PLAYER PROFILES ...

STEVE KERRY

Former Preston Grass hoppers R.U. half-back, turned professional for Salford for whom he was a prolific scorer and he topped the R.L. points scoring list in 1990/91 when Salford won the Second Division Championship with 427 points. Can play equally well at stand-off or scrum-half and was long admired by Oldham coach Peter Tunks, before he finally got his man in September 1992.

SCOTT RANSON

24 year-old St Helen's player and the top try scorer from his former club, Swinton. Signed for Oldham in March 1992.

IAN SHERRATT

Former Oldham and Lancashire Schoolboy, left Oldham for Salford and returned season 1991/92. A hard grafting prop-forward.

NIGEL HESLOP

Former England R.U. winger who won 10 caps for his country. Signed for Oldham from Orrell RU club in February '93 after losing his place in England's Five Nation Cup Squad for 1993. Represented England in the World Cup '91 and was a member of two Grand Slam winning squads.

SEAN DEVINE

A 23 year-old scrum-half, whom Oldham boss Peter Tunks also recruited in an exchange. This time it was with St Helens. Oldham receiving #50,000, Devine and back-row forward Paul Jones for Great Britain under-21 forward Chris Joynt.

PAUL JONES

At 6ft 3ins and 17 stone, Leigh based Jones had more than 50 senior appearances for St Helens behind him, albeit many of them as a substitute, when he signed for Oldham with Sean Devine in the Chris Joynt deal.

TINY SOLOMONA

A Kiwi of Western Samoan origin, "Tiny" signed for Oldham in early 1992 from Widnes, but did not make his debut until the start of the season because of groin trouble. Has had two groin operations since the turn of the year, but is playing at the top of his form now and won the man of the match award in Oldham's first round Lancashire Cup win against first

division club Warrington. Has been selected for international duty.

MIKE KUITI

A New Zealand international of great repute. Played in Great Britain and France with the New Zealand tourists in 1989. Selected for the Test team 8 times, playing in Great Britain, France and New Guinea, but not Australia. A strong loose forward or second rower, at the pinnacle of his career. Has played for Rochdale, Swinton, Leeds and Rochdale again. Has a good eye for making and taking scoring opportunities.

DAVID JONES

A strong finishing winger signed from Wakefield. A Wigan born St Pat's player and as an amateur gained County and International honours, can quickly establish himself as a firm favourite at Oldham if he continues in his current form.

BOB LINDNER

One of Australia's all time greats, played in 25 State of Origin games and in 23 tests for Australia. One of the world's most feared loose forwards. Also successful second row forward. Had previous spells with Castleford. Kangaroos man of the tour in 1990, is looking forward to a successful season with Oldham and helping to keep our rightful place in the first division.

PAUL GROVES

Signed from St Helens in the close season. A Hooker of top quality, played with Salford before going to St Helens and toured in Australia and New Zealand in 1988. A strong and determined runs with a flair for being in the right place at the right time and finishing moves he has often started. Never gives up.

ANDY GOODWAY

A product of Oldham's early youth policy and established himself as a firm favourite with the fans for his strong running and tackling in Oldham's first team in his teens. Chased for some time by Wigan and was finally transferred for a large fee. Soon recompensed Wigan and became an England international. Still capable of filling a first team place and is to assist in coaching the "A" team. Welcome back.

HULL FC V OLDHAM HEAD TO HEAD

Hull FC will be looking to improve a fine home Division One record against the Roughyeds - their only defeat in eight meetings being in the 1982/83 campaign when tries by Green, Vigo and Alan McCurrie gave Oldham a shock 8-2 victory.

CLUB LINKS

Few players have donned the jerseys of both clubs the most notorious being David Topliss who after a brief but glittering playing career at the Boulevard moved onto the Watersheddings to end a chequered career on the field. Toppo became the first Hull FC captain to lift the Challenge Cup in 1982 after a 68 year absence and was the figurehead of Hull FC's glorious successes of the early 80's.

