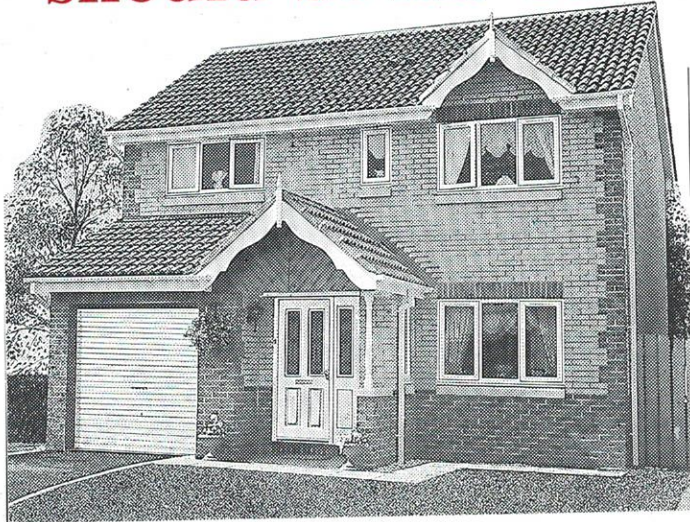

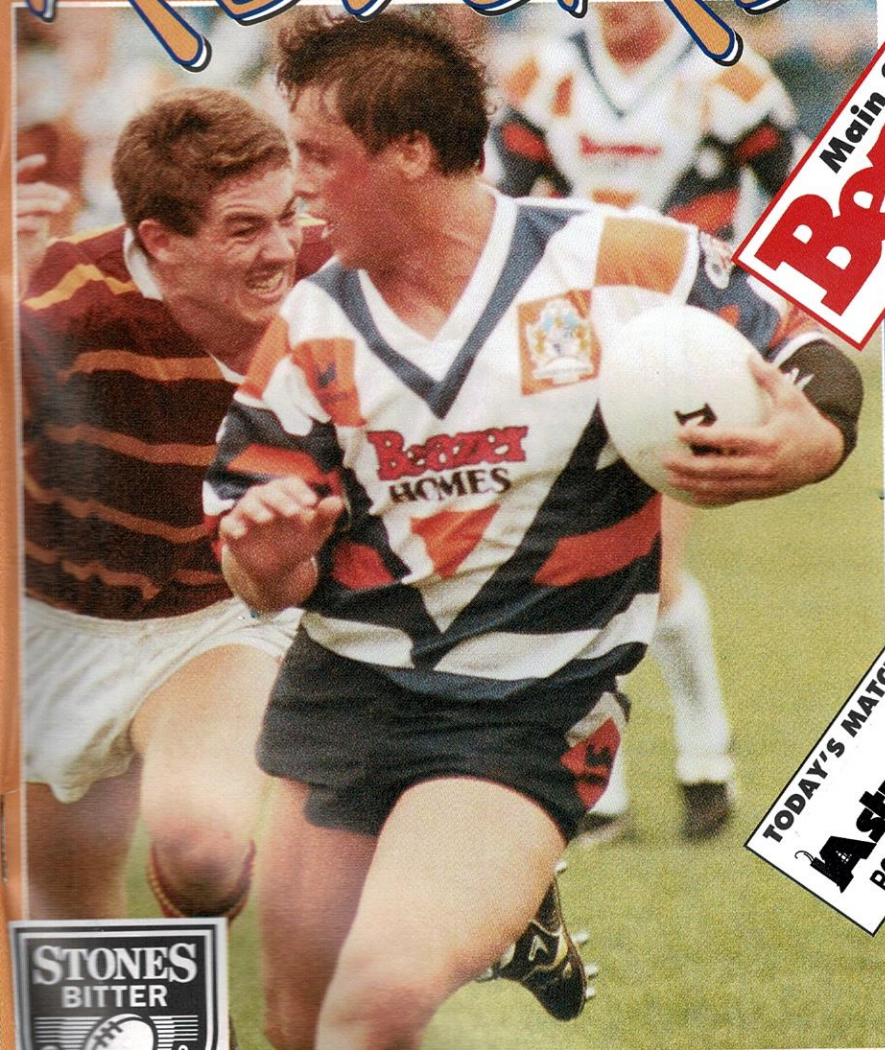

THE INSIDE STORY

LATEST NEWS FROM POST OFFICE ROAD

Fellow promotion winners, Oldham, are this afternoon's visitors to Post Office Road for a game that, if tradition is maintained, will thrill everyone who witnesses it.

