



## FROM the BOARDROOM

Voices of protest against BSkyB's coverage of Rugby League and Soccer have been raised recently in some sporting circles, but I would like it to be known that, in my view, "Sky" provides excellent coverage and is helping to spread the Rugby League gospel.

I cannot comment on its relationship with soccer, but as far as Rugby League is concerned, the promotion our game gets from the "Sky" is putting the game to the forefront from John O'Groats to Lands End – and beyond.

If you accept that, in 1993, the game has to be striking out beyond its traditional boundaries, and you surely must, then it is not difficult to appreciate that "Sky's" world-wide coverage is taking Rugby League into all sorts of places it rarely got to before.

Our game's marketing and publicity people did a survey on the crowd at the first Test between Great Britain and New Zealand at Wembley in October and a surprisingly high percentage of tickets were sold in the South of England.

It is well known that the southern editions of the National papers give little coverage to Rugby League, which they still regard as a Northern game, so one has to conclude that

the nationwide coverage to Rugby League provided by the satellite channel had a major influence on the Wembley attendance.

We get three bites of the cherry, the Boots N All Magazine programme on Thursday evenings, the live game on Fridays and the recorded match on Sunday evenings.

One thing often strikes me when Steve and Eddie give the winners of competitions or put viewers' letters on the screen and that is the number of people writing in from Scotland, the South of England or other parts of the British Isles.

On a more personal note, let me tell you a little story which also relates to Rugby League on "Sky". I have many friends and business contacts in Ireland and most of them are interested in Soccer or Rugby Union.

Major efforts are being made just now to push amateur Rugby League in Ireland and our local Development Officer, Niel Wood, is playing a major role in that. Good luck to him and everyone else who is working hard to lay down some Rugby League roots in the Colleges and Universities over there.

Anyway, to get back to my story. Two friends of mine in Dublin and their two sons, flew to Manchester the

other weekend to watch United play Norwich. The boys play Union in Dublin for the club that our former player, Sean Quinlan, is still connected with.


Fathers and sons are also keen on soccer, hence their trip to Old Trafford. But this is the interesting bit. Through watching Rugby League on "Sky", on a regular basis, they had become sufficiently interested to want to watch a game from the stands and they stayed in this area on the Saturday night, to take in the Oldham-Leigh game on the Sunday.

They thoroughly enjoyed it, returned to Dublin with all sorts of Oldham RLFC souvenirs and vowed to make a return trip in the not-too-distant future.

PR exercises of that nature are invaluable if we are to let the whole of the British Isles know that we have a top-quality game on offer.

It perhaps isn't an ideal thing to switch games to Friday evening, but the £20,000 that goes to the home club is good money, fair recompense and in most cases warmly welcomed. The League has also done its bit this season by working out the Sky schedules many months ahead, so that spectators would not have to be inconvenienced at short notice.

## A Watersheddings Welcome to . . . HALLEAX

Steve Hampson (Fullback): Summer signing from Wigan, where he had an illustrious career, winning medals in every major competition and 12 Great Britain caps. His appearances so far have been limited by injury, although Steve has begun his comeback in the A-team in recent weeks.

Steve Lay (Fullback): 26 year old Kung-Fu expert who signed from Hunslet in october after an impressive loan spell during which he won Man of the Match award against Salford.

Warren Wilson (Utility Back): Fearless runner who began his pro career at Hunslet. Played at Leeds for two seasons under Mal Reilly before moving to Thrum Hall in September 1990, where he played a crucial role in that seasons promotion campaign.

John Bentley (Wing): Elusive former Cleckheaton and England Rugby Union player, capped for GB v France in 1991. Signed from Leeds RLFC in the 1992 close season. John is an instinctive player who is capable of scoring matchwinning tries, as demonstrated in two recent Man of the Match displays against Widnes and Keighley.

