They are stories of people who love Oldham Rugby League and who obviously take pleasure and satisfaction from doing their bit to help the club, at a time of great financial hardship.

There was the elderly gentleman who came to attend our home game against Wakefield. He came into the Souvenir Shop before the game, asked to see me and told me that he was not able to drive any more for health reasons and the club could have his car, if it would be of any use.

It was a magnificent gesture – and the car is now in safe keeping, while we decide how best we can put it to good use. We cannot use it yet, because the supporter concerned wants to take of an advanced-driving badge and a tow-bar connection, but I know we will be able to make great use of it. Thanks to the man concerned.

Another supporter has stepped in to support the contract we have negotiated with Craig Booth from Featherstone

Rovers. You will have read in the Press that Craig bought himself out of Post Office Road. The supporter concerned, who wishes to remain anonymous, was touched by his initiative and his enthusiasm for coming to Watersheddings and immediately stepped in with a firm offer of help.

I can go on. There was the man, signing himself simply "An over-60", who sent the club a donation of £35 last week as his contribution to the cause, because he was no longer able to attend matches.

We have taken the decision, as a board, to do all in our power to encourage the growth of our support among the young people of the town.

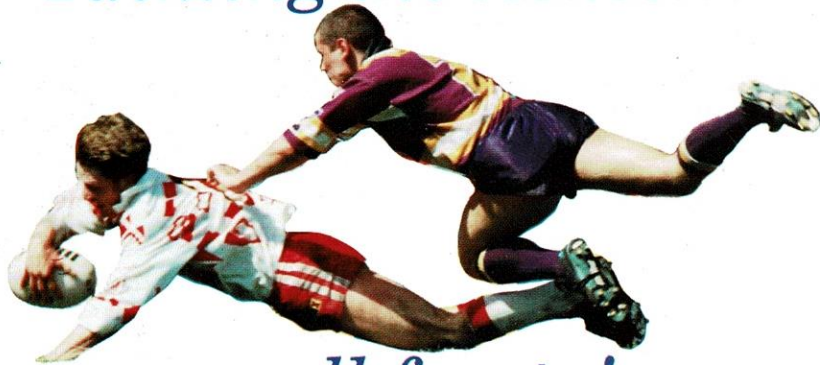

A Watersheddings Welcome to ... Castleford

Graham Steadman. AT £170,000 Graham was Castleford's record second buy when he moved from neighbours Featherstone. First at Stand-off before a switch to full back he has proved full value with a string of tries to his name. A test player starring in the last Great Britain tour of Australia.

St. John Ellis. Exciting winger who was a bargain buy from York. He has since gone on to represent Great Britain and has been a prolific try scorer for Castleford. "Singe's" versatility has proved invaluable to the club as his ever present status over the previous two years demonstrates.

Richard Blackmore. Powerful Kiwi centre with eight New Zealand test caps to his credit. In his time at Castleford he has had to overcome two serious injuries but glimpses of his best form demonstrate a potential to match the best.

Tony Smith. Another player with the ability to move around the back division. Tony had a long stint at centre last season and led the Club's try scoring table. An under-21 international who has the ability to step-up to the senior level if he maintains his progress to date.

Grant Anderson. Another Great Britain under-21 international. Grant is one of the clubs longest serving players, although still only in his mid-twenties. He has a strong defence and is tipped by many as a future back row man.

Simon Middleton. Simon switched codes after a long career in local rugby union, but took little time to adopt to League. He has brought pace to the wing and was

regarded by former coach, Darryl Van de Velde, as one of his best acquisitions.

Jon Wray. Another rugby union convert. Jon had gained junior international honours in the fifteen a side game. He joined Castleford from Morley Rugby Union, but previously had played with the renowned Bath Club. A keen tackler, Jon is looking to clinch a regular wing berth this term.

Tony Kemp. The club's latest overseas recruit, joining up from Newcastle Knights club in Australia. Gives Castleford a trio of New Zealand internationals and is expected to fill the stand-off role. As a youngster he had a spell in England at Doncaster.

Mike Ford. A major signing for the club from Oldham, Mike has proved himself as one of the best number sevens around. A great leader who fully deserved his England and Great Britain debuts last season.

