
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



FROM the BOARDROOM

As a priority for next season, we must make sure we have adequate training facilities for the winter months. Ever since I can remember our form has slipped a little from about the middle of November and I have no hesitation at all in concluding that it has a lot to do with the rough weather we invariably get at Watersheddings and the shortage of good training facilities in the club and around the town.

No, I haven't forgotten that we sold our training pitch. That was a necessity to ease our financial crisis. It doesn't help our training problems, I know, but to be honest it wouldn't have mattered if we had had half a dozen training pitches at Watersheddings in the past few weeks, they would all have been waterlogged, like the centre of the greyhound ring, or at best very heavy indeed and unsuitable for training.

I was going to say we couldn't legislate for the weather. But we can, can't we? And we all know how. Anyway, that's another story and I won't go into it here.

Luckily, we have been using the gym and sports hall at St. Augustine's School on Monday nights for the past few months. As a facility for use 24 hours after a Sunday match that is fine and we are very grateful indeed for it and indebted to those people who make it possible.

However, if the players are going to be inside on Monday nights they need good outdoor facilities for ball work, tactical sessions and other kinds of training on Wednesday and Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. But what has happened in the past few weeks? The weather has been so bad up here – snow, hail, sleet, heavy rain and high winds – that the players couldn't get on the greyhound area and only rarely on the main pitch, which has to be protected now because we are playing first team, "A" team and Academy games on it as well as using it for training whenever possible.

Our multi-gym has been oversubscribed in the past few weeks, I can tell you . . . and we have also been good customers at the local swimming baths. But Peter Tunks and our coaching staff will tell you that there is no real substitute for outdoor work in the sessions from Wednesday onwards and I am convinced in my mind that the form of our players has been affected by the constant attempts to make-doand-mend in freezing conditions or driving rain and cold.

On Wednesday of last week we managed to get the use of the all-weather surface at Hathershaw Sports Centre for one hour. The coaches and players agreed that the floodlit facilities were excellent and that's the sort of facility we need to get on a more regular basis next season.

I have been accused in a reader's letter in the sports pages of the Oldham Chronicle of making excuses, of blaming the weather and the shortage of facilities for our dip in form when other clubs have similar problems. Some do. But many don't. And I don't think many would argue with us when we say that our geographical location, on the slopes of the Pennines, gives us

more problems with the winter weather than the clubs in West Lancashire, for instance.

Take Wigan. Not only are they fulltime professionals, training most days during the day, but they have excellent facilities at Central Park and the use of other good facilities in the town, particularly at Robin Park.

There, they can use an eight-lane running track, indoor facilities, all-weather surfaces and even a covered running area.

The Wigan players, unlike ours, do not get home from work at tea time and turn out on a wintry night to try and do some training in the driving sleet and mud. Yes, I know Wigan are exceptional. But I submit there are few teams in the Stones Bitter Championship who have to overcome the problems we face up


It appears that the problems are not exclusive to the town's Rugby League Club, either. The other night I read that Joe Royle was having to ring round the town trying to find some training facilities for Athletic.

Let's hope 1994 will bring an improvement in the weather in the early months of the year. Mark my words. As the weather improves, so will the quality of preparation and so will the results.

This is professional Rugby League at the highest level. There is an extremely thin dividing line between success and failure on the field of play and merely a slight hiccup in team planning and preparation can make all the difference between victory and defeat.



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Roughy 'eds Recalled

No. 17 TOM MARTIN



ABE Tom Martin was a winger who joined Oldham during the first season of the Northern Union making his debut on New

Arbroath. Born in Scotland, Tom's family moved to North East England when he was 12 years old and it was from the Tudhoe club in County Durham that Tom was signed by Oldham.

Years Day 1896.

A powerful and elusive wingman, he gained County honours with Durham at Rugby Union and emulated the feat in the new code playing

several times for adopted County Lancashire.

Tom's last game for Oldham was against Salford on October 28th,

1899 by which time he had played in 99 first class matches the "Roughyeds" with an impressive total of 57 tries.

No. 18

NO2NHOL

Abe Johnson was signed from Leigh in December 1925, making his debut at Warrington on the 12th of that month when he kicked two goals in the 7-7 draw with Warrington.

A very versatile player, Abe played equally well in the stand off, centre or wing positions and also proved to be a more than useful goalkicker.

Contrary to common belief Abe actually holds the record for points in a match



for Oldham. On Easter Monday, April 9th, 1928 he scored two tries and kicked 12 goals in the 60 points to 5 thrashing of Widnes, for a total of 30 points.

Before his transfer to Halifax, just before the Challenge Cup deadline in 1930, Abe had played in 146 first class games for Oldham, scoring 62 tries and kicking 157 goals including two in the 1927 Challenge Cup final victory over Swinton.


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

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
JOHN SHOWS HIS SKILL

JOHN SMITH'S TOUR BY AUSTRALIA 1994

The three-match John Smith's Test series between Great Britain and Australia will be housed at Wembley, Manchester United's Old Trafford and Elland Road, Leeds, providing capacity for a record breaking aggregate attendance.