**Norton knocks
out Oldham**

Loose forward Steve Norton was the commanding figure in a fast-flowing and entertaining John Player Trophy Semi-Final at Headingley.

He created the openings for Hull's first three tries when they had to struggle to tame a surprisingly effective Oldham. Without Norton Hull could have been in serious trouble. The score hardly reflects the quality of Oldham's effort. In the end it was Hull's speed and strength - and of course Norton's undeniable skills - that saw them through.

The gap between the First and Second Divisions may be wide but Oldham went some way to bridging it with their spirited display. Indeed, with the score at 7-6 early in the second half, Hull came under frightening pressure.

With McCurrie dominating the scrums and Alexander and Goodway in rousing form, the Oldham pack more than matched the Hull forwards. It was not until Norton's gala performance in the last quarter that Hull achieved superiority in midfield.

There was some fine rugby from both back lines with Dean and Day clever halves for Hull, and stand-off Taylor and centre Parrish playing forcefully for Oldham.

For all their courage, however, Oldham had no man to match Leului, the New Zealand international centre, as he proved with his two glorious scoring bursts late in the match.

Oldham narrowly failed to score in the first minute when a wild pass to O'Hara went astray and McEwan kicked the loose ball ahead, narrowly failing to touch down. Hull settled down and two goals by Crooks and a well taken try by Dean, after Norton had wriggled through a gap, gave Hull the lead they deserved.

Oldham never quit, and three minutes before half-time a storming break by Parrish was finished bravely by McEwan, who recovered after stumbling to touch down in the corner.

If Hull were content with a 7-3 half-time lead they were in for a shock. In the sixth minute of the second half McCurrie's long pass found Parrish steaming up and he had not trouble crashing through Leului's tackle to touch down in the corner.

His goal-kick floated just under the cross bar and for the next 14 minutes Oldham applied constant pressure.

Then came the Norton show. First he put Day over for a determined try with the crispest of passes and nine minutes later made a gap for Leului to show his paces.

With five minutes left Leului scored again, this time racing through off a smart inside pass from Day. Crooks added all three goals, and Hull finished far more decisive winners than was suggested 30 minutes earlier.

The way is now open to an all-Humberside final on 23rd January. Hull Kingston Rovers meet Second Division Swinton in the second semi-final at Headingley on 12 December and few can see Rovers being stopped.

Norton the magnificent

Yet another dominating performance by Steve Norton carried Hull to victory in Saturday's John Player Trophy semi-final at Headingley and had both colleagues and opponents handing out accolades.

Stone, Hull's captain, said simply: "He is our team," while Dean expressed the admiration of a scrum-half who knows the worth of a great loose-forward.

"He has so much flair it is not always easy to follow him but I have got used

to his style and we work well together," said Dean.

"It's made such a difference to my game - I don't have to concentrate on just the basics - that I wish I had joined Hull five years ago."

Flanagan the Oldham and Great Britain Under-24 loose-forward but clearly a long way from replacing Norton at Test level volunteered: "He is obviously a great player and sets the standard for me to aim at."

Arthur Bunting, Hull's coach,

confessed he was lost for words to add to the praise he has always heaped on Norton.

But perhaps the greatest tribute was paid by Mordell, the Oldham forward, who flattened Norton with a late high tackle a few minutes after he had put through Dean for Hull's first try. Even that blow did not stop Norton getting his pass out.

Of the 16 tries Hull have scored in this season's competition, Norton has been involved in 12. He laid on all three in the third round at Barrow and was the creator of all four on Saturday.

He paid tribute to the supporting play of the backs, in particular Day, who scored twice at Barrow and got another on Saturday coming off Norton's passes.

The stand-off was also the link man who got Leului away for the most spectacular try of the match after Norton had opened the way in midfield.

Leului read the situation well to take Day's inside pass and race away in style for his second try. Norton - of course - got him moving for his first try when he needed to use more power after seeming to miss the opportunity at first.

