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
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# HALIFAX 'A' 21 - 14 TRINITY 'A'




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MARK MEADOWS: A second row forward, who had seen service with Swinton and Trafford Borough when Tunks snapped him up on the eve of the 1992-93 season from the new Blackpool Gladiators club, who took Sean Allen in a straight swop.

**HUGH GUMBS:** A young winger from Yorkshire, who signed for Bradford Northern when David Hobbs was boss. Had a spell with Batley and then signed for Oldham as a free agent in the summer of 1992. Went to Australia that summer in the students World Cup.

**PAUL JONES:** At 6'3" and 17 stone, Leigh based Jones had more than 60 senior appearances for St. Helen's behind him, albeit many of them as a substitute, when he signed for Oldham with Sean Devine in the Chris Joynt deal.

**BEN OLSEN:** This Danish born forward made a name for himself with London Crusaders and signed for Oldham in the famous swop-shop summer of 1992 with winger Richard Blackman, a Londoner returning "home" to join the crusaders at Crystal Palace.

TINY SALOMONA: A Kiwi of Western Samoan origin, "Tiny" signed for Oldham in early 1992 from Widnes, but did not make his debut until the start of the season because of groin trouble. Has had two groin operations since the turn of the year but is playing at the top of his form now and won the man of the match award in Oldham's first round Lancashire cup win against first division club Warrington. Has been selected for International Duty.

**PAUL FLELTCHER:** A first class player who has played successfully with Salford, Hull and Castleford. An excellent full-back and now willing to try to fill the roll of a hooker or scrum-half. An invaluable player to have on one's books.

MIKE KUITI: A New Zealand International of great repute. Played in Great Britain and France with the New Zealand tourists in 1989. Selected for the test team eight times, playing in Great Britain, France and New Guinea but not Australia. A strong loose forward or second rower, at the pinnacle of his career. Has played for Rochdale, Swinton, Leeds and Rochdale again. Has a good eye for making and taking scoring opportunities.

**DAVID JONES:** A strong finishing winger signed from Wakefield. A Wigan born St. Pat's player and as an amateur gained County and International honours. Can quickly establish himself as a firm favourite at Oldham if he continues his current form.

**BOB LINDNER:** One of Australia's all time greats. Played in 25 State of Origin games and in 23 tests for Australia. One of the World's most feared loose forwards. Also successful second row forward. Had previous spells with Castleford. Kangeroo's Man of the Tour in 1990, is looking forward to a successful season with Oldham and helping keep our rightful place in the 1st division.

**PAUL GROVES:** Signed from St. Helen's in the close season. A hooker of top quality. Played with Salford before going to St. Helen's and toured in Australia and New Zealand in 1988. A strong determined number 9 with a flair for being in the right place at the right time and finishing the moves he has often started. Never gives up.

**JASON FOGARTY:** A massive 6'8", 19 stone son of former Oldham forward Terry Fogarty. Signed from Huddersfield and has something to prove....i.e. He is as good as or better than his father. Is learning the game quickly and may soon establish a firm place in the first team. Oldhamers wish him every success.

**ANDY GOODWAY:** A product of Oldham's early youth policy and established himself as a firm favourite with the fans for his strong running and tackling in Oldham's first team in his teens. Chased for some time by Wigan and was finally transferred for a large fee. Soon recompensed Wigan and became an England International. Still capable of filling a first team place and is to assist in coaching the "A" team. Welcome back.

**STEVE KERRY:** Former Preston Grass Hoppers R.U. half-back, turned professional for Salford for whom he was a prolific goal scorer and he topped the R.L. points scoring list in 1990/91 when Salford won the second division Championship with 427 points.

Can play equally well at stand-off or scrum half and was long admired by coach Peter Tunks, before he finally got his man in September 1992.

**DAVID BRADBURY:** Signed from Leigh Miners after touring new Zealand with the BARLA Under 19 squad. David is a strong running loose-forward, who impressed on Oldhams's pre-season tour of France. A most promising young player.