Lee Crooks. Club captain, pack leader and goal kicker, Lee was a £150,000 buy from Leeds and immediately became a key figure at Castleford. A strong leader, Lee's club form at Wheldon Road led to his representative career being resurrected with Yorkshire, England and Great Britain call-ups, including the last tour, since his move from Headingley. Lee started his career at Hull where he gained rep honours as a teenager and is now one of the biggest names in the game.

Richard Russell. A close season signing from Oldham who took Shaun Irwin in exchange. Richard, who started in the game at Wigan,

has figured in the middle backs and the back row but new coach John Joyner saw him as a number nine. Whilst at Wigan he gained under-21 honours.

Dean Sampson. Castleford Colts product who has Great Britain under-21 honours and was a late entrant to last year's Australian tour squad. Often used as a "Super-sub" Dean is a popular player with the crowd and the club were quick to quell close season rumours of a possible move.

Martin Ketteridge. Long serving backman who has moved through the forwards from second row now to prop. A product of Doncaster Junior Rugby, Martin is a fine goalkicker who always gets through a lot of work when called up.

Tony Morrison. In his second term at Castleford Tony has proved an astute buy costing just £30,000 from Swinton. Previously with Oldham, Tony puts in non stop effort on both attack and defence.

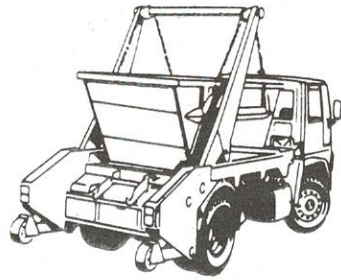
Ian Smales. An eve of season capture from neighbours Featherstone, giving a pleasant surprise to Castleford fans. Ian joined "Rovers" from Lock Lane A.R.L. and has filled the middle backs and back row positions. A Great Britain tourist Ian is a prolific try scorer and occasional goal kicker.

Andy Fisher. Another signing from Featherstone, Andy came in an exchange deal which took Neil Roebuck to Post Office Road. A product of Wakefield A.R.L. Andy attracted close attention from Leeds before opting for a place on the Castleford back row.

Tawera Nikau. Ranked amongst the world's best, Tawera has proved himself in the Championship and at home with the New Zealand test team. His early career took him to Canterbury Bankstown in Australia before spells with Sheffield and York. At the end of his contract with Minsterman a host of clubs at home and abroad wanted his signature with Castleford winning the day for this classy forward.

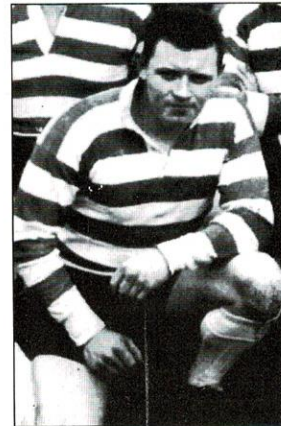

Wilf's career with Oldham lasted until the

early 1970's, when he left to join Warrington and his try-scoring ability is illustrated by the fact that, in just under 80 games for the club, he managed to score 48 tries.

No. 27 CHARLIE WINSLADE



Wilf signed for Oldham just in time to beat the Challenge Cup transfer deadline in January, 1968. He came to the club from Leigh, with Tommy Warburton going in the other direction to join the men from Hilton Park.

Playing in the stand-off half position, Wilf was a real try poacher and soon endeared himself to the Oldham supporters when he scored under the posts in the Second Round Cup Tie at Bradford, when the "Roughyeds" upset the odds by

Oldham supporters were saddened to learn of the death, late last year, of one of the stars of the great 1950's team, Charlie Winslade.

Charlie signed for Oldham on 21st January, 1950, from the Maesteg Rugby Union Club. Before turning to the professional game, he had won International honours at schoolboy level for Wales and played four times for Glamorgan County and was thought to be on the verge of a full Welsh International Cap.

A robust, straight-running second-row-forward, he was one of the dynamic Oldham "back three", along with Sid Little and

Derek Turner, who paved the way for much of the success the club enjoyed in the late 1950's.

Virtually an ever-present in the first team for a decade, he played once for Great Britain against France in Grenoble on 5th April, 1959.

