Chris Wilson turns the spotlight on the Rugby League

Oldham visit Central Park this afternoon with both sides needing points at opposite ends of the table. The Roughyeds are level with Wakefield and Salford on six points and are in danger of falling into the second relegation position. Wigan are currently just behind the leaders and need to win to keep the pressure on Warrington at the top.

Oldham created headlines in the close season with their capture of Australian Test forward Bob Lindner on a two vear contract. On and off the field the Queenslander has proved to be an inspired choice. Leading a strong pack which can contain internationals Se'e Solomona, Andy Goodway and Paul Groves as well as the impressive Craig Richards, Lindner is in the key role at loose forward. He is keen to do well and to silence the unkind whispers that during his stints with Castleford in the late 1980's he was not giving of his best. After being dumped by Leeds last year he surprised many by joining the Roughveds.

Groves is still a crafty footballer but is having difficulty keeping his place thanks to the form of the youngsters Peter Tunks has recruited from the ranks of the BARLA tour squad and Oldham's own Academy side. Shaun Irwin is a key member of the side in the backs as is Martin Crompton who is in line to make a return to his hometown club where he could not hold down a regular first team place. Crompton made a good start for Oldham being instrumental in their win at Hull KR.

Tunks has had to wheel and deal to get the type of player he wants at Watersheddings. Now he feels the squad is more or less complete. With no money, the former Salford, Leeds, Sheffield and Canterbury prop has had to find ways and means of acquiring players that will benefit the club now and in the future. He wants the type of player that will be an ambassador for the club on and off the pitch. Bob Lindner is one such player.

Tunks is aiming to restructure the club

from top to bottom. He has to struggle success on the field with wiping out the debt off it. Thus he needs to sign the kind of player who will fit the equation by being a quality footballer while not breaking the bank in either transfer fees or wage demands.

He has also managed to swap an older side which was not good enough to survive in the top flight for a side with a much younger average age which also has more ability and will hopefully

be with the club longer.

The base of the club looks like it is getting stronger. The Academy side is in its first season while the Alliance side sits on top of the Second Division with eight wins from eight matches. Last week they contested the Alliance Lancashire Shield Final with Rochdale, having beaten Wigan A in the second round.

Oldham have been competitive all the way this season but have not got the points on the board. They were the better side at home to Bradford but Watson's late interception stole the victory after Craig Richards and Tiny

Solomona had been in fine form in the pack. They scored good wins at Hull KR (which is never an easy place to go to) and at home to Leeds. However, a much-changed side struggled to beat Highfield in the Regal Trophy - not crossing the tryline at all in the second half. Last week, they had much of the game at home to St. Helens but could not turn the pressure into the points.

Bob Lindner is unlikely to be the difference between survival and the drop but with there being a few sides in contention it will be mighty close at the foot of the table at the end of April. The Roughyeds may well have to beat Wigan at Watersheddings to remain a First Division side in the last league weekend of the season. Points today would be a great help in their struggle and they will not give the home side an inch this afternoon. The clubs also clash in a moneyspinning Regal Trophy tie in two weeks time and by the end of the season may be sick of the sight of each other.

There is little point in having short term success but big debts at the bank. Oldham are aiming to become a competitive top flight team starting from scratch. There is an adage that from little acorns, mighty oaks grow. At the moment Oldham RLFC is just a sapling.

Friday night's televised fixture saw St. Helens take on Halifax at Knowsley Road. Both matches between the sides last season were on TV and resulted in narrow Saints wins. Fax have not done too well against the top sides in the division losing to Warrington, Wigan and Castleford in recent weeks while Saints have picked up after a shaky start to go into second spot after their win over Oldham last week.

Leaders Warrington travel to Sheffield where they should maintain pole position. The Eagles were here at Central Park on Wednesday for a difficult game and their home record points to a Wire win. Bradford meet Leeds in a local derby. This is a big game for Leeds who need to stop the rot and compete with the top sides

again. They struggled to overcome a game Leigh side last week while Northern lost the chance to put some daylight between themselves and the rest thanks to the weather.