The 'Roughyeds' were, of course, runners-up to Rovers last season in the second division championship race, often displaying an exceptional standard of rugby league football. Since then team manager, Peter Tunks, has strengthened the side considerably in an attempt to lift still further the quality of play in order to compete at the demanding levels of first division rugby.

Although Oldham have won only three of their opening nine league games the team has shown good form throughout the campaign so far, being especially unlucky in defeat after playing well, against Bradford Northern and Wakefield Trinity. Those were games that could just as easily have been won and so Rovers should on no account be fooled by the fact that their opponents today are placed in the bottom half of the table. The signs are that they will not be there for very much longer.

This season's performances by Rovers have been inconsistent to say the least. Home and away form has been in stark contrast with only three league points being gained from the team's travels so far. In fairness to the players it has to be said that defeats in away games have been at the hands of Bradford, Halifax and Widnes. How many sides will come away from those grounds with anything this season?

At home Rovers have been a totally different proposition, losing just the one against a St Helens side that couldn't put a foot wrong on the day. The wins over Hull KR and Leeds were excellent and the humiliation of a near full strength Wigan side will live in the memory of Rovers fans for many years to come. Rovers, on their day, can be an awesome proposition for any opponent, especially here at Post Office Road, a ground that many teams find to

be intimidating when closely surrounded by the fervent enthusiasm of several thousand home fans.

Provided that Rovers perform to their full potential this afternoon, then victory will be theirs. Anything less may present a useful Oldham side with the opportunity to start their climb up the first division table.

PLAYERS

International full-back, Chris Bibb, continues to stay away from Post Office Road. The reasons for Bibb taking this course of action are quite puzzling as the terms of a new contract for the player had been negotiated amicably and agreed upon by both parties.

The only stipulation put forward by the club was that Chris, after his knee injury, should prove full fitness by playing the necessary number of games which is surely reasonable. The agreed contract would then be made available.

Chris has declared that he will train with amateurs, Lock Lane, in the meantime, the reasons for which are indeed in a mystery to everyone at Post Office Road. This whole situation is very sad as Chris Bibb is a valued member of the first team squad and there are few better full-backs in the game today. Hopefully he will have a change of heart in which case Chris will be made more than welcome on his return. Meanwhile he remains on the transfer list at a fee of £90,000.

Three of Rovers' reserve grade players have joined other clubs on a month's loan. Centre or wing threequarter Spencer Longstaff has teamed up with brother, Simon, at Wakefield, while second rower, Neil Bradbrook, is over at Elland Road with Hunslet. Finally, promising full back, Craig Booth, is trying his hand with today's visitors, Oldham. Craig also has a connection with the Oldham club as he is Andy Goodway's nephew. We wish all three players every success in their attempts to prove themselves at their new clubs.

