

FROM THE BOARDROOM

ON behalf of everyone at Watersheddings I would like to extend a big welcome to the directors, players and supporters of the St Helens club.

After an in auspicious start to the season, Saints are now in full cry and anyone who has seen them on television recently must have warmed to their exciting brand of rugby.

Wingers Anthony Sullivan and Allan Hunte have been running in the tries, Steve Prescot has emerged as a young full-back of exciting attacking potential and the team as a whole has been producing the brand of football for which Saints are renowned. But it hasn't happened by accident. If anyone knows a good scrum-half and a good centrethreequarter it must surely be the Saints chairman Eric Ashton MBE. Eric was a wonderful centre with Wigan and Great Britain. I'm sure he must have a chuckle when he thinks back to the signing-on fee he got from Wigan and compares it with the contract Saints paid out to land Scott Gibbs from Welsh Rugby Union.

Older fans who recall Eric's playing days won't find many similarities either in the modern games or in the style of centre play which tempted Saints to bring Scott up from the Valleys to Knowsley Road and follow in the footsteps of so many of his fellow countrymen.

Nevertheless, the signing of the Welshman was a major coup. Strong with the ball in his hands, Gibbs can also tackle a bit. He has given the Saints back division a new dimension - truly a signing that rivalled Wigan's more recent

capture of Scott Quinnell from Llanelli for a reported £400,000. While Eric was in his pomp at Central Park, of course, there was a young man in a No 7 jersey at Knowsley Road who could also play a bit. Alex Murphy was the name and I wonder if Saints have got the "new Murphy" in Bobby Goulding.

By all accounts, Bobby is the key man in the Saints set-up: the man who makes them tick. Formerly with Wigan, Leeds and Widnes, Goulding is playing at the top of his form and is pushing hard for a place in the Great Britain side for the first Test against the Kangaroos at Wembley on October 22.

Many judges in the game reckon Goulding should wear the No 7 jersey for Britain with Shaun Edwards switching to stand-off, such has been the impact he has made since Saints hit the winning road after defeats by Doncaster and Warrington in their opening two games.

The expensive signings of Gibbs and Goulding seem to be proving money well spent by Saints, who currently lie fourth in the table and will give our Oldham boys a tough test in a match which will be filmed by Sky Television and put out tonight.

Former Oldham players Chris Joynt and Tommy Martyn are also in the Saints camp these days. Tommy is injured just at present and is out of the limelight, but good luck to Chris on his attempt to get into the Test team for the Wembley showdown.

My congratulations from the boardroom also go to Andy Goodway, his coaching staff and



players for recent results which have seen us beat Doncaster and Hull in consecutive Stones Bitter Championship games and progress to the second round of the Lancashire Shield at the expense of Saints, who were beaten 46-22 here at Watersheddings.

To beat Saints on the Friday night at Alliance level and then go to the Boulevard and win 21-17 in a first division clash on the Sunday gave everyone a big lift behind the scenes and was due reward for all the hard work that is being out in. Finally, it would be remiss if I did not give a big Watersheddings welcome to our new signings from New Zealand, Jason Temu and Wilson Marsh. They were expected to arrive on Friday and link up with their fellow countryman Joe Faimalo to complete our overseas quota for this season.

These three young men are a long way from home and are here to do their best for Oldham RLFC. If you see them around make them feel welcome



CLOSE UP ON ST. HELENS

Our visitors in detail

ANTHONY SULLIVAM: £80,000 signing from Hull KR, has already represented Great Britain at U21's level. This son of former Boulevard favourite (Clive Sullivan) seems destined for greatness if he continues to progress. Very quick and elusive.

SONNY NICKLE: Saint's £80,000 buy from Sheffield Eagles. Has really captured the imagination of the St, Helens public. Well built at 5'11' and 15 stone is one of the fastest forwards in the game.

JOHN HARRISON: Joined Saints in 1987 from local amateur side Haresfinch, standing 6'7', John is very awkward to tackle. He became a 1st team regular towards the end of the 198/89 season and was unfortunate to miss out on the Wembley place due to an injury in 1989 but deservedly took a Wembley 'bow in 1991.

PHIL VEIVERS: He made his Saints debut in October 1984 arriving from Brisbane Souths. Quickly established himself as a very safe and steady full-back. Phil has played in five finals with Saints and was 'Player of the Year' in 1988 and 1989. He moved to the centre and has also played loose forward and stand off.