Castleford host Wakefield Trinity in another Yorkshire derby. Trinity lost to Second Division opposition in the Regal Trophy for the second year running recently and face a Tigers side in spanking form rattling in tries from all angles at Wheldon Road. The visitors could be in for a torrid time as Cas look to make amends for their defeat at Wilderspool last weekend.

Hull KR meet Widnes at New Craven Park having lost their last three home matches. The Chemics had a high scoring match with Sheffield last week although bad news followed good for Phil Larder. Firstly Harvey Howard made himself available for selection again but Bobby Goulding put in a transfer request. The Yorkshire-based number seven may be Wakefield Trinity's next target after they failed to secure Andy Gregory's signature. Gregory may make his home debut for Salford against Featherstone Rovers today just fifteen years after he first played for the club as a trialist. He had a hand in the Red Devil's win at Hull KR last week which put pressure on Oldham and Wakefield in the relegation scramble.

The black and white of Humberside travels to Leigh boasting just one point from their travels. Leigh's solitary point was in front of their own fans who would be ecstatic if their favourites could record their first win today.


In the Second Division, Dewsbury v Huddersfield is the top game in the section. The Fartowners still have maximum points after ten matches but face a tough game at Mount Pleasant. Keighley are four points adrift but should win and boost their points difference into the bargain at the expense of Highfield.

At Elland Road, Hunslet take on Swinton. The homesters' only win was over Rochdale while the Lions are also having a terrible time. The coach and the Board are under fire in the press as results are not coming on the pitch. Consequently, crowds are down and Gigg Lane is not a happy place at the moment. Defeat today could make things worse. Tony Barrow has a new five year contract but may not see it out. Victory over Doncaster last weekend may be only a stay of execution. The Lions need to string a few wins together to start climbing the table and particularly need to beat the clubs below them in the table.

The two sides that caused major upsets in the Regal Trophy meet at Barnet today. London were in action on Wednesday against Bramley while Carlisle's good run came to an end at Leeds Road on Sunday. Barrow travel to Ryedale York on the back of a good home win over Rochdale. Workington should beat Bramley to continue pushing for a promotion place.

At Spotland, Steve Gibson's bubble has well and truly burst with defeat by struggling Hunslet and Bramley in recent weeks. The Hornets loss last week at Barrow was their third in succession and Kurt Sorensen's Whitehaven side will be no pushovers as they chase a top four spot.

The big clash in the Conference yesterday was Wigan St. Patrick's visit to Hemel Hempstead. The top two in the division are separated by five points, so Pat's had a chance to close the gap on their debut in Hertfordshire. This afternoon, Blackpool entertain Saddleworth while cellar-dwellers Egremont make the journey to improving Chorley Borough. Chorley are the best placed of the former League clubs having sneaked into third spot on the back of some good wins and could be outsiders for a quick return to the Second Division.

SEAN DEVINE

A 23 year old scrum-half, whom Oldham boss Peter Tunks also recruited in an exchange. This time it was with St. Helens, Oldham receiving £50,000, Devine and backrow forward Paul Jones for Great Britain under 21 forward Chris Joynt.

MARK MEADOWS

A second row forward, who had seen service with Swinton and Trafford Borough when Tunks snapped him up on the eve of the 1992-93 season from the new Blackpool Gladiators Club, who took Sean Allen in a straight swap.

HUGH GUMBS

A young winger from Yorkshire, who signed for Bradford Northern when David Hobbs was boss. Had a spell with Batley and then signed for Oldham as a free agent in the

summer of 1992. Went to Australia that summer in the students world cup.

PAUL JONES

At 6ft 3ins and 17 stone, Leigh based Jones had more than 60 senior appearances for St. Helens behind him, albeit many of them as a substitute, when he signed for Oldham with Sean Devine in the Chris Joynt deal.

