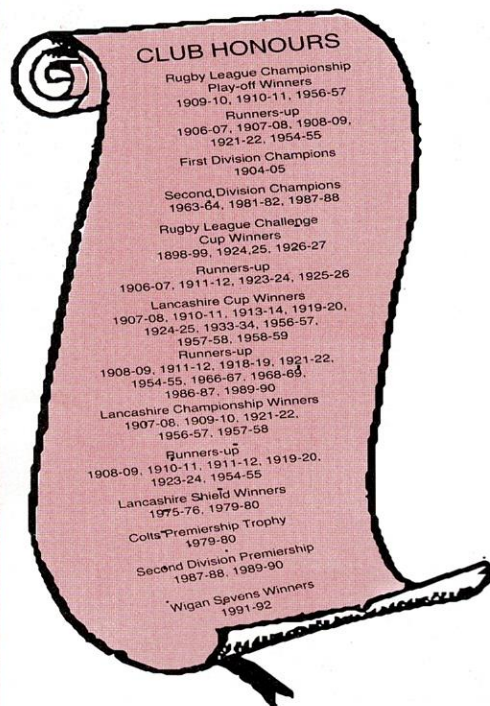

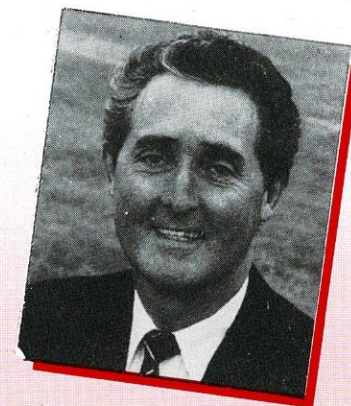

FROM the BOARDROOM

On the occasion of our final game of the season, congratulations go from the boardroom to the dressing room. Each of our three teams has enjoyed success of one form or another in an eventual 1993-94 campaign, not least the first team which won at St. Helens last Sunday to clinch our survival in the First Division of the Stones Bitter Championship.

We have survived our baptism of fire in the First Division, after being relegated at the first attempt in 1989 and 1991, and hopefully we can now establish the club in the top flight and win the support of the people of Oldham and the town's business, professional and commercial enterprises.

Regrettably, results did not go our way for much of the season and there came a parting of the ways between the club and our previous coach Peter tunks, in February.

Peter did a fine job in assembling our squad, but in the game of Rugby League chairmen and coaches know that decisions are made on the evidence of results on the field of play.

We have done remarkably well since Bob Lindner and Andy Goodway took over two months ago, culminating in our 30 - 26 win at Knowsley Road which clinched our First Division survival.

Hopefully, we will all be together again next season, striving to benefit from the experiences of

this year and doing enough to arouse the interest and the passions of local people.

So congratulations to Bob and Andy for keeping us in the First Division and also to Shane Tupaea, who has enjoyed stunning success with the Alliance side. At the time of writing, Shane's 'A' team lads had won the Lancashire Shield, the Youngers Alliance Second Division Cup and the Youngers Alliance Challenge Cup, beating Salford 14-8 in a memorable final, watched by nearly 2,000 fans.

If they managed to beat Bramley in midweek to extend their season's record to 31 wins and one draw from 32 games this season in all competitions, they will have won their fourth trophy, the Youngers Alliance Second Division Championship.

The Academy Team has also done well in its first season in the JJB Sports Academy. The boys have a good chance of winning promotion and going up to the First Division with Featherstone Rovers, who have been their chief rivals at the top of the Second Division for most of the season.

Congratulations are due, too, to the men behind the rise and rise of the Academy team at Watersheddings, namely Alan Robinson, Jack Buckley, Geoff Munro, John Prince and Harry Aspinall.

All of this, of course, has been achieved despite the club's critical

financial position and despite the on-going negotiations with Oldham Council to find a successful formula for a rescue package, which might involve our departure from Watersheddings in three years time into a new purpose-built stadium elsewhere in town.

We have managed to keep that side of the operation well away from the dressing room so that it could not hinder the players' feelings of security, their commitment or their ambition. Recent results - 13 points out of 18 under Bob Lindner tend to indicate that we have succeeded in divorcing football matters from financial affairs.