The New Zealand centre made another long run in the second half display that was a vast improvement on the first 40 minutes and other recent indifferent displays.

Leului five tries on the way to the final prove what he is capable of when totally involved. Hull should also be looking for ways to get his partner O'Hara, in action more often. Perhaps a switch to their Test partnership on the left wing would be the answer.

Although penalties were 10-7 in Hull's favour Oldham won the scrums 12-8 and still could not prevent Dean dominating at scrum-half.

Even to hint at a Test cap at his advanced age would probably embarrass him but I have not seen a better scrum-half this year. None have shown the same combination of work rate and individual skill allied to teamwork.

Although the margin finally reflected the difference in class Oldham rose above their Division Two status and with less than 20 minutes left were only 7-5 down.

Former RU forwards Alexander and Mordell were not out of place in a typical RL Cup-tie, while Nicholson rocked Hull twice with surprising pace for a prop.

The attendance of 11,400 was a semi-final record for the competition and Hull's 22 points equalled the highest score for a semi-final.

**Norton makes all
the difference**

It is doubtful at the moment if there is a more influential player in the game than Steve Norton, the Hull loose forward. Had he been playing for Oldham - and their own No. 13 Terry Flanagan is not mean performer - in this John Player semi-final at Headingley on Sunday, the Second Division side would probably now be preparing to meet either Hull KR or Swinton in the final.

A difference of 16 points at the end did less than justice to Oldham, often Hull's equals and, for the first 15 minutes of the second half, emphatically their superiors. However, just when Oldham were threatening supremacy Norton, dazed by a heavy collision with Mordell in the 20th minute, drew a lung full of fresh air and began to work his miracles again, and Oldham were mercilessly put down through a try by Day and two by Leului.

Norton is in his pomp at the moment and any RL devotees wanting to see a highly-gifted player performing at the limits of his talents should hurry along now to see him before the magic begins to fade. A soccer writer once said of George Best that trying to pin him down was like trying to capture a shaft of sunlight in a matchbox. Substitute the name of Norton for Best and you have the picture.

Opponents can make nothing

of him at present, with his changes of pace, his bewildering switches of direction, long passes, short passes and passes suddenly slipped out when he appears to be held in the tackle. There is a touch of arrogance about him too and more than once he invited dispossession by thrusting the ball under an opponent's nose before drawing it back into his chest and curving away on another mesmeric run.

Before Norton was flattened by Mordell he had engineered a try for Dean that talented and underrated scrum half, but Oldham, who seemed for a period in danger of a collapse of confidence, were only four points adrift at half time, thanks to a lot of determination and a try by McEwan.

Soon after the interval McCurrie, who had produced a series of eccentric passes in the first half, threw out a beauty to Parrish, and the Oldham centre's powerful run and the plunge took him over. That brought the score to 7-6 but, unfortunately for Oldham, Norton blossomed again sending in first Day, and then Leului. Finally he began the move that brought the game's best try when he, Day and Leului combined in a move that was as rapid and as final as machine gun fire. Crooks improved all Hull's tries and landed a penalty as well.

HULL FC ON THEIR TRAVELS ...



NEXT SUNDAY we travel to the Don Valley Stadium where we have encountered contrasting fortunes in our meetings with Sheffield Eagles. Next week's clash has special significance because it brings former Hull FC favourite and Great Britain international Lee Jackson into confrontation with his former team mates for the first time since his move to Sheffield last month. Jackson of course was unable to agree contract terms with the Hull Club and many supporters were disillusioned to see him go. The transfer fee has yet to be decided by a tribunal and Gary Hetherington is currently accumulating funds for Jackson's purchase.

The Eagles have made a disappointing opening to the new campaign with five points from their seven league fixtures but with internationals Jackson, Daryl Powell and Mark Aston in their ranks results should improve. Despite our erratic away form we can travel to Sheffield with optimism having been unbeaten in our previous league encounters in the city, winning at Bramall Lane in 1980 by 32-4 and at the Don Valley Stadium in March

1991 by 16-6.

