

Backroom men, maybe, but they are men who are playing a vital role in the future of Oldham RL Club. They are, of course, the men who are actively involved in the running of our Under-19 Academy side, either as Scouts, Coaches or on the Administrative side.

The Academy side was formed only at the start of this season, but nobody could possibly recognise the amount of sheer hard work and dedication put into the Under-19 operation by this bunch of dedicated Rugby League enthusiasts.

It wasn't easy to put a team together. There were many obstacles to overcome. It isn't appropriate to go into them all here, but suffice to say that our men behind the Academy team have worked wonders, often under extreme hardship, to provide the club with a squad of which we can all feel very proud indeed.

In the early days, particularly, most of the lads were recruited from West Lancashire and to save expense we had them training in Golbourne, while the local contingent trained here at Watersheddings with the First and "A" Team squads.

It isn't an ideal arrangement, but needs must. Throughout this time the men behind the Academy were beavering away on recruitment, scouting, training and coaching and, sure enough, they came up with a team which did surprisingly well in the first phase of the Academy season.

It was perhaps a good thing, from the long-term point of view, that the youngsters failed narrowly to qualify for a place in the First Division when the teams were graded in mid-Autumn. Now, in the Second Division, they are building up their confidence.

At the time of writing, the Academy lads were joint top of the Second Division, with Widnes and it was a joy to see the name of Oldham at the top of that table, while the Alliance Team topped the Second Division of its competition.

I would like to offer my personal thanks, and those of the Board, to the men who have done such a good job. To John Prince for his work behind the scenes, to Jack Buckley for his day-to-day involvement on the administrative side, to Alan Robinson and Geoff Munro for their enthusiastic coaching, to

Harry Aspinall of Orrell, who knows Youth Rugby like the back of his hand and does such a lot of scouting for us.

Alan's sheer enthusiasm, as he stalks up and down the touchline, is infectious. So thanks to all, thanks also to the players, who have shown such loyalty to the club and, last but by no means least, thanks to all those people who have supported the operation, either by turning up to give the lads a cheer or helping out with sponsorship or in voluntary capacities.

The Broadbent Group of Companies have provided the lads with new tracksuits, so they will be looking very smart for the second half of the season. Thanks for that and also thanks to Bill and Brenda Rogers for all they do and to their loyal bunch of friends, who never miss the opportunity to turn up on the touchline and lend their support – even at Whitehaven and, in the case of the "A" Team, Hemel Hempstead.


I can't mention everyone and I do hope I offend no-one by omission, but the Farrell's have also backed the Academy boys from day one and long may it continue.

A Watersheddings Welcome to . . . SALFORD

Garry Jack (Full Back) Returned to the Willows at the start of this season in the capacity of player/manager. The former Aussie Test full back (21 caps). Previously had a spell with Salford during the 1987-88 season at a time when he was regarded as the world's best in that position. Began his senior career at Western Suburbs in 1981 and the following year moved to Balmain. Last season he was on Sheffield Eagles books.

Tex Evans (Winger) A tribunal figure of £40,000 settled his transfer from neighbours Swinton in August 1988, after originally playing for the Crosfields A.R.L. side. Last season's players "Player of the Year" has also appeared in the second row, using his strength and pace with telling effect.

Jason Critchley (Centre) A 1992 close season signing from Widnes along with Steve Wynne, in the deal that took winger Adrian Hadley to Naughton Park. Already proved that he is a useful acquisition. Already a G.B. Under 21 International when he arrived at the Willows, he has since played for England against Wales.

Scott Naylor (Centre) Snapped up from Wigan during the close season. A 21 year old former Leigh Miners Schoolboy International, he made only two appearances for the Central Park side, but is highly regarded.

Martin Birkett (Centre) Joined Salford originally on a three year contract in December 1989, after impressing in the Alliance side. Developed well since turning professional from the Prizington A.R.L. club. Represented Cumbria against Papua New Guinea in 1991, scoring a try on his County debut.

Phil Ford (Winger) Signed from Leeds in the deal that took Reds forward Mick Worral to Headingley during the the 1992 close season. Phil is a G.B. and Welsh R.L. International who toured Down Under in 1988, when he enjoyed much success. Originally turned professional with Warrington in 1981, later having spells at Wigan and Bradford Northern. Reds' top try scorer last season with a total of 21 tries.

Paul O'Neill (Winger) Signed from Leigh Miners A.R.L. side in November 1989 and made a two try scoring debut against Barrow in October 1990. That season he scored eight tries in ten games and has been on the first team fringe ever since.

