With the Academy

Joung Airlie Birds definitely started with a tough one when they visited Central Park for their opening group match, It was a quiet changing room prior to the match and the Wigan Presence" appeared to affect the younger members of the squad. Hull in fact had the first chance when stand-off Kitching intercepted but was hauled down five metres short but then Wigan broke and a long range raid should have brought the opening points but Barrow dropped the ball over the line. Two against the head by hooker Danville out. Hull in a commanding position and with an overlap generated the referee gave Wigan offside and Harris kicked a simple goal. The Airlie Birds defended well and frustrated their opponents while Kitching once again broke away beating four defenders before losing the ball in the tackle ten metres from the line.

Wigan bounced straight back but it was a harsh penalty for holding down which saw Docherty level the scores with a straight penalty.

Wigan were now slightly on top and after holding out for half an hour the Hull defence was finally breached when loose-forward Hatton sailed through a gap and Docherty added the extras. Half time proved a turning point of the game when Prest was awarded a try. Hull failed to diffuse an extremely difficult

bomb which swifed in the wind dropping. between two defenders but when the Wigan player hacked on he was clearly offside and then failed to ground the ball because of obstruction from the Hull defence.

The touch judge signalled a 20 metre tap while the referee awarded a try but not a penalty try as originally thought. Wigan finally increased their lead when a bout of fine handling with a man always in support saw Hammill cross under the posts for Docherty to goal.

Hull kept the pressure on knocking the bigger Wigan pack out of their stride and once again Arro went close. Hull then stretched the ball wide as Dunning and Danville worked a run round which saw. Windass in at the corner. Although eventually losing 18-6 the performance was full of character.

The opening home game of this season saw the first ever visit to the Boulevard of an academy side from Keighley presumably a direct result of Cougar mania.

Hull dominated the opening quarter with Keighley failing to escape from their own half. Bone scored the first try when Gray stood up in the tackle to send the second rower over in the comer. The lead was increased when Sedman made good ground before Hull created the

overlap to send McCrapken in at the corner.

On 25 minutes the Cougars at last made Hull temtory and should have posted their opening points but Gibson sliped his penalty wide from in front of the posts. This encouraged Hull to open out and Dunning scored an excellent try.

Then came the try of the half as Hull slipped the ball in the tackle and supported each other before Gray raced away to the line, Kitching supported and went under the posts for Gray to add his third goal for a 22-0 interval

The Cougars had a better second period but Hull scrambled well and kept them at bay. Hull extended their lead when Sedman burst through to find Danville in support leaving an easy goal for Gray.

Darwille, from a great ball by Beet scuried in from 40 metres with Gray again adding a goal. After a scrappy bout of play Gray made a direct thrust for the posts and Dunning would have scored but was tackled without the ball. From the resultant penalty Roberts completed the 38-0 victory as he plunged over from close range. Hull actually ended the match with ten 16 year olds on view and two league points toward their quest for first division rugby.

Touchline View

I ull travelled across to Wheldon Road with high hopes of victory and fought out an even opening quarter trailing just 2-0 to a Tonk's penalty goal.

What happened next over the ensuing hour is not for the faint hearted as they struggled to a 20-0 interval deficit before finally going down 52-10, with the Tigers at one point scoring four tries in 6 minutes. without Hull touching the ball. Hull did manage a couple of tries, their first being the opening score of the second period. Richardson made useful ground and then Chico sent Stevens into a gap and the stand-off engineered a try for Barnard to score in the comer while Stevens added a fine touchline conversion.

The second try was the last in the match as Castleford knocked on from the kick-off and from the scrum Stevens went blind feeding Gray with a long ball and the winger stood his marker up before racing 20 metres to the corner. Gray nearly added another when he took Steven's asture kick to the corner but Wray just managed to tackle him short.

An all round improvement was witnessed with the visit of York and Hull made the perfect start when Cassidy burst blind to send Barnard in at the corner

York responded when the evergreen Mumby carved out an opening, but hooker Pallister dropped the ball over the line.

Hull increased the lead on ten minutes when Hewitt dummied his way over and added the goal, but York responded when Pallister made amends for his earlier mistake to wriggle over when O'Donnell failed to cover a kick ahead and Mumby added the goal and a penalty as York narrowly trailed

It proved end to end entertainment but there was only one further score in the opening half when Cassidy picked up from a scrum base before dragging three defenders over the line.

