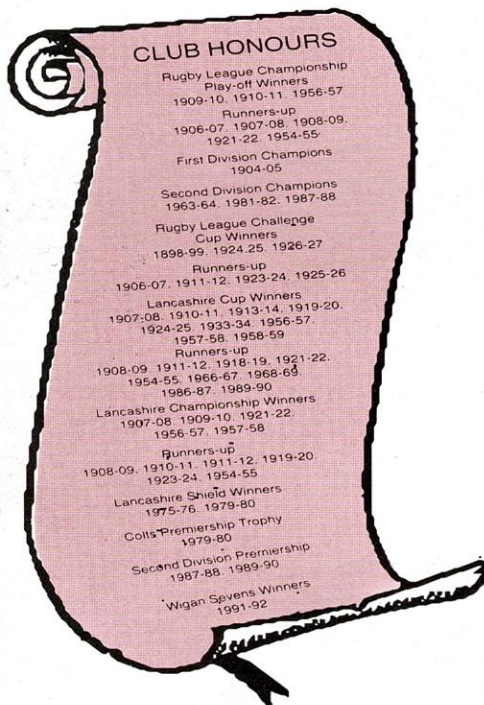

At senior level, Bob Lindner is a world-class player and I am confident that before

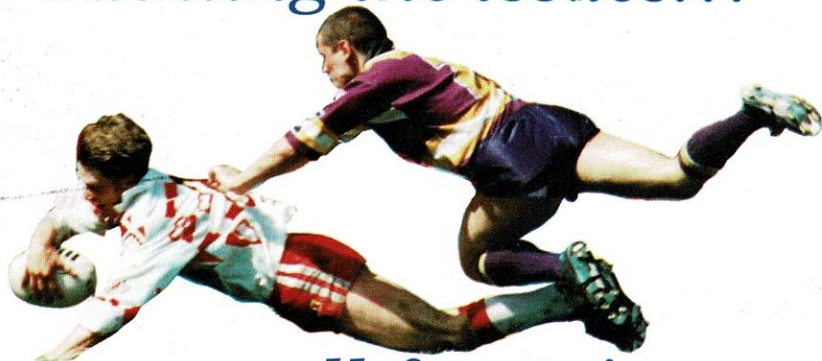
the season is out he will prove that he has all the makings of a first-class coach.

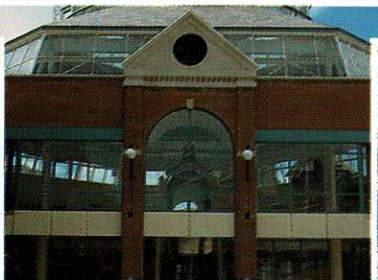

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A Watersheddings Welcome to ... Wakefield T.

Matthew Fuller. 23, ex-South Sydney, is signed to play for Winfield Cup newcomers Perth Western Reds when they enter the competition in 1995. Recommended to Trinity by Reds coach Peter Mulholland, Matthew captained Australia schoolboys as a stand-off, and led Canterbury Bankstown's junior side to the President's Cup in 1991.

Dave Woods. 27, 6ft 2in, 17 stone prop or second row from the Canberra Raiders and like Matthew Fuller is signed to play for Perth Western Reds in 1995. Like Darren Fritz before him, comes highly recommended by Raiders coach Tim Sheens, and is a strong-running forward very much in the Fritz mould who has been somewhat unfortunate to be unable to secure a regular spot in the Raider's star-studded pack despite being the reserve grade's top forward try scorer and captain.

Gary Christie. 20, 5ft 11ins U/21 International secured in exchange for Gary Price from Oldham, only took up the game aged 18 with amateur club Widnes Tigers yet within 18 months had achieved representative honours. Seen by many as one of the game's brightest young prospects, Trinity snapped him up in the face of intense competition from several other top clubs.

Mark Sheals. 27, 5ft 11ins, 16 Stone 4lb prop, a terrific crowd favourite at the Watersheddings, where he was voted supporters' player of the year last season, as well as being voted top prop in Division Two. His departure, in exchange for Trinity winger David Jones provoked such an outcry amongst the Oldham faithful that a petition was instigated by fans incensed at the move. Renowned as a hard-working pro's pro, whose workrate and consistency earned him selection for Lancashire. Desperately unlucky to break his leg in a pre-season friendly, during an impressive debut.