Peter Williams (Stand Off) A sensational capture from Orrell R.U. club, in March 1988, on a five year contract. In his R.U. days he represented England and Lancashire, gaining four caps at International level. Made an

immediate impact at the Willows and soon made his debut for Lancashire and G.B. Classy player who is a creator of tries. Last season he represented the Welsh R.L. side, becoming the first former R.U. player to do so. that was made possible by the fact that his father, Roy, was a Welshman having played prop for Llanelli prior to turning pro with Wigan.

Mike Neil (Scrum half) Signed during the close season from Illawarra Steelers. Experienced top grade player who was a team-mate of Garry Jack at Balmain for five years. He began his career at Western Suburbs in 1983 and moved to Balmain in 1986, playing in the 1988 and 1989 Sydney Grand Finals. He moved to Illawarra last season.

Steve Blakely (Scrum Half) Signed from Wigan on a three year contract in November, 1992, making 14 appearances for the first team and taking over the goal-kicking duties towards the end of the season. Formerly played for Leigh Rangers A.R.L.

David Young (Prop) Signed from Leeds in April 1991, on a four year contract. The former British Lion and Wales R.U. star originally turned pro on a five and a half year contract worth £165,000 but things did not go as planned and he only made eight appearances for Leeds. At Salford he has settled in well and played for his native Wales at R.L., improving all the time and Garry Jack has installed him as team captain.

Mark Lee (Hooker) A bargain £15,000 signing from 5t. Helens in January 1990. Went straight into the first team and has remained there ever since. A clever player who can dictate the moves. Accurate touch finder with his long raking kicks. Missed just two matches last season.

Paul Forber (Prop) Signed from St. Helens in January 1993. Former G.B. Colts and Lancashire County player at senior level who had a successful stint at Knowsley Road spanning eleven seasons and almost 250 games. Played in several major finals for St. Helens. A prominent member of the Reds pack.

Ged Stazicker (Prop). A 1991 close season signing from Wigan for a £30,000 fee. Originally at Central Park in January 1984 from the local Wigan St. Patricks A.R.L. side. Played for Lancashire Colts in 1985 and was a sub for G.B. Colts in 1986. Hard working prop who always gives 100%. Played in every match last season.

lan Blease (Second Row) Local lad, Ian has been at the Willows since March 1985 when he turned professional from Folly Lane A.R.L.

club. As club captain he leads by example and made his County debut for Lancashire against Yorkshire in 1991. Last seasons sponsors "Player of the Year".

Andy Burgess (Loose Forward) Signed professional for Salford on his 17th birthday in April 1987, after several outings with the Alliance side. Gone from strength to strength, earning a G.B. U21 call up against France in 1991. During the close season he has had a spell with N.S.W. Country Club, Casino, and they were most impressed.

Keri Brookfield (Hooker) Joined Salford from Wigan St. Patricks A.R.L. club during the 1992 close season. He was a member of the G.B. BARLA side against Australia and France during 1991-92 and the Reds beat a host of other clubs to sign the nephew of former player Keiron O'Loughlin.

Bob Marsden (Prop) Former Shaw A.R.L. player who turned professional with Oldham in September 1983 but made only nine appearances in five seasons, prior to moving to Rochdale Hornets, where his career took off under coach Stan Gittens. Voted Player of the Year twice and also man of the match in the 1991-92 Lancashire Cup Final when Hornets lost to St. Helens. Joined Salford in October 1993

Terry O'Conner (Prop) Twenty-two year old prop who originally signed for Salford in August 1991 after returning from a BARLA trip to New Zealand. Made his debut as sub v Chorley Borough in January 1992 but has came into his own this season, giving several powerful displays.

Wayne Reid (Half-back) Joined Salford from Wigan during the 1991 close season, after spending five years at Central Park without playing for the first team. Scored ten tries in 29 appearances during the 1991-92 season plus another 25 appearances last season. Has also figured at loose forward in the Reds successful Alliance side.


Chris Tauro (Second Row) Aussie Second Row forward from the Manly club who came over to this country backed by glowing reports from former Wigan boss Graham Lowe. Made his debut against Castleford in October.

Richard Webster (Prop) Former British Lions and Swansea flanker. The 25 year old forward joined Salford after winning 13 Welsh caps. He scored a try in his first outing with the Alliance side in October and it is hoped that he will make a big impact in the professional code.