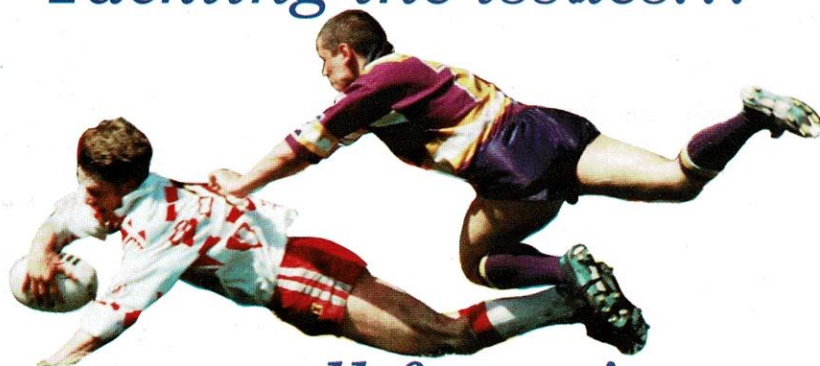
Thanks go from the boardroom to all the people who have supported us during the past season and to all those people who gave up their private and leisure time to do a thousand and one jobs for us for no reward other than the pleasure gained from helping the club. The directors have a great respect for that.

Finally, welcome to Wigan. It is perhaps fitting that our season should end in front of a full house crowd and the BSKYB TV cameras in a match against a team as fashionable and exciting as the men from Central Park.

They may need to win here to retain the title. If so, what a cracking match it should be!

A Watersheddings Welcome to ... Wigan

Danny Ellison. Position winger. This youngster signed from Golborne ARLFC in 1991 and has made several first team appearances during the past two seasons. A promising young player who has gained honours with the G.B. Under 19's.

Michael Cassidy. Position - back row forward. This youngster signed from St. Judes ARLFC in May 1990. Has made several first team appearances and has gained international honours playing for G.B. under 21's. A hard grafting forward with great future prospects.

Barrie Jon Mather. Position second row. This strong youngster has supported the first team for the most of this season to date. A brilliant worker, signed from Arnold School RUFC. A player with great prospects in the game. Has gained GB Academy and Under 21's honours.

Franco Botica. Position wing/stand off. An ex All Black rugby union star signed in a blaze of publicity. A very quick worker who has earned the position of goal kicker with his immaculate kicking record, thus having solved a long standing problem for Wigan. Made an eight point Wigan debut at Swansea in the Charity Shield competition. Franco created history last March, recording the fastest 1000 points aggregate in British Rugby League's history in 93 matches. Has been described by one of his team mates as the 'closest thing to a goal kicking machine'. Played for New Zealand in the 1993 Test Series.

Dean Bell. Position centre. A former N.Z. captain. Known as 'Mean Dean', Dean became the first New Zealander to receive the coveted Stones Bitter Man of Steel Award. One of the team stars' who has appeared in the club's sixth consecutive Cup Finals. Had a spell with Eastern Suburbs before joining Wigan in 1986. As club captain, a great team member and a highly respected player. Was presented with the 'This is Your Life Award' in September 1993.

Joe Lydon. Position centre or wing. Graphic Designer. Another great of the modern game. A versatile player who has filled every backline position for Great Britain and is capable of turning a game with a try or, on one occasion, a sixty yard drop goal. Signed from Widnes in 1986, Joe is only the fourth in history to have won both the Harry Sunderland and Lance Todd Trophy. Joe has gained 30 caps for Great Britain.

Shaun Edwards. Position stand off/scrum half. Shaun has blistering pace off the mark, great vision and constant alertness for the half

chance. A player who demands perfection from himself and expects it from his colleagues. Voted Young Player of the Year on a record three occasions and 1990 Man of Steel. The games leading try scorer in the past two seasons. Showed great courage when he stayed on field despite a fractured eye socket and cheekbone during a Wembley Cup Final. Son of Jackie who played for Warrington. Shaun joined Wigan in a blaze of publicity in 1983.

Denis Betts. Position second row forward. Burst into the Rugby League scene as an 18 year old player and is now a Great Britain Star. A powerful forward who played in every one of Wigan's games during their Championship year. Has twice been nominated Young Player of the Year. Signed from Leigh Rangers ARLFC in 1986. Was once on the books of Manchester United F.C. A dedicated young player who gives his all.