Lee Hanlon. Ex-Yorkshire County under 19 star, turned pro with Hull from Middletown amateurs, failed to break through on Humber side, in the face of intense competition from overseas stars like Mackey, Entat and Gale, being snapped up by Trinity during the close season. A tricky half-back and prolific goal-kicker, who will be hoping to make his mark in the big League this season.

Mark Webster. A local lad, "Webbo" began his career at St. Helens, being a highly sought after junior, before Trinity snapped him up on a free transfer. A powerhouse prop, he is a tremendous impact player and enjoyed the best form of his career at the beginning of last season, before a virus laid him low in the winter. At anything like his best, has the firepower to trouble any defence.

John Glancy. A man of very few words who does all his talking on the field, John is a no-nonsense grafting forward who would do the business in any team. Very much a players player, this ex-Sheffield Eagle is always near the top of the list for tackles and yardage, and is equally at home at prop or second-row.

Jason Timmins. A much-underrated utility player, Jason was signed along with Richard Slater from Normanton amateurs. Yet to find a permanent place in the first team, Jason has been one of the Alliance side's most consistent performers over the last couple of seasons, and has never looked out of place in the top flight. A valuable squad member who definitely has what it takes to seize his chance when it finally comes along.

Kieran Allen. Another exciting local prospect, Kieran is a real flyer of a half-back who has the pace and wits of a natural finisher. Though still young enough for Academy football, where he has already caught the eye of the Great Britain selectors, he has not looked out of place in his appearances in first-grade football, and will be one to watch for in the next couple of seasons.

Andy Wilson. Ex-Queens amateur and Sheffield Eagles, Andy missed a good deal of last season through injury, but he is still capable of filling the wing berth to great effect. A natural try scorer, deceptively strong and elusive with the ball in his hand, he also is a solid defender and Trinity fans will be hoping to see some more of his tricky runs this season.

Nigel Bell. A cult hero in Wakefield. Signed from local club Eastmoor, he made his debut alongside Wally Lewis at scrum half, but he spends most of his time these days in the pack, being equally at home at prop, hooker or in the back row. A ferocious tackler, and extremely mobile, he never has a bad game, according to coach Dave Topliss, and many at Belle Vue feel that his talents should have long since been recognised with representative honours. Currently in his benefit year.

Andy Mason. Ex-Leeds, Bramley and Roundhay R.U., Andy has been top try scorer for the last two seasons, as well as having as sound a defensive game as any in the League. Has represented Yorkshire on several occasions, and has the happy knack of popping up to finish off any breaks made by team mates. A financial consultant by profession, he has seemed to improve with age and last season was probably his most productive yet.

Richard Goddard. A product of the local Stanley Rangers club that also produced Nigel Wright, Richard has tremendous potential. Represented Great Britain at Academy level last

year, and is still young enough to play Academy, even though this will be his third year in the top flight. A strong-running full-back, wing or centre, he is devastating when picking up the ball from broken play and can time a pass beautifully like all good centres. Many around Belle Vue feel that Richard has what it takes to play at the highest level, and will be hoping that he starts to really fulfil his potential this season.

Richard Slater. Small of stature but big of heart, Richard has modelled his game on that of Trinity's legendary Aussie, Ray Price, who taught him that a lack of inches definitely doesn't prevent someone making a huge impact on the field. Indeed, so young was he when he first broke into the team, that it is incredible to think that he is still in his early twenties. Noted for his tigerish defence and impeccable tackling technique, he is, however, deceptively quick in attack, and capable of unlocking the tightest defence with a deft body swerve.

John Thompson. Another local hero, J.T. "likes it hard." Signed from Eastmoor amateurs, was actually a member of Trinity's squad the last time they reached Wembley as far back as 1979, but he only really began to fulfil his potential when the club came back into the top flight five years ago. A no-nonsense, grafting forward who never gives less than 100%, he is equally effective at hooker or prop, and is one of the game's real unsung heroes.

James Mosely. Signed in the face of intense competition from all the top clubs, this ex-Moldgreen amateur enjoyed international selection at U/17 and U/19 levels before coming to Trinity. A skilful elusive threequarter, he made quite an impact on breaking into the side last season, with a sensational 90 yard effort at the Boulevard. Tipped by many at Belle Vue to pick up where Nigel Wright left off, he is another fine prospect.