John Schuster (Centre): Former All-Black who joined Halifax on a two year contract this summer after a dispute with the Newcastle Knights kept him sidelined for the latter part of last season. Strong and powerful with pace and a tremendous side-step, John is also an able kicker, and hit four vital goals from four attempts in the recent home defeat of Widnes.

Graeme Hallas (Centre): Exciting young 1992 GB tourist signed 12 months ago from Hull KR. The former Dudley Hill amateur has found his form after a good close-season, and has impressed the Thrum Hall crowds with his strong running and some class tryscoring.

Mark Preston (Wing): Lancashire based former Fylde RUFC and Wigan RLFC speed merchant, with whom he won Challenge Cup and Championship Winners Medals. The former 'Wigan Flyer' is renowned for his long distance finishing, as demonstrated as St. Helens when he scored two 80 metre efforts in the recent draw.

Henry Sharp (Wing): Former Barla tourist who had a spell with Leeds in 1986, signed at Thrum Hall in 1991 and was part of the promotion winning side that year. Henry is a fast and elusive runner, and is a valuable part of the squad following long term injury to utility back Mark Bailey.

Michael Hagan (Half-back): Another summer signing from the Newcastle Knights, 'Hages' was previously with Halifax in 1985. The State of Origin player is now back at the club after starring in two Sydney Grand Finals with Canterbury before moving to Newcastle. Mike is the architect of so many Halifax scores, and he has assumed the role of Captain during the absence of Karl Harrison.

Paul Bishop (Scrum-half): Former Wire and St. Helens half-back, who has been previously described as 'fiery' although Malcolm Reilly has instilled discipline into his game and he is now producing the best football of his career. An ever present last season, Paul had scored in every game since joining Halifax until undergoing surgery on a niggling knee injury from which he is still not fully recovered.

Chris Robinson (Scrum half): Signed from Dudley Hill ARLFC in November 1990, this 23 year old former Yorkshire youth representative is a major player in the Halifax Alliance side, and fully deserved his call-up into the first team to cover for the injured Paul Bishop, putting in some excellent performances during the last few weeks.

Karl Harrison (Prop): Team Captain. Club record signing when transferred from Hull to Thrum Hall in 1991. Formerly with Featherstone Rovers, Bramley and Leeds amateur outfit B.R.K., Karl has 11 Great Britain caps and was called out as a replacement on the Australasian tour in 1992. Currently sidelined after dislocating an elbow against St. Helens.

Roy Southernwood (Hooker): Redhill amateur and former Castleford scrum half, who has captained both England Schoolboys and Great Britain U21's. Joined Halifax during the summer of 1990. Moved to the hookers berth following the arrival of Roger Millward to the club in 1991, and has kept that position ever since. Roy is a very underrated player who consistently tops the tackle count.

John Lawless (Hooker): 19 year old local product signed from Siddal ARLFC during the 1992 close season. Johnny has made two appearances as substitute for the GB Academy and was a try scorer against the Junior Kiwis at Wembley. Called into the first team after some sensational appearances as the Alliance captain, he made his debut in the televised clash at St. Helens.

Gary Lord (Prop or Second-row): Ex-Leeds and Castleford utility player who has moved up to prop after working hard in the back row for the last eighteen months. Wembley Cup Winners medal whilst at Cas under Mal Reilly and GB under 21 appearances as full back. Gary is a fierce tackler who is not short of pace.

David Boyd (Prop or second-row): The third summer signing from the Newcastle Knights, David is a tremendous defensive player, previously with Canterbury Bankstown. A founder member of the Newcastle Club, he went on to make over 100 first team appearances for them.

John Fieldhouse (Prop or second-row): Vastly experienced forward who joined Halifax in 1991 from Oldham where he was player/coach. Previously with Widnes, Warrington and St. Helens with seven GB caps to his name. John has been vital to the team during Karl Harrison's absence.

