

ARE YOU HAPPY WITH THE TWO WINS OVER LEEDS AND ST.HELENS?

I have got to happy over successes, but that does not stop me from being critical of our style of play when we make life unnecessarily hard for ourselves. We have developed an annoying habit of conceding early points to the opposition at a time when we should be building the foundations of a performance by settling into the game, holding possession and giving nothing away. To keep a game at high peak performance is asking a lot but we are still trying to achieve perfection in this game. It is easier and more confidence building to step up gear by gear to reach a peak rather than leap into one then have to climb down. Against Leeds we let them in in the seventh minute. That stung us into some scintillating play and at the break we had control of the game. After half time Leeds, in a five minute spell, pulled back from 26-6 to 26-18 and groans could be heard that it was "Headingley again". I hope to believe that we had learned a lesson at Headingley and leaving aside the game at Bradford we have finished our games strongly.

Lack of composure, over eagerness, call it what you will but we threw away scoring chances and found ourselves in arrears by ten points with half time on the horizon. The six points we pulled back in the final minute of the half were invaluable and gave us the chance to re-assess what we were doing out there. Our second half performance was steadier but had we not given the home side that early encouragement, I am sure we could have been more impressive. All the best sides in the world are mean with the ball and are very good at defending in the opposition's half. We have improved this season but we can achieve more...that is the aim.

THE INJURY SITUATION IS IMPROVING.

We seem to have been losing players at the top of their form and it takes several matches at top level to reach that peak again. We have lost Paul Cullen but to see Bob Jackson, Phil Sumner and Gary Chambers back on the field of play at any level, with promise of others in the next couple of weeks, plus the ever increasing confidence of our youngsters gives me confidence that we can still improve.



Watching...Oldham

The job of rebuilding Oldham was handed to coach Peter Tunks in April 1991 and it has taken him just two seasons to achieve the first objective - a return to Division One of the Stones Bitter Championship.

Oldham began last season in confident fashion, their opening sequence of six successive victories featuring four Second Division Championship wins and the defeats of First Division sides Warrington (H) 33-20 and Leigh (A) 26-14 in the Lancashire Cup. The Roughyeds lost at Wigan in the semi-final (8-48) and were defeated by 22pts-40 at home by Castleford in the Regal Trophy first round. By the time the Challenge Cup came around Oldham were challenging with Featherstone for promotion. Victories in the Challenge Cup over London (H) 34-6 and Huddersfield (H) 20-17 led to a home quarter-final against Bradford, which they lost heavily (4-42). Left to concentrate on their main aim, Oldham easily clinched promotion in second place behind Featherstone with the following record:- played 28, won 20, drawn 1, lost 7, for 753, against 503, points 41. A surprise home draw against Dewsbury (14-14) in the Divisional Premiership was compounded when the replay was lost 18pts - 20 to end the season on a disappointing note.

1988-89

rebuilding job was necessary in preparation for the top flight and he proved himself to be the ace wheeler dealer, securing the signatures of, amongst others, Steve Kerry, Tiny Solomona, Paul Groves, Mike Kuiti, Andy Goodway, Craig Richards and Martin Crompton. His most impressive capture was undoubtedly Aussie test star Bob Lindner who Tunks immediately installed as captain. Great enthusiasm on the terraces was partially dispelled by opening Championship defeats against Halifax (A) 12-26 and Bradford (H) 20-24 prior to a fine 28pts- 14 win at Hull KR. Oldham lost to Wire at Watersheddings (12-18) following a second half recovery from the visitors. A disappointing home defeat by Sheffield (15-22) was followed by an unlucky (12-14 reverse at Widnes, leaving Oldham desperate for a win. Leeds were the sacrificial lambs and provided a first time victory by 21pts-6. An impressive 35pts-8 hammering of Hull at the Boulevard gave great cause for optimism. A narrow 21-22 loss at Wakefield signalled another fruitless run, encompassing defeats against Featherstone (A) 24-30, St. Helens (H) 2-12 and Wigan (H) 12-38. Oldham won at Highfield in round two of the Regal Trophy (26-8) but lost at home to Wigan in the snow in

Peter Tunks knew that a further

round three by 8pts-16. A victory over Leigh at home in the Championship (42-6) briefly relieved the pressure at Watersheddings but since then, Oldham have lost league fixtures against Halifax (H) 11-28, Salford (H) 8-20, Bradford (A) 16-48, Castleford (A) 16-34 and Hull KR (H) 16-17.

The obvious target for Oldham in the second half of the season is to ensure First Division survival but with the talent available to him coach Peter Tunks will no doubt see a Premiership place as a realistic and attainable measure of improvement.


FLOOD TIDE - TWENTY POINTS IN TEN MINUTES

Also in the category of those tries that didn't count, was the thrilling try he scored in the Championship Final of 1954 against Halifax, when an astute diagonal kick by left winger Stan McCormick gave Bev the opportunity to streak away, gather the ball from a lovely bounce and scorch past the bemused Halifax defence to plant the ball under the sticks. The referee, who had his back to Bevan when the ball was kicked. ruled him offside, in the belief that no one could have covered the ground so quickly.

Dozens and dozens of similar hairline decisions throughout his career must have denied Brian scores of tries, but sometimes the decisions were in his favour, like the decisive try he was credited with in the Lancashire Cup Final of 1959 that won the trophy against St. Helens. Brian and his great rival Tom Van Vollenhoven, the South African flyer, both chased a rolling ball over the Saints' try line close to the touchline and corner flag. Vollenhoven stretched his leg to try and kick the ball dead as Bev, in a desperate outstretched dive, was adjudged to have made contact with his finger tips, and the try was awarded. Some you win and some, you lose.