The Ashes treble will be staged in London on Saturday, 22nd October, in Manchester on Saturday, 5th November and in Leeds on Sunday, 20th November.

The current attendance record for a British Test series is 133,684, set on the Australian's last visit in 1990, producing world record receipts of £1,180,000.

All three Test grounds will be all-seater by the autumn, with a capacity of nearly 78,000 at Wembley, 43,000 at Old Trafford and 39,000 at Elland Road.

Ticket prices at Wembley are £8, £13, £17, £20, £24, £27, and £30 in the stadium plus £40 for the Olympic Gallery. A special promotion will be mounted for organised parties of junior fans who will be offered £13 seats for only £4. An initial allocation of 5,000 seats have been reserved for this development exercise. For the Great Britain v. New Zealand first Test at Wembley last October, Keighley Cougars alone took 1,000 schoolchildren on this scheme.

Seats for the Old Trafford and Elland Road John Smith's Tests will be priced at £10, £15 and £19 with an allocation of the £4 junior special offer again made available.

As a special incentive to encourage attendance at all three John Smith's Tests, purchasers of a ticket for each of the three Tests will receive a £5 discount.

Order forms for the John Smith's Test series can be obtained from the Ticket Office, The Rugby Football League, 180 Chapeltown Road, Leeds LS7 4HT with Access/Visa bookings made on the Ticket Hotline, 0532 629991, Monday to Friday 9.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m.

The League has already decided that no League matches will be played on the weekends of the Wembley Test and the Leeds Test.

The remainder of the John Smith's Tour fixtures will be determined at a meeting in Sydney between Rugby League Chief Executive Maurice

Lindsay and Australian Chairman Ken Athurson over the weekend of the Coca-Cola World Sevens from 4th-6th February.

Mr. Lindsay said today: "The number of John Smith's Tour matches and the opposition are still subject to debate".

Wembley will be staging its sixth Rugby League International. Visits to the twin towers in 1963 and 1973 were unsuccessful, but a return for the first Anglo-Aussie Test in 1990 attracted a current record British Test crowd of 54,569.

Two years later the Stones Bitter World Cup Final between Great Britain and Australia was attended by 73,631 – a world record for a Rugby League International match. Last October the third highest crowd for any Anglo-Kiwi Test in the 82-match history – 36,131 turned up for the John Smith's first Test.

Old Trafford made its Rugby League Test debut in 1986, the first Great Britain encounter with Australia attracting a then British Test record of 50,583. The 1989 Kiwis played their first Test in 1989 before nearly 20,000 fans before the Australians returned in 1990 to draw level in the Test series in the second encounter before 46,615 spectators.

Elland Road's first staging of a Test was in 1985 when a crowd of 22,209 witnessed a dramatic 6-6 draw to leave the series tied. The Australians called in on their 1986 visit en route to a Test whitewash of Britain, before New Zealand returned in 1989.

The Kangaroos completed the ground's quartet of Tests a year later with a capacity crowd of 32,500 for the deciding 1990 series encounter, Australia retaining the Ashes with a 14-0 victory.

This autumn's eagerly awaited visit will be the 18th Kangaroos tour since 1908. Britain have won nine of those home Test series, Australia's eight successes including a current run of seven consecutive triumphs.

Honours are even in the 108 Ashes Tests, each side winning 52 with four drawn, Australia having the advantage on points scoring difference.

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
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Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of September 13th, 1993.

Debutant scrum-half Martin Crompton was an outstanding individual in a workmanlike team as Oldham scored five tries to two at windswept Craven Park yesterday.

Rovers beat St. Helens in their previous home game, but on this occasion they were ripped apart in the last 20 minutes by an Oldham team which lifted its level of performance when playing into the stiff breeze.

Choosing to play against the wind when winning the toss, the Robins must have been well satisfied to hold Oldham to 8-8 at half-time.

Midway through the second half they were still there at 14-14... then Oldham cut loose with three quick tries to pick up their opening win in the First Division after defeats by Halifax and Bradford Northern.

As the hooter signalled Oldham's first win under the captaincy of Aussie star Bob Lindner, travelling supporters showed their appreciation and then roared their approval a second time when Lindner led his men over to greet them from the side of the pitch.

The Aussie made a useful debut as the Oldham pack got well on top in the second half and earned one of the biggest cheers of the day when he took his team to applaud the support on the oppular side.

This was heady stuff for the fans after two seasons of Second Division mediocrity and it compensated for the bitter disappointment of an undeserved defeat by Bradford.

The pack laid down the foundation, the halfbacks provided the link and the threequarters applied the finishing touches with centre Darren Abram scoring stylishly early on and Shaun Irwin adding two more tries in the second half.

Rovers had plenty of determination and spirit, if not much class. They never once held the lead, but they twice came from behind to level and it wasn't until Crompton crowned a splendid individual performance with the third Oldham try in the 58th minute that the home challenge faded.

Out of five tries scored by Oldham, Crompton touched down once and helped to fashion three more.

He linked beautifully with Mike Kuiti to send Abram sidestepping past Mike Fletcher and Wayne Parker on an inside dash to the posts in the eighth minute.