Andy Platt. Position utility forward. Joined Wigan from St. Helens in September 1988 for a then club record fee of £140,000. Became only the 6th forward in history to gain 25 Test caps when skipping Great Britain against France at Headingley early in 1993. Harry Sunderland Award winner for his try-scoring display in the 1992 Premiership Final against former club St. Helens. A Great Britain Star and a relentless tackler. A good clubman and the ideal Coach's player.

Kelvin Skerrett. Position prop forward. Great Britain prop signed for Wigan in 1990. Previously had spells with Hunslet and Bradford Northern. Nephew of ex-Great Britain star, Trevor Skerrett. A product of Oulton ARL. A workhouse who was impressive on the 1990 Lions tour.

Phil Clarke. Position loose forward. A player who is undoubtedly destined for the game's highest honours. A skilled footballer and a powerful runner who gets through a lot of work in defence. Took the man of the match award for the 1993 Test Series. Former GB under 21's skipper, son of former Wigan hooker and Coach, Colin. Excelled in all three tests on the 1992 Lions Tour and was a member of the England side which defeated Wales at Swansea in November 1992.

Martin McDermott. Position hooker. A dangerous dummy half runner with quick hands. A Great Britain international who fought to make the number nine shirt his own. Joined Wigan from Wigan St. Patricks ARL Juniors in 1984, making his debut in 1985 at Wakefield. Skipped GB at Colts level in 1988 and 1989.

Martin Hall. Position hooker. Aged 23, signed from Rochdale Hornets. Has made several first team appearances but yet to gain international honours. Another hard worker and a great prospect.

Ian Gildart. Position second row forward. A young but yet strong tackling machine. Signed from Leigh Rangers ARLFC. Has gained international honours at GB Colts and GB under 21's level. Has supported the first team, often but yet to gain his own regular place.

Martin Offiah. Position winger. Signed from Widnes RLFC in January 1992 for a record fee of £440,000 and repaid some of that fee with 30 tries in just 16 appearances, including a club record 10 in the Stones Bitter Premiership defeat of Leeds. Former Lance Todd Trophy holder. Topped the League try charts in each of his first four seasons gaining immediate selection for Great Britain. After a long period due to injury, has made his way back into the number five shirt. A speedy player known throughout the game for his pace.

Jason Robinson. Position winger. Voted Young Player of the Year for 1992. This Leeds born teenager made his first team debut against Sheffield. Represented Great Britain in the 1993 Test Series but was injured in a club match which meant that he was unable to appear in the second and third test. A great player who has so far excelled himself and will no doubt be in contention for many of the games highest honours.

Sam Panapa. Position centre/utility player. Joined Wigan from Sheffield in August 1991 and scored Wigan's opening try in the Foster's World Cup Challenge Match in October 1991. An invaluable member of the team who has helped Wigan to Championship and Premiership glory.

Neil Cowie. Position prop forward. A product of Todmorden ARL. Gained all five domestic winners medals inside his first 18 months at Central Park. A great tackling machine and a hard worker who gives his all in defence.

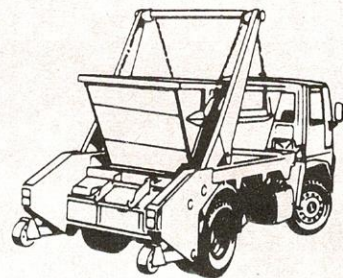
Billy McGinty. Position second row. Joined Wigan from Warrington in 1991, forcing his way into the 1992 Lions party. A product of Widnes Tigers ARLFC. Another player who has gained all five domestic medals inside his first 18 months at Central Park. A player who has been out of action due to a serious injury but is working his way back after making an excellent recovery.

Gary Connolly. Position centre. Signed from St. Helens in September, 1993. Had a successful off season in summer 1993 with Canterbury Bankstown returning to play for Wigan after they were eliminated from the Winfield Cup. A current Great Britain international who played in all three of the 1993 tests versus New Zealand. A strong, fast player who is exceptional in defence.

Nigel Wright. Position stand off. Signed from Wakefield Trinity in August 1993. A great player who will, along with the other Wigan youngsters, no doubt gain some if not all of the games highest honours.

