powell's three first half tries gave him the man of the match award, but it was scrum-half Aston who quietly engineered the openings and fashioned the chances with his astute use of the pass and his vision to change the direction of the attack.

Aston pulled the strings and Test man Powell responded with the finishing touches in a superb double-act that could have easily killed Oldham off in the first half.

Sheffield loaded the blind side on numerous occasions and caught Oldham out where they were weakest thanks to Aston's foxlike cunning.

Oldham had no luck at all in the first half. The bounce of the ball and the referee's decision invariably went Sheffield's way.

Oldham made a lot of mistakes, however, and seemed powerless to beat the excellent defensive work of their opponents, apart from the occasion from which Platt scored wide out after a telling break by Burne.

This was probably Byrne's finest game for Oldham, and it was merely a sign of things to come when he split the defence brilliantly for Ropati and Tyrer to send Platt crashing in.

It just about summed up Oldham's luck when Platt's goal-kick from out wide struck the upright and bounced out.

Overall, however, Oldham were nervous in the

They were vulnerable to the bomb and the right flank of Nicklin and Ranson was too easily beaten or dragged out of position.

They were already 12 - 4 down when Sherratt was sent off and within minutes, Powell completed his hat trick by waltzing past Platt on the inside after a defence splitting pass by Aston.

in the second half, Street and Byrne took charge up front and Oldham's luck began to change. Slowly but surely, the balance of power began to

Decisions gone against Oldham earlier were now going for them.

More than once, Sheffield were beaten by the little kick, but the ball refused to sit up into Oldham hands.

Still, it was Oldham's turn for good fortune when Mycoe went over, only to have put a foot in touch. Broadbent was turned on his back over the line and McAlister seemed a certain try scorer only for the referee to rule that he bounced the ball when trying to touch down.

Encouraged by these Sheffield lapses, Oldham began to claw themselves back into contention thanks to the sterling work or Ropati, Russell, Byrne, Warburton and Street.

Newton worked hard throughout and Joynt began to come into his own as an attacking force.

As Oldham started to find gaps down the middle it was the Hull KR thriller all over again.

The fight back began when Byrne sold an outrageous dummy to go behind the sticks and Martyn goaled.

Nicklin, now at full-back, saved the day when he wrapped up Lumb before Joynt and Warburton went majestically down the middle to pave the way for a Newton try, goaled by Martyn.

Incredibly, Oldham were level at 16-16, but Street released an ambitious pass after a stunning break and back came Eagles for Aston and Powell, the deadly duo, to fashion a try in the corner for Mycoe

Oldham could have been forgiven for capitulating but they refused to lie down. Warburton almost got Joynt over, before half the side handled a brilliant move which enabled Byrne to unleash Ranson on the half-way line.

It was the winger's one chance of the afternoon and he took it brilliantly by scorching up the touchline, turning inside the cover and then heading for the corner to beat Mycoe for speed.

it was a fantastic try that brought the house down.

Martyn could not put Oldham in front with his goal kick off the touch line, but Sheffield were visibly wobbling by this stage and there were only ten minutes left.

Eagles looked dead and buried when Street pushed off three defenders to another defiant dash but, again, he chanced his arm and from his misdirected pass the Eagles regained possesion.

That was almost the last Oldham saw of the ball. Lumb squeezed over from dummy half for Aston to kick the goal.

Then Aston goaled again - the killer kick - when Byrne obstructed him after he had chipped ahead. Finally, that man Aston supplied the final pass for Mumby to crash over near the posts.

Aston kicked the goal to crown a marvellous individual display which could easily have taken the Tom Gergin man of the match off Powell.