Oldham players and supporters too, had numerous times to curse and yet applaud the man they loved to hate. During his career at Wilderspool, he scored 40 tries

against the Roughyeds, and none more dramatic. than the one he got at Watersheddings in the 2nd Round of the R.L. Challenge Cup in 1954. Oldham, at the time had a great side with the talents of Bernard Ganley, Terry O'Grady, John Etty, Frank Pitchford, Alan Davies, Frank Stirrup, Ken Jackson, Syd Little, Charlie Winslade etc. On a mudheap of a pitch, after heavy snow, Oldham were leading 4pts-2pts. well into the second half of the game, from a scrum on the Warrington twenty five yard line, Pitchford got his backs moving and the ball quickly reached Roland Barrow, the Oldham left centre, who, with the try line in sight flung out a lovely pass

to Terry O'Grady his winger. Then, before anyone, the players, the ref or any of the watching thousands realised what had happened, that great opportunist Bevan, had flashed between the attacking Roughyeds to intercept the ball and race upfield. Bernard Ganley, the Oldham full back, was a lone figure as Bev bore down on him, and although the condition of the pitch was deplorable, the majestic Bev with a swerve and supercharged acceleration left the hapless Ganley in his wake, to go on and score under the posts.

Harry Bath duly obliged with the conversion to give Warrington a 7pts-4pts victory, and another step on the road to Wembley which they eventually reached.

To the cynics that flash of brilliance could have been so costly to his side. They would argue that if he missed the ball, it would have been a certain try for Oldham, but he didn't miss it, and even after he had clutched that wet and slippery ball he still had to keep his feet on a skid pan of a surface to run 80 yards and beat Ganley into the bargain.

The try too, that he scored at Workington in another Challenge Cup tie will linger long in the memory of those who saw it. Bevan had broken through from his own 25 yard line, and with the Workington defence coming across to cover, he set off along the touchline with only inches to spare past attempted tackles, and with the Warrington Trainer Freddie Worrall running alongside, excitedly urging him on to yet another match clinching try.

There was a game at Wilderspool

against Hull K.R. and Brian Bevan scored three tries, all from interceptions. It was almost as if he hypnotised the opposition into doing exactly what he wished. To categorise some of his tries serves only to scratch the surface, the man was so gifted, determined and greedy, but one try he scored at Wilderspool against Rochdale Hornets in 1954, exemplified the sheer guts and courage of this superb performer.

He had scored one try which had been converted, but Rochdale had fought back to be leading 7pts-5pts. Brian had been off the field injured early in the second half, but with his side depleted and defeat being possible, he came back on. He had hurt his leg and was only able to hobble, but with time running out, the crowds shouts of "Give it to Bev" seemed to be wistful thinking. Bev had other ideas though and in one last attack the ball reached him about 30 yards out from the Rochdale line. With his head thrown back, and his teethless gums clenched fast, he set off along the touchline, virtually running on one leg and a swinger, to dive over in the corner. It was only against lowly Rochdale, but to Bev. it was a try to win the game and winning money for him and his team mates. Sometimes, when games seemed to be slipping away from the primrose and blues, and all the efforts of his side had been of no avail, it was only natural for them and their fans to think that their only chance of winning was to give Bev a half chance. Frustration could often defeat the objective, but more often than not, an optimistic kick would result in him pulling one out of the bag, or else a half chance would put him in the clear and another match winning try went up on the scoreboard.



MEMORABLE MATCH FROM THE 80's

1985/86 Premiership Trophy Semi Final

Wigan 12 Warrington 23

A first round victory over Widnes set up this mouth watering Semi-Final against the Championship Runners Up. Paul converted Mark Roberts early try and added a drop goal to give Wire a slender 7-6 lead at the break. n the second half Paul completely dominated affairs, scoring a try and taking his final goal tally to eight (3 goals, 5 drop goals). Wigan had no answer to the constant probing and scoring of Paul Bishop, as he gradually 'dropped' Wigan out of the competition. Wire went on to lift the Trophy at Elland Road following a 38 pts-10 victory over Champions

Paul arrived at Wilderspool via Thatto Heath ARLFC and after a brief apprenticeship in Warrington's 'A' team, made a dream debut at Wilderspool on 21.10.84, scoring a try and seven goals to earn the man of the match award. Paul was only 17 but he quickly learned the hard way that Rugby League is the toughest of sports. In only his second game for the club, against Oldham, he swallowed his tongue following a robust tackle. Fortunately swift reactions from all present prevented a tragedy. Paul soon recovered and made an excellent contribution to the

1985/86 season, culminating in a Premiership winners medal following the 38 pts-10 victory over Halifax at Elland Road. Paul contributed a try and five goals. He earned the Wire young player of the season award and after a short close season spell in Australia, returned the following term for his finest season at the club. He linked superbly with Andy Gregory and when Andy left, took on increased responsibility. He missed the John Player Final due to suspension following his harsh sending off in the Semi-Final victory over Widnes, but played at scrum half in Warrington's 0-8 Premiership Trophy defeat against Wigan at Old Trafford. Great Britain Under 21 honours were almost inevitable, and Paul gained two caps against France. He then decided to try his luck in Australia but enjoyed little success, and returned to the club in 1988/9. He struggled to recapture his form that season and the following term was squeezed out by Aussie import Greg Mackey. When Greg moved to Hull, Paul stepped back in to the scrum half berth and finally regained his confidence and a place in the Challenge Cup Final. He kicked two goals in Warrington's disappointing 14-36 defeat but was forced to leave the field of play through injury. The arrival of Kevin Ellis at Wilderspool in season 1990/91 eventually led to Paul's departure from the club. He played his last game for Wire in the league at Oldham on 20th October 1990 and then moved on a free transfer to St. Helens, the club where his father. Tommy had made his name in the game.


