



A Watersheddings Welcome to . . .

FEATHERSTONE R.

Coach **Steve Martin** has assembled a strong squad of players at Post Office Road as his side seek to consolidate their position in the top flight.

One absentee from their line up however is homespun full-back Chris Bibb who is at present staying away from Post Office Road. His place has recently been filled by half-back Martin Pearson the sides goalkicker, who joined the club five years ago from Travellers A.R.L. Club. He has already represented the G.B. Under-21 side. Wingers Ikram Butt and Owen Simpson have the pace and power to worry the best of defences and them, between registered 51 tries for Rovers last season. The former was signed from Leeds in the 1990 close season, whilst the latter came from Keighley three years ago.

Another former Lawkholme Lane player **Terry Manning** has held down a regular centre spot since joining Featherstone over four years ago and he registered ten tries out of his 37 appearances last season.

His partner in the three quarters will be former G.B. Test player *Carl Gibson* who toured Down Under in 1988 and 1990.

The ex-Batley and Leeds centre has played on 11 occasions for G.B., the last of them being against France in 1991.

With Pearson taking the full-back position, the half-back combination of **Francis Maloney** and **Brett Daunt** is that which helped Rovers beat Workington Town in the Divisional Premiership Final at Old Trafford in May, when Maloney scored a try in his sides 20-16 victory.

Maloney began his career Leeds but was transferred to Rovers twelve months ago. Aussie scrum-half Daunt is now in his second season at Post Office Road after notching tries from 29 appearances during the 1992-93 campaign.

Former Warrington and Leeds prop **Steve Molloy** will probably be wearing the number eight jersey. He has represented G.B. at both senior and Under-21 level, as well as having made an appearance for

England. The other prop is likely to be ex-Oldham forward **Leo Casey** who was a club record signing in the 1990 close season. At first he was dogged by injuries but now seems to be enjoying his rugby again. Hooker **Richard Gunn** is another former Headingley favourite who joined Featherstone in September 1992, taking over **Trevor Clark's** role.

Second row forward **Neil Roebuck** was with
Bradford Northern before
moving to Castleford in
December 1989.

However, he made the short move to Featherstone in January 1993 and was a substitute in Rovers Divisional Premiership Final victory at Old Trafford. He has represented G.B. Under-21's.

Gary H. Price joined Rovers this season from Wakefield Trinity and he has played for G.B. at both senior and Under 21 level, whereas his namesake Gary S. Price has been at Post Office Road for over four years since his move from Leeds.

Roughy 'eds Recalled



No. 24 SYD RIX

Also a try scorer in the 1927 Cup Final victory over Swinton, he topped the tries in a season list for Oldham on two occasions in 1922-23 and 1929-30.

By the time Syd played his last match for Oldham on 26th March, 1932, again against Rochdale, he had made 330 first class appearances for the "Roughyeds", scoring 155 tries and four goals. Awarded the club captaincy in the late 1920's, there can be no doubt that SYD RIX was one of the finest three-quarters ever to play for Oldham R.L.F.C.

Originally from Irlam O'th Heights, in Manchester, Syd joined Oldham just after the First World War and made his first team debut at Rochdale on 22nd March, 1919.

Best remembered as a winger, he also was very effective in the centre position and turned in a storming performance in the 1925 Cup Final, when playing centre to Joe Corsi.

Syd became a great favourite Watersheddings fans, as the team became the Cup specialists of the mid 1920's and was one of four Oldham players selected for the 1924 Tour to Australia and New Zealand. He played in all six tests on the tour, scoring a try in the first against Australia in Sydney and another in the second against New Zealand in Wellington.

No. 25 GEOFF ROBINSON

A member of the formidable Whitehaven "pack" in the late 1950's, Geoff signed for Oldham on 12th August, 1959, making his debut three days later in the 27-12 victory over Leeds at Watersheddings.

A second row or loose forward, Geoff played for Oldham for six years before he was transferred to Warrington.

During his spell at Watersheddings, he



notched up 174 senior appearances and scored 19 tries, of which the most famous, by far, was his touchdown in extra time, in the first replay of the 1964 Challenge Cup semi-final against Hull K.R. This try looked to have put Oldham on the path to Wembley, but unfortunately for Geoff and Oldham the match was abandoned soon after his try, because of failing light.







SILK CUT CHALLENGE CUP SEMI-FINAL, CENTRAL PARK, WIGAN LEEDS v. ST. HELENS, SATURDAY, 26th MARCH, 1994

Teenager Francis Cummins could be in line to become the youngest-ever player to appear in a Challenge Cup Final at Wembley, if Leeds beat St. Helens – by one day.

Cummins, who has played on the left wing in the three previous rounds, was born on 12th October, 1976. That would make him 7 years and 200 days on the day of the final, 30th April.