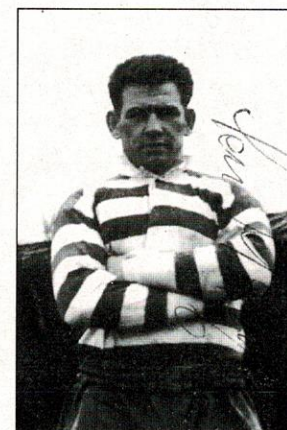


returned for the 1965-66 campaign, the devastating speed was never quite the same. However he could still cause problems for the opposition and I will remember a length of

No. 29 LEN McINTYRE



Speedy winger Trevor Simms joined Oldham from Rochdale Hornets in June 1962 and made a two try debut against his former club in the Law Cup match on August 11th. He had previously played for St. Helens and also been the Lancashire sprint champion.

On the field Trevor was capped by Lancashire but his career suffered a severe set-back when he broke his leg when diving over for a try at Leigh, on October 3rd 1964, this injury kept him out of action for the rest of that season and although he

Signed on March 2nd 1959 from Barrow, Len was previously with St. Helens and was in the Saints team at Wembley for the 1956 Cup Final against Halifax.

Len's position was hooker and he became Oldham's regular striker for over six season until he was transferred to Liverpool City in December 1965.

He made 212 appearances for the

"Roughy'eds", scoring 28 tries and kicking one goal. This being the dramatic late equaliser against Hull K.R. in the 1964 Challenge Cup semi-final at Headingley.

Len also gained one Great Britain cap against Australia at Swinton in 1963.

Last Time Out . . .

with ROGER HALSTEAD

An extract from Roger Halstead's match report in the Oldham Evening Chronicle of December 13th, 1993.



Nobody could have asked more of Oldham, but Wigan's superior pace, strength and class edged them through in a fiercely-fought Regal Trophy third-round tie at Watersheddings yesterday.

Strength told when Kiwi stand-off Sam Panapa blasted a hole in Oldham's midfield defence to score the first try, straight from the scrum, with only three minutes on the clock.

There was more than a touch of class in dreadful conditions when Joe Lydon and Barrie-Jon Mather combined beautifully to send Jason Robinson sliding at the pavilion corner in Scott Ranson's tackle.

And teenage forward discovery Andy Farrell produced plenty of pace out wide to race 40 yards on a treacherous surface before turning Gary Connolly inside to the posts for Wigan's third try after half an hour.

Wigan won the toss, took first use of the wind and driving sleet and turned round with a 16-2 lead which was always going to be enough.

Nevertheless, absent Oldham boss Peter Tunks would have been proud of the way his team battled bravely in the second half to salvage pride and win admirers.

Before leaving for Australia to attend to personal matters, Tunks promised that Wigan would know they had been in a cup-tie. They did, too.

With the wind behind them, Oldham took the game to Wigan, won the second half slog 6-0 and camped out in the visitors quarter thanks to a strategic kicking game and exceptional tackling.

The forwards hunted as a pack, tackled in twos and threes and rarely missed a challenge as their fans got behind them to offer vocal support.

What a different story it might have been had Wigan been restricted to two tries in the first half or had

Oldham been able to score earlier once they had Wigan on the ropes after half-time.

The new half was only ten minutes old when Ranson looked like going clear only to be edged off balance by a desperate ankle tap.

For all their constant pressure after that, Oldham couldn't bust Wigan's resistance until eight minutes from time when Barrie McDermott crashed over and Paul Topping goaled.

The statistics sum up the game as well as anything. Neither side scored a try when playing into the wind.

With the wind behind them, Wigan scored three tries and Oldham one, the home side producing an excellent performance on defence, but surrendering too much possession on attack to make the most of their second half territorial stranglehold.

That's where Wigan's class told and that's why Wigan were again in the hat when the quarter-final draw was made this morning.

A first half talking point was Oldham skipper Bob Lindner's decision to press for a try and ignore an easy penalty chance with Wigan 10-2 ahead.

There is no right or wrong in these decisions. It is down to opinion, judgement and an appraisal of how the game is going at any given time.

Count me among those who believe you take what you can when you can in a tight game . . . but Lindner went for broke and he would have been everybody's hero had his gamble come off.

