

FROM the BOARDROOM

by CHAIRMAN JAMES QUINN



Today we welcome Wigan to Watersheddings in the third round of the Regal Trophy and, in so doing, we have to acknowledge that this is the club that has set new standards for all to follow.

For the last five or six seasons the men from Central Park have been "the team to beat" and that in itself is a marvellous tribute to Wigan's professionalism and consistency not only on the field of play but in all aspects of club life.

Don't count me among those people who criticise Wigan for all manner of things. Such thoughts can only be born out of envy. How can you possibly knock a club that has been to Wembley six consecutive times and lifted the Stones Bitter Championship almost as many times in an era of trophy success that has never previously been matched in Rugby League history?

Don't forget that this wonderful chapter in Wigan's wonderful history began in the Second Division. Maurice Lindsay and his fellow directors rescued the club from difficulties, turned it round and laid down the foundations for men like Graham Lowe, John Monie and now John Dorahy to weave their spells of magic as coaches.

Wigan have neglected nothing. Unafraid to spend heavily to take some of the world's best players to Central Park, they have also tuned to perfection a youth policy that will not only stand their own club in good stead for many years to come, but will also ensure that Great Britain will at last conquer the Australians in Test rugby after all these years of trying.

Just look at young players like Phil Clarke, Andrew Farrell, Jason Robinson and Barrie-Jon Mather, to name but four, and you can see that the next wave of home-produced talent is striking through, no doubt determined to follow in the footsteps of players like Martin Dermott, Denis Betts and Shaun Edwards, who is set to receive a club record testimonial of £54.000.

So, you see, Wigan's success has not all been down to the cheque book, big-money signings from other clubs or stars from the other side of the world such as Brett Kenny, Gene Miles or Frano Botica.

Whether buying from overseas, closer at home or developing home-spun talent, Wigan have gone for the best and that applies also to the magnificent stadium they have developed at Central Park.

So, believe me, there is no jealousy of Wigan here at Watersheddings, just an appreciation of all they have done and all they have achieved and the realisation that they have established guidelines for the rest of us to follow.

One has to admit, of course, that the

board at Central Park always knew it would get the total backing of the Wigan public if it put the goods in the shop window. Five-figure crowds would be assured and there was always a stadium to accommodate them

Like many other West Lancashire towns (St Helens, Warrington and Widnes among them), Wigan don't have an FA Carling Premiership soccer club on their doorstep. With due respect to Wigan Athletic, the town is almost exclusively interested in Rugby League.

Nevertheless, Wigan's policies should surely merit adoption by other clubs even if they have to be modified or tailored down to suit realistic crowd expectations and financial budgets.


We have to agree, surely, that over the past decade or so Wigan have been simply the best in Rugby League terms. Other clubs, including ours at Oldham, should examine what has gone on at Central Park and use their policies as a guideline to their own success in future.

Yes, Wigan ARE the team to beat. They still recall that we were the last team to beat them in the Challenge Cup six years ago when Paddy Kirwan scored his last-minute try and Mick Burke landed the winning goal. Wouldn't it be nice for a repeat performance today.

A Watersheddings Welcome to . . . WIGAN

Danny Ellison: Position - winger. This youngster signed from Golbourne ARLFC in 1991 and has made several first team appearances during the past two seasons. A promising young player who has gained honours with G.B. Under 19's.

Michael Cassidy: Position - back row forward. This youngster signed from St. Judes ARLEC in May 1990. Has made several first team appearances and has gained international honours playing for G.B. Under 21's. A hard grafting forward with great future prospects.

Barrie Jon Mather: Position - second row. This strong youngster has supported the first team for most of the season to date. A brilliant worker, signed from Arnold School RUFC. A player with great prospects in the game. Has gained GB Academy and Under 21's honours.

Frano Botica: Position - wing/stand-off. An ex-All Black Rugby Union star signed in a blaze of publicity. A very quick worker who has earned the position of goal kicker with his immaculate kicking record, thus having solved a long standing problem for Wigan. Made an eight point Wigan debut at Swansea in the Charity Shield competition. Frano created history last March, recording the fastest 1000 points aggregate in British Rugby League's history in 93 matches. Has been described by one of his team mates as the "closest thing to a goal kicking machine". Played for New-Zealand in the 1993 Test Series.

Dean Bell: Position - centre. A former New Zealand captain. Known as "Mean Dean". Dean became the first New Zealander to receive the coveted Stones Bitter Man of Steel Award. One of the team's stars who has appeared in the club's sixth consecutive Cup Finals. Had a spell with Eastern Suburbs before joining Wigan in 1986. As club captain, a great team member and a highly respected player. Was represented with the "This is Your Life Award" in September, 1993.