The second half opened with Windley scoring an excellent try, from a scrum, the young stand-off ran across field utilising angled runs from dummy runners before accelerating through a gap, while Hewitt's conversion opened up a 12 point lead.

York bounced back with O'Donnell having to be alert to put a ball shead and then an ankle tap by Richardson prevented Kettlestring scoring in the corner, Rushton twice made surging breaks putting over the trialist centre and Richard Wilson but both efforts were controversially disallowed by referee Shaw for forward passes. Windley was then taken out during a kick and chase but the clusive next score came in the final minute when after a fine break, Hewitt strolled through a huge gap to put Smith under the posts. Hewitt's goal made it 26-8.

A chance to establish Hulf's improvement came with the visit of Wigan. The crowd loved it, as they heckled Lydon and Cowie, a handful of sad Wigan supporters and saw Hewitt and Windley outplay former BARLA internationals Hatton and Murdock,

A Hewitt penalty opened up the scoring before Windley raced across field using his

centres as dummy runners to feed 0 'Donnell who immediately gave Donkin a half chance and the winger waitzed round his coposite. number to score in the corner while Hewitt converted off the touchline.

Hull defended resolutely as Wigan opened up and when Murdock was sent away by Lydon, Donkin raced back to make an excellent cover tackle five metres from the corner, From the position Hull were found guilty of holding down and Murdock kicked an angled penalty.

Just before the interval, Hewitt took the right option to drop a goal for a 9-2 interval lead. Sterling, making a return from injury was just held by his shorts but when the ball was worked wide Hewitt's kick was fumbled and Donkin snapped up his second try.

Hull continued to stretch Wigan and

Windley put a long pass out for Sterling totouch down in the comer. Hewitt missed a senalty and then had a bomb made dead as the pressure was maintained. Cassidy made storming break from the dropout and as Windley stopped the defence continued slicing across, leaving a hole which 0 Donnell strolled through and Hewitts kick made it 23-2.

Even though Wigan had the wind and ydon's boot they invariably kept Wigan genned in their own quarter.

Wigan scored their opening try on 70 nutes and deep into injury time they made e score respectable when Radinski ccepted a touchine pass. Murdock's goal ade # 23-12.





CHALLENGE CUP GLORY AND SCORING RECORDS

Dilly Batter's first season with the Hull FC dub coincided with their highest ever league placing of fourth behind leaders Huddersfield, Salford, and Wigan. They attained a 72.06% success rate with 24 victories and one draw from 34 fixtures but any Championship aspirations were soon ended by a 5-23 defeat at Huddersfield though Salford took the title with a tense 5-3 defeat of the Claret and Golds. That disappointment was more than consoled by Hull's first Northern Union Challenge Cup success, the more meritorious when it is recalled that League Champions Salford and Cup holders Huddersfield were overcome along the way. Hull's opponents in the final, played at Halifax on April 18th in the fateful year of 1914 were their conquerors of the 1908-09 final, Wakefield Trinity. The Airlie Birds emerged victorious in a closely fought encounter by 6 points to nil, their trysorers being Alf Francis and Jack Harrison. The Hull side which duly did duty on this occasion must be regarded as one of the strongest to have represented the club; Greg Rogers, Alf Francis, Bert Gilbert (Captain), Billy Batten, Jack Harrison, Jimmy Devereux, William Anderson, Bill Holder, Tom Herridge, Dick Taylor, Joe Hammill, Alf Grice, and Steve Darmody.

Further distinction for the club came with the selection of Welsh international wing three-quarter Alf Francis on Britain's second tour of Australia in 1914. Unfortunately Alf did not make the Test side which won the series 2-1, all three Tests taking place in Sydney. This tour became famous for the 'Rorke's Drift' third Test decider, named

British soldiers held off hordes of Zulus. The British team earned their glory by winning 14-6 after injuries reduced them to ten men for most of the second half. For a brief period they only had nine players. The drama began before the match. Already depleted by injuries, the tourists objected to playing a third Test match in eight days. A cable from headquarters in England urged them to go ahead, adding 'England expects every man to do his duty.' It brought a magnificent response and with the series level at 1-1, the tourists rose to the occasion at the Sydney Cricket Ground to regain the Ashes. The British crowned a most successful Tour with a 16-13 triumph over the Kiwis in Auckland.

after the battle in which outnumbered

In season 1914-15 Hull enjoyed more success finishing fifth in the League table behind Champions Huddersfield, Wigan, Leeds, and Rochdale Hornets and were beaten finalists in the Yorkshire Challenge Cup. going down heavily to the all conquering Huddersfield. Though Hull ended without any silverware their scoring prowess certainly came to the fore. In the 43 matches played the Airlie Birds accumulated 770 points, exceeding their previous best in 1898-99 of 616 and for the first time in the club's history an individual reached a century of goals; Ned Rogers who kicked exactly 100 goals. The club's tryscoring record was also smashed in impressive style, Jack Harrison notching 52 touchdowns easily outdoing Alf Francis' tally of 27 in 1910-11 and that record still stands today.