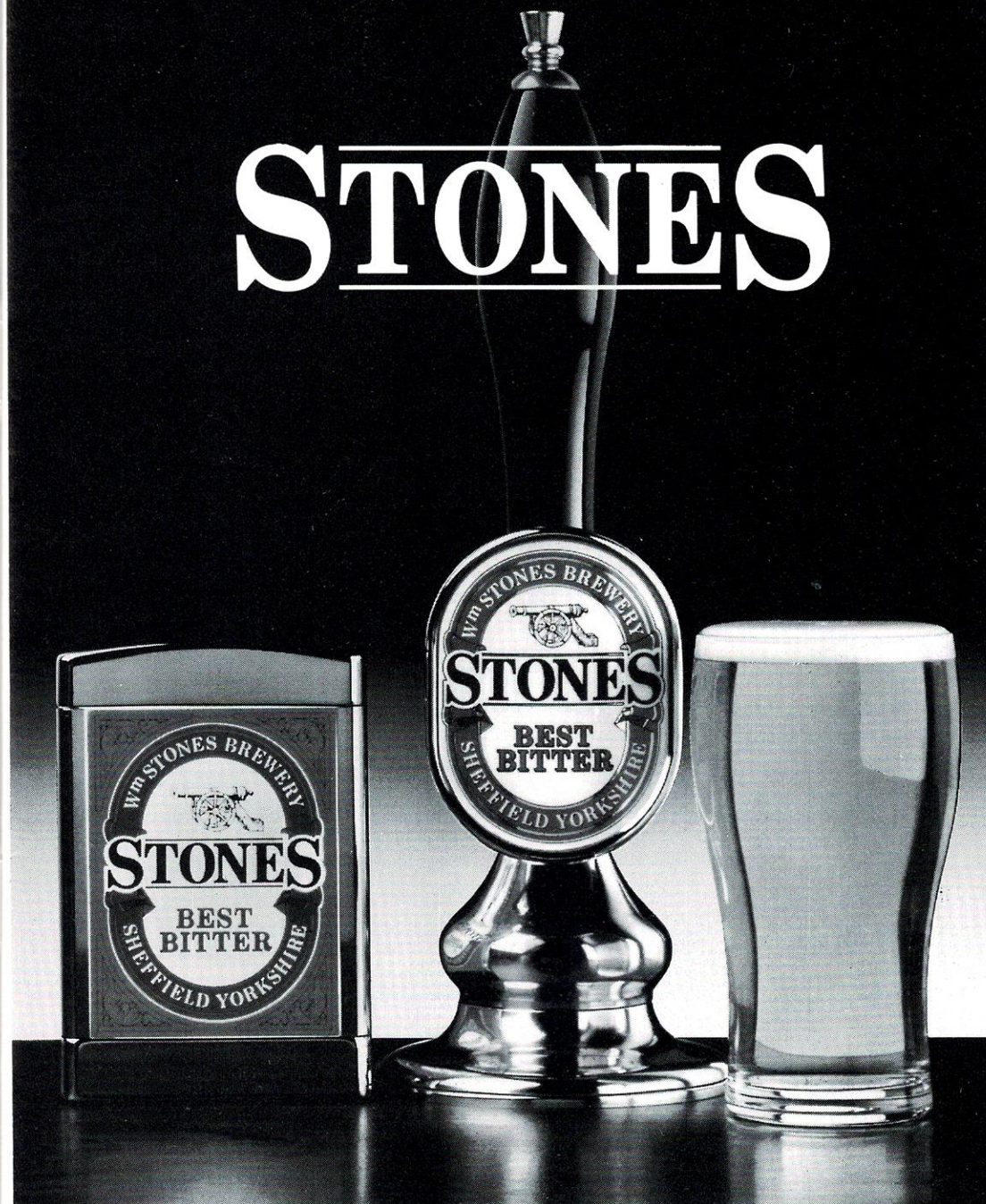

Probably Tunks' most significant recruit this season has been the mighty Bob Lindner. This man has been a bastion of the Australia and Queensland pack for what seems like forever. He is a true leader and by all accounts, victory has been snatched from the greedy grasp of defeat more than once through the example he has set. Interestingly he has also brought Andy Goodway to the Watersheddings, a sort of second

coming I suppose. You could say Andy is the British equivalent of Lindner. He's had a long international career, gives a hundred percent minimum and sets a fine example. Darren Abram and the well known Mike Kuiti arrived from Rochdale. Abram, a centre, was linked with Rovers for a while, in the papers at least, and the signing of Kuiti who was on the coaching staff at Spotland didn't go down very well at all with their arch-enemies. Playing alongside Abram will more than likely be Shaun Irwin the ex-Castleford player, whilst Paul Topping was the record try scorer for a fullback when he was with Leigh. All signed for less than outrageous fees or as part of exchange deals. See what I mean about wheeling and dealing?