Joe Lydon: Position - centre or wing. Graphic designer. Another great of the modern game. A versatile player who has filled every backline possible for Great Britain and is capable of turning a game with a try or, on one occasion, a sixty yard drop goal. Signed from Widnes in 1986, Joe is only the fourth player in history to have won both the Harry Sunderland and the Lance Todd Trophy. Joe has gained 30 caps for Great Britain.

Shaun Edwards: Position - stand off/scrum-half. Shaun has a blistering pace off the mark, great vision and constant alertness for the half chance. A player who demands perfection from

himself and expects it from his colleagues. Voted Young Player of the Year on a record three occasions and 1990 Man of Steel. The games leading try scorer in the past two seasons. Showed great courage when he stayed on the field despite a fractured eye socket and cheekbone during a Wembley Cup Final. Son of Jackie who played for Warrington. Shaun joined Wigan in a blaze of publicity in 1983.

Denis Betts: Position - second row forward. Burst into the Rugby League scene as an 18 year old player and is now a Great Britain star. A powerful forward who played in every one of Wigan's games during their championship year. Has twice been nominated Young Player of the Year. Signed from Leigh Rangers ARLFC in 1986. Was once on the books of Manchester. United F.C. A dedicated young player who gives his all.

Andy Platt: Position - utility forward. Joined Wigan from St . Helens in September 1988 for a then club record fee of £140,000. Became only the sixth forward in history to gain 25 Test Caps when skippering Great Britain against France at Headingley early in 1993. Harry Sunderland Award winner for his tryscoring display in the 1992 Premiership Final against former club St Helens in 1992. A Great Britain star and a relentless tackler. A good clubman and the ideal Coach's player.

Kelvin Skerrett: Position - prop forward. Great Britain prop signed for Wigan in 1990. Previously had spells with Hunslet and Bradford Northern. Nephew of ex Great Britain star, Trevor Skerrett. A product of Oulton ARL. A workhorse who was impressive on the 1990 Lions tour.

Phil Clarke: Position - loose forward. A player who is undoubtedly destined for the game's highest honours. A skilled footballer and a powerful runner who gets through a lot of work in defence. Took the man of the match award for the 1993 test series. Former GB Under 21's skipper, son of former Wigan hooker and Coach, Colin. Excelled in all three tests on the 1992 Lions tour and was a member of the England side which defeated Wales at Swansea in November 1992.

Martin Dermott: Position - hooker. A dangerous dummy half runner with quick hands. A Great Britain international who fought to make the number nine shirt his own. Joined Wigan from Wigan St. Patricks ARL juniors in 1984, making his debut in 1985 at Wakefield. Skippered GB at Colts level in 1988 and 1989.

Martin Hall: Position - hooker. Aged 23, signed from Rochdale Hornets. Has made several first team appearances but yet to gain international honours. Another hard worker and a great prospect.

lan Gildart: Position - second row forward. A young but yet strong tackling machine. Signed from Leigh Rangers ARLFC. Has gained international honours at GB colts and GB Under 21's level. Has supported the first team often but yet to gain his own regular place.

Martin Offiah: Position - winger. Signed from Widnes RLFC in January 1992 for a record fee of £440,000 and repaid some of that fee with 30 tries in just 16 appearances, including a club record 10 in the Stones Bitter Premiership defeat of Leeds. Former Lance Todd Trophy holder. Topped the League try charts in each of his first four seasons gaining immediate selection for Great Britain. After a long period due to injury, has made his way back into the number five shirt. A speedy player known throughout the game for his

Jason Robinson: Position - winger. Voted Young Player of the Year for 1992. This Leeds born teenager made his first team debut against Sheffield. Represented Great Britain in the 1993 Test series but was injured in a club match which meant he was unable to appear in the second and third tests. A great player who has so far excelled himself and will no doubt be in contention for many of the games highest honours.

Sam Panapa: Position - centre/utility player. Joined Wigan from Sheffield in August 1991 and scored Wigan's opening try in the Foster's World Club Challenge Match in October 1991. An invaluable member of the team who has helped Wigan to Championship and Premiership glory.

Neil Cowie: Position - prop forward. A product of Tormorden ARL. Gained all five domestic winners medals inside his first 18 months at Central Park. A great tackling machine and a hard worker who gives his all in defence.

Billy McGinty: Position: Position second row. Joined Wigan from Warrington in 1991, forcing his way into the 1992 Lions party. A product of Widnes Tigers ARLFC. Another player who has gained all five domestic medals inside his first 18 months at Central Park. A player who has been out of action due to a serious injury but is working his way back after making an excellent recovery.

Gary Connolly: Position - centre. Signed from St. Helens in September, 1993. Had a successful off season in summer 1993 with Cantebury Bankstown returning to play for Wigan after they were eliminated from the Winfield Cup. A current Great Britain international who played in all three of the 1993 tests versus New Zealand. A strong, fast player who is exceptional in defence.

