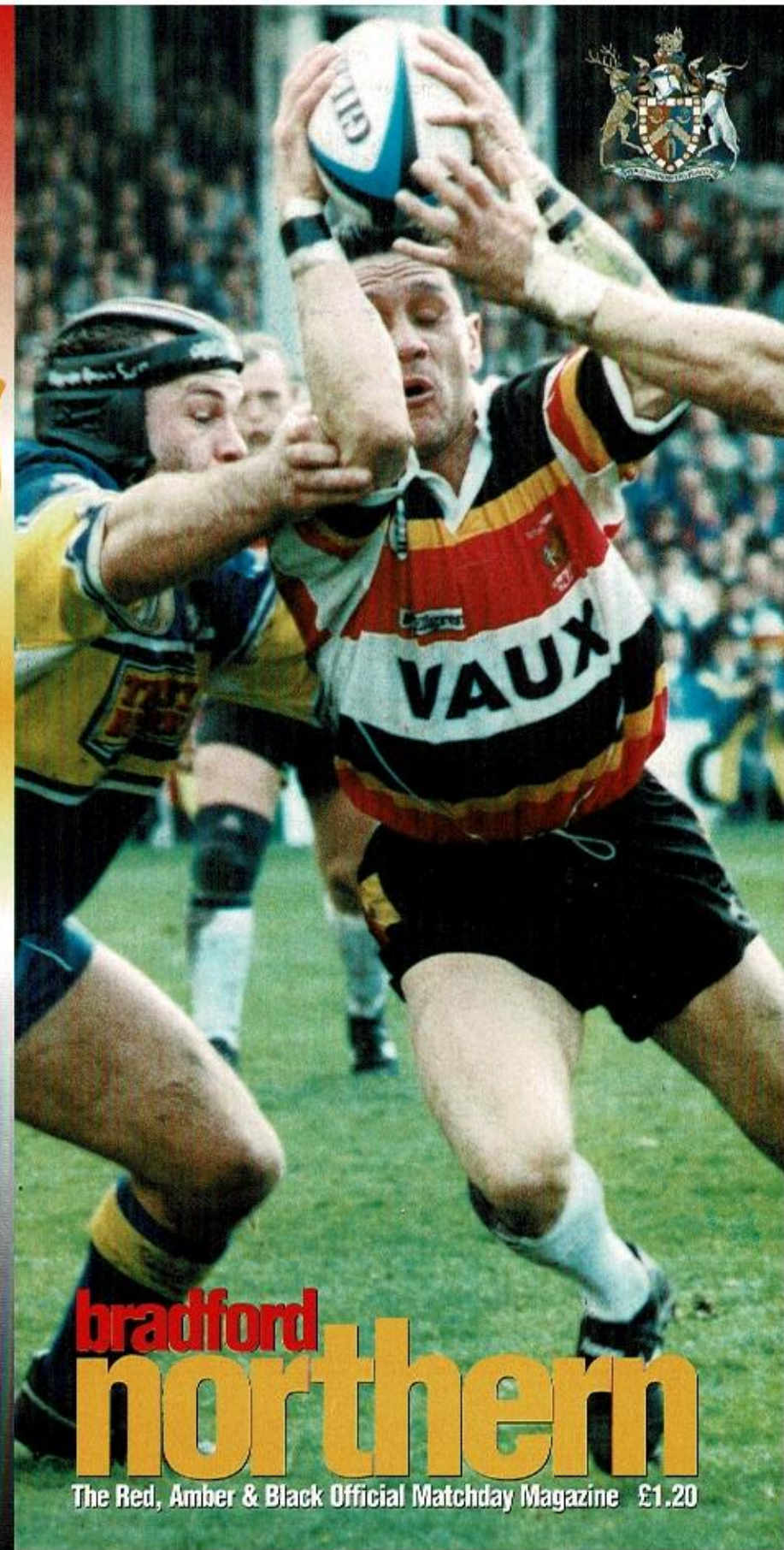

The only bad news so far was Trevor Clarke's achilles tendon injury which will keep him out until the New Year, especially after his excellent form last season - I wish him a speedy recovery. There is much more to report from the close season activity, but space will not permit, so I shall close with an acknowledgement to our major sponsors, Vaux Breweries Ltd, and hope that we can gain success this season and that today Vaux beats Samson.