Charlie was transferred to Warrington in November 1961, but not before he had made 355 senior appearances in the Oldham team, scoring 30 tries and kicking two goals along the way. A great servant of Oldham R.L.F.C.

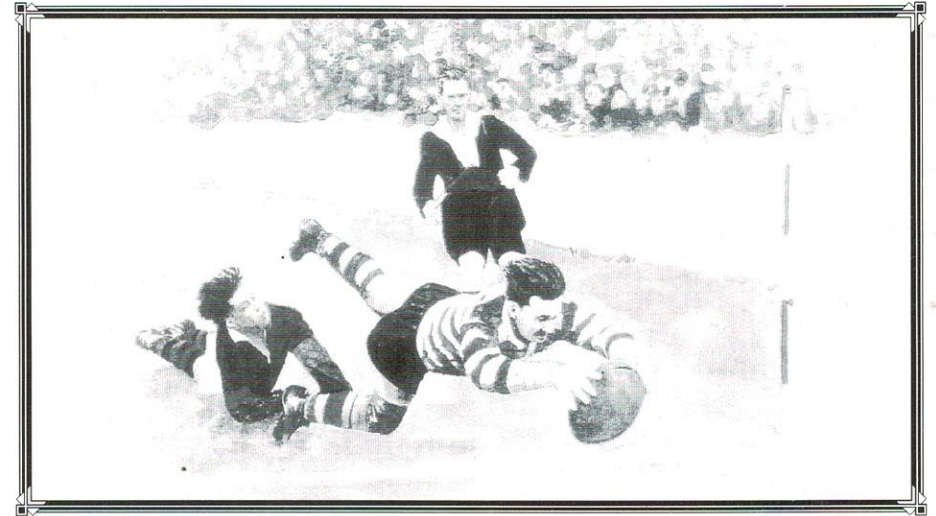

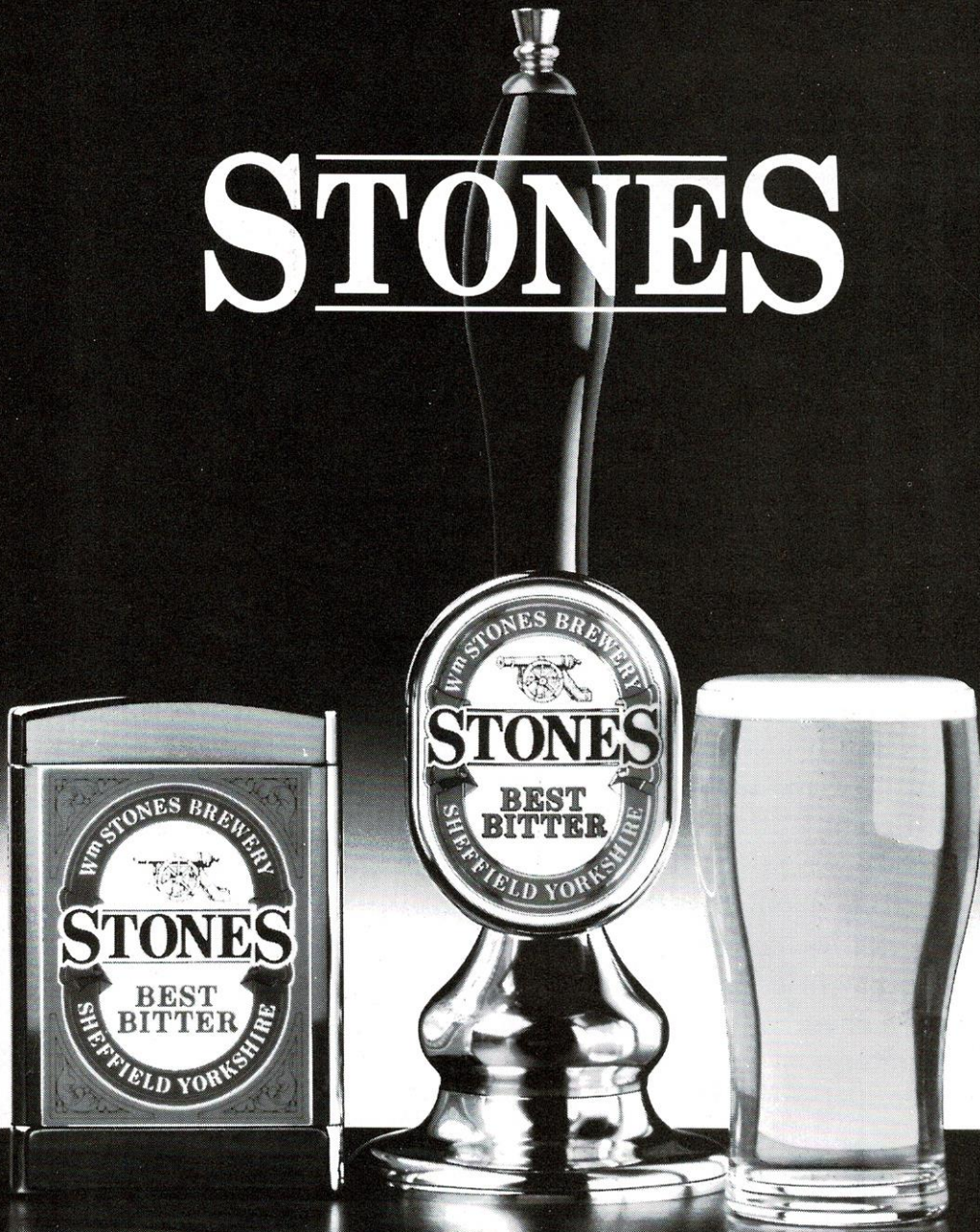

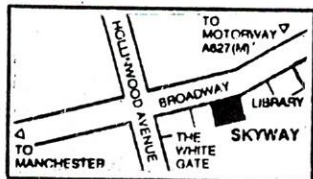

Dean Bell of Wigan needs four tries for a career century of touchdowns for the club.

The New Zealander's 96 tries have come in 248 appearances, including nine as substitute.

Injury has restricted Bell's appearances this season and he has played in only 11 matches, without scoring.

Bell's most prolific season for Wigan was his first when he scored 22 tries in 1986-87. He has scored two hat-tricks.

Ironically, Bell's English debut was against Wigan. After signing for Carlisle from New Zealand club Manukau, he made his home debut at home to Wigan on 22nd August 1982, losing the Division One match 7-10.

He scored 11 tries in 23 matches for Carlisle before moving to Leeds and scoring four tries in 22 matches in 1983-84.

The New Zealand Test centre then had two years with Australian club Eastern Suburbs before Wigan brought him back to England two years later.

He scored a try on his debut, playing on the wing in a 35-0 Division One win at Leigh on 7th September, 1986.

He took over the captaincy of Wigan early in 1991-92.

Bell was born at Auckland on 29th April, 1962.