BEN OLSEN

This Danish born forward made a name for himself with London Crusaders and signed for Oldham in the famous swop-shop summer of 1992 with winger Richard Blackman, a Londoner returning 'home' to join the Crusaders at Crystal Palace.

TINY SOLOMONA

A Kiwi of Western Samoan origin, 'Tiny' signed for Oldham in early

1992 from Widnes, but did not make his debut until the start of the season because of groin trouble. Has had two groin operations since the turn of the year but is playing at the top of his form now and won the man of the match award in Oldham's First Round Lancashire Cup win against First Division Club Warrington. Has been selected for International duty.

PAUL FLETCHER

A first class player who has played successfully with Salford, Hull and Castleford. An excellent full-back and now willing to try to fill the role of a hooker or scrum-half. An invaluable player to have on one's books.

MIKE KUITI

A New Zealand international of great repute. Played in Great Britain and France with the New Zealand tourists in 1989. Selected for the Test team eight times, playing in Great Britain, France and New Guinea, but not Australia. A strong loose forward or second rower, at the pinnacle of his career. Has played for Rochdale, Swinton, Leeds and Rochdale again. Has a good eye for making and taking scoring opportunities.

DAVID JONES

A strong finishing winger signed from Wakefield. A Wigan born St. Pat's player and as an amateur gained County and International honours. Can quickly establish himself as a firm favourite at Oldham if he continues in his current form.

BOB LINDNER

One of Australia's all time greats. Played in 25 State of Origin games and in 23 Tests for Australia. One of the world's most feared loose forwards. Also successful second row forward. Had previous spells with Castleford, Kangaroos man of the tour in 1990, is looking forward to a successful season with Oldham and helping to keep our rightful place in the 1st Division.

PAUL GROVES


Signed from St. Helens in the close season. A hooker of top quality, played with Salford before going to St. Helens and toured in Australia and New Zealand in 1988. A strong and determined number 9 with a flair for being in the right place at the right time and finishing moves he has often started. Never gives up.

JASON FOGARTY

A massive 6ft 8ins, 19 stone son of former Oldham forward Terry Fogarty. Signed from Huddersfield and has something to prove...ie he is as good as or better than his father. Is learning the game quickly and may soon establish a firm place in the first team. Oldhamers wish him every success.

ANDY GOODWAY

A product of Oldham's early youth policy and established himself as a firm favourite with the fans for his strong running and tackling in Oldham's first team in his teens. Chased for some time by Wigan and was finally transferred for a large fee. Soon recompensed Wigan and became an England International. Still capable of filling a first team place and is to assist in coaching the 'A' team. Welcome back.



STEVE KERRY

Former Preston Grass Hoppers RU half-back, turned professional for Salford for whom he was a prolific goal scorer and he topped the RL points scoring list in 1990/91 when Salford won the second division championship with 427 points. Can play equally well at stand-off or scrum-half and was long admired by

Oldham coach, Peter Tunks, before he finally got his man in September 1992.

DAVID BRADBURY

Signed from Leigh Miners after touring New Zealand with the BARLA Under 19 squad. David is a strong running loose forward, who impressed on Oldham's pre-season tour of France. A most promising young player.

SCOTT RANSON

Twenty four year old St. Helens player and the top try scorer from his former club, Swinton. Signed for Oldham in March 1992.

SHANE TUPAEA

Ex-New Zealand player. Signed for Swinton then Rochdale. A hard tackling defensive second-row forward.

IAN SHERRATT

Former Oldham and Lancashire schoolboy. Left Oldham for Salford and returned season 1991/2. A hard grafting prop-forward.

BARRIE McDERMOTT

Strong and powerful despite his 21 years, local boy Barrie is yet another member of the BARLA squad to throw in his lot with Oldham. He is a dedicated young professional and has quickly made enough impression to earn a place on the bench in Oldham's last season's matches.

NIGEL HESLOP

Watersheddings.



view from...