Despite losing players like Martyn and Joynt, Peter Tunks has assembled a squad which at the very least can stay up (I'm trying like hell to avoid writing the dreaded axiom 'yoyo syndrome') and are starting to compile a creditable portfolio of victories, including Leeds and Hull, but last week's defeat by Wakefield Trinity will have gone down about as well as a kidney infection with Peter Tunks. What must have been really frustrating was that Oldham nearly won the game in the dying seconds when Scott Ranson scored from a difficult to convert position and sure enough Paul Topping failed with what would have been a dramatic last throw of the dice kick. There are no easybeats in the first division and Wakefield, who have had lots of problems this year, proved it. You can rest assured that Oldham will have learned from that experience.

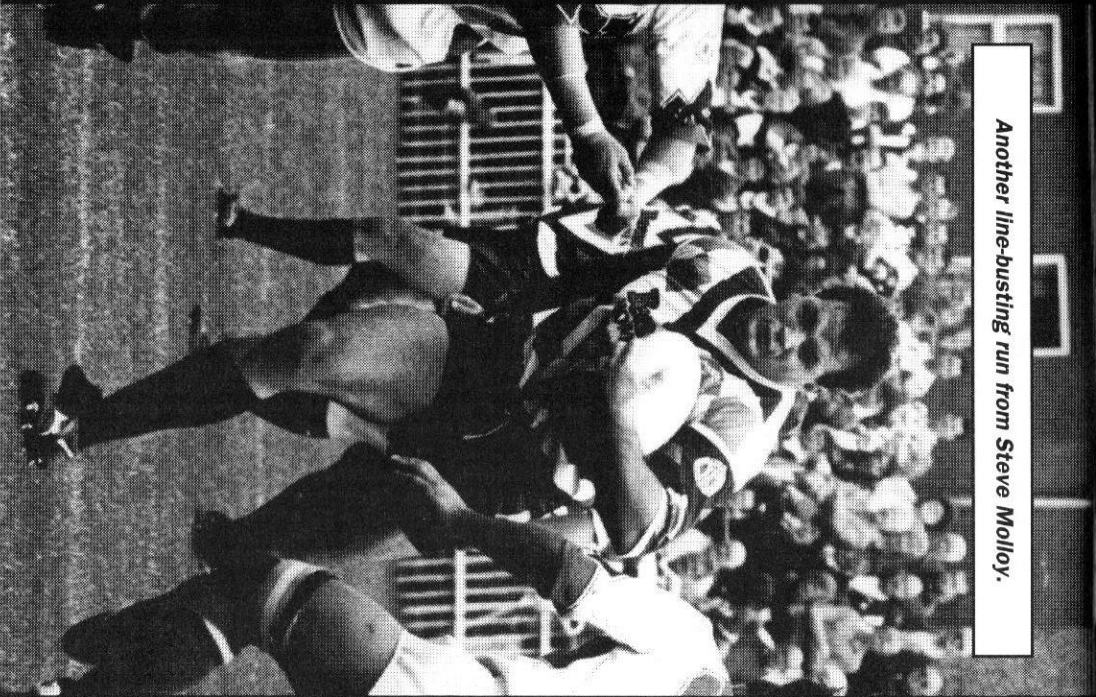

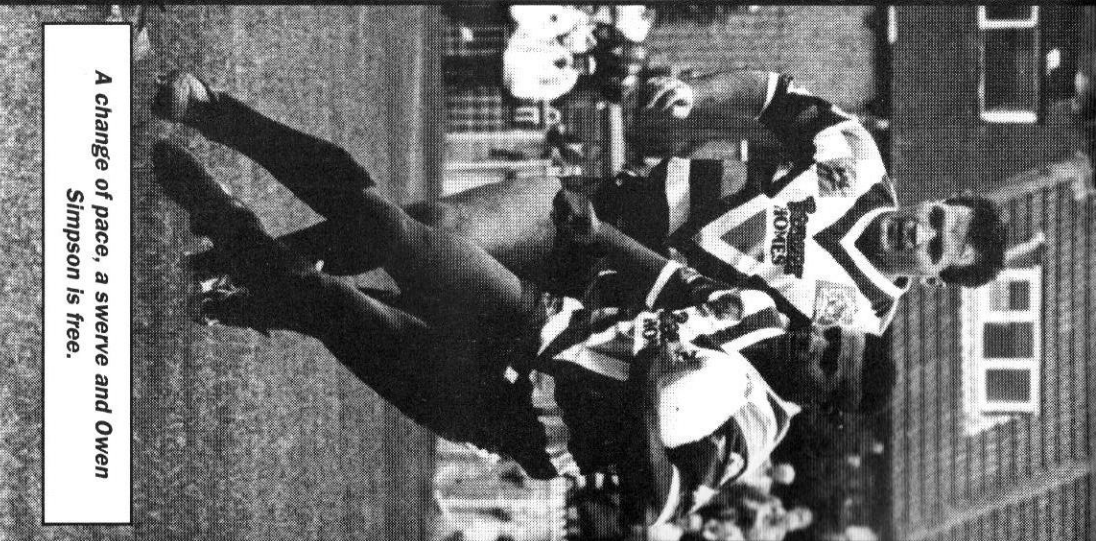

'FEVVER YOUR NEST'

TO CAP IT ALL

Two things that really get my back up are Rugby Union's continued belief that they hold the moral high ground, and Rugby League's continued belief that it has to be cautious about the image it presents. It is no more true that Rugby Union is a game for amateurs and gentlemen than it is that men at Rugby League grounds still wear cloth caps and say 'thee' and 'thy' and 'cock'.

One of the best laughs I had recently at the expense of Rugby Union was inspired by a very well known MP, who told me: 'I earned far more money playing Rugby Union than I ever did playing Rugby League.' I also must confess to a good chuckle when I hear people accusing me of being a flat-capper because of the stance I take on how we celebrate our local culture. What does it all mean? I'll tell you what. It all boils down to people not being allowed to be themselves. A few years ago I trained as a Union representative. One week the firm I was