BERNARD OWYER: Signed from local amateur side Hare & Hounds in 1984. Bernard has become a 1st team regular in the back row over the last couple of seasons. His game is based on a very solid defence and is very much in the 'Australian Mould'. Bernard has also converted to the No. 9 position with great success.

SHAME COOPER: Highly respected club captain who is regarded as being one of the best stand off-loose forwards in the world. New Zealand international who toured Great Britain in 1985. He made his Saints debut in October 1987 and led Saints to the 'John Player Trophy' in 1988. Shane scored 6 tries in a game against Hull in February 1988 to equal a club record.

CHRIS JOYNT: Back row signed from Oldham in September 1992 and has since represented Great Britain in the match in France. Chris, a Wiganer, has been really impressive since joining Saints and has good speed and an excellent work rate.

JONATHAN GRIFFITHS: Signed before 1989 'Premiership Trophy Final' in a blaze from Llaneli R.U.F.C. and scored a brace of tries on his Saints debut at Sheffield on the opening day of the1989/90 season. Jonathan is a very strong, powerful runner who has bags of potential and should have a great future in the game. PAUL LOUGHLIN: Joined Saints from local amateurs II.G.B. ARLFC and made his debut in March 1984 against Oldham at Knowsley. Road. He toured Down Under with Great Britain in 1988 and has kicked over 100 goals in each of his last four seasons. Set up a club record in September 1986 when he kicked 16 goals and scored 40 points in a Lancashire Cup tie against Carlisle.

DAVID LYON: Full-back who joined Saints from Warrington in September 1992 after earlier success period with Widnes. He is a very dependable player and a shrewd tactician who excels in joining the three quarters to make the extra man in attacking positions.

AUGUSTINE O'DONNELL: A very successful utility player who can perform equally well at half-back or hooker. Augustine joined Saints from Wigan in a deal which cost the Knowsley Road Club £80,000. Another Wigan based player.

MIKE RILEY: From limited opportunity he has emerged as a top winger, winning medals in the 1991 Lancashire Cup Final and last season's 'Premiership Trophy' final when he looked more than a match for Martin Offlah.

ADAM FOGERTY: Joined Saints this season from Halifax. Son of Terry, former Wigan and Halifax favourite. Tall and powerful ex-boxer signed for Halifax January 1991. Arrived at Saints on "Free".

LES QUIRK; Signed from Barrow in October 1987. He finished as the club's leading try scorer in 1988 and 1989. During 1988/89 Les broke a 50 year club record by scoring tries in 10 consecutive matches and scored 2 vital tries which took Saints to Wembley in 1989.

ALAN HUNTE: In his first full season Alan Innished up as Saints top try scorer with 21 tries in 35 appearances and scored a try in his Great Beitain U21 debut in France. Saints signed him in February 1989 from East Moore A.R.L.F.C. He made his debut on 1st March 1989 against Oltham and scored a brace of tries. THE GROWING GAME

Many of you will have seen the curtain raiser games played at Watersheddings over the past twelve months and wondered about the mini posts that we use. Well now I can reveal the secret. They are part of the Puma Little League kit which was launched last week. Puma Little League is the way that Rugby League will be introduced to children in the future. Under 9 year olds will play mini league which is 9 a side and played to very basic rules designed to allow players the maximum in participation and enjoyment whilst learning to play Rugby League. Although most of the players who play before the games are actually under 11's they are playing mini league because many are

beginners and it allows two games to be played across the pitch.

After mini league the young players move on to play Modified Rules which is 11 a side and introduces scummaging, field kicking and marker defence. As you can see this is a progression along the route of the full rules. It does, however, allow new players to learn the basic skills of the game whilst being fully involved in playing.

When the players move to Under 12 they are more ready to play the full rules of the game. Each player has greater skill and understanding of the game and we hope to ensure more players trying Rugby League and sticking with it. Puma Little League is good for

Rugby League. Anyone with an interest can start a team. The Puma Little League kit bags contain two sets of posts, marker cones, 2 match balls, whistle pump, video and booklets in fact all you need to supply are a dozen children and a piece of grass and your on your way to your own team.

I would like to see Puma Little League teams established at each Amateur club in Oldham plus other new clubs serving Failsworth, Chadderton, Hathershaw, and in fact, every area of the town. The only way this will happen, however, is for Rugby League people to volunteer to open up our great game to hundreds of new young players if you are one of that special breed please contact me on 627 4497.