Jack Harrison remembered

■ ack Harrison will always take special place in Hull's history not only for his deeds on the field but also off it in military service. A Hullborn schoolmaster Jack was a prolific pointscorer during his four seasons with the Boulevard club with 106 tries and 2 goals and he headed the first team's tryscorers chart for three of those seasons. His greatest facets were an electrifying burst of speed, a unique bodyswerve, and ability to score tries while working in the minimum amount of space. He made his Hull debut in 1912, alongside the Australian debutants, Herbert Gilbert and Stephen Darmody, and will be best remembered for his try in Hull's first Challenge Cup success of 1914. Three years later Harrison was reported missing in Maly 1917 after his selfless deeds and conspicuous gallantry on the western front and posthumously brought

distinction to the Hull club and Northern Union by being awarded the Military Cross and the Victoria Cross.

WARTIME DISRUPTION

The Hull club continued with varying success during the war years, difficulty being encountered in raising teams owing to Service calls. With the cessation of hostilities in 1918, the club was able once more to field something like a representative side and the end of the season saw the Boulevarders in the proud possession of the Yorkshire League Cup. From 16 fixtures they achieved a 81.25% success rate finishing comfortably clear of Leeds and Bramley. Hull's neighbours Hull KR occupied seventh place in a League comprising eleven clubs with Bradford Northern at the wrong end of the ladder.

JACK HARRISON was posthumously awarded the Military Cross and the Victoria Cross for outstanding gallantry in 1917. He is also the Club's record try scorer with 52 in one season. Oldham

ORIGINS

ne of the pioneer members of the Northern Union, Oldham were one of the game's first successful clubs, occupying a top four placing in the League Championship between 1905-06 and 1910-11. They also reached the play-off final in the first five years of it's existence, winning two against local rivals Wigan and losing the others to Hunslet, Halifax and Wigan. They also became the first Lancashire club to win the Rugby League Challenge Cup in 1899, with a 19-9 defeat of Hunslet at Maine Road before a crowd of 15,763. Oldham's early games were played at Glodwick Mill, with their first opponents being Stalybridge. They then moved, briefly, to Clarksville, and then, in 1889, to their present Watersheddings home, opening with a match against Swinton.

COUNTY SUCCESS

Oldham dominated the early days of Lancashire Cup football, gaining four triumphs between 1907-19 over Broughton Rangers, Swinton, Wigan and Rochdale Hornets, their success being influenced by some outstanding players such as the long-serving Cumbrian forward Joe Ferguson, who appeared in no less than 634 matches. between 1899 and 1923, and Jim Lomas, the first Lions tour captain in 1910. The Roughyeds enjoyed consecutive County Cup successes in 1957, 1958 and 1959 but have not won the now defunct competition since, their last final appearances being in 1987 and 1990, going down to Wigan and Warrington respectively.

CHALLENGE CUP DISAPPOINTMENT

Oldham added to their Challenge Cup triumph of 1899 with successes in 1925 and 1927 over Hull K.R and Swinton but have yearned for such gory in the intervening years with a Wembley place continuing to elude them; they endured disappointing semifinal defeats in 1934, 1964, 1986, 1990 and 1991. Even Oldham's

outstanding post-war side of the late 1950s failed to reach Wembley. With the great goal-kicker Bernard Ganley (who landed a world-record of 219 goals in 1957-58), the brilliant Test centre Alan Davies, and forwards Derek Turner, Charlie Winslade, Syd Little and Keith Jackson, the Twin Towers still eluded them. The 1960s saw the break-up of that great side but, in 1964, after relegation from the first division, they went agonisingly close to a Wembley debut. In their semi-final against Hull KR, Oldham were saved from defeat only by a last-minute Len Mointyre drop-goal at Headingley, but led the Robins 17-14 in the twelfth minute of extra-time in the Station Road replay, when light faded and the match was abandoned. They then lost the second replay at Fartown by 12 points to 2. The Roughyeds were just as close in 1990 going down 6-10 to Warrington but the following year were unfortunate to be paired with Cup Kings Wigan at Bolton Wanderers' football ground Burnden Park.