Nigel Wright: Position - stand off. Signed from Wakefield Trinity in August 1993. A great player who will, along with the other Wigan youngsters, no doubt gain some if not all of the games highest honours.



ing this three year spell, he made a total of 88 appearances for Oldham scoring 104 tries. The press reports of the day

would talk about his "corkscrew" runs, when he would weave inside and then outside of the opposing defenders until the ball was placed safely over the try line.

The wing position was and still is the most glamorous position in a Rugby League team and Sam Williams was truly one of the games first superstars.

In the successful Challenge Cup campaign of 1899, Sam scored a total of 14 tries. including two in the final against Hunslet.

At the end of the 1896-97 season Oldham gave a trial to a young threequarter from Northampton, at the time I'm sure no-one connected with the club could have realised the impact LIDDIARD this player would have on freshly formed

Sam Williams did enough in that trial game to convince the Oldham officials to sian him for the club. So he made his debut in the first match of the 1897-98 season, as a centre, by the seasons end, he had played 18 matches, which yielded him four tries.

"Northern Union".

For the following season Sam was switched to the wing, with dramatic effect. In 28 games in the 1898-99 season he scored 39 tries to top the list for the whole Northern Union. He also scored most tries in the entire League for the next two seasons and dur-

No. 12 GLEN



Younger brother of Aussie full-back, David, Glen came over with the rest of the Liddiard family in 1985 to follow David's progress in the English game. After playing a few matches with Saddleworth, Glen was catapulted right Division with Oldham, making a try scoring debut against Dewsbury on December 15th, 1985.

Glen played most of his games for Oldham on the wing but occupied the stand-off position in the Challenge Cup semifinal against Castleford, when he scored Oldham's only try before having to retire with concussion. Only 16 at into the R.L. First the time, Glen would have been the youngest player ever to play at Wembley, if Oldham had won through to the final.







It's Regal Cup day and today's opponents do not come any tougher than the mighty Wigan, whose cup record speaks for itself


They have virtually cleaned up in all competitions these past few seasons and clearly will present a tough challenge if we are to progress into the next round

DATE AND TIME - THIRD ROUND MATCH DETAILS REGAL TROPHY QUARTER-FINAL DRAW

The draw for the quarter-finals of the recordbreaking £360,000 Regal Trophy will be broadcast live on BBC Radio Five's breakfast programme (909/693 kHz) next Monday (13th December 1993) at 7.45 a.m.

The draw will be made by Rodney Walker, the Chairman of the Rugby Football League accompanied by Maurice Lindsay, the Chief Executive of the League. It will be networked to all local radio stations in the Rugby League playing areas and published in local and national press. The round will be played over the weekend of 18/19th December 1993.

In the meantime the battle for who will go into that draw will be played out this coming weekend, starting on Saturday 11th December) when the mighty St. Helens entertain the inform league pace-setters, Warrington in the BBC Grandstand televised match, kick-off 3.00 p.m. The next day (Sunday) attention turns to holders, Wigan, who travel to Oldham in their quest to win the Trophy for the seventh time (kick-off 3.00 p.m.) while the big Yorkshire derby of the day will be at Bradford Northern where Halifax are visitors (3.00 p.m.). Other Regal Trophy matches include Rydale York v London Crusaders (3.15 p.m.); Hull v Widnes (3.15 p.m.); Batley v Salford (3.15 p.m.); Carlisle v Bramley (3.00 p.m.); and Castleford v Leigh (3.30 p.m.). Of the teams in the third round Wigan (six), Warrington (four), Widnes (three), Bradford Northern (twice), St. Helens, Hull, Castleford and Halifax have all won the competition during its 23 year history while at the other end of the scale London Crusaders and Carlisle have never reached the quarter-final stage.

SHAUN EDWARDS

Shaun Edwards of Wigan needs nine points for a career total of 1000. The half-back's total is made up of 907 for Wigan and 84 in representative matches including 60 for Great Britain in Tests. He has totalled 237 tries and 22 goals including a drop goal.

Edwards shares the Wigan record of tries in a match with 10 tries in a 78-0 Lancashire Cup

It was also a County Cup record and, playing at scrum-half, the most by a non-winger in any match.

In addition Edwards has thrice scored four tries in a match for Wigan and five other hat-tricks.

He was the game's top tryscorer in 1991-92 with 40, second last season with 46 and has finished in the top ten on three other occasions.

The former schoolboy international signed for Wigan on his 17th birthday, 17th October 1983, and made his debut at stand-off in a 30-13 John Player first round home defeat of York on 6th November, 1983.

JONATHON DAVIES

Jonathon Davies of Warrington scored the 100th try of his career with one in the 30-14 Stones Bitter Championship home defeat of Featherstone Royers.