**SCOTT RANSON:** 24-year-old St. Helen's player and the top try scorer from his former club, Swinton. Signed for Oldham in March 1992.

**SHANE TUPAEA:** Ex New Zealand player. Signed for Swinton then Rochdale. A hard tackling defensive second row forward.

IAN SHERRATT: Former Oldham & Lancashire schoolboy. Left Oldham for Salford and returned season 1991/92. A hard grafting prop-forward.

**BARRIE McDERMOTT:** Strong and powerful despite his 21 years, local boy Barrie is yet another member of the BARLA squad to throw in his lot with Oldham. He is a dedicated young professional and has quickly made enough impression to earn a place on the bench in Oldham's last seasons matches.

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#### WIDNES 10 · TRINITY 0


Trinity took the imaginative step of giving away 2000 tickets to local schoolchildren for this televised fixture, but the bright idea's seemed to end there, as Toppo's men turned in a below par performance against a well-organised Widnes outfit. Two years ago fog saved them whilst sixteen points down, but this time there was little to alleviate the gloom around Belle Vue as the fans chuntered their way home through the chill night air.

The game hinged on two kicks near the line. The first, a Bobby Goulding bomb, was spilled by Gary Spencer, allowing the ball to be moved wide for Adrian Hadley to cross in the corner to open the scoring, whilst the second was a Geoff Bagnall grubber which bounced off several pairs of legs before Lee Hanlan pounced to cross by the sticks, only for aussie referee Greg McCallum to disallow the try and give the handover. None of those watching could come up with any reason for the ruling. Even among the visiting support, but the net result was that it left an increasingly desperate Trinity pounding away on the visitors' line for most of the second half without ever fashioning the vital opening, and it came as no surprise when Myers sped down the stand side late in the game to put Bobby Goulding under the sticks and offered the mercurial scrum-half the opportunity to indulge in an extravagant celebration involving various branches of perfomance art.

With hindsight, the night was particularly frustrating in view of the number of times Trinity manmaged to make clean breaks without managing to capitalise. First Richard Goddard burst onto Geoff Bagnall's short ball to surge 50 yeards upfield without finding adequate support, and later on Ian Marlow made a stunning midfield break of fully 60 yards before unloading Geoff Bagnall, who then went on a fruitless search for his winger, being hauled down on the 20 metre line marooned and in not-so-splendid isolation.

In the second half, Trinity looked to be heading in front when Gary Spencer made the half-break and unloanded to Andy Mason just five yards out right in front of the sticks, but the ball ended up wide and the chance went begging. In the dying minutes first Paul Brown and then sub Gary Christie looked to have made the gap on the outside, but on both occasions the covers was enough to save the day for the Chemics.

This defeat leaves Trinity in the seamy business of trying to drag themselves out of the relegation zone with low morale, and low confidence, and Dave Topliss will have his work cut out to lift spirits in time for the visit of Oldham.

JUST turned 22 and Lee Hanlan has already tasted rugby league at three very different levels with a big-name club, a little club and now a medium sized club eager for growth

sized chib eager for growth.

He signed with Hull after achieving amateur honours at district, inter-town and Yorkshire levels. From there he returned nearer to his Leeds-born roots and signed with Batley before Trinity picked him up at a bargain price following the departure of Nigel Wright to Wigan.

Trinity officials went to great lengths to point out that Hanlan was not a direct replacement for Wright, but neither was it intended that he should languish in the A-team. But after the first couple of games - the pre-season friendly with Hunslet and the opener at Warrington - Hanlan looked to have all the makings of a first division standoff.

His ball handling and touch

hicks were only outshone by his massive tackling stints making him difficult to criticize, but only rarely has he made the sort of break from which tries are scored, so perhaps now is the time to take the bull by the horns.

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
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#### MISSION IMPOSSIBLE????

#### I CAN REMEMBER WHEN TRINITY HAD A TEAM....



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
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