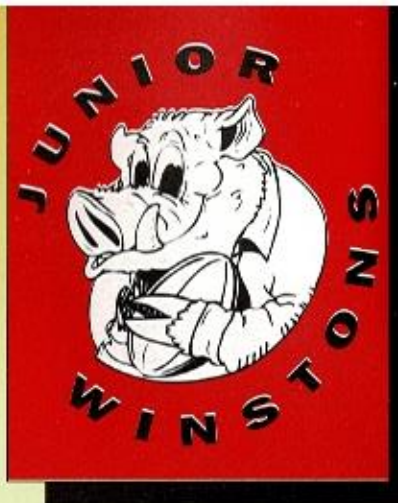

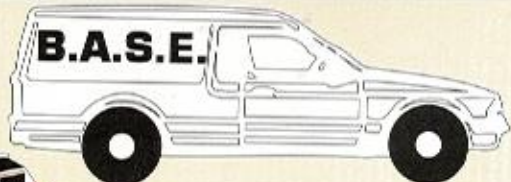

Introducing ... Andy Goodway

A new season brings a new career for the popular Yorkshireman who spent the majority of his playing career west of the Pennines. Castleford-born Goodway, a product of the Redhill Club, made his Oldham debut in 1981. Oldham had instigated a youth policy and Goodway fully repaid the club's faith during his initial four seasons with the club. One of five Oldham players on the 1984 Australia tour Goodway's international career finished in 1990. It had lasted seven years and included captaincy against the French in 1985. He was also a valued member of Peter Fox's all conquering Yorkshire side of the eighties, being one of the few players in the squad who never played for Fox at club level. In May 1985 Goodway returned from a brief period with Australian club Manly. Within two months he was a Wigan player, transferred for £65,000 which at that time was a record fee for a forward. An endless list of trophies followed as the Wigan bandwagon begins. Twelve further international caps, four Challenge Cup winners' medals, four Regal Trophy winners' medals, a solitary Premiership winners' medal, four Lancashire Cup winners' medals. Add on three Championship medals and the man of the match award in the 86-7 Regal Final. Not bad value for £65,000! A brief spell at Leeds preceded his return to the Watersheddings. Following the departure of Peter Tunks he assisted Bob Lindner with the coaching duties. It had been Goodway's thirteenth season in the sport. Retirement beckoned and during the summer months he accepted the coaching contract offered by the club. A conclusion of a successful playing career and the start of a coaching career at his first professional club. ■

A BRIEF HISTORY

Founded in 1876 Oldham were a founder member of the Northern Football Union. The club has had no Championship success in recent seasons. Very much a yo-yo side, relegated six times in the last two decades, their only League success has been in the Second Division Championship where the Cherry and Whites have been champions in 81-2 and 86-7. Inconsistency has led to many changes. Andy Goodway is the club's eighth coach in the last decade, a list that includes the former Northern and Oldham Aussie forward Mal Graham. The club's most successful period was between 1906 and 1914. They won the old style Championship in consecutive seasons (beating Wigan both times) and were runners-up in the three seasons preceding their first championship success. They also finished as League leaders on two occasions during this period.

FORM GUIDE

Success for the East Lancashire Club during the current season may be difficult to define. Avoiding relegation for a second successive season may rid the club of the yo-yo title whilst a place in the top ten will be envisaged by most neutrals as an optimistic objective. The 93-4 campaign was a battle against relegation. Peter Tunks earned acclaim for the manner in which he rebuilt his side.

Realising that the players in the 92-3 promotion team needed replacing, he engineered a number of exchange deals. Tunks left the Watersheddings after a 20-0 cup exit at the hands of second division Doncaster. Australian international Bob Lindner replaced Tunks and was fortunate in that Oldham had obtained the services of Aussie stand-off Glenn Liddiard. He was a major force as the club escaped relegation with Lindner only

enduring four defeats during his ten match reign. With victories over Widnes, Hull and Featherstone on home soil and wins at Leigh and St. Helens the Roughyeds were entitled to be satisfied with Lindner's efforts. Earlier in the season they suffered a forty-eight points to sixteen pounding by Northern at Odsal and lost a close early season affair at the Watersheddings by just four points.

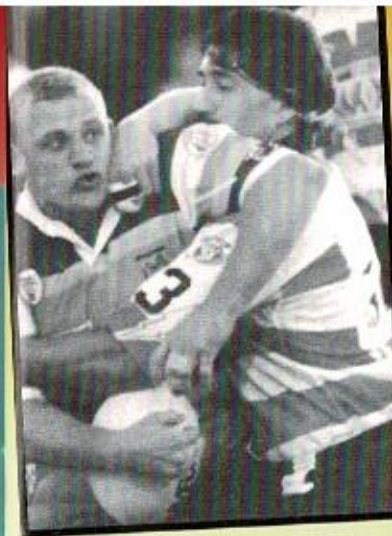

IN CHARGE

Following the departure of Australians Peter Tunks and Bob Lindner the club has appointed a coach from within the English game. Better still they have appointed a Yorkshireman, Andy Goodway. However, to keep a balance his assistant is Alan McCurrie, a Cumbrian!

OVERSEAS' STARS

With the Australian tourists due in this country in the Autumn many clubs are turning to New Zealand for their current overseas' signings. Joining the Watersheddings club this season are Kiwi goalkicking full-back or stand-off Wilson Marsh from the Manukau Club and forward Joe Faimalo.