Michael Jackson (Second-row): Former Hunslet and Wakefield Trinity star signed in the close season, who has not had the best of luck with injuries, breaking his thumb in Hallifax's opening game this term, but came back with a double try scoring appearance from the bench against Wigan in October. Michael played for Great Britain v Papua New Guinea in 1991 and France in 1992, and toured Australasia the same year. Returned to the GB fold for the second and third Kiwi Test matches this Autumn.


Mark Perrett (Second-row): Powerful and pacey local product signed from Ovendon ARLFC in 1991, who impressed in the Alliance and claimed his regular first team spot with a fine try-scoring debut against Widnes last November. Finally appeared for the GB under 21's v France at Wilderspool earlier this month after missing out twice through injury.

Lee Harland (Second-row): Enthusiastic and determined runner, signed in August after rejecting terms at Headingley where he made eight first team appearances last season. Made his GB debut for the under 21's versus the Kiwis at Workington in October, gaining a further cap in the recent game v France.

Gary Divorty (Loose-forward): Firm favourite with the Thrum Hall crowds, this York born hard working back row or loose forward signed from Leeds along with John Bentley in 1992. Previously with Hull FC and Heworth ARLFC, Gary was a BARLA youth international tourist in '83, made a Challenge Cup final appearance in '85, and was capped for Great Britain in '86.

## Roughy 'eds Recalled

#### No. 13 HUSSEIN M'BARKI



Moroccan-born Hussein M'Barki was captain of the Rugby Union team in his native country made and International appearances, before he went to try his luck at a higher level in France. It was there, across the Channel, that he first became aware of Rugby League and after declaring his interest in the game, he was soon snapped up by the newly-formed Fulham Club.


After three unsuccessful seasons with the Londoners, he left to play for Warrington and then signed for Oldham at the start of the 1985-86 season.

Hussein had two years at Oldham, usually playing centre or wing but occasionally filling in at full-back.

An aggressive runner and strong in defence, he played 60 games for Oldham, scoring 12 tries, including an appearance in the 1986 Lancashire Cup Final, against Wigan.

After a short spell with Hull, Hussein returned to London to finish his career with Fulham.

## No. 14 JACK KEITH



Oldham were indeed fortunate that, after having Brooks perform so well in the No. 9 shirt for the best part of 17 years, they had now signed another formidable "Striker", who would occupy the position for the next decade.

Jack Keith was a canny Yorkshireman, totally confident in his own ability and not afraid to let anyone know it.



As well as his undoubted ball-winning skills, he was also an accomplished player "in the loose", a good ball handler with a deceptive turn of pace and a knack of being in the right place to finish a try-scoring movement.

Jack was the Oldham hooker throughout the club's successful period in the 1950's and scored a total of 64 tries in 351 games for the club. In a way Jack, more than any other player, represents the 1950's at Oldham, signing at the start of the 1949-50 season and leaving for Halifax in January, 1960.






## TUNKS' TALKBACK



## Last Time Out . . .

#### with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of August 30th, 1993.

#### HALIFAX 26 OLDHAM 12

Paul Bishop introduced Oldham to the First Division with a couple of killer grubber kicks, which gave Halifax a flying start with tries by Mark Bailey and Gary Divorty in the first quarter of an hour.

A lucky rebound off a defender gave Bailey a walk-in, then Divorty scored when Scott Ranson fielded an awkward ball on his own line but lost it in the tackle.

Fortune favoured Halifax on both occasions. But credit them with knowing what they were doing on the last tackle, and having a player like Bishop to make it happen.

Oldham didn't reach the fifth tackle as much as Halifax because they nearly always lost possession long before then.

But when they did get to five they often looked lost, running around and aimlessly trying to keep the ball alive, with the result that possession was handed over.

In contrast, Bishop orchestrated the Halifax performance and made life tough for Oldham's Steve Kerry, who was pulled off at half time as coach Peter Tunks looked for more authority and direction.

Oldham were 8-0 down before they had handled the ball, and 12-2 down after 17 minutes.

The signs were ominous when speedy Mark Preston was put away by Graeme Hallas, and Wally Gibson flew across to halt the Halifax winger.

