

EDITORIAL

It was the Regal Trophy which started it all five years ago. The players went on strike and against Wigan the club only fielded two professionals, one of whom was sent off, losing 92 points to 2. Since then it's been an uphill struggle to regain credibility. Throughout that period the club has set an example of financial probity which others declined to follow preferring to go out of business leaving huge unpaid debts and a nasty taste in the mouth.

The penalty paid by this club in the five years since has been incalculable and it is sad to see commentators such as Mike Sadler, writing in the League Express, suggesting that players carry no responsibility for the economic woes of rugby league. Sadler, speaking, so I understand (although I am ready to be corrected) from a position which involves no risk of financial loss on his part, suggests that players deserve every penny they can get and that clubs should go out and get the money or die.

And if the clubs die, who will pay the players? Why should anyone in their right mind risk halfapenny of their hard earned cash, provide a minute of their precious time, or pay to watch others perform, unless those performers are worth it. The cold hard statistics of rugby league attendances suggest less and less people are inclined to believe they are worth it.

Rugby league players must be one of the few working groups who have increased their earnings during the recession. In any other business the less customers you get the quicker you reduce costs. London Crusaders have already recognised this by cutting wages. Scarborough and Swinton failed to recognise it early enough. Widnes have recognised it belatedly. You cannot expect to be paid unless there is money in the kitty.

Ideally all professional clubs should have full time staff, including a commercial manager, but rugby league is far from the ideal world. It is - Wigan, Leeds and e few other clubs notwithstanding - still a game where people are compensated for broken time not one where the majority are full time players. Recent research suggests that greed was at the heart of the original break away from rugby union. Current evidence suggests that greed is throttling the life out of rugby league and no amount of gloss can cover it up.

Perhaps when the Mike Sadler's of this world have to bear the financial consequences of their opinions media comment might be worth listening to. But the the BBC doesn't have to compete or die, does it.

They say what can't speak can't lie but last Sunday's result didn't tell the truth about our performance against Doncaster. Anyone at the game knows that had we managed to convert pressure into points during the first half hour of the second half the game was ours for the taking.

All Doncaster's points came within six minutes: the problem was that they scored two tries in three two minute spells. I have to give credit to the lads for fighting back after our disastrous start but we lacked the ability our visitors showed in finishing moves off by scoring.

Today's visitors also have that ability - ability shown by local players wearing Oldham's colours. The finishing power of Scott Ranson and Darren Abram in the backs, the experience of ex-Saints hooker Paul Groves, Andy Goodway (four times Regal Trophy winner with Wigan) and Aussie Bob Lidner in the pack, not to mention the proven handling and kicking skills of half backs Paul Topping and Steve Kerry.

Oldham have already shown they are a quality outfit capable of holding their own in the first division. In the Regal Trophy, they have twice reached the semi-finals, although it is four years since they progressed beyond the second round. Highfield has had its best showing in the competition for nine years and it's in the nature of cup football that in a one-off situation anything can happen. Exactly what will be seen during eighty minutes this afternoon.

TONY PEMBERTON

Tony Pemberton admits to having a sense of humour. "You need a sense of humour to be a hooker," Highfield's Oldham based number nine said casually, "having to put your arms round two big fellows dozens of times in an afternoon."

Not that that's all the fiery ex Blackpool man does for his money on a Sunday. A frequent leader in the tackle count chart he refers to his contibution to team work in a dismissive manner. "I can't do anything else," he says, "I've always been a defensive number nine rather than the attacking variety you see in Martin Dermott."

Unlike Dermott, Pemberton has no ambitions to reach the top of the tree in rugby league. "It's enjoyable but it's not the most important thing in life. It's family first." Family means not only Christine and their two children, six year old Kayliegh and Jack, aged two, but the avid support of his parents. "My mother is the one who likes watching me play but as she doesn't drive my dad has to watch as well. I'm not sure he would, given the choice."

Although only 23 - "honest!" he protests, 'Pemby' has been playing rugby league for a decade, starting with Fitton Hill and moving on to Blackpool under Mike Peers who was instrumental in bringing him to Highfield earlier this year." I joined on loan towards the end of last season and was impressed by the team spirit and commitment shown in the battle against relegation to the Conference. Unlike Blackpool when Highfield made an agreement with me they stuck to it so when I became a free agent in the summer I had no hesitation in joining permanently. My only disappointment is that we haven't been able to get one or two more players in key positions. I'm certain that if we can the club is capable of finishing in mid-table."

That confidence is based on his own belief in the quality of his team mates. "Ian Potter's quiet but you always know he's there and I get on alright with Brownie - when he plays." Owing to Brown's erratic form that hasn't been as much as expected this season but Pemberton was deliberate in his observations. "I can't say too much about him, he's bigger than me, I might not get a lift home and walking back to Oldham from St. Helens would test even my sense of humour," he said smiling.

THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING POLITICALLY CORRECT

- * The Rugby League's Board of Directors was due to consider reports on the game's playing and financial future this week. The one on finances will be by Roy Waudby, who has just returned from a fact finding mission in Australia. No indication was given about who financed the trip.
- * Joe Lydon will replace John Monie in the BBC TV commentary team now for the former Wigan coach has returned to New Zealand. Joe, who is a graphic artist, beat Leigh coach Steve Simms and former Huddersfield assistant coach Terry Flanagan for the job, which was not publicly advertised.
- * Hemel Hempstead remain at the top of the Conference League after beating Nottingham City 22 points to 14. Hemel now have a five point lead over Wigan St. Pat's, Woolston and Chorley in the Premier Division. In the battle of the former League clubs Blackpool and Chorley honours were shared at 24 points each. In the light of Hemel's defeat by Ryedale-York in the Regal Trophy the question of whether they are capable of holding their own in division two is one which will need to be addressed before long.
- * Oulton's victory over Millom moved them two points clear of Heworth in division one, while Balckbrook's defeat of Eastmoor enabled Redhill to take over the top spot in division two on points difference.