They join two Kiwis who had different fortunes last term. Mike Kuiti, a former Leeds and Rochdale player appeared in every game while Charlie McAlister could only muster fourteen appearances. The versatility of the former Bradford and Bingley Union man could be a big asset this season.

INTERNATIONALS

Not much for this heading. Nigel Heslop had a few outings for the Twickenham boys. Let's not forget young promising hooker John Clarke. The former East Leeds player represented BARLA at international level on the young 'Lions' tour to Australia in 1993. He was also the BARLA youth player of the year in 1992 and 1993, the same award had previously been won by Dave Heron (1976) and Deryck Fox (1983).

TRANSFERS

Very little transfer activity occurred during the early summer months. Gary Lord made the short journey from Thrum Hall. A workmanlike prop forward, he will fit in well and assist former Odsal player Ian Sherratt with the hard work. Likewise former Widnes' Cumbrian forward Paul Davidson has joined to enhance the pack strength. Stand-off Steve Gartland has been recruited from nearby Rochdale Hornets. Gartland kicked over one-hundred goals for the Hornets two seasons ago.

CLUB MEN

With former coach Peter Tunks chopping and changing his squad, there are not many long-serving players in the Oldham ranks. Three years seems to be the best offer. Forward Dave Bradbury and Ian Sherratt both signed in 1991. No need for a testimonial committee at this club! Young prop-forward Barrie McDermott also joined in that year, with only forty appearances to his credit in three seasons he has now departed for new pastures at Central Park. Reportedly Oldham received an immediate £40,000 and may benefit to the tune of £100,000 if the player is a long-term success.

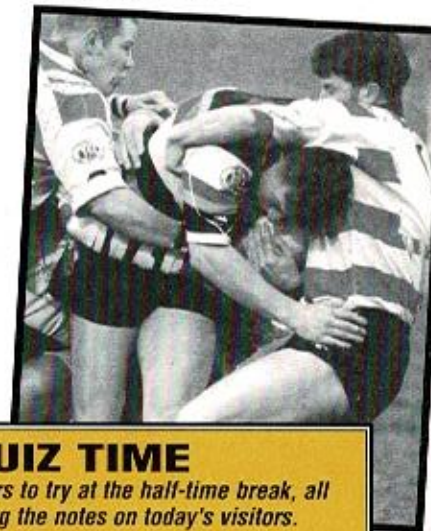
IN FORM

Former Rochdale centre Darren Abram was the man in form last season. Notching up twenty tries he also showed that he has the ability to

kick goals. The top goal kicker was Paul Topping with fifty-five in twenty-six appearances. With nine outings starting on the substitute bench, the former Leigh full-back did not have every opportunity, half-backs Steve Kerry and Glen Liddiard also joined in.

WEEK IN, WEEK OUT

One of the most notable features of the Oldham side last term was the number of positional changes. These mainly occurred during Peter Tunks' period in charge. Full-back Wally Gibson found himself at half-back (including against Northern), Paul Topping played full back, centre, half-back and second row whilst former Castleford centre Shaun Irwin had a single game at hooker. Andy Goodway joined in the fun with the odd game or so at prop. Then again, as a youngster many pundits reckoned that prop was going to be his natural position.

