FROM the BOARDROOM

by CHAIRMAN JAMES QUINN



It doesn't need me to tell you that we have not enjoyed the start to the Stones Bitter Championship that we had hoped for. Nevertheless, we have produced only one poor performance, against Sheffield and in all our remaining matches we have been very competitive indeed.

I said last summer that we would face a challenging period in the First Division and it is certainly turning out that way but, as a club, we have to meet these challenges and disappointments head on. It is only when you come through the difficult times that you appreciate the good times and I am confident, as is the rest of the Board, that we have the players to pull through and not only avoid relegation, but establish the club as a real First Division outfit.

We now have in place an Under-19 Academy side that is doing well in its first season – unbeaten at home – and a second team that is proudly sitting on top of the Youngers Alliance Second Division. We appreciate that we are talking about the Second Division. Even so, we are up there at the top and, at the time of writing, we had a 100 per cent record.

If you take away the Sheffield game, we have been very competitive and that is reflected in the fact that we have conceded only 19 points more than we have scored.

Compare that with most of the other teams in the bottom half of the division and you will see that it is very good indeed.

We have no plans to dive into the transfer market. To start with, we have no money. Secondly, it is important that we now have a settling-down period.

We knew at the outset that we were in for a long, hard season. I said in the summer that we would cry together when things were tough and celebrate together when times were good.

Well, we are doing our crying now, but I am sure the time will come when we have something to celebrate. A win will do everyone a world of good. We will close ranks and battle it out through thick and thin.

We have had no luck so far. Any luck that has been on offer has tended to go to the opposition. Our share of luck is still in the bank and sooner or later, we will start to get our share of it.

There were some bright spots in our performance at Widnes, not least the display of young John Clarke on his debut. To say he had played only a handful of Alliance games, after leaving BARLA, he performed superbly on his First Division debut.

The overall contribution of the team was vastly improved on what we produced against Sheffield. The players stuck it out and battled together from start to finish and that is the sort of attitude that will take us clear of the bottom places.

We have a lot of experience in the

side and that will start to count when everybody settles in.

It is also important that we get the full backing of our supporters, particularly when we play at home. I was very impressed with the level of vocal support which Widnes received from their fans last Sunday.

Their supporters have seen their club torn apart by financial problems. They have lost some of the finest stars in the game, but there is no doubt in my mind that the support from the terraces lifted Widnes in the second half, at a time when the game could have gone either way.

One of the advantages of playing at home is to get the majority of fans on your side and I would like to think our supporters will rise to the challenge today.

Encouragement is greatly appreciated, believe me. The players were most encouraged by the support they got from travelling supporters when they won at Hull KR and, in appreciation, they went over to them after the game and showed their thanks in the usual way.



Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of January 2nd, 1991.

LEEDS 28, OLDHAM 12

GREAT Britain stars Garry Schofield and Paul Dixon broke Oldham hearts after Tony Barrow's men had threatened to pull off one of the upsets of the season.

The score flattered Leeds, who trailed 12-0 after 26 minutes and only hit the front for the first time when stand-off Schofield finally escaped from Brett Clark's clutches to put winger John Bentley under the posts with only quarter of an hour left.

After that Oldham collapsed alarmingly and big men like Dixon and Steve Molloy began to make massive inroads into a defence that had given its all and had nothino left to give.

Dixon, contained for an hour, performed a one-man demolition job on Oldham's forwards as they tired in the last 20 minutes.

In the end Leeds were playing cat-and-mouse with an Oldham side that conceded 18 points in the last 15 minutes.

The tackling, so raw, rugged and resilient for much of the match, was desperately poor in the later stages after gradually losing its bite from a period early in the second half.

Oldham produced a superb first-half effort. They were lively on attack, ruthless in defence, harassed Leeds into numerous mistakes, kicked intelligently thanks to Mike Ford and Keith Atkinson, blotted out Schofield with an umbrella defence and scored tries by Charlie McAlister and Clark to thoroughly deserve their 12-4 internal land.

Leeds enjoyed an 11-4 first-half penalty advantage, which went to 14-4 early in the second half.

Oldham conceded some silly penalties, but they were also unlucky on occasions to be on the wrong end of refereeing decisions.

It must be said, however, that they were guilty of several unforced errors, often involving the unpredictable and enigmatic McAlister, who then scored a brilliant try to put Leeds under real pressure.

It was difficult to believe that the McAlister who surrendered possession three times early on was the same player who, later in the game, produced several delicate defence-splitting passes around the man to look like one of the most skilful forwards on the field.

Even Test stars are human, however, and Schofield proved that when Oldham had the measure of him in the first half.

Clark, moving up quickly on defence on the outside, policed Schofield superbly and forced him into errors, not least when he twice put kicks into the stiff wind out on the full.