working for was visited by a top executive from the firm's parent company in America. Us union plebs were invited into the boardroom to be greeted with polished glasses filled to the brim with mineral water and a flip chart. The top executive turned over page after page on the chart, pointing with a stick to

'performance indicators', 'role team management units', 'task based skills' and so on, until the final page on which in big red felt tip letters was written: 'If you're not prepared to be part of the solution, then you must be part of the problem'. To cap it all he fixed a steely glare on me as he pointed. I put my hand up and asked him 'What if I agree with some of what you're saying and don't agree with the rest?' He smirked and pointed his stick at the chart again.

The 'if you're not with us you're agin us' school of business should never ever come to Rugby League. This is how Rugby Union has tried to protect its interests over the years, this is how the class system works, this is how the old boy networks work, this is exactly the reason we hate it. Rugby League is a game about people. About celebrating the differences. About the mix of different cultures, different backgrounds. Let's keep all of that, especially the pride in our working class roots. If I want to believe that Featherstone is the best place on earth and as I was once told, 'there is nothing here to realistically nourish that belief' I will still believe it. I have always advocated that the Regal Trophy and the Challenge Cup should include more amateur clubs and leave the first division to come in later. I am delighted to see that has been the case this year, plus the inclusion of a couple of French teams. Unfortunately, and I say this advisedly, no surprises have resulted. I am sure it would have been good for the game, if not for the defeated clubs, if some surprises had resulted.