Andrew Gregory (Scrum half) Former G.B. test scrum half who joined Salford from Leeds in November 1993. Originally played a trial game for Salford in November 1978 but Salford failed to sign him and he went to Widnes. He has achieved every success in the game, both at Club and International level, which has also seen him land the Lance Todd Trophy on two occasions (1988 and 1990). In total, he has made eight appearances in Challenge Cup Finals and only finished on the losing side once. After leaving Widnes he had successful spells at Warrington and Wigan before his shock move to Headingley. Already has shown that he is still one of the best scrum halves in the game and he could prove to be the bargain buy of the season

Roughy 'eds Recalled

No. 15 RICHARD CRACKNELL



Signed for a club record fee of £4.500 in October, 1953. from Huddersfield, "Dick" Cracknell had gained International honours during his time at Fartown, playing in two Tests against the 1951 Kiwis.


A winger who stood 5 ft. 11 in, tall and weighing over 13 stones, he represented a formidable presence on Oldham's right flank. He gained further honours with Yorkshire County whilst with the "Roughyeds" and made the No. 2 shirt his own during his six seasons with the club.

played Championship Finals and four Lancashire Cup Finals for the club and was a consistent try-scorer in the great Oldham team of the 1950's.

Also a useful goal-kicker, he once kicked nine in one match, this was against Blackpool Borough on 24th November, 1956, in a 60 points to eight victory over the Seasiders.

However, it was his tryscoring talents that made him a big favourite with the Watersheddings fans and he scored a total of 119 in 213 appearances for Oldham and kicked 28 goals.

No. 16 HARRY MAJOR



uncompromising second row forward, who joined Oldham from Warrington during the big "freeze" in January, 1963. He made his debut at Widnes on 2nd February, this being Oldham's only match in a 10-week period, due to the atrocious weather conditions.

In the following 1963-64 season, Harry played a "Major" part in the success of the club, as Oldham took the Second Division title

and reached the Semi Final of the Challenge Cup.

One of the games characters, Harry played 67 games for Oldham, before signing for Wigan on 15th September, 1965, his debut for the Riversiders coming the following day at Oldham, in the Lancashire Cup.

The programme for the match shows Harry in the Oldham line-up, but it was a short-lived debut, as Harry was sent off in the first half.



An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of March 11th, 1991.

OLDHAM 40. SALFORD 3.

A ONE-POINT win would have done . . . but Oldham swept into the semi-finals of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup for the second-year running, with a seven try demolition act on the Second Division leaders.

The 40 points scored came only a week after 37 points were piled up against Bradford at Odsal. Are Oldham coming good at just the right time?

It was a question many fans were asking as they left Watersheddings last night and playercoach John Fieldhouse felt sure he knew the

lain MacCorquodale, his assistant, dismissed suggestions that Salford's weakness was the main factor in such a one-sided quarter-final tie. The telling factor, he said, was Oldham's strength. "Salford had one or two key men out through injury," he conceded, "but even accounting for that you don't expect a side like Salford to let in 40 points in a third round Challenge Cup-tie.

"I think that says a lot for the way we played." Already without I an Blease, Tex Evans and Steve Gibson, Salford suffered another blow at training on Saturday, when skipper Mick Worrall pulled a hamstring.

Luck was not on Salford's side, but nobody can take anything away from an Oldham team that has lifted itself off the floor in recent weeks to surge into the Cup semi-finals.

The players, however, have not forgotten that they also have a battle on their hands to stay in the First Division.

The first thing Fieldhouse did when he arrived back in the dressing room was to inquire about the League results involving relegation rivals Wakefield and Sheffield. And the chat in the bowels of the pavilion was not about the semi-final draw, but about the First Division matches at St. Helens on Wednesday and Sheffield at Watersheddings next Sunday.

Teamwork will have to be at its best . . . just as it was at Bradford and again in yesterday's cup-tie.

It was reflected in the way the seven tries were

spread around and scored by Richard Irving (2), Mike Ford, Charlie McAlister, Paul Round, John Henderson and Brett Clark - one each for the second-row pair and the rest to the backs. It was reflected in the choice of three different Oldham players for various manof-the-match awards.

The Press gave the Silk Cut prize to Ford, the Oldham club chose Richard Russell to receive their own award and the dressing room vote among the players - 12 out of the 15 declared McAlister as the op man among his peers, the highest recommendation any player can receive.