Last season's corresponding fixture finished all square and Paul Eastwood's last minute try and goal near the posts snatched Hull a draw in their final league fixture.

Only seven minutes earlier it seemed Gary Jack had clinched victory for Sheffield Eagles after slipping through for a try behind the post to which Mark Aston added the goal. Hull had just battled back from being 12-4 down to equalise with a try from each of their wingers and Eastwood's second plus last minute goal dashed Sheffield's hopes of a top eight Premiership place.

Although the Eagles are in just their seventh season of existence several players have donned the colours of both clubs. As well as Lee Jackson, currently starring in the Sheffield back division, is former Great Britain international Richard Price who took up the challenge of regular first team football at Sheffield having struggled to hold down a senior place at the Boulevard. Tim Wilby who enjoyed a new lease of life at Hull in the later stages of his career also gave Sheffield brief service before moving onto London, whilst Hull's former Welsh international half-back Gary Pearce also spent a brief period on loan with the Eagles during the 1990/91 season.

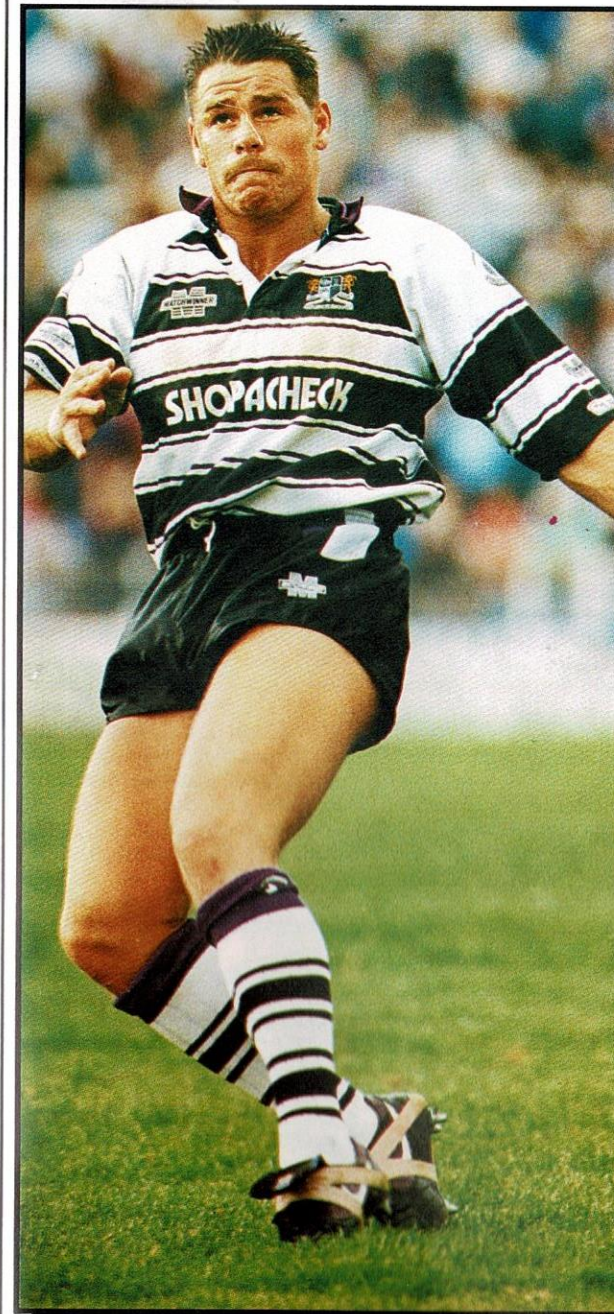

OLDHAM IN PROFILE

LAST SEASON'S PERFORMANCE

Oldham returned to the top flight after a two year absence. Finishing runners-up to Champions Featherstone Rovers. In the unusual fixture system of playing other sides four times the Roughyeds completed a 28 match league campaign with 20 victories and a draw though just one success over Featherstone prevented any championship ambitions. Oldham also made their mark in cup football, disposing of First Division Leigh and Warrington before crashing out 8-48 to star-studded Wigan at Central Park. In the Regal Trophy Castleford proved too strong in a first-round tie at the Watersheddings and it was a similar story in the games Premier Trophy, the Challenge Cup as Oldham disposed of London Crusaders and Huddersfield before going down to a heavy home defeat by Bradford Northern. The biggest disappointment for Oldham followers was the surprise exit in the Premiership Trophy to Third Division Dewsbury in a 14-14 draw at the Watersheddings being followed by an 18-20 defeat in the replay.

MANAGEMENT

Currently at the helm at the Watersheddings is Aussie Peter Tunks, now in his third season in charge of the Roughyeds. Tunks took over in April 1991 from former player John Fieldhouse who had taken over the reins from Tony Barrow, Tunks a former Australian Test prop and skipper at the Canterbury Bankstown Club which won the 1988 Grand Final, has certainly stamped his own identity on the Oldham set-up and can feel highly satisfied that his side is holding its own in top flight football. One of Tunks finest achievements came in 1991/92 when he steered Oldham to an Old Trafford Divisional Premiership Final with Sheffield Eagles after having his side decimated by the departures of Paul Lord, Paul Round, Mike Ford, Leo Casey, Charlie McAlister, John Fieldhouse, Andy Ruane and Brett Clarke.