Early on this week, the Rugby League achieved national media coverage for two different reasons. By national coverage I mean the area south of Widnes. Last Monday Maurice Lindsay met the Minister for Sport Mr. Ian Sproat to point out that although the Rugby League was goverened by the safety at sportsgrounds act, no provision had been made to help the Rugby Clubs as had been made to aid Association Football Clubs. Apparently Mr. Sproat, a new and interested convert to Rugby League has offered his support and we hope that in the very near future all clubs will be helped to improve the safety and facilities at their grounds.

The second issue concerned the relationship between Rugby League and Rugby Union. Present, informed thought seems to point to the fact that there will soon be a free gangway between the codes from the very top level downwards. Jonathan Davies and Kevin Ellis were interviewed and made the point strongly that they certainly had no regrets changing from Union to League. The third personality interviewed was a larger than, larger than life Stuart Evans who was contemplating taking his case to the High Court so that the Welsh Rugby Union would be compelled to reinstate him. The only flaw in his case seemed to be that "he had retired from Rugby League because of injury, but Neath RUFC had asked him to play again."

The Test match between Scotland and the All Blacks last Saturday could have had the less discerning believing that the New Zealanders were indeed super heroes.

The press and particularly one famed television commentator used every superlative in the dictionary to describe their performance. Watching Rugby Special last Sunday you had to keep pinching yourself so as not to be caught up in the hype. When you were treated to yet another 'Brilliant' or 'Superb' New Zealand try the thing that stuck out like a sore thumb was the fact that the Scots were not tackling at all. Now at any level of Rugby, if a side does not tackle, they lose, and the longer the game goes on the more tries the opposition score. On the Wigan video from the season before last 'Ultimate Warriors' we are treated to two occasions when Dean Bell sailed past Leeds'

Craig Innes who had just signed from an excellent All black career. The difference between the codes is vast, especially in the tackling and running with the ball departments. I cannot, however, see a free gangway making much difference unless the likes of Harlequins or Bath offer Rugby League players 'Loadsamoney' to sign on. Rugby League clubs will always sign good

I see from the Rugby press that the speculation over All Black Va'aiga Tuigamala joining Wigan has died down and that the club is showing interest in Australian Rugby Union centre Jason Little. I suppose the difference between Australia and New Zealand is that Rugby League in Australia is the national game. Little will therefore have had League experience. Would he fall for a Dean bell dummy in the way that Craig Innes did?

The Australians seem to be contemplating experimenting with an important rule change,

increasing the tackle count to eight, but not allowing any kicks after the sixth tackle. What do you think will happen to teams? Will they stick to kicking on the sixth tackle or throw caution to the wind and throw the ball about for the last two tackles in order to try to get over the opposition try line. What about keeping the six tackle rule and not allowing any kicks after the fourth tackle? Surely this will encourage teams to throw the ball about more. The Aussies idea would just mean the forwards 'hitting up' for six tackles. Why not restrict it to four 'hit ups'? Why change rules at all? Whatever happens, do not let them bring in the rule that allows the side that kicks the ball into touch to have head and feed in the ensuing scrum!

The short match reports that appeared after the Wigan game at Bradford had some discrepancies. In one I read that the Bradford try was scored just before the thick fog descended. Now am I right in thinking that only about six people on the whole ground knew that Cordle had touched down and it took a long time before Stevo and Eddie found out who had scored. You never know, Cordle was probably behind Offiah when the ball was kicked.

Having shopped around New Zealand for players, the Auckland Warriors have now started to look to Great Britain. Barrie Jon Mather and Chris Joynt are the latest players to be approached. It must be rather tempting to be part of a new exciting set up in a very attractive part of the World. Young players will be able to add to their experience and probably to their value on the transfer market after a couple of seasons under John Monie. The salary cap may well work in British clubs favour with players not insisting to play less than they can earn in Britain in what after al is a relatively short career. A figure of £20,000 has been quoted. That must be on the low side, I suppose a young footloose and fancy free bachelor could live well on that sort of salary but it would certainly not tempt a family man with children to uproot and travel half way around the World. The advice to British clubs is, if you want to keep a player, marry him off as soon as possible.