Shaun Edwards, born on 17th October, 1966, was one day older when he was at full-back in Wigan's defeat by Widnes at Wembley on 5th May, 1984. Edwards is now set to make a record-breaking ninth final appearance this year.

Cummins was still 16 when he made his first team debut as a substitute on 19th September this season, scoring two tries in the 42-6 home League defeat of Hull Kingston Rovers.

He made one other sub appearance before his full debut as a winger, scoring a try in the 27-18 home League defeat of Leigh on 21st November.

Cummins has now made 17 appearances, including two as substitute, and scored 11 tries plus a goal. Five of his full appearances have been at centre and 10 on the wing.

The birth dates of other 17-year-olds in Leeds possible Cup Squad are: Paul Cook (23rd July, 1976) and Marcus Vassilakopoulos (19th September, 1976). Eighteen-year-old regular Graham Holroyd was born on 25th October, 1975.

Leeds are aiming for their first Wembley Final since beating St. Helens 14-12 in 1978. Since then they have been beaten in four semi-finals, including last year against Widnes.

They have appeared in 14 Finals and won 10. Their record includes five wins in eight Wembley appearances.

St. Helens last semi-final was in 1991, when they went on to lose to Wigan in the Final.

They have appeared in 13 Finals and won five, their last victory being in 1976 against Widnes. All five wins were at Wembley, where they have lost six times.

SRL PREMIERSHIP FINAL

The Student Rugby League's regular season reaches a climax on Wednesday, 23rd March, at Tattersfield, Doncaster, when Cardiff Institute meet Leeds Metropolitan University in the SRL Premiership Final (kick-off 7.30 p.m.).

Cardiff will be defending the title they won last year, by beating Chester College 36-18 at Knowsley Road, St. Helens. Their success has continued unabated this season, as they have claimed the Inaugural SRL Division One South Championship and won through to the SRL Cup Final for a fourth consecutive year. Coached by the Rugby Football League's Welsh Development Officer, Mark Isherwood, and bolstered by the arrival of former dual Welsh International Rob Ackerman, they were also the first student side to appear in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup, when they lost in the first round at Milford by 18-8.

Leeds Metropolitan University last appeared in the Premiership Final in 1992, when they beat Loughborough at Wilderspool, Warrington. This season has seen them return to former glories by winning the Inaugural SRL Division One North title – making this Premiership Final a real battle of the champions. With BARLA Internationals Mick Hill and John Fairhurst in their back row, and Keighley Cougars Andy Hinchcliffe and Oldham's Hugh Gumbs in the backs, Leeds look more than capable of posing Cardiff a genuine test.

The delayed UKC SRL/UAU Cup Final between Cardiff I. and Salford U. will now take place at The Willows, Salford, on Wednesday, 4th May. Before that, the SRL will launch the first four-nation British Championship in South Wales from 10th-17th April, with matches to be played at the Morfa Stadium, Swansea, Neath R.F.C. and Aberavon R.F.C.

Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of November 8th, 1993.

FEATHERSTONE 30, OLDHAM 24

Oldham played their hearts out at Featherstone yesterday to compensate for the 25th minute dismissal of prop Barrie McDermott, but in the end the handicap proved too much

McDermott, playing his first senior game of the season, was penalised for a high tackle in the 20th minute and sent off five minutes later for a similar offence on Gary H. Price.

Price, the former Wakefield forward who almost joined Oldham at the start of the season was carried off on a stretcher and taken to hospital with concussion and a suspected law injury.

Oldham were 12-6 down at the time. They quickly conceded two more tries - one of them a gift - to trail 20-6 before starting a fightback which left Rovers clinging on desperately in the last few minutes.

From a point just before half-time when Wally Gibson scored in the corner and Paul Topping goaled off the touchline, Oldham scored 18 points to the home sides 10 despite playing with only 12 men.

The question on everyone's lips was: could Oldham have won had McDernott stayed on the field?

"I cost the lads the game," said McDermott afterwards, "but I must be the unluckiest player in Rugby League.

"I wasn't angry or growling. I was cool and composed and I thought I was playing well up to that point.

"I saw a Wakefield forward come strongly from behind Leo Casey and I went in to tackle him hard.

"I suppose I must have hurt him because he was carried off on a stretcher, but I didn't mean to tackle him illegally or anything like that. I just saw him coming and threw myself into the tackle."

Oldham coach Peter Tunks and chairman Jim Quinn preferred not to comment straight after the match and that was wise because it was practically impossible from their vantage point - and mine - to see exactly what went on at close quarters in the tackle that sent Price to hospital

Widnes referee David Campbell confirmed that McDermott was sent off for a high challenge.