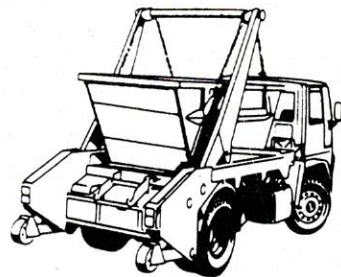
Gary Spencer. Wakefield born and bred, Gary began his career at Belle Vue before joining Leeds, where he was too often passed over in favour of high-profile signings like Ettinghausen and Gallagher, despite excellent form. Rejoined Trinity four years ago and has been first-choice full-back ever since. Solid as a rock in defence, and inventive in attack, he is also capable of moving into the forwards to great effect when the situation demands it.

Adrian Flynn. Another outstanding local prospect, Adrian is a strong running second row, who has already represented Great Britain at Academy level. Spent most of last season in the Alliance side, but his consistent eye catching form and regular try scoring earned him a place in first grade towards the end of the season. With the departure of Gary Price and Michael Jackson, this season is his big chance to claim a regular first team place.

Billy Conway. A product of the Charlston U/17 side that produced Gary Spencer, Billy has been a Belle Vue mainstay since the mid eighties. A former English Schools Boxing champion, he is quick thinking and tenacious, capable of opening up the tightest defence around the rucks. In defence, he is a constant thorn in the side and always seems to pop up at just the right moment to harass the opposition.

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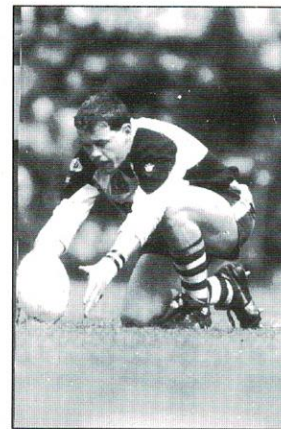
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Roughy 'eds Recalled

Gary joined Oldham during the 1988-89 season, after having 10 successful years with Castleford. Whilst with the Wheldon road outfit, he had gained Great Britain under 24 honours in the early 1980's and also represented Yorkshire County.

Gary's position was centre and he was a regular member of the first team when they won promotion from the 2nd division in the 1989-90 season.

Although not renowned

Signed from the Bewsey Imps junior club in Warrington in December 1947, Arthur Tomlinson was a tough uncompromising prop or second row forward.

He made his debut on January 31st 1948 in the game against Wakefield Trinity and became a regular member of the Oldham pack for the next 8 years.

Arthur's career with the "Roughyeds" endured until the Championship

winning 1956-57 season in which he made 7 first team appearances.

In total he played in 174 first class matches for Oldham scoring 12 tries.

he later emigrated to New Zealand and actually coached the Kiwis against the 1962 great Britain touring team.