The centre has scored 18 for Keighley plus 11 Rochdale Hornets, 25 Salford, 45 Hull KR and 100 Halifax.

Austin is the joint holder of the Second Division match record with six tries for Halifax in a 66-26 home defeat of Trafford Borough on 7 April 1991

He also scored six in a match for Hull KR and his total of 17 hat-tricks includes two five-try feats, and four touchdowns on three occasions.

Austin has finished in the top ten try chart in each of the last four seasons being second to Martin Offiah twice, and is in the lead this season with 18.

A former Manly player, the Australian began his British career with Rochdale, making a substitute debut in a 52-13 Second Division home defeat of Doncaster on 22 September 1985.

His full debut followed seven days later when he scored a try in a 25-16 league victory at Keighley. He moved to Salford, returned to

Australia for a year and then signed for Hull KR, for whom he made a two-try debut in a 54-12 Yorkshire Cup first round victory at Bramley on 17 September 1989.

He staved at Rovers for just over a season, then they released him from their overseas quota to make way for New Zealand international forward

James Goulding. Halifax snapped him up and he made another tryscoring debut as a substitute at Bramley in a 56-8 Second Division win on 23 September 1990.

A week later he was in the centre for a 26-18 league victory at home to Ryedale-York.

A move to Keighley Cougars this year saw him make his debut in the 30-22 Second Division win at Barrow on 29





The Centres

When a club has paraded as many star wing threequarters before the Rugby League public as Wigan have then the business of finding the best centres to partner them has always been high on the agenda. Nobody can say that we supporters have not been well provided for and what marvellous players we have been privileged to see in those number three and four shirts.

There have been few better exponents of centre play than Ernie Ashcroft, the local lad who walked into Central Park and asked for a trial even though he had never played any organised rugby previously. Ashcroft always gave me the impression that he was moving in slow motion. He wasn't of course but his long legged, loping running action disguised his speed. It was the same with his passing. So methodical, straight from the coaching manual, had there been such a thing at the time. I wonder how many youngsters learned how to pass a ball correctly by copying Frnie Ashcroft?

Alongside Ernie for most of the late 'forties was Welshman Ted Ward. Ward was strong and crafty and an excellent goal kicker but he never had the reputation of being fast. In fact my lasting memory of Ted Ward was his rather prominent stomach.

Jack Broome and George Roughley were the two 'A' team centres who played in Wigan's 1950 Championship winning side at Maine Road. Broome had more first team games under his belt at the time but even though Roughley was always regarded as a reserve he notched up nearly 100 senior appearances. Broome was signed as a 17 year old in 1948 and from the outset he was pushing for a first team spot. Maine Road provided Broome with his big break and his spectacular try against Huddersfield was the highlight of an historic day. In 1953 Broome was called up for National Service and he added to his reputation in Army rugby union.

Services rugby also helped shape the career of Eric Ashton and it was while he was on a weekend pass from his army unit that he appeared in a public practice match at Wigan at the start of the 1955/56 season. I was at the match and remember it well especially Ashton's part in it. He looked so tall and thin but he was outstanding in every way. The Wigan directors were ready to sign him on by half time. At the end of the day they had done so.

Ashton just seemed to get better and better with every game he played. He soon showed that he was a born leader so it was inevitable that he would become Wigan's captain. He went on to skipper Great Britain too and during the 1962 tour one Australian journalist considered Ashton to be 'the greatest captain ever."

Wigan liked to pair the elegant Ashton with centres of contrasting styles. Men who had a bit of the devil in them, like Keith Holden, a hard uncompromising player who took the knocks to protect his winger but who was not averse to handing out a few knocks himself. Holden had two spells at Wigan and between them they signed another tough guy centre - one of the toughest in fact, name of Alan Davies.

Davies was a Test player and a hardened pro before his transfer from the crack Oldham side of the 'fifties and he typified the spirit of that team with his 'bully boy' attitude which intimidated opponents.