TOP POINTSCORERS

One man in particular Bemard Ganley dominates Oldham's scoring records. He became the first goal-kicker to pass the 200-goal barrier, in 1957-58, and again led the field with 190 in 1958-59, creating Oldham records for goals in a match (fourteen v Liverpool City in 1958), in a season (200 in 1957-58) and in a career (1365). His career aggregate of 2775 points is another dub record. A playing colleague of Ganley, Alan Davies holds the club record of 174 tries, also going onto become their most-capped footballer.

COACHES

Oldham have never been able to enjoy consistency in their hierarchy, an incredible seventeen coaching appointments having been made in the last two decades. Only one man, Frank Myler has held the reins more than once and his period in charge between June 1984 and April 1987 is the

longest spell. Last season former Australian Test loose forward Bob Lindner guided the Roughyeds to First Division safety having taken over from fellow countryman Peter Tunks who lost his job after Oldham's nightmare start to the campaign. Unfortunately Lindner has returned to his homeland and Oldham's fortunes now lie in the hands of one of their own sons, Andy Goodway who made his name at the Watersheddings before moving onto Wigan where he enjoyed remarkable success and later Leeds. Goodway is obviously a novice in the coaching world but if he leams as rapidly as he did as a player then Oldham will be the benefactors.

INTERNATIONALS

Oldham have always been big contributors to the international arena, over forty individuals having donned the Great Britain jersey. Their most capped player is the legendary Alan Davies who accumulated 20 caps between 1955-60 whilst Goodway himself represented his country on eleven occasions between 1983-85. Goodway was one of five outstanding products of Oldham's highly acclaimed youth policy of the late 1970s who accompanied their coach, Frank MMer on the Lions tour Down Under in 1984, giving the club it's biggest tour representation. The other tourists were forwards Mick Worrall and Terry Flanagan and backs Ray Ashton and Des Foy.

TRANSFERS AND PLAYING TALENT

Like so many other clubs, Oldham have had their financial problems but the more immediate concern is up front. in the forwards. Coach Andy Goodway has stepped down as a player, former player coach Bob Lindner has moved onto Queensland Crushers and promising young prop Barrie McDermott has taken on a new challenge at all conquering Wigan. Former Castleford utility player Gary Lord has moved across the Pennines from Halifax and Cumbrian Paul Davidson has been

recruited from Widnes, but the Roughyeds are still down on power for top flight football as early results suggest and another relegation battle seems likely. Last season they beat the drop finishing fourth from bottom after a lengthy spell in the bottom two following a dreadful start. They'll also be without Australian stand-off Glen Liddiard who played such an important role in that climb to safety and they've brought Oldharn-born Steve Gartland up from second division rugby with Rochdale Homets to fill the gap. But if they can't consolidate the pack then the talented back line is bound to suffer.



t was their first match of a new season and Hull FC were due to open their fixtures against their old nivals from Oldham.

Despite the high class performances of Steve 'Knocker' Norton and Vince Farrar, the Airlie Birds had been relegated the previous season and now faced the task of bouncing back at the first attempt.

The shrewd buying skills of coach Arthur Bunting had added points machine Geoff 'Sammy' Lloyd and Iron Man Charlie Stone to his squad, signed from Castleford and Featherstone respectively.

Those who turned up at The Boulevard for the Oldham match were to witness the start of an unprecedented unbeaten run and a new era in Hull FC's history.

Hull ran out 62-10 winners and a new hero was hailed at The Boulevard! Sammy Lloyd kicked 14 goals from 14 attempts - from all over the park, the man simply could not miss!

And so the Black and White army embarked upon a crusade of crushing victories and the songs of "Oh Sammy, Sammy" and "Old Faithful" echoed around not only the Boulevard but every defeated opponents ground as the triumphant procession of victories rolled on.

Hull played with flair and power, records tumbled until with 25 straight league victories they faced Hunslet at The Boulevard. The winner would take the Championship.

This was a close fought low-scoring finale to an incredible season for both clubs and how they fought for victory on that never to be forgotten night.

The tension and excitement was unbelievable and has probably only been matched when Hull ran the invincible 1982 Australians so close to defeat.

As the final whistle blew and the mud splattered heroes took their deserved applause from the adoring fans, a new page in Rugby League history was written.

As the Guiness Book of Records shows Hull FC had won every one of their 26 league matches!!