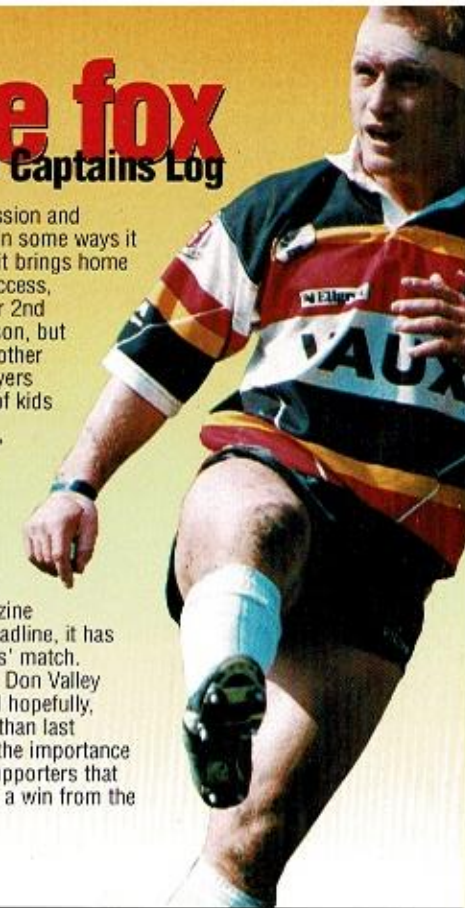

I must say the lads were absolutely overwhelmed by the supporters' of all ages

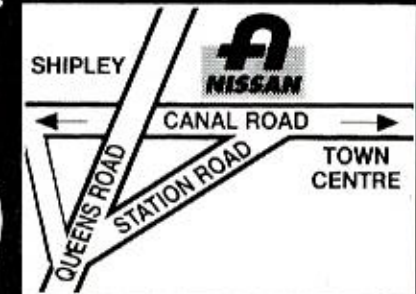

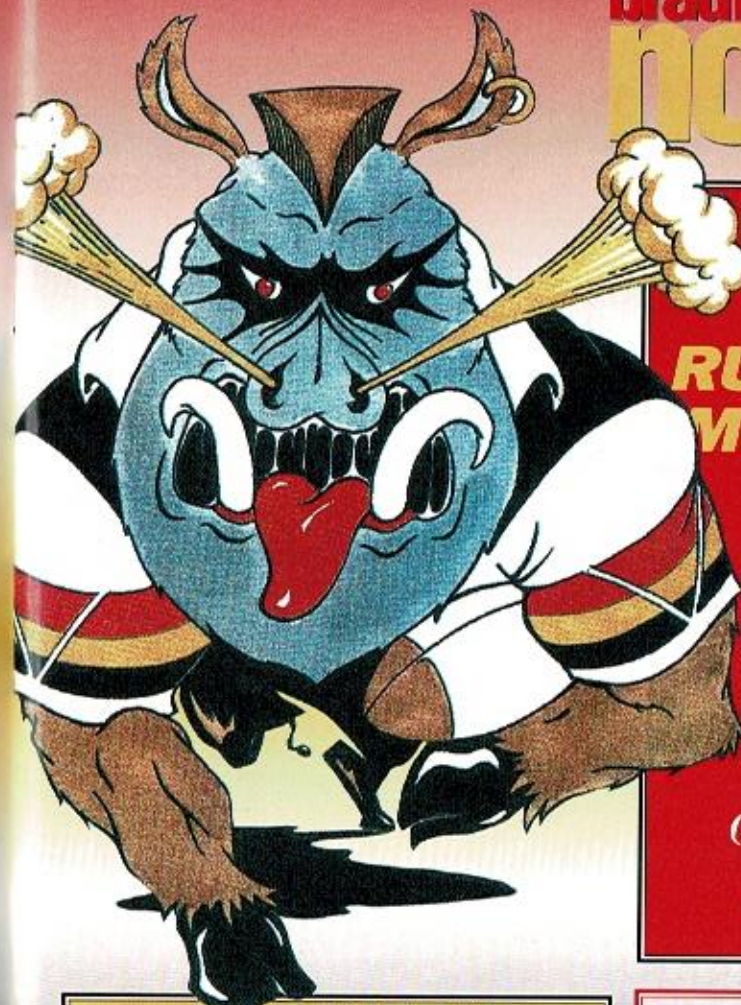

Bruce Bendigo shares his views on the 'Odsal Dream'

What on earth is the world coming to? Odsal to be re-developed? Odsal with a roof, for goodness sake? And, heaven

forbid, Odsal to be re-named? Forgive me if I sound somewhat incredulous at talk of 'Sportsworld', 'Musicworld', '250-bedroom hotels', never mind, "... interested parties from the U.S.A., Middle East and Europe", but is this really our Odsal we're talking about here? Despite a small, knowing smirk, I balk at saying, 'pie in the sky', but it does all sound rather grand, don't you think?

Anyway, now there are new plans to turn the 'Odsal Dream' into reality. Serious ones this time, mind you! I realise I might possibly be leaving myself open to the charge of scepticism, but I must own up to having that, 'Wally Lewis is coming...' feeling about the whole thing, if you know what I mean. Well, let's be honest, for almost as long as there's been an Odsal, there's been a plan in the pipe-line to turn it into, 'the Wembley of the North', 'the envy of the world', or whatever. We've heard it all before. Pipe-lines and pipe-dreams seem to overlap at City Hall, like nowhere else. Are you really holding your breath this time? Did I hear someone mutter, "... and pigs might fly"?

It's not a nice thing to have to deal with, but I'm obviously older and more cynical than I'd realised. More sentimental, too, than I'd imagined. Firmly rooted in the past, no less, with a chronic lack of either vision or ambition. So be it. I know it all to be true since

all these 'space-age', 'twenty-first century', 'new world order' plans for Odsal leave me cold. Colder, indeed, than Odsal itself ever did. So all this brings me to my dream of Odsal, which is quite a bit different to the modern one doing the rounds. Mine is somewhat hazier, but more atmospheric. A dream of childhood; of growing up; of the seasons' turning; of history. It's an Odsal peopled by characters of epic proportions, both on and off the field. Memories, feelings, life itself. Whilst growing up, Odsal was a grand old citadel, overlooking the city. And we, serfs of the kingdom, would enthusiastically climb the hill, every couple of weeks, to pay our respects, at our feudal castle. It was the light on the hill, calling to the faithful. All roads led to Odsal in those days. A part of me says they still do.