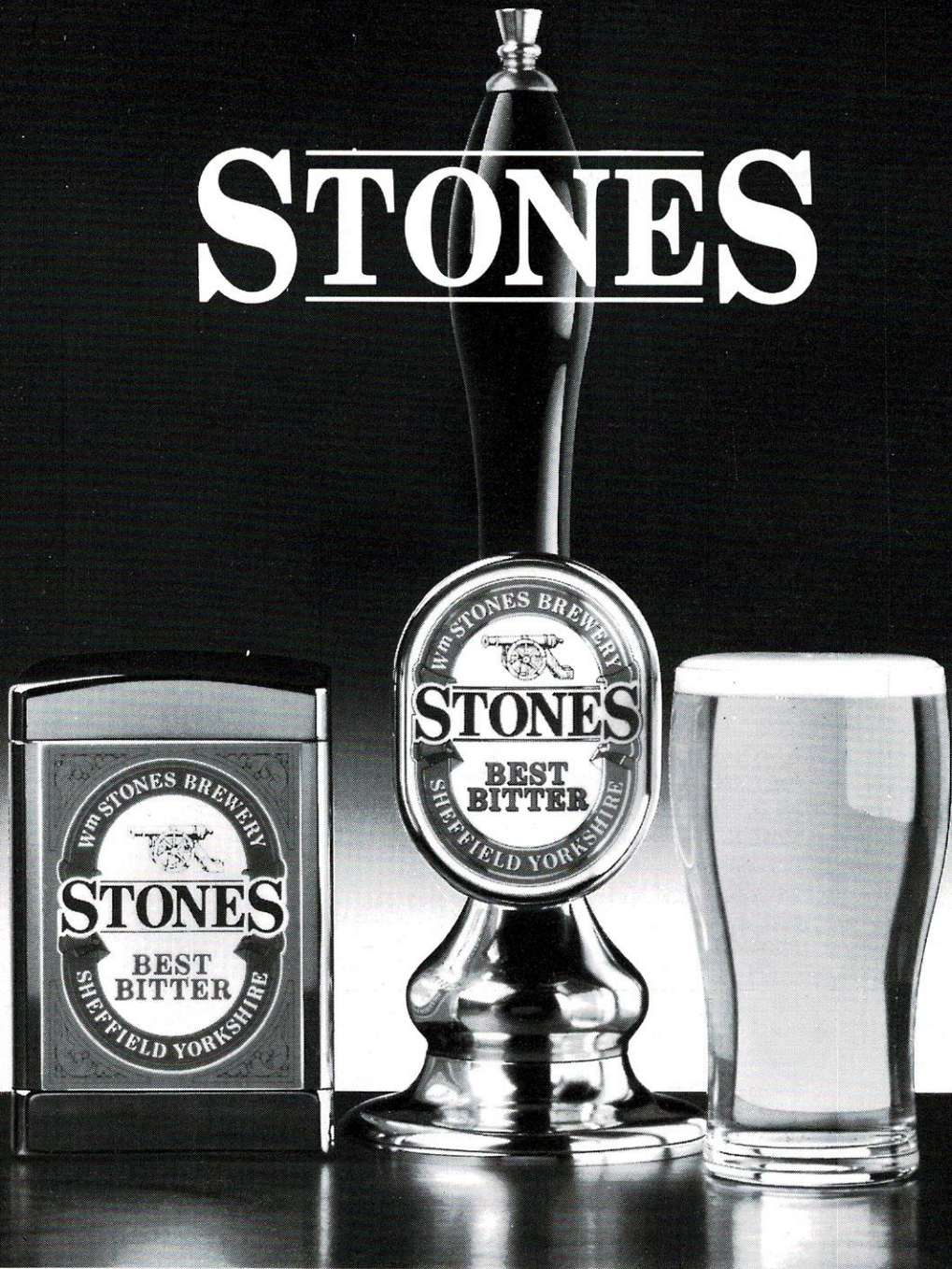

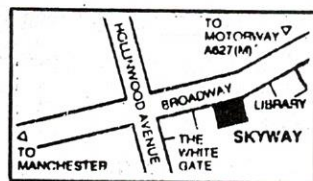
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Ex-players Reunion Dinner

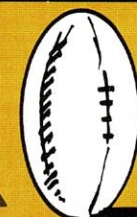

France v Great Britain

Jonathan Davies is poised to become only the fifth player to total 50 or more goals for Great Britain in Test and World Cup matches.

The Warrington back has kicked 48 goals including two drop goals, from 12 appearances, including one as substitute.

Neil Fox (Wakefield T.) is the top goalkicker of all time for Britain with 93 in 29 matches between 1959-1969. He is followed by Lewis Jones (Leeds) 66, Jim Sullivan (Wigan) 64, Eric Fraser (Warrington) 53 and Davies 48.

Davies's total includes a record-equaling 10 for Britain in the 72-6 defeat of France at Headingley last April.

He has also scored three tries for a total of 106 points, putting him in seventh place behind leader Fox with 228.

Garry Schofield will be making his 44th appearance for Great Britain, leaving the Leeds half-back only two behind Mick Sullivan's record 46 appearances between 1954-1963.

Sullivan also leads the Great Britain try chart on 41 with Schofield's 31 putting him in second place.

Britain have won their last six matches against France. Their last defeat against them was 18-25 at Headingley on 7 April 1990.

They last lost in France when they went down 24-16 at Perpignan on 17 March 1985. They drew the next match 10-10 at Avignon on 16 February 1986.

Britain's highest score and widest margin win in France was 48-6 at Carcassonne a year ago.