Early in the second half Crompton teased the Rovers defence on a crossfield run before putting Irwin into a gap for the centre to finish well from 30 yards out.

The Oldham scrum-half scored himself when Bright Sodje failed to smother his grubber kick close to the line.

Then, as Rovers finally capitulated, he again combined with Kuiti to set up position from which the ever-alert Paul Groves nipped in from dummy half.

Oldham won a scrum against the head just outside the Rovers quarter and Crompton sold the dummy, went clear and almost succeeded in giving Kuiti a well-deserved first try for the club.

The Rovers defence was unable to gather in time to stop Groves scoring under the sticks and Paul Topping's fourth goal put Oldham firmly in control at 24-14 with 20 minutes left. For good measure, Irwin made absolutely sure by crashing over from dummy half after Mike Bibby had fumbled a Crompton up-and-under. Competitive in everything he did, Irwin replied in the best possible manner after allowing David Liddiard to give him the slip to score the first Rovers try after half an hour.

Liddiard, hooker Richard Chamberlain and scrum-half Parker, the brains of the outfit, were the only Rovers players to give Oldham much trouble.

It was Parker's clever creative play which provided centre Rob Hutchinson with the second Rovers try early in the second half.

Oldham were opened up easily on that occasion and coach Peter Tunks will want to know why.

He need ask no questions, however, of Scott Ranson, who effectively bottled up the potentially dangerous Sodje, or of stand-off Topping, who played his opposite number, Dean Clarke, out of the game.

Wally Gibson was sound at full-back, displaying courage and skill under the high ball and always running out of defence effectively.

While Crompton played the lead role of the half-backs on attack, Topping helped out his forwards in midfield by pulling off 37 tackles – only three more than the industrious Kuiti and four more than Tiny Solomona.

Topping had every reason to feel satisfied with his performance in a position that was comparatively new to him.

He also kicked four goals from six shots in difficult conditions, the two he missed passing only inches wide despite acute angles and a



powerful wind.

The pack's performance was a team effort in every sense of the word, each of the seven forward used making valuable contributions.

Solomona was well marked early on, but by midway through the second half he had proved who was boss. Rovers were sick of the sight of him by then.

Substitute Craig Richards was equally punishing in the heavy-foraging department, while Lindner, Andy Goodway and Kuiti formed a skilful and penetrative back-row.

Lindner used the ball cleverly, did his tackling, took the ball up and was punishing in the first half as a wide runner – a role Goodway adopted successfully in the second half.

Oldham went in front early, suffered a bad spell, regained the initiative, but lost it again when Lindner was penalised for standing in the five-metre zone on the chort side at an Oldham play-the-ball.

This led directly to Liddiard's try and an equalising goal off the touchline by Mike Fletcher.

The visitors were unlucky when Irwin was stopped on the line, after an excellent spell of attacking rugby, and when Crompton's pass to Kuiti was judged forward as the Kiwi went clear

The half finished, however, with both Lindner and Goodway making handling errors deep inside the Rovers quarter, Oldham going in for the break with a first-half error rate of 40 percent.

This had to be improved considerably and it was slashed to 18 per cent during a second half in which Rovers scored only one try to Oldham's four and threatened seriously on only one more occasion.

BACK PAGES

The first League game between Oldham and Hull KR was on September 27th 1902 when Oldham travelled to Humberside and recorded a seven points to two victory, with Rovers first visit to Watersheddings the following January again ending up with an Oldham win 19-2.

Since those earliest encounters there has been many a fierce contest between the "Roughyeds" and the "Robins".

Strangely enough for five years between 1908-1913, the Watersheddings match was a festive fixture with Rovers coming to Oldham on Christmas Day, with Oldham's visit to Hull usually coming in the first month of the season.

Of all the encounters between the two sides there are three (or should I say five) which stand out above the rest.

The first was the 1925 Challenge Cup Final at Leeds when a Reg Farrar inspired Oldham team won 16-3, for local skipper Herman Hilton to lift the cup for the Roughyeds. Although Rovers took some

consolation by defeating Swinton in the Championship final the following week at Rochdale.

Then we have the legenreplayed dary twice Challenge Cup semi-final in 1964, when after two titanic struggles at Leeds and Swinton, Rovers ran out deserving winners in the second replay at Huddersfield to earn the right to meet Widnes at Wembley. The scores were 5-5, 14-14 and finally 12-2 to Hull K.R. However most supporters of both clubs will need no reminding that Oldham were actually winning the Swinton clash by 17-14 in extra time when the match was abandoned for bad light. Rovers lost in the final 13-5, but it was the epic semi-final that passed into Rugby League folk-lore.

The most recent "big match" between the two clubs was of course, the 1990 Second Division Premiership Final, when on a sweltering May afternoon at Old Trafford, Oldham staged one of the most dramatic R.L. comebacks of all time. Rovers had set off like a house on fire and five minutes into the second half they held a 29-6 lead, but Oldham gradually clawed their way back and a late try by substitute Tommy Martyn gave Oldham a historic victory by 30 points to 29.