Tiny Solomona and Ian Sherratt had more than matched Karl Harrison and Gary Lord, but there was a need for more second-row punch in the Oldham pack, which came with Andy Goodway.

Skipper Mike Kuiti set a sound example on defence, Solomona and Sherratt responded, and Goodway began to make inroads into Halifax.

But the outside backs toiled to

hold centre Hallas and the powerful Bentley on the right wing.

Nigel Heslop always threatened when in possession, but he found it difficult to stop his opposite number.

The impressive Paul Topping save a certain try when Bentley went outside Heslop, but there was no holding the former Leeds man when he took the same route to score the fifth and final Halifax try near the end.

Compared with Bentley, Schuster and Hallas, Oldham were lightweight in the threequarters.

This was clear when Ranson, who made two early handling errors, was switched to centre at half-time.

Topping, Gibson and Abram held their own in the backs, but too many crucial mistakes were made out wide, leaving the forwards under pressure.

Oldham, who had opened their account with a 13th minute penalty by Kerry, came back into the game when Goodway, Kuiti and Solomona almost sent Gibson in.

When the ball went left, it needed a fine tackle by Lay to stop Abram's burst on Kuiti's slick pass.

From there, Kuiti took charge again with a long pass to the wing which gave Heslop a try.

In the second half Topping went to full-back, Gibson to scrumhalf Ranson to centre and David Jones came in on the wing. Topping, gaining in confidence by the minute in his first serious game for 15 months, gave a splendid second-half display.

Sadly, the first half defensive stint began to take its toll on the forwards.

Little was seen of Harrison in the first half, but the Halifax prop was now given leeway to turn and release the ball, and it took only ten minutes for Harrison

and Hallas to set up a try for

Having played himself to a stand still, Sherratt was replaced by Green after an hour, but the forwards were flagging when Halifax took a vital scrum against the head and Kuiti made an unforced error at play-theball

Topping went close from Gibson, but Schuster had already pushed the home side 22-6 in front when Abram, Topping and Kuiti fashioned a try down the middle for Groves, which Topping improved.

### **BACK PAGES**

Today's visitors, Halifax, were one of the founder members of the Northern Union and in the first season under the new administration they finished runners-up in the Championship to Bradford club Manningham.

The first time a two division system was introduced in 1902-03, Halifax took the First Division title, with Salford as runners-up. The "Thrum Hallers" have a knack for being the first winners of R.L. competitions, taking the honours in the first top four Championship play-off in 1907, the first top 16 play-off in 1965 and also being the first winners of the John Player (Regal) Trophy in 1972.

It is the 1907 Championship Final (against Oldham) that is our focus for today's "Back Pages".

Halifax had finished top of the League with 56 points, with Oldham second on 53 points. The first stage of the play-off saw Halifax defeat fourth placed Keighley by 9-4, While Oldham accounted for third placed Runcorn 11-3. So it was on to Huddersfield for a "Roses", final between "Fax" and the "Roughyeds".

On the day, the Yorkshiremen proved far superior and ran out easy winners by 18-3, with tries from Riley, Bartle, Bulmer and Morley and three goals from full-back Little. Oldham's only reply being a try by Joe Ferguson.

The Oldham team that day, 20th April, 1907 was as follows: R. L. Thomas, G. Tyson, W. Dixon, A. Avery, T. White, M. Yewlett, A. Lees, A. Smith, J. Ferguson, H. Vowles, H. Topham, J. Wilkinson, W. Longworth.

To complete a disappointing end to the season, Oldham

were defeated by Warrington in the Challenge Cup Final the following Saturday.

Two years later Oldham gained some revenge on Halifax by knocking them out of the Championship play-off, only to lose to Wigan in the Final.

I am currently researching for a book covering the complete playing records and history of OLDHAM RLFC. If anyone has any old material connected with the club (photos, programmes etc) I would be very interested in viewing such items.