Alan Davies had his best days at Oldham before his

move to Wigan. Chris Hesketh on the other hand had to leave Central Park to make his name. Although an able performer with Wigan he could never be sure of a regular place and as things turned out his transfer to Salford was the best thing that could have happened.

I have to rack my brain to come up with any centres of real quality in the dozen or so years after Eric Ashton retired from playing. For most of the time the positions were filled by men voted for their versatility, like the brothers O'Loughlin and Hill. I have come up with two however - three if you include Bill Ashurst who began as a centre but who found real fame as a second rower so more of him later.

Peter Rowe, a 1966 signing from Swansea RU was well equipped for the centre's job. I always thought he had the look of Ernie Ashcroft about him although he certainly did not have a pair of hands like Ernie, and there was another Welshman, David Willicombe whose signing was welcomed by the fans who had seen him play many fine games against Wigan for Halifax. Deceptively fast, Willicombe was as good a centre as anyone around. He toured in 1974 but broke his arm a year later while playing for Wales in the World Cup. After that it was a series of operations, steel plates and bone grafts. When the arm was right he broke his ankle, after that a complicated shoulder and that eventually forced him to retire.

'WIGAN SIGN BOY WONDER' screamed the headlines in 1978, heralding the arrival of Trevor Stockley who signed for Wigan on his 17th birthday to end one of the most publicised talent chasing races for years. While he was only sixteen Stockley had been playing for the first team as A N Other and turning in impressive performances against top opposition. Why, I wonder, did such an outstanding prospect fail to make a lasting name for himself in the game?

During that bleak period in the late '70s it seemed that none of Wigan's signings could inject flair into a team that was on the slide and it wasn't until the arrival of David Stephenson in 1982 that Wigan could once again claim to have a centre with pedigree. Stephenson made the right centre berth his own while Wigan tried to find a worthy partner for him. Colin Whitfield was given the job and then Wigan signed Steve Donlan from Leigh. The problem was finally solved in the grand manner with the signing of Joe Lydon for yet another record breaking transfer fee.

Since then the list of Wigan's centres reads like an international Rugby League 'Who's Who'.

New Zealander Kevin Iro - The Beast. What a player!

And from Australia, three short term custodians of the centre places: Andrew Farrar, Gene Miles and, my favourite of the trio, Phil Blake. Anchor man throughout this period has been Dean Bell. For more than five years he has been a model of consistency and if Deano has played a bad game for Wigan in that time then I must have been somewhere else because I never saw it.





The weather can interfere with matches in all sorts of ways, and through a long season it is surely part of the make up of a good team to be able to battle through all sorts of different climatic conditions. Perhaps then we should give some credit to Neil Summers, the Bradford stand off, for having the sense to hoist the ball up into the fog where no one could see it in what turned out to be the last minute of the game. This was simply adapting to the conditions.

It was nice to hear Mr. Smith's obvious concern for the spectators in making his decision. It was not just whether he and the players could get on with the game, but whether the paying public could

There is a story that this was not the case some years ago in a European match at Anfield. Fog

had closed in to the extent that spectators at either end could no longer even see as far as the half way line, just their own goal area. A roar from one end was followed by the Liverpool players trooping back into their own half. having obviously scored. The end that could not see began chanting "Who scored?". They were quickly answered by the

Since they could no longer see the game they had to do something to pass the time, although with some top soccer matches that is still the case, even when the weather is perfect.

It was fog that caused John Snagg. the plummiest voice ever known on BBC sports commentary, to make one of the first commentary cock ups that have come to be known as Colemanballs. He was describing the boat race, tedious



Referee Smith showed his concern for the spectators as well as the players when abandoning our match at Odsal Stadium.



Wigan 26 Bradford 22 (20-11-93)



Ten to test you

Would you believe it?

We are used to seeing matches postponed occasionally because of frost, waterlogged pitches, international calls, etc. but would you believe that a Wigan game was once called off because of an outbreak of foot and mouth disease?