Howe played in 38 of Castleford's 45 matches, all on the wing, mostly on the right. His total included two hat-tricks.

He finished third in the try chart behind John Stopford (Swinton) 45 and Trevor Lake (Wigan) 43.

Howe totalled 109 career tries for Castleford, playing 167 matches including five as substitute, between 1962-70.

Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of January 13th, 1993.



A young 'A' team pack restored Oldham's pride at Wheldon Road last night with a gutsy performance that could kick-start a push for First Division safety.

Coach Peter Tunks, faced by a crucial relegation clash against Hull KR at Watersheddings on Sunday, went into the Castleford game with eight team changes, two debutants, the reserve pack and young Paddy Mitchell having his first senior game in the problem stand-off spot.

Directly opposite Kiwi international Tony Kemp and, faced by forwards of the calibre of Lee Crooks and Tawera Nikau, local lad Mitchell produced a mature, intelligent performance when all the pressure was upon him.

The young forwards did well, too. Classy Cas ran in 26 points in as many minutes before Oldham's rookies realised they had no reason to be in awe of men like Crooks, Nikau, Ford, Kemp, Steadman and St. John Ellis, top try scorer in the Rugby League.

Once the nerves stopped jangling and they adjusted to the pace and power of the game, Oldham's forwards gave as good as they got.