Sadly the Eagles lifted the trophy with a 34-10 success but Tunks had made his mark in the coaching field.

TRANSFER ACTIVITY

Peter Tunks has been a busy man in the transfer market recently totally reconstructing his promotion winning outfit. From the amateur circles he has acquired Martin Holden, John Clarke and Alf Goulbourne whilst Oldham supporters were thrilled to see former skipper Andy Goodway return to the Watersheddings after experiencing life at the top with Wigan and then enduring difficult times with Leeds. Another former Loiner and New Zealand international Mike Kuiti is relishing a return to top flight football after a spell with Rochdale Hornets. Former St Helens hooker Paul Groves arrived in an exchange deal which saw Tommy Martyn go in the opposite direction and Tunks negotiated another player exchange with speedy wing man David Jones coming from Wakefield Trinity and Gary Christie and Mark Shields departing for Belle Vue. Former Wigan hooker Richard Russell took on a new challenge at Castleford with centre Shaun Irwin and former Hull FC favourite Paul Fletcher joining Tunks at Oldham and Charlie McAlister rejoined former team mate Goodway after a spell away with Whitehaven. John Fogerty was acquired from Huddersfield on a free transfer whilst a £25,000 fee brought Leigh's talented full back Paul Topping to the Watersheddings.

Oldham's biggest capture came late in the Summer with the signature of Australian Test forward Bob Lindner. The classy loose-forward Lindner twice toured Britain with the 1986 and 1990 Kangaroo squads and with over 20 test appearances for Australia is one of the most capped Australian forwards of the modern era. He began his career with Brisbane Souths, later winning a Brisbane Premiership with Wynnum. Manly before joining Wilfield Cup football for Paramata, Gold Coast and Wests, in addition to separate

spells with Castleford in 1986 and 1987. Lindner has already become a favourite with Oldham supporters and has appeared in the last 12 Anglo-Australian matches, being outstanding in 1990.

LAST TIME AT THE BOULEVARD

The last occasion Oldham visited the Boulevard was for a league fixture in December 1990 when the success starved Airlie Birds bounced back from a torrid run of four defeats in five games to comprehensively crush Oldham.

Hull strengthened their grip on the top of the First Division table with a spectacular second half performance which saw them run in 25 points to completely demoralise Oldham.