I have followed the fortunes of Hemel Hempstead with particular interest in their efforts to take Rugby League further South. When the club first came into the second division of the Alliance League a couple of years ago, their club officials came up to see ourselves, and Terry Mullaney in particular, to gain advice to start their own Lottery. Steady progress has been made and last week they met Ryedale-York in the first round of the Regal Trophy. Now Hemel are currently leading the National Conference League, but they found the difference in pace of the professional game quite alarming. The two French clubs also suffered quite heavy defeats.

The draw for the second round has done us no favours, London Crusaders away. It will involve the Club in heavy expense with little or no chance of any return from the 'gate'. Such is life.

Just as our national side is becoming better and better it is to be hoped that bringing the French sides over here for Cup matches will improve their standards as well as our amateur sides. At least they are seeing how much higher the standard is above them.

Looking at the names of the players taking part in the second test reminded me of some of the great players that have worn the Featherstone jersey. I went one step further and made out a team of players that have recently left the club. What a formidable team they would make:

League points in October have been scarce. Away wins at both Sheffield and Widnes should not have been beyond the bounds of possibility, only one point resulted. Although currently standing in eighth position, the most worrying factor is that we have the worst defensive record bar two teams in the first division! This is appalling and overflows into the Alliance side as well. Teams in the past at Featherstone, of a lesser ability, have always been able to tackle. If we are to go anywhere this season, tackling must be improved dramatically.

IC What are your thoughts on the current Rugby League v Rugby Union debate?

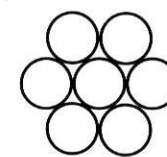

THE MAN WHO'S THERE WHEN HISTORY IS MADE

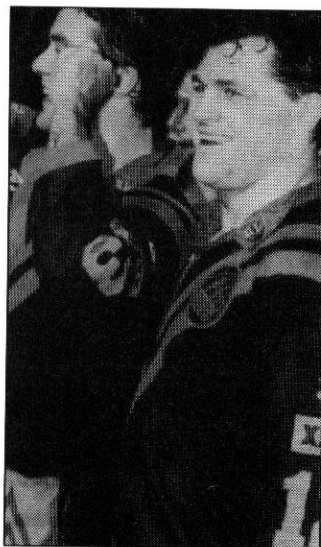
State Of Origin football, that's the stuff to give the troops. Nowhere in the World of Rugby League can the intensity, the ferocity and passion of State Of Origin be matched and at the same time I don't think anyone who has followed these epics of do or die and to be honest deep mutual loathing say that they have ever seen a game that wasn't thrill packed and foaming over the brim with all the skills which we know make Rugby League football what it is.

Bob Lindner is the only player in the British RFL to have played in the last State Of Origin series, which his state, Queensland, lost two games to one. Bob played in all three of this year's games and scored a try in the final match – probably HIS final game of representative football, a fitting swansong indeed for a player whose representative career has not only been a long one but has encompassed some of the most historic encounters of the modern era.

For instance, last year's world cup final Bob played second row alongside the awesome Paul Sironen. Bob was a Western Suburbs player then, but he was later to move to the Illawarra Steelers and thence to the UK to join Peter Tunks at Oldham. The Sironen-Lindner partnership was in action for Australia again in another historic match – Great Britain against the Australians at Princes Park, Melbourne, and OK Bob Lindner was on the score sheet again. But close your eyes and let your thoughts go back to that day last summer and those delightful juicy tries by Newlove, Steadman, Clarke, Schoey and Offiah. 40-17 and we all felt ten feet tall. OK so it was a downer for Bob, but it was history all right and he was there. He was also on the Australia subs bench in his days with Parramattain, another famous defeat, yes that's right the one in 1988 at the more than half empty Sydney football stadium on the day when International football between the Northern and Southern hemispheres regained its credibility and sure enough Bob was at loose forward at Wembley Stadium on 27 October 1990, never mind the result, Lindner was at loose forward in the game that has surely established the pattern of playing test football at Wembley.

Here's another bit of history from the Bob Lindner scrapbook . . . he played in the State Of Origin game which was played in 1987 in California. In the Queensland side for that game was Alan Langer . . . as an Ipswich player, remember this was in pre-Broncos days and the side in those days was peppered with players from clubs like Wynnum Manly, Redcliffe and Brisbane Norths.