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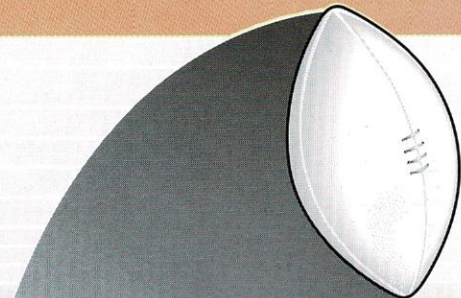
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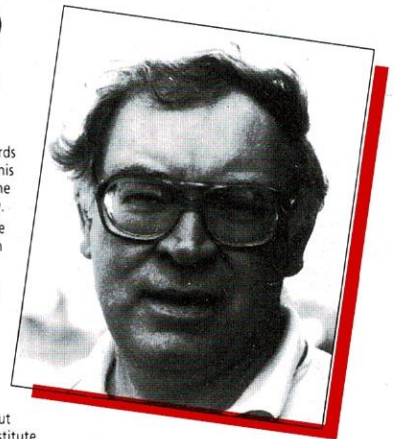
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Last Time Out . . .

with **ROGER HALSTEAD**

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the *Oldham Evening Chronicle* of November 1st, 1993.



The story of Oldham's narrow defeat by a poor Wakefield Trinity side at Belle Vue yesterday can best be told by facts and figures.

Many people in Rugby League will be surprised if Trinity escape relegation this season, yet they scored five tries to demolish a flimsy Oldham defence.

In so doing, they became the first team since Halifax on the opening day of the season to cross Oldham's line five times and they achieved, in 80 minutes, what Widnes, Leeds and Hull failed to achieve collectively in 240 minutes of football over the previous three games.

So what went wrong for Oldham? Were Wakefield's five tries by Mason, Goddard, Forshaw, Spencer and Hanlon the result of an outstanding team performance, or were Oldham still basking in the glory of that great win at Hull last time out?

One has to conclude that Wakefield scraped and clawed their way to their first home win of the season against an Oldham side that produced a disappointing display after impressive shows against Leeds and Hull.

Both teams made dozens of handling errors, referee Niel Wood of Keighley chipped in with one or two controversial decisions and the ease with which Trinity split Oldham's weak defence added up to a game that was full of incident and excitement if very little class and defensive commitment.

On my scorecard, Wakefield won a points decision if only because they scored five tries to Oldham's three and were 4-1 up on the try-count until the last quarter of an hour.

Richard Goddard's failure to land more than one goal from numerous attempts kept Oldham in the game rather more than the visitors efforts to keep Wakefield at bay or produce try-scoring rugby of their own.

Of the three tries Oldham scored, two were solo efforts by Bob Lindner and Paul Topping and only the third, by Scott Ranson near the end, was beautifully executed by teamwork, Lindner and Shaun Irwin doing the damage out wide on the right.

Had Topping been able to tack on the extra points from the touchline, Oldham would probably have snatched it, but whether they could have gained real and lasting satisfaction from their performance is another matter completely.

They did not have the rub of the green. No doubt about that. Of all the penalties dished out to each side for holding-down after the tackle, only Lindner was sin-binned.

There was no such temporary dismissal for Wakefield full-back Gary Spencer just after half-time when he was penalised for obstruction as Wally Gibson chased his own kick to the Wakefield line.

A lucky rebound paved the way for Wakefield's fourth try by Spencer, but it was the fifth by Hanlon which caused Oldham to feel a little hard done by.

The Trinity scrum-half, tackled a few yards short of the Oldham line, seemed to regain his feet in one movement and race away to the line as Oldham appealed in vain for a penalty.

The referee must have ruled that the tackle was incomplete or, probably, that Hanlon quickly played the ball himself.

Either way, I would like to see the video recording of the incident to be completely satisfied of the validity of the try.

The biggest blow to Oldham was the early departure of Ian Sherratt with an ankle injury.

Sherratt and Tiny Solomona, the props, have been a tower of strength all season, but on this occasion the Kiwi was merely a substitute after playing for New Zealand on Saturday and Sherratt contributed only 17 minutes of solid endeavour before he was injured.

Trinity had done their homework. Not that it needed much doing with Paul Round in their side. They knew Sherratt had been in splendid form and it was clear from the start they knew they had to hold him.

Honours were about even when Sherratt limped off, to be replaced by a man who had given his all for his country the previous day.

Solomona this time was not the Solomona who has been a model of consistency for Oldham over the past 18 months. He had tackled himself to a standstill in the Test and he will be the first to agree his club performance suffered badly as a result.