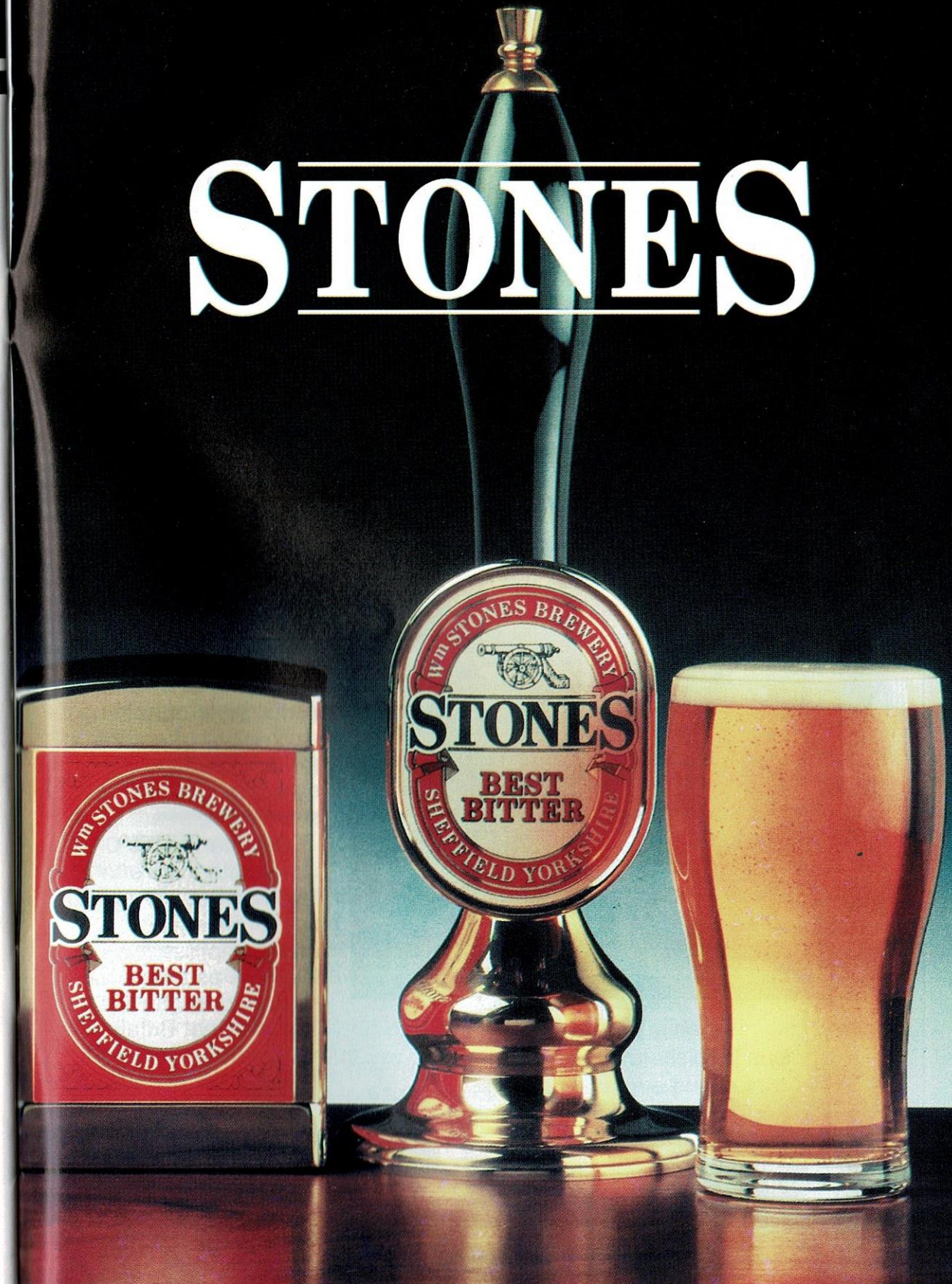
The Lancastrians made a spirited start in their efforts to erase the memory of a shock Regal Trophy defeat by Batley and went ahead when Paul Lord raced in for a try. Gradually though Hull's pack began to dominate with Test prop forward Karl Harris and second-rower Ian Marlow both outstanding. Harrison broke the Oldham line on numerous occasions and found supporting players with shrewd passes, while Marlow was always ready to make up the running and in a great performance caused Oldham countless problems with his strong running.