On Friday 13 October 1967 the Australian tourists met Wigan at Central Park and were beaten 6-12 before a crowd of 22,770. A few days later a suggestion was put forward for the Australians to play an exhibition game in Dublin. The Aussies saw this as an opportunity to avenge their defeat and agreed to the game requesting that Wigan be the opposition. The Rugby Football League decided, however, that Featherstone Rovers, as the Challenge Cup holders should meet the tourists. Not happy with this the Aussies insisted that they play Wigan and eventually the RFL sanctioned a Wigan v Australia re-match.

Irish promoter Bill Morton organised satisfactory financial guarantees for both sides and the game was arranged to be played on Sunday 26th November 1967 at the John F. Kennedy Stadium at Santry in Dublin. Stand tickets were available at a price of 10 shillings (now 50 pence). Several charter flights were immediately booked in order to ferry fans across the Irish Sea. A package arranged by the Social Club (now the 'Riverside') included transport from Central Park, a return flight and one night's accomodation in a Dublin hotel. The cost of this was a princely £11-10 shillings!

On 25 October 1967 foot and mouth disease was discovered in cattle at a farm at Oswestry in Cheshire. The outbreak spread rapidly and had a disastrous effect on the farming industry. Widespread restrictions were imposed on the movements of animals and people in an attempt to prevent further spread. The Irish government were desperate to ensure that the disease did not reach the Republic and on Thursday 23 November 1967 the Irish Minister of Agriculture made an order which banned non-essential travel into Ireland. The transport of the teams and supporters was in that category and, inevitably, the big game was cancelled and could not be re-arranged

ANSWER Andy Goodway

Each of us present at this afternoons encounter will have the privilege of seeing one of the finest players of the last decade playing for Oldham. The legend of Lang Park, Bob Lindner, is now winning over many British R.L. spectators with his intelligent attacking play and his resolute, uncompromising defensive skills

Bob began his career with Brisbane Souths in the Brisbane League and was a team mate of Mal Meninga before he moved on to Wynnum Manly where he played alongside Wally Lewis and Gene Miles. By 1984 his talent had been noted and Lindner made his State of Origin debut for Queensland, he had also appeared for the Brisbane Combined team. In 1986 Bob made a try scoring Test debut for Australia against Papua New Guinea, won a Brisbane Premiership with Wynnum Manly and was selected to tour Great Britain as a Kangaroo.

All the time he was growing in stature and rapidly earning the respect of the World's R.L. critics with his good, hard, honest football. In 1987 Lindner moved to play Winfield Cup Rugby League with the Parramatta Eels, before moving on to the Gold Coast Seagulls in 1989. During the 1986 and 1987 Australian close seasons Bob played English club Rugby League with Castleford to whom he was a revelation.

By the time Lindner had moved to Western Suburbs in 1990 he was hailed as the best back-rower in the World and he had a quite magnificent tour of Great Britain with the 1990 Kangaroos where his trademark became his blockbusting straight running and his cast iron defence. Bob came to Britain to represent Australia for a third time last season when he was a member of the Aussies World Cup final winning side. The World Cup final was Lindner's 13th Anglo Australian Test match.

Last season he played for Illawara and was a try scorer in his 23rd and final State of Origin match for the Maroons at Lang Park, which incidentally Queensland won. Bob's 24th and final Test match was also at Lang Park where he was a member of the successful Australian team which defeated the Kiwis to clinch the Test series back in June 2 nil.

For Oldham, Bob's signature was seen as a major coup and he has rewarded the management in the short term by turning in some top displays. At present Bob is the only current Australian Test player playing in Great Britain and to date has been more than a match for all his opponents. Lindner's conduct, both on and off the park is impeccable and the example he sets to the youngsters is second to none.

For Big League fans in Britain, Lindner's presence in the Oldham side is sure to generate interest as they have the opportunity to see one of the best players in the World in action. Hopefully the faith that they Oldham management showed when the acquired Bob's signature will be repaid in the long term by his class and his effect on the clubs younger players who can learn the skills of a 'living legend'.