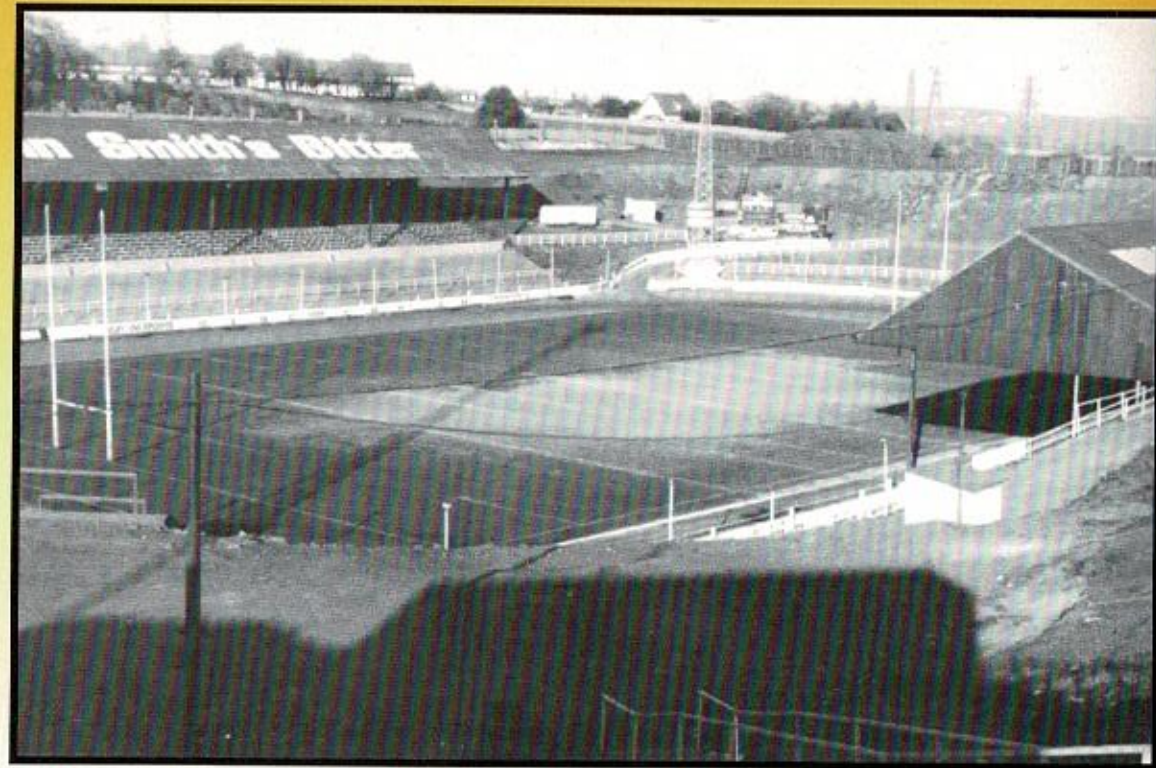
Where else can you think of the majesty of the elements being so apparent? (With the exception of mountaineers and Queensburyites, okay?). Well, 'majesty' is a word that only an idiot living 10,000 miles away, whose forgotten how rain down the back of your neck feels, might use, but this is a dream, after all. Let your imagination loose here. This is sentiment at it's rosy best. Go on, humour me and close your eyes. Think of the warm, shirtsleeve August afternoons, contented with memories of the summer holiday fast fading, as you look down on 'sun-tormented' and red-faced players going about their business on the pitch below. Think again and it's Autumn, bringing with it a wild freshness to Odsal. Everyone bundled in warm clothing, flushed from the cold and the excited

anticipation. Flags are whipping atop the rim of the stadium, maybe there's a band on the pitch. Just time to squeeze a place on the infamous walkway to see your heroes emerge from the old dressing-rooms, greased and breathing steam, like dragons in the chilly, raw air. You might collect an autograph or two and all around is the thrilling aroma of wintergreen and warm pies.

Now it's winter and the grey skies promise snow and dreaded postponements. Icy Siberian winds blast through the Odsal bowl and freezing rain soon follows, driving all and sundry, panting and grumbling, to the Old Stand, to stamp their feet, huddle and blow on chafed hands. The roar is louder from out of the stand and all the grown-ups shoot from their seats to follow the play. A kid needs to be pretty inventive to see anything. The air is damp and heavy with drying coats and the blue tobacco smoke teases around the rafters.

On the field itself, well that was the province of heroes, giants and gladiators. I remember standing in the middle of the pitch at a deserted Odsal and the atmosphere was physical. I felt ten feet tall and still dwarfed by the place. It was a mystical, cosmic experience and Wembley could never have touched it. Odsal was the only place I ever wanted to be. Just think, for a while of all the players that have strode across Odsal. All the greats - Bevan, Boston, Ward. Gods of mythology. And what about the big games? The Tests, the finals. Don't try to tell me Odsal wasn't a magical place.