Behind the pack half-backs Patrick Entat and Greg Mackey turned the screws with some delightful football. Entat returned from international duty with France against the Australians to produce a stirring performance and was involved in three of his side's five tries.

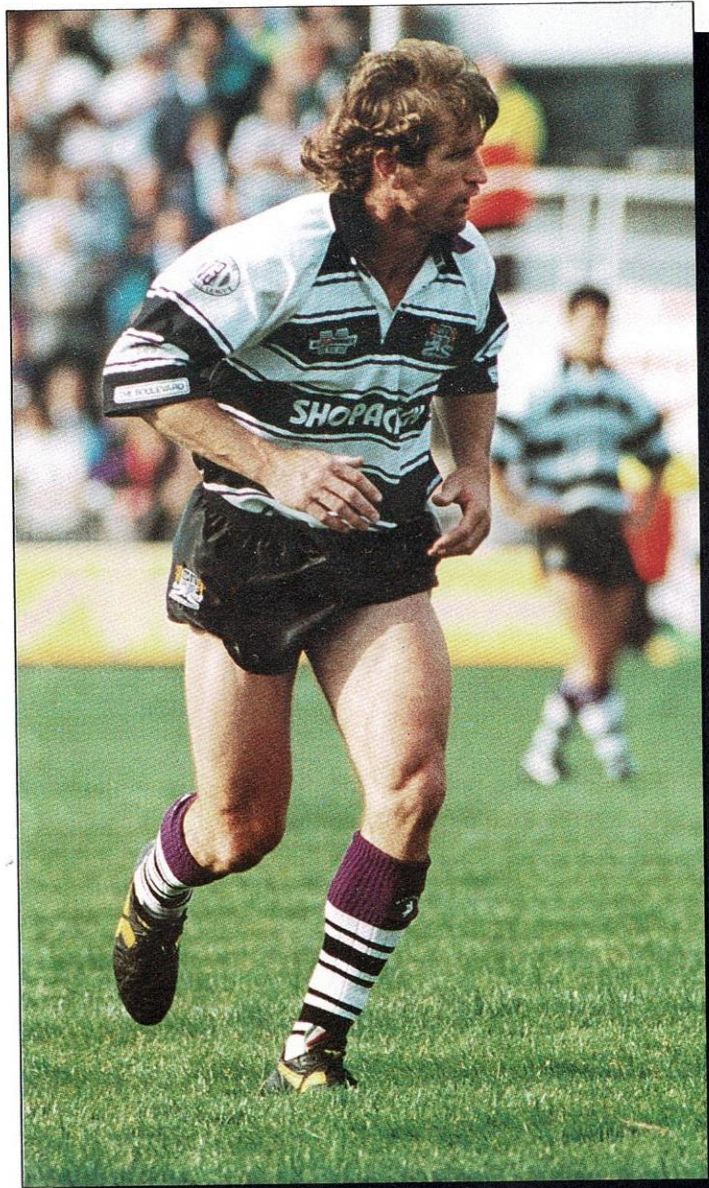
Mackey provided the leadership and steadying qualities Hull needed when things looked bleak in the early stages and then exploded into action as Hull slipped into top gear.

The turning point came in the 21st minute when Entat superbly created a vital try for Harrison. Paul Eastwood's conversion gave Hull a 6-4 interval lead and then in the second half they went in for the kill. Five minutes after the re-start

WHEN ROYCE Simmons ran his five marathons in five days during the summer, few people understood why he had gone to such lengths merely to bring yet another Australian player over to Hull.

His target was Des Hasler and as all Hull fans now know, Des is not just another player.