With Sherratt helpless in the dug-out, Solomona struggling after his exertions the previous day, Paul Groves finding it hard to make an impact after a spell in the Alliance side and No 10 Mark Meadows substituted early on by Ian Green, Oldham were up against it in the front row.

The first three forwards down made a major impact in the narrow defeat at Widnes and the wins over Leeds and Hull, but on this occasion the front-row honours belonged to Wakefield.

Trinity props Steve Durham and Ian Marlow took a lot of holding in the first half when the pattern was set. For good measure, hooker Nigel Bell took Trinity's Man of the Match Award.

Trinity were already 10-1 up when Sherratt went off, but that should not conceal the fact that Oldham were weakest in this match where they have been strongest in previous games - in the front-row.

That was the biggest single difference between this Oldham performance and better ones over the last few weeks.

Round emerged with a lot of credit for his work in the Wakefield second row, but collectively Oldham had the edge in the back row of the forwards thanks to the strong running of Mike Kuti and Andy Goodway up the middle and Lindner out wide.

Gary Christie and Andy Wilson, on the Wakefield wings, had nightmare games, but Andy Mason - a player who never fails to impress me - was the best and busiest centre on view until Irwin came strongly into contention late on when, courtesy of Lindner, he was able to supply Ranson with an excellent service.

Simon Longstaff kicked well for the home side, but Wakefield had little to offer save for the strength of Durham, Marlow and Round in the forwards, the class of Mason out wide and a dogged determination to conquer.

Mason scored the first Trinity try and set up two more for Forshaw and Spencer, but Oldham were not sharp enough on defence around the play-the-ball and too many Trinity attacks were allowed to develop when they should have killed at source.

Wakefield's second try, was a typical example. There seemed to be no danger when Bell moved away from Groves deep inside the Trinity half, but Durham put centre Goddard through a gap and he raced up field, turned inside a wrong-footed Gibson and pulled out of Ranson's tackle to give his side a 10-1 lead.

Oldham clawed their way back to lead 11-10 with a Lindner try and three goals by Topping and at that stage they seemed capable of going on to win the match.

The balance of power swung back into Wakefield's favour when Solomona was penalised for not playing the ball properly. Tries by Forshaw and Spencer quickly followed and Oldham were never to lead again although they twice got to within one point of Wakefield with late tries by Topping and Ranson.

The Wakefield defence closed down by Kerry, never allowing him the room to shine as he did against Widnes, Leeds and Hull.

They had their homework and it paid off for them, but Oldham will be kicking themselves at having missed the opportunity to move into the top eight.

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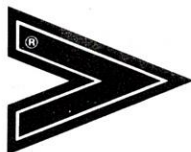

First next week's home game against

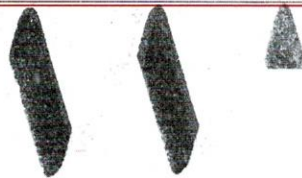

The first meeting between the 2 teams in the old Northern Union took place at Watersheddings on 7th October 1895, when Oldham recorded a victory by 17 points to nil. However there would be no "double" for Oldham as Trinity won the return match 16-5 the following April.

There has always been a healthy degree of transfer activity between the two clubs going right back to the 1920's when Oldham's Welsh wingman Ned Thomas (ex Llanelli) crossed the penines to join Trinity in February 1924. Then in the 1940's, Billy Stott also went to Wakefield, where he would become the first winner of the Lance Todd Trophy in the 1946 Challenge Cup Final victory over Wigan.

Probably better remembered are the trio of players from the successful 1950's side who helped Wakefield become the Cup specialists of the early 1960's namely, Derek Turner, Don Vines and John ETTY.

All 3 gaining the Challenge Cup winners medal that had eluded them at Oldham. Turner in particular proving to be an inspirational captain lifting the Cup for Trinity in 1960-62-63 with final victories over Hull, Huddersfield and Wigan.

In more recent times, Paul Round, Paul Lord, Gary Christie and Mark Sheals have also crossed form Oldham to Wakefield, with Alan McCurrie and current winger David Jones going in the other direction. The present

Wakefield coach David Topliss and ex prop forward Mick Morgan also played for both teams.

On 2 occasions Oldham have defeated Wakefield in the Challenge Cup semi-final in 1912 and 1927.

I am currently researching for a book covering the complete playing records and history of OLDHAM RLFC.