We've all got our own favourite

memories of the place. Foxy's Test in 1978, when his 'Dad's Army' beat the Aussies; the only nil-nil draw I've ever seen was there in the 1968 Huddersfield-Wakefield Cup Semi-final and of course the mud was to blame. David Treasure's tries up the Old Stand side, in the mud, against Swinton; what about Mike Lamb's try against Wigan in the 1973 Cup Third Round, when all our collective held breaths kept the touch judge's flag down. The list is endless. As endless as the millions who have watched the games at Odsal. The history of Rugby League and its folk-lore are inextricably entwined with our Odsal. The place was ever much more than railway sleepers, muck and weeds. Yet what's the point of all this? That Odsal is long gone. It went with the Old Stand and the arrival of pitch-level dressing rooms. I guess all my euologizing boils down to the fact that I hope this development does become a reality. I'm no fan of progress, but at present Odsal is neither developed nor left alone. If we can't go back, and even I accept

that we can't, then let's go the whole hog forward. If Northern are to be a part of these superstadium plans, then it can only do the club good in these days when profile is everything. Mind you, I remain unconvinced that the average Joe Blow fan will reap any benefits from the resultant spawning of uniformed, bloody little busy bodies that will be telling a person where they can and can't go. What about the roof you may well ask? Well, if you want a roof over your sport, go to the basketball! The price of progress is indeed a high one. But if there is a move to change the name, I strongly urge a universal manning of the barricades. Odsal is synonymous with Rugby League and sport as well as Bradford Northern and Bradford itself. The name must remain as a link to and in respect of a wonderful past. Why is it at times like this there's always a bright spark wanting to make a name for themselves and never mind whether it's the right or popular thing to do? Don't let them get away with it. I'm not aware of

the names being bandied about as alternatives, but calling Odsal something along the lines of the Bradford Superdome would be a piece of historical vandalism akin to calling Lawkholme Lane, Cougar Park. These people would had had Rolf Harris re-paint the Sistine Chapel, if they'd been in charge. Bradford Superdome is as about as inspired as calling the original Odsal, "Council Tip Incorporating Playing Field", or the City of Bradford, 'Area of Hilly Land with Houses'. Progress and change aren't necessarily the same thing so let's keep Odsal as Odsal at all costs. You've probably gathered this latest plan for the Odsal dream isn't exactly my cup of tea. However, given the lack of options, I acknowledge it's the best way to go. Anything that might give Northern a boost and push the club towards the top can't be all that bad. You never know, one day in the not too distant future, those pigs might well fly and there'll be no complaints from me if they're the good old 'Steam Pigs'.

Darrall Shelford, affectionately known as 'Inspector Gadget' because of his ability to extend his arm to score a try, joined us on the terraces at Lawkholme Lane, erm sorry 'Cougar Park', where there ... 'Cougars are hungry' and they have a Shetland pony as a mascot, which uncannily resembles a large ferocious cat. Entering Cougar Park does not immediately spark the strong emotions of being a Rugby League fan. To be subjected to hype and razzmatazz comparable to that of an American Football game is not entirely 'Rugby League'. Ordinarily, when supporters clash, they exchange the customary banter and conclude on a humorous note, a feeling that was completely lacking in some areas. 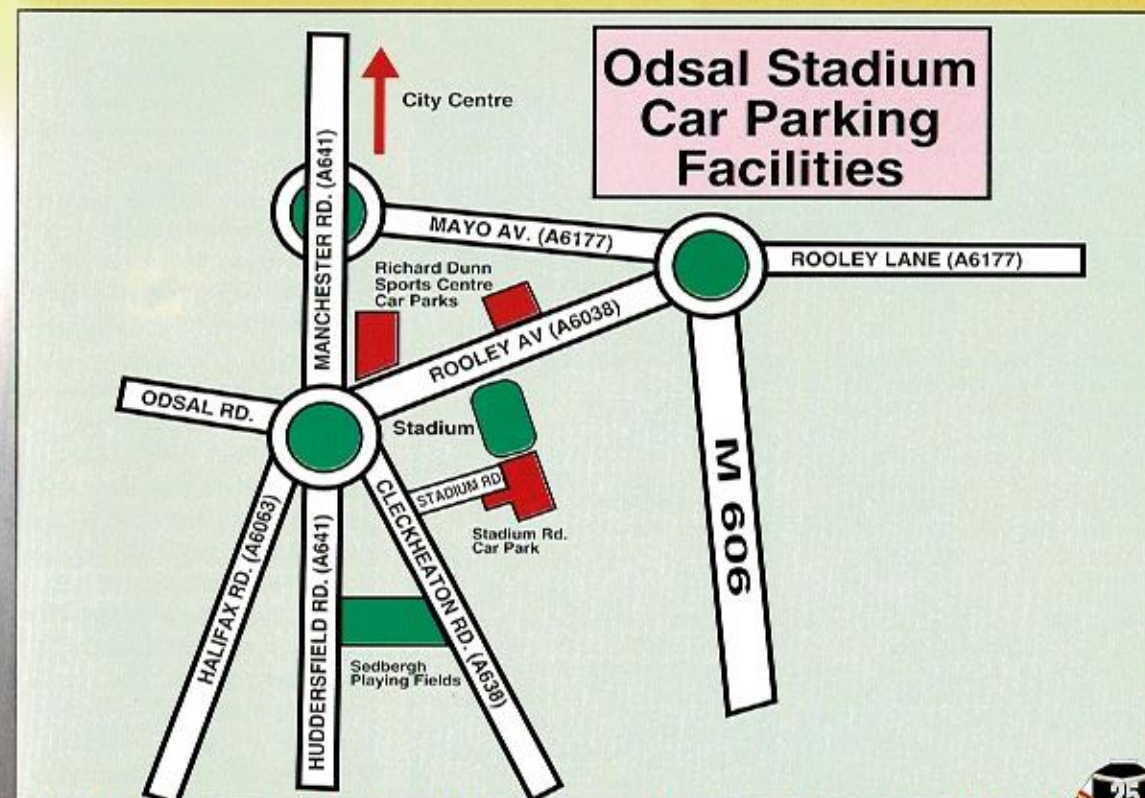