It was reflected also in the fact that Andy Ruane and Fieldhouse topped the tackle count, Tony Anderson was second to Ford in the backs, and there were impressive performances by Duncan Platt, two-try Irving Ruane, Round and Austin Donegan, before he went off injured after 20 minutes.

Every player in the side contributed substantially, as Oldham roared into their third semi-final appearance in the last six years.


Des Foy's stunning long ball just outside the Salford 25 enabled Round and Anderson to send Ford scampering over in the pavilion corner for the second try. John Henderson saved a certain try to Salford early on by turning and catching Steve Kerry, when he raced clear up the blind-side of the scrum.

McAlister stopped Andy Burgess on the line and at a vital time of the match when Round was in the sin-bin just after half-time, Anderson saved the day with a last-ditch challenge on Salford's most dangerous forward, Francis Leota.

Oldham's defence was at its best when Round was off. Salford could not capitalise on their numerical advantage although they were dangerous just after half-time, when the tricky Kerry started to run with the ball and take men on.

The home side survived, steadied itself, and then ran in four second-half tries at regular intervals. Brett Clark was a busy stand-off, Keith Atkinson's goalkicking was beautifully performed when he replaced the injured Platt and John Cogger was a bundle of bounce when joining the action midway through the second-half.

Other features of the tie were McAlister's phenominal field kicks early on and the way in which Ruane, aided by a big push, won the ball against the head on no fewer than three occarions.



It was not a good day for Salford's acting skipper Mark Lee, the hooker, who was carried off with a foot injury midway through the second half. His loss of so much ball on the Salford feed meant that Oldham were able to compensate for conceding four penalties to none in the first half.

Oldham received their first penalty, in fact, in the 47th minute, when Cassidy challenged Ford after he had parted with the ball.

Both Cassidy and Fell, who later dropped Cogger in a similar incident, were penalised but were lucky to stay on the field in view of Round's sin-binning earlier in the match.

This was not a dirty game, though, and Oldham filled it with football to score their seven of the best.

Russell and Ford produced some immaculate blind-side football from the first scrum to send Irving in at the pavilion corner.

It was a classic try of its kind with scrum-half and loose-forward linking together as they used to do regularly in days gone by.

Ford scored next after a move initiated by Foy's long pass and then Irving, showing remarkable strength, burst between Sherratt and Hansen to score the third try.

Round's wide running cut Salford to ribbons in the second half. He went close when unleashed on a delicately floated McAlister pass and from the ground gained, Ruane gave McAlister a walk-in under the posts.

And so it went on. Round plunged over next after McAlister had gone close and then Henderson capatilised on a dreadful error by Fell to follow Ford's kick and score the sixth try.

The seventh came when Russell and Fieldhouse handled cleverly for Clark to score under the posts.



BACK PAGES

Today's visitors, SAL- tour, Lomas was again FORD. were founder-members of the "Northern Union", but ioined for the second season of its existence in 1896-97, along with neighbours Swinton. Both clubs no doubt realising that their continued alliance to the Rugby Union, would isolate them from all their top local fixtures and potential best attendance.

As it happened, Salford's first home match under the new code was against Oldham, on 12th September, 1896, with the "Roughyeds" victorious by nine points to nil and then going on to complete the double, with an 11-3 victory at Watersheddings on 19th December.

In 1901, Salford signed James Lomas from Bramley, in the first £100 transfer. A Cumbrian by birth, Lomas was a burly half-back or centre, who was one of the most noted players in the early era of the game and in 1910, captained the first Great Britain team to tour Australia and New Zealand.

After his return from the


the subject of a record transfer, when Oldham paid £300 for his services in January, 1911. There was concern amongst the Oldham supporters that Lomas might be too "long in the tooth" to warrant such a large fee. but the fears were soon set aside, as Jim showed great form to help Oldham to the 1910-11 Championship, scoring two tries and three goals in the Championship Final against Wigan.

Another notable transfer between the two clubs was in 1950, when the multi-talented utility

back Frank Stirrup left the Willows, to become one of the brightest stars in the great Oldham team of the mid to late 1950's.

With regard to players going in the other direction, no fewer than five of the players who helped Oldham to the Second Division Championship in 1963-64, ended up on the Salford register, namely: Geoff Sims, Vince Nestor, Stuart Whitehead. Charlie Bott and Peter Smethurst.

In more recent times, players who have assisted both clubs include: lan Holland, Steve Herbert, Mick Worrall, Ged Byrne and current "Roughyeds", Steve Kerry and Ian Sherratt.