As it happened, it didn't get the chance to because Paul Topping's kick to touch failed to make it and Wigan took off the pressure.

Moments earlier, Oldham looked to be wrongly pulled up for a knock-on and it was from the first set of six from this scrum that Robinson scored in the

corner. Oldham rarely got into good position for long enough to pressurise Wigan in the first half, but they had a chance shortly before half-time when Martin Crompton dummied though the defensive line.

He chipped forward as the defence closed in, but he ball just ran dead as Darren Abram swept in for the touch-down.

In the second-half it was all Oldham as Wigan were forced onto the back foot and had to be content themselves with defending their lead.

Topping's early kicks often turned Lydon, the chase was good and the challenge was always determined and beefy.

Unfortunately, some Oldham players found it hard to adapt their handling skills to wild, windy and wet weather.

This was no day for slipping the ball in the tackle, trying an ambitious pass or taking a chance.

Oldham won many friends for effort and Ian Sherratt walked away with two individual awards for his tireless work up front in matching the big men in Wigan's pack, Neil Cowie and Andy Platt.

It was a hard slog for both teams from start to finish, but Wigan had the edge in polish and professionalism and it carried them through.

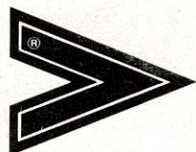

For our last game of the 1993-94 season, we welcome our friends, rivals and fellow Lancastrians; Wigan.

At the time of writing these notes the Championship title had not been settled, with Warrington, Bradford and Wigan still battling it out for the "Big Prize". Still the men from Central Park continue to dominate the Challenge Cup competition and they are to be congratulated on reaching their 7th successive final, when they carry the Lancashire hopes in the "Roses clash against Leeds at Wembley next Saturday.

As this featured covered the most important games between the two clubs in the programme for the Regal Trophy tie last December, this time I will just give a brief mention to some other interesting encounters between Oldham and Wigan.

The first meeting in the 'Northern Union' took place at Watersheddings on December 21st, 1895 with Oldham winning by 20-0. However Wigan won the return the following April by 18-5.

The teams have met five times in the Lancashire Cup Final with three wins for Wigan in 1908, 1966 and 1986 with success for the "Roughy'eds" in 1913 and 1957.

In October 1944, due to the fact a number of teams dropped out of the League in wartime, Oldham and Wigan were invited to play in the Yorkshire Cup and actually played each other, Wigan winning the first round tie over two legs.

I'm sure that supporters of both clubs need no reminding that Oldham were the last team to defeat Wigan in the Challenge Cup and it is now seven years since that cold February

night when Paddy Kirwan and Mick Burke contrived to knock the Riversiders out of the competition with their last minute efforts in front of a capacity all ticket Watersheddings crowd. I firmly believe that the shock nature of that defeat made the already resolute Wigan team even more determined when it comes to the Challenge Cup and the rest of the League has suffered the consequences ever since.

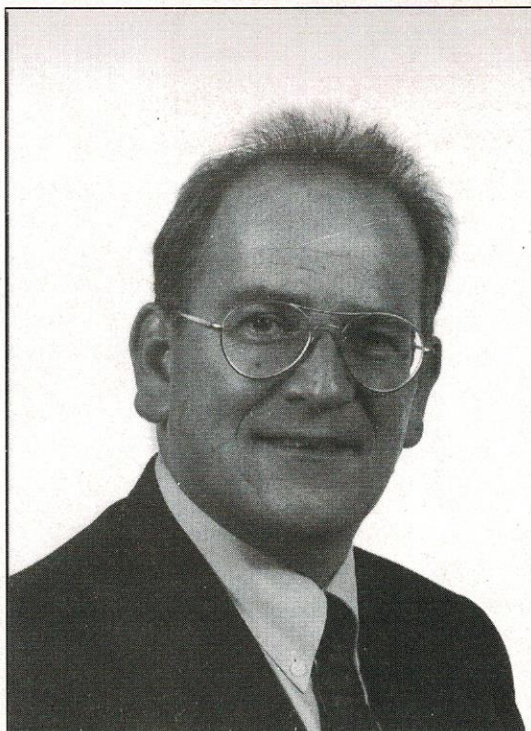