If it's happened on the World stage of Rugby League in the last ten years, then Bob Lindner's been there, including a spell at Castleford. California to Castleford, that's what you call a culture shock.



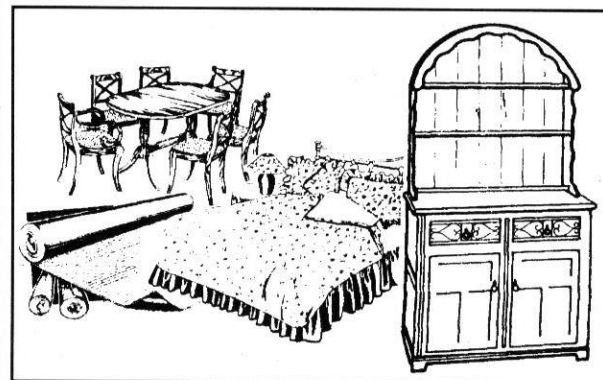

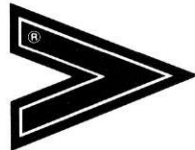

Today we entertain our old rivals from West of the Pennines, Oldham.

Known in the Rugby League world as the 'Roughyeds' (maybe someone will explain the name), Oldham are a club with strong RL traditions, being one of the original members of the old Northern Union which was later to become the Rugby Football League.

Although very prominent in the 1950s when they carried off the League Championship (56/57) and three consecutive Lancashire cups (56/57, 57/58, 58/59), Oldham's recent success has been confined to second division competitions. They could be described as a perfect example of a club suffering the so-called yoyo syndrome which seems to be a by-product of our league structure, having been relegated and promoted no less than six times since divisional football was reintroduced for season 1973/74.

We have of course seen some excellent close fought encounters between our two teams during our own division two campaigns, not least the second division premiership at Old Trafford in 1988 when we were pipped at the post following a remarkable Rovers fightback.

That being history, both sides this afternoon will be fully aware that the main prize today is the two points which are vital to both clubs if a firm foothold is to be made in this season's division one competition. Like ourselves, Oldham have shown that they can win in the 'Big League', two excellent away wins against the Humber-side clubs, where it never is easy, together with a convincing win against Leeds at the Watersheddings gives them six points from nine games.

Defeats have been suffered at the hands of Bradford, Sheffield and Warrington (all at home) and Halifax, Widnes and Wakefield away from home.

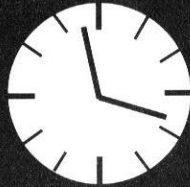
'Well, since it's a Rugby League game I suppose there was a brawl haw haw haw.'

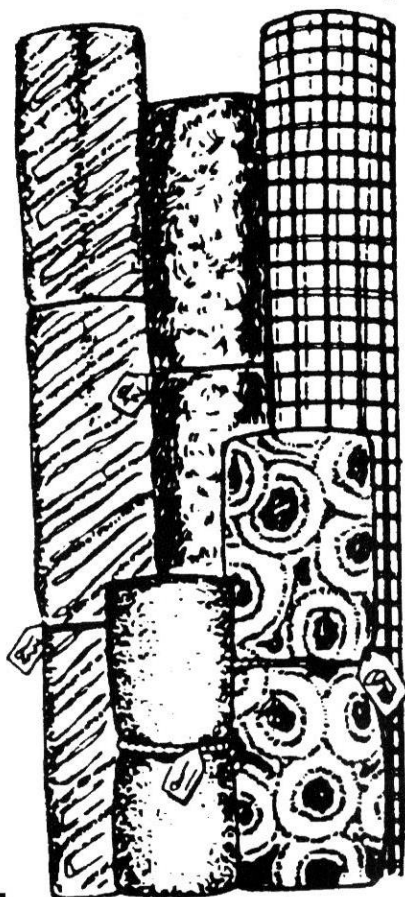