Leeds won the toss and gave Oldham first use of that wind in a half when lots of things went right for the visitors and little went right for Leeds.

Oldham totally controlled the game for much of the first 40 minutes. It was 15 minutes, at least, before the home side got out of its own half against an Oldham side that looked well-drilled, played with great determination and forced Leeds into desperate kirks out of defence by Schofield and John Galladort.

There were several big hits in defence by Austin Donegan, Keith Atkinson, Paul Round and McAlister, and Leeds were further in trouble when Cavil Heugh had to quit with shoulder trouble midway through thee half and prop David Young followed him 12 minutes later after a oowerful McAlister tackly.

Duncan Platt gave Oldham the lead with an early penalty goal and the visitors increased their lead after 20 minutes when McAlister got outside Clark in the the right centre berth and used his weight and power to travel 20 yards at top speed and crash over the line with several defenders in his wake.

Not long afterwards, Richard Gunn was harrassed into putting out a stray pass on his own 25 and Tony Anderson pounced to pick up the loose ball and, one handed, sent a jubilant Clark diving over by the posts.

Platt goaled and Oldham found themselves 12-0 up and thoroughly deserving of such a commanding lead. The forwards were playing well as a unit, Mike Ford and Clark were enjoying their best half-back performance for several weeks and Platt was often dangerous when linking up from full back.

Towards the end of the half, Leeds came back into the game, partially because Oldham's discipline was at fault when penalties were needlessly conceded and the side was twice taken back another ten yards for dissent.

Nevertheless, it was Leeds who had the problems at the start of the second half when Oldham defied the wind to make a promising start in which Platt beat two men and sent Paul Lord racing clear up the wing.

As full back Gallagher moved across, John Henderson screamed up on the inside but a defender also got back and Lord elected to take Gallagher on the outside, only to fall to the full back's touch line

Had Oldham gone even further in front then, Leeds might have been dead and buried, but within minutes they were back in the game with a typical Leeds try in which the ball passed through several pairs of hands before winger Phil Ford got in at the corner.

Oldham's tackling, hitherto so solid, began to lose its sting when winger Bentley moved inside and pushed off several challenges and then Dixon took over to send in Phil Ford at the corner, courtesy of an outstretched Oldham hand that diverted the ball perfectly into the path of the Leeds winger.

Irving goaled off the touch line to cut Oldham's lead to two points and, for the first time in the match, one began to feel that Leeds had more in reserve to come strongly in the final push for victory with the wind at their backs.

Schofield began to exploit the wind at every opportunity, even on the first tackle straight from a srum when he spotted Platt lying up.

At the same time Oldham started to miss vital man-toman tackles, particularly on the powerful Dixon and the tricky Paul Delaney



Molloy also began to make vital ground and on one occasion he sent Dixon on a 40-yard midfield break in which the Test forward swatted off Oldham defenders like flips.

By now, Leeds were hot favourites to win and sure enough, they snatched the lead for the first time when Schofield received from a scrum fust outside Oldham's 25, somehow wriggled between Clark and Platt, and gave Bentley a walk-in to the posts.

Irving goaled and straight from the restart, Delaney took advantage of a leg-weary defence to make another spectacular break which led to a Gallagher try, another Irving goal, and an unassailable 22-12

It was unbelievable that, in the space of two minutes, Leeds had come from behind to take the game away from Oldham's reach so ruthlessly and so professionally.

By this time Oldham had had the stuffing knocked out of them. Heads dropped, passes went to ground, a certain try was missed when Anderson knocked-on after excellent work by McAlister and Duane, and Leeds capitalised with a fourth try by Gary Divorty, which I living goaled brilliantly off the touch liny.

Oldham were merely chasing shadows by now and half the Leeds team handled with Bentley and Phil Ford both stepping out of countless challenges before Gary Lord and Gallagher enabled Divorty to put the finishing touches to a bewildering move.

In a similar performance to that at Hull, Oldham outplayed their opponents for 25 to 30 minutes but gradually lost the initiative and finished up well beaten.

A disappointed Tony Barrow said: "We find it hard to concentrate for 80 minutes and that is one of our biggest problems.

"We were brilliant in the first half, but we were unable to sustain it.

"We now face some crucial matches in which we will be trying to produce our first-half form and maintain it over 80 minutes."

It is perhaps strange that The Yorkshire side found two clubs with such illustrious tradition and histories within the Rugby League game, as Oldham and Leeds have never met Jackson in a major Cup Final.

This time the Headingley men held the "Roughyeds" to ten points, with Davies (2) and Cracknell again scoring tries, along with David Ayres and Bernard Ganley chipping in with five goals to give Oldham a 22-12 win, with Stevenson and McLellan scoring tries for the visitors along with three goals from "Golden Boy", Lewis Jones.

After this match of course, Oldham went on to win the Championship Final, beating Hull at Odsal by 15-14.