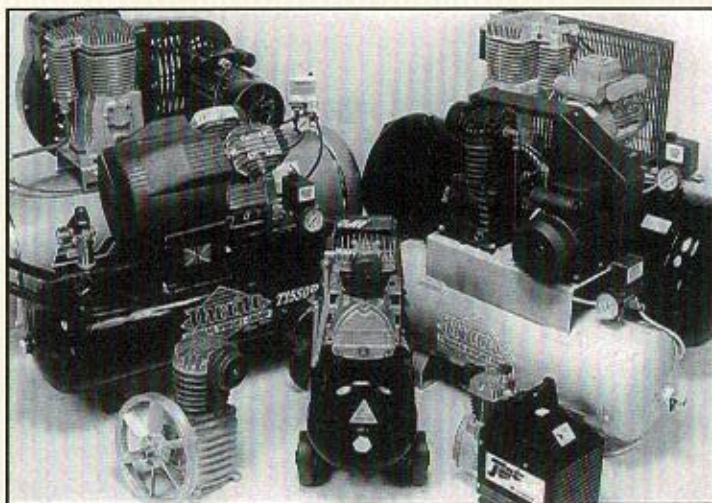

from where I sit | Martin Bass takes a look back at a hectic summer

This club is gearing itself up for success, everybody from our ambitious chairman Chris Caisley down to the newest supporter is hungry for that success. We all want to see Wigan's monopoly of the top honours smashed and everyone at Odsal is determined it will be Northern who do it. During the now traditionally hectic close season the club has strengthened both forward and back positions. The signing of French international David Fraisse from Sheffield, flying winger David Myers from Widnes. Talented youngsters Robbie Paul from New Zealand and Jason Donohue from Leigh all add competition for places to an already impressive back division. The introduction of Eugene Bourneville should add strength and power as well as create more forward options for coach Peter Fox.

Last season we played some incredibly entertaining open rugby, which is backed up by statistics that show we scored more tries than any of our first division rivals. This term promises to be even better. Let's face it, if we can improve on last season's League position by one, we'll be champions. The bridesmaid tag which has plagued this club in the past few years will be well and truly buried.

The signing of French international David Fraisse marks new ground at Odsal, as he is the first 'Gallic' player to join the Northern ranks. In fact, Northern/French links have been near non-existent in the past. Although in 1968 and 1972 Odsal staged GB/France Test matches both of which the Lions won. Even French club side touring this country have avoided the delights of a winter visit to Odsal. With the exception of Cote Basque XIII in 1936 who Northern beat 23-12 and the Roanne side of 1949 who managed to inflict a rare Odsal defeat on Dia Rees's team. At the end of the 1947/48

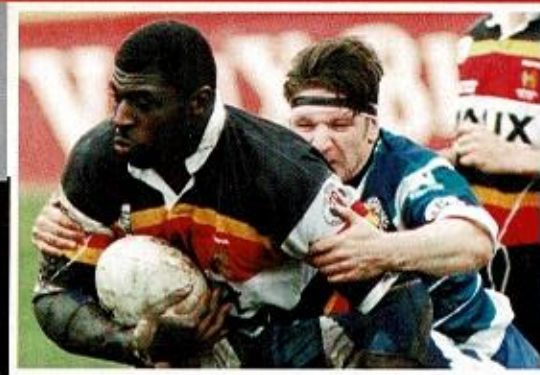
campaign Northern made a short 'tour' to France playing Toulouse Olympique on 15th May and Carcassonne the following day. The Bradford team being victorious in both clashes. David Fraisse has already shown his international calibre with some outstanding performances for the French national side, who have generally struggled with the demands of modern Test match rugby league. He was first capped at the age of 17 and has since been an automatic choice for the 'Tricolours'. David will no doubt feel proud and deservedly so, of being a member of the triumphant French side that humbled Mal Reilly's Lions at Headingley in 1990.