From a point just before half-time, Oldham scored 16 points to Castleford's eight and, unlike the late comeback at Bradford on Sunday, this revival was self-inspired and not due to the opposition's benevolence.

Oldham's performance was all heart and courage . . . the heart to pick themselves up from 26-0 down and the courage to compete all the way with one of the finest teams in the game.

Young forwards Barrie McDermott, David Stephenson, Chris Parr, Craig Richards, Ian Green and David Bradbury threw themselves into the challenge with all the zeal and zest of men on the way up.

The more experienced Shane Tupaea held them together by setting a mag-

nificent lead on defence and club skipper Bob Lindner came off the bench with Castleford 26-0 up to add strength and stature to the big effort.

Take away that first 25 minutes and Oldham's defensive work was inspirational, with everyone playing a part in rattling Castleford into a succession of errors.

Crooks, one of the most feared forwards in the game, departed early in the second half, his legs like jelly after taking a three-man challenge from McDermott, Tupaea and Charlie McAlister.

Little was seen of Nikau and the Castleford forwards needed to follow Tony Morrison's great example on defence to whip up the enthusiasm to match Oldham for sheer determination and dogged persistence.

Andy Hay was a strong runner and Richard Russell was lively in the first half around play-the-ball and in support, but it was Morrison's big effort on defence that kept the Castleford pack on its toes.

Ford's class was always a threat, but once the home side had scored four early tries by Russell, Simon, Middleton, Hay and Ellis, the Oldham forwards worked overtime in the middle of the field to cut off the supply line to the home backs.

A tough, physical encounter threatened to blow up more than once, first when Morrison was sin-binned just before half-time and then when Stephenson (Oldham's top tackler) followed him during a fiery second half.

While Oldham's forwards took most of the team's honours, there was an eye-catching display from full-back Nigel Heslop, back in the side after a six-week injury absence.

He handled well, tackled strongly, made ground when advancing the ball and took a wide pass from Mitchell out on the left wing to dance past two

defenders and send in Scott Ranson for Oldham's third try.

Martin Crompton worked hard at scrum-half, scoring the first Oldham try and creating the second for Darren Abram by putting Steadman under pressure from an up-and-under and them hacking on again for Abram to follow up and score.

It was another defeat . . . but this time it was full of pride and passion, the qualities that enrich a performance for supporters and promote a belief that brighter days may be just around the corner.

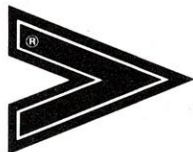

The "Glassblowers" of Castleford became full members of the Rugby League in time for the 1926-27 season, although there had been an amateur team in the town prior to this time.

It would be another six years before "Cas" and the "Roughyeds" would play each other, the first meeting taking place at Castleford on 5th November, 1932, when Oldham gained a victory by 18 points to 6. In the return match at Watersheddings on 27th December, the tables were turned with Castleford winning the game by 9 points to 6.

Before the return to a Second Division set-up in 1973-74, Castleford were probably the most infrequent visitors to Watersheddings, which is demonstrated by the fact that there was no League match between the two teams from 19th April, 1950, until 15th December, 1962 and it would be another 11 seasons before the next League encounters in 1973-74. There were, however, three meetings in Cup Ties in this period, two in the B.B.C. Trophy at Watersheddings and one in the Challenge Cup at Wheldon Road.

The most famous match involving Oldham and Castleford was the 1986 Challenge Cup semi-final, played at Central Park, Wigan. Both sets of supporters will remember that victory went to Castleford by 18 points to 7. The turning-point in the game coming midway through the second half when, with Oldham holding a one-point advantage, Cas scrum-half Bob Beardmore put up a speculative "up and under" that took a cruel bounce over the try-line, eluding the Oldham full-back David Liddiard and was touched down by Beardmore, who had fol-

lowed up his own kick. Even then the Oldham players argued that the Cas half-back was over the dead ball line when he scored, but the try was given and Cas went on to win this match and then triumph over Hull K.R. in the final.

The Oldham try that day was scored by the then 16-year-old Glen Liddiard (David's brother) who is now, of course, back on the Watersheddings scene.

I am currently researching for a book covering the complete playing records and history of OLDHAM RLFC.