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of Monday, November 29th, 1993.

Get a few bob on Wigan to keep the Stones Bitter Championship trophy at Central Park.

Oldham didn't play badly there yesterday, but they were powerless to stay in the game when the champions turned on the heat in the last 20 minutes.

Consider that Wigan produced some of their best rugby of the season without the injured Nigel Wright, Shaun Edwards, Martin Dermott, Andy Farrell, Jason Robinson and Dean Bell and you get some idea of the strength in depth that will take the Riversiders to more glory this season.

They still fielded nine full internationals against Oldham and it was one of them, Phil Clarke, who was an outstanding man of the match in his first appearance since damaging a shoulder in the Third Test against New Zealand three weeks ago.

Oldham couldn't handle Clarke's punishing pace from the loose-forward position and it was appropriate that he should score the first and last Wigan tries with magnificent breaks that brought a 12,000 crowd to its feet.

Winger Martin Offiah chipped in with a hat-trick, but the men who caused Oldham most trouble were Martin Hall, Neil Cowie and Barrie-Jon Mather, filling in at centre.

Mather, like Farrell, can surely climb to the top of Rugby League's ladder of opportunity.

Many of Wigan's forwards are there already, but it was a player who is only half way up, Cowie, who emerged as their top pack man here.

Oldham missed a lot of tackles and Cowie capitalised when he went round three defenders on a crossfield run before sending in offiah for the third Wigan try.

He crowned a fine performance when, in the 60th minute, he sidestepped Wally Gibson to score Wigan's fourth try and spark the late scoring burst.

Oldham trailed 18-12 on the hour, but the floodgates opened after that for Cowie, Mather, Offiah and Clarke to run in further tries.

Oldham did not fare badly considering the team's injury problems and the late withdrawal of Shaun Irwin, who hurt his back at home on Saturday night. Charlie McAlister and Martin Strett started at half-back, but Darren Abram soon suffered a dead leg and left the field.

Martin Crompton came on at scrum-half with Strett moving to stand-off and McAlister to centre.

Oldham made the perfect start when Mike Kuiti (twice) and Abram combined beautifully to send in Bob Lindner for the opening try in the eighth minute, Strett adding the angled goal.

Strett was lively on attack and came close to stretching Oldham's lead with a defence-splitting break that produced a try-saving tackle from Joe Lydon.

After that Oldham were rocked by the full force of Wigan's reply and conceded tries by Clarke and Offiah (2), with Botica landing two goals, before halftime.

Offiah scored his first after a misunderstanding between McAlister and Lindner at a play-the-ball and crossed for his second after poor attempts to

Oldham scored a good try 15 minutes into the second half when Crompton dummied his way through and turned McAlister inside on a clear run to the posts.

Strett's goal put Oldham only six points down, but it was merely the signal for Wigan to turn up the gas.

Wigan had the advantage of 12 penalties to Oldham's three and it was this possession which contributed to the visitors fadeout.



ACTION FROM OUR PREVIOUS ENCOUNTER WITH WIGAN

BACK PAGES

by Michael Turner

Today we welcome to Watersheddings the most famous of all Rugby League clubs . . . WIGAN.

A glance at the record books, show that the men from Central Park are by far the most successful team in both League Championship and the various Cup competitions.

In today's "Back Pages" we look back to the beginning of the Championship play off tournament. This way of deciding the League Champions was first operated in the 1906-07 season when the top four teams played off after the conclusion of the League fixtures. The main reason for the play off being that all clubs did not play each other during a season.

For the first seven years of the Championship play-off either Oldham or Wigan figured in the final and for three consecutive seasons, 1908-09, 1909-10, 1910-11, the "Roughy'eds" and the "Riversiders" were face to face in the title decider.

The match details are listed below:

1909 Wigan 7, Oldham 3 at Salford, attendance 12,000.

1910 Oldham 13, Wigan 7 at Broughton, attendance 10,850.

1911 Oldham 20, Wigan 7 at Broughton 15,543.

Prior to the 1911 final Oldham and Wigan had already played off for the League Leaders Trophy. This came about because both teams had finished the season with 57 points from 34 games. Wigan won this encounter by 11-3 with the strange venue for the match being Belle Vue, Wakefield. It has to be

said that justice was seen to be done, Wigan having finished the season with a superior points difference.

During this period Oldham's star-studded line-up included such names as Alf Wood, Joe Ferguson, Bert Avery, New Zealander G.W. Smith and Aussies Sid Deane and "George" Anlezark. Also by 1911 Oldham had signed the legendary Jim Lomas from Salford, further enhanced his reputation with two tries and three goals in the 1911 Final.

The Wigan side could boast the fine talents of Jim Leytham, Lance Todd, Joe Miller, Johnny Thomas and Charlie Seeling.