In 1992 French Rugby League was in mourning at what appeared to be the end of David Fraisse's playing career, in fact his life hung in the balance for a while as doctors plied their trade in repairing his battered body, after an horrendous motor bike accident, in which his broken collar bone and shoulder blade were minor injuries compared to his cerebral oedema (swelling of the brain). To add to these problems David was in a coma. When he awoke from the coma he remained in intensive care, David had total paralysis. Doctor's didn't know whether he would be able to move again, let alone continue his distinguished rugby league career. As can be seen today, David has shown tremendous courage and determination in making a full recovery. And while at Odsal will be doing his utmost to add to his French League and cup medals won with the Le Pontet and Carcassonne clubs. That is if we can manage to keep him off the Speedway track! The arrival of so many new faces at Odsal is tinged with a little sadness, because of the departure of the ever popular, four times winner of the

'Clubman of the Year' award Darrall Shelford. Darrall is the unfortunate victim of the restrictions on signing 'overseas' players. Darrall has served Northern's cause admirably since his arrival from New Zealand Rugby Union. Both on and off the field he has been the perfect ambassador for Bradford Northern and Rugby League in general. Since gaining a first-team spot soon after his arrival he's been one of the first names on the team sheet every week. His contribution to the team was not spectacular (neither is running water - but try living without it!) however, his consistency was of the highest order. His colleagues will confirm that he was an extremely reliable member of the team. Off the field Darrall assisted in local schools, coaching rugby league. Both Darrall and his wife Frances were always willing and able to help the supporters' club with any of its activities. I am sure I'm not alone in wishing Darrall and Frances, who expect their first child in early October, all the very best for the future.

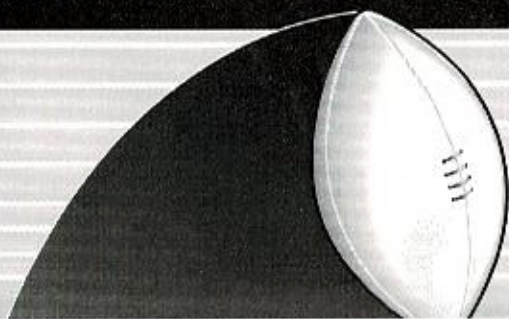

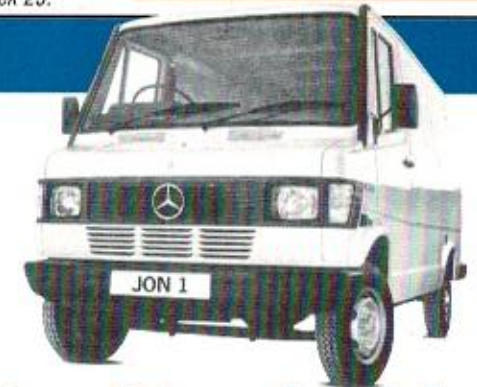

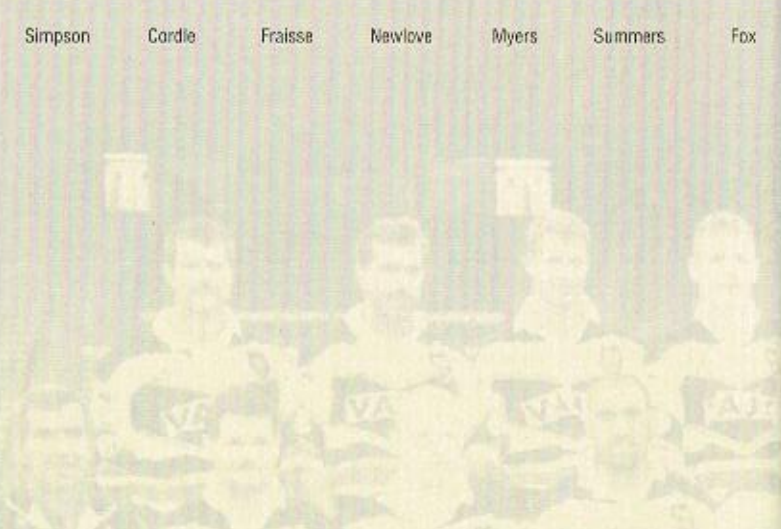