And a fair and honest view from the Featherstone camp was provided by one of McDermott's rival props, man of the match Steve Molloy.

Nobody seemed to know what caused the damage - head, shoulder, forearm or elbow.

Said Molloy: "The referee had no option but to send Barrie off because he had spoken to him earlier and the rules of the game demand a clamp-down on head tackles these days.

"He had to go, but in my opinion ten minutes in the sin-bin to enable him to cool down might have been enough.

"He tends to lead with the elbow and if he isn't careful he is going to get a reputation for himself and then referees will really cane him.

"As far as I was concerned, his dismissal spoiled the game and it was a pity for him as well as for Oldham because he was probably their best forward up to that point.

"After saying all that, he did take Gary Price out of the game, so there will always be an argument that he had to go, too".

Oldham will want to study the video re-run of the incident before issuing any statements.

Molloy admitted that Rovers knew they were in danger of letting Oldham snatch a draw in the dying minutes.

"We were our own worst enemies," he added, "but all credit to Oldham. When we led 24-14 and turned the screw to force them into three drop-outs from under their sticks we thought that would kill them off.

"They soaked up 24 tackles on their own line with a man short and then hit us hard with two late tries. It was unbelievable."

In fact, Oldham were camped out on the Rovers line in a thrilling finish and it needed a strange penalty against Tiny Solomona to take off the pressure.

The Kiwi came off the bench to replace Craig Richards after 24 minutes and played a major role in the fightback despite his appearance for New Zealand the day before

He was stopped only a few yards from the Rovers line and straight in front of the posts as Oldham went all out for the equalising points, but the referee penalised him, claiming he was holding down a defender on top of him in pursuit of a penalty to Oldham.

Neither camp was happy, with the performance of referee Campbell, who did not give one of his better displays.

A blatant forward pass led directly to the first Featherstone try by Pearson.

Similarly, Featherstone felt several decisions kept Oldham in the game.



Oldham made a great start

when Andy Goodway scored by the posts in the seventh minute, from a Steve Kerry bomb, but the game threatened to run away from them in the next half hour.

Pearson, Butt, Simpson and Manning crossed for Rovers tries, McDermott was sent off and his fellow prop Richards was pulled off and substituted by Solomona in a disastrous opening for the new-look front-row.

The Manning try was a gift. Oldham winger David Jones failed to clear a kick by Daunt on his own line and Manning was left with the formality of touching down.

His confidence affected, Jones similarly slipped up in the dying seconds of the half, but the hooter came to the rescue.

Luckily for Oldham, Pearson was off form with his goalkicking, with the result that Oldham were only 20-14 down when Kerry, Irwin and Topping sent in Gibson and Topping added two goals.

Intense Rovers pressure produced further tries for the dangerous Butt and Pearson, but never-say-die Oldham responded with a Clarke try from dummy half, a Topping goal, and a brilliant individual effort by Irwin.

The former Castleford centre crashed through two tackles and sped off to the corner to score the try that cut the home lead to the contraction.

Molloy and Casey gave Rovers a crucial advantage in the front-row, as feared, while Daunt played well at scrum-half, Butt, on the wing, was almost unstoppable at times and Tuuta had an excellent game at loose-forward.

Rovers controlled the ball brilliantly, hardly making a mistake, but Oldham refused to lie down and were worth a draw, considering how close they came to it while a man short for nearly an hour.

Rovers joined the Rugby League for the 1921-22 season, registering a 17-3 victory in their firstever senior match at Bradford on 27th August, 1921.

Featherstone's first visit to Watersheddings was on 18th February, 1922. Oldham won the game 28-5 and went on to complete the double with a 3-0 victory at Post Office Road on 15th March, when Widnesborn winger Jim Finnerty touched down for the only score of the match.

After only a few years in the Senior League, Rovers fought their way through to the 1928 Championship Final, losing to Swinton 11-0 at Watersheddings, the only time the Championship decider was ever played in Oldham.

There have been many dour struggles between the "Roughyeds" and Featherstone over the years. A Second Round Challenge Cup tie in 1964 immediately springs to mind, when a late try by hooker Len McIntyre gave Oldham a 9-7 victory.

There can be no doubt that the most famous conversion and dramatic entre the bar and counter between the two clubs was the 1988 Watershedd Second Division Premiership Final at Old points to 26 Trafford, when Rovers favour.

staged one of the most courageous fight-backs in Rugby League history to recover from being 22-0 down to actually lead the game by 26 points to 22, with only a few minutes to go. However, Oldham produced one last big effort and Mike Ford. Des Foy and Gary Warnecke worked a fine move to send Kevin Meadows scrambling under the posts. Charlie nervous conversion scraped over the bar and the trophy was on its way to Watersheddings, final score being 28 points to 26 in Oldham's favour.