For years at the very top level of Rugby League, Des Hasler has produced an incredibly high level of consistency, thrilling the crowd with his electrifying pace and unique style of running which more often than not, ended in a memorable try.

Des started his career with the Penrith Panthers but went on to play for Manly just in time to impress the selectors as they chose the squad for the 1986 Tour of Great Britain.

For those of us who remember the 1982 tourists and the way they totally destroyed anything that stood against them in Rugby League, it was hard to contemplate that a better squad could be put together especially as Great Britain had by now improved their own game dramatically.

The Kangaroos known as the "Invincibles" lived up to their name by winning every single game on English and French soil.

If we contemplate that the squad included such players as Peter Sterling, Brett Kenny, Mal Meninga, Gene Miles, Ray Price, Royce Simmons, Gary Jack and of course Mr Versatility himself, Des Hasler.

Throughout his career, Des has performed at the very top level in both half-back position, loose forward, in the centres and as he did at the Boulevard in 1986, on the wing. In that match Des scored 2 tries and helped the mighty Australians to a 48-0 victory over the Black and Whites.

In 1987, he was a member of the successful Manly team to win the Winfield Cup which is the ultimate prize in Australian Rugby League.

Des played on numerous occasions in ferociously contested State of Origin matches and again toured with the Kangaroos in 1990.

Throughout this period, Des had every opportunity to play in English League, most notably when the mighty Wigan

attempted to lure him to Central Park to join the highly successful squad.

Des was the number one target for Brian Smith, former Manly team mate Noel Cleal and of course in latter days Royce Simmons.

Airlie Birds supporters who had come to worship the name of Peter Sterling, waited for years for his promised return and although numerous high-class No. 7's have graced the black and white jersey, including Fred Ah Kuoi and Craig Coleman, the ghost of Peter Sterling has lived on.

At long last the Hull fans have a player of at least equal stature and all those painful miles which Royce trod on his mammoth runs, can be seen to be worthwhile.

It was ironic that as the man of the match for the recent Widnes game was selected, that the name of Sterling was nominated. This was quickly corrected and Des justifiably received the accolade. It was obviously the flowing mane of blonde hair, the non-stop performance and total involvement which triggered the error.

Des Hasler came to these shores with a reputation of being the most professional and fittest Rugby League player in the toughest competition in the world. We can see that this was no exaggeration, and let us hope that he wears the famous black and white jersey for more than just the coming season.

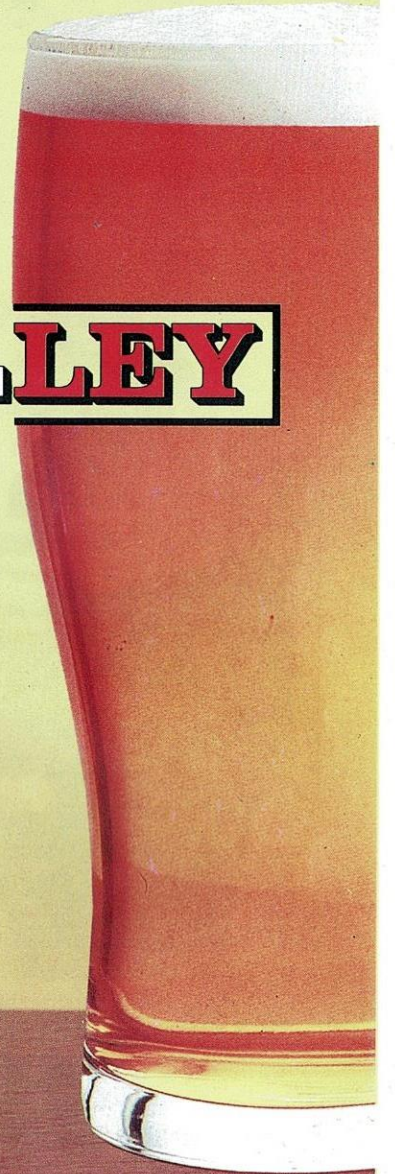
