





fans and the club in general, we




must win this afternoon. One thing is for sure, our preparation this week has all been geared towards us getting two points out of todays game.

he Australians arrived on Thursday 29th September and had the first game of their tour against Cumbria last Sunday with the Roos victorious 52-8. Cumbria's best included Steve McCurrie (Widnes), Jon Roper (Warrington), Martin Birkett (Salford) and John Neill (St. Helens) but they couldn't deny the power, pace and sheer skill of the tourists although they were not disgraced. Torrential rain hampered the handling for both sides, as it did for all matches west of the Penninest Wendell Sailor was sensational with two tries as were the other debut boys. Bobby Fulton was realistic in his approach saying 'we will see how the boys do against stronger opposition before we start jumping up and down' with the Aussies playing Leeds (5.10.94) and Wigan (8.10.94) with Castleford next Wednesday (12.10.94) they will certainly get a feel for the tougher opposition' sooner rather than later. As rugby league gears itself up for the first test at Wembley on Saturday 22nd October the battle still rages over whether Ellery Hanley will choose Garry Schofield for his team let alone as captain. The usual comments of 'if he has not been good enough for Leeds, is he good enough for GB? have been bandied around. But Gary certainly got to grips with the game against Castleford last week coming on as sub. After a shaky start he showed touches of brilliance particularly in setting up Hanleys try and his experience in facing the Aussies

would be an asset, although saying that the decision is not cut and dry when that would mean either Bobby Goulding or Shaun Edwards taking a sideline seat which doesn't seem plausible the way they have been performing. Goulding is inspirational and without him Saints would be struggling, it was only Bobby's genius which beloed Saints clinch a draw against Oldham in the dying minutes of the game last week and claim a 26-10 win over Sheffield Eagles the week before. Sheffield were nilled by Widnes last weekend 0-22, going down without scoring a point for the first time in their ten year history. Sheffield didn't get it together at all and Widnes hit them with a cast fron defence which left the Eagles short on options and ideas. Gary Hetherington had been away all week on GB duties as assistant coach and Sheffield weren't further helped by the none appearance of Canberra prop Paul Osborne who was due to fly in on Friday but didn't arrive, Sheffield have certainly been unlucky in their picking of overseas players Daryl Trindall leaving after one week because his son is ill, but he is also quoted as saying he will not return because of the poor treatment that he received. Bradford remain top of the table with eight wins from eight although they were made to fight all the way at the Boulevard last week. Although this clash meant top side meeting bottom side it wasn't always obvious which side was which. Hull were defending an impressive record against Bradford with Northern not winning at the Boulevard since 1988.

Their first triumph there in 13 visits was sealed in the 62nd minute when Bradford won a scrum against the head inside the Hull quarter to see Watson over just to the left of the uprights. Hull showed their best form of the season and the arrival of their third Kiwi Tevita Vaikona at centre went some way to nullifying the threat of Paul Newlove. Hull face Sheffield today and unless the Eagles get it together Hull could claim their first win of the season which would be an enormous confidence boost for them as they travel to Belle Vue next week. We went down 46-0 at Central Park last week in a game best forgotten, too many handling errors in our own half gave Wigan the possession they needed to keep up their unbeaten record after they won at Castleford two weeks ago 28-21 in a game which saw Richard Goddard score two tries to give Castleford a chance of victory. It was only the goalkicking which separated the two teams, Castleford failed on two conversions late in the game which could have seen them win 32-31 but it was not to be. Last weekend Castleford had the memorable draw against Leeds at Headingley. Castleford looked all at sea for the first twenty minutes until Lee Crooks came on as sub. Crooks had missed the last game against Wigan through a back injury but was instrumental in Castleford's revival in the second half to see them share the points. Crooks had spent ten minutes in the sin bin after a late tackle on Hanley after he had scored a try for Leeds making it an eight point try, with the penalty but

minutes after returning to the field it was Crooks who kicked a penalty to draw the match. With the best of Cumbria playing, Featherstone, Warrington, Workington and Halifax all had a free weekend with Workington travelling to Featherstone (Tues 4/10/94) Salford and Doncaster were the other two teams to play last Sunday and it was Salford who hung on to take the points 22-12. Doncaster were 22-0 down after 40 minutes, at this point tempers began to fray and referee Mr Presley had a job on his hands to keep the peace. Forber was sin binned for Salford and Turner for Doncaster both for foul play, but in different incidents. Garry Jack will be breathing a sigh of relief after Salfords first win in five matches whilst Doncasters Tony Fisher looks to have some problems

Oldham come to Belle Vue today after two emphatic wins against Doncaster and Hull (44-8) and (17-21) respectively, and then last week they held St. Helens to a draw, although if it were not for Bobby Goulding leading Saints out of the mire, Oldham would have had both of the points.


Nigel Heslop has started the last three games in the number one shirt a former England RU winger, he won ten caps for his country before joining from Orrell RU club in February 1993. Last weekend, Wally Gibson, a firm favourite with the Oldham crowd, came on as a substitute to replace Heslop. On this day one of the finest attacking full backs in the game, Wally made his name with Huddersfield before joining Oldham two years ago and playing havoc with the best defences in the league. David Jones has held a regular wingers jersey since joining Oldham from Wakefield, a former Wigan St. Pats David had a spell in Australia during the close season, and will be looking to cross the whitewash today in front of his old team mates. Scott Ranson holds the other wingers shirt, the twenty five year old joined from Swinton, where he was their top try scorer, in March 1992, Ranson also had a spell with St. Helens. The centre spots at Oldham are currently being occupied by Shaun Irwin and Darren Abram. Irwin, a former Castleford player moved to Oldham in 1992 in the move that took Richard Russell to Castleford. Darren Abram began his career at Warrington before moving to Trafford Borough and then onto Rochdale for £40,000 in 1991. A prolific try scorer at Rochdale he was listed at £70,000 when Oldham snapped him up in February 1993

beating off Salford and Featherstone in the battle. Paul Topping currently holds the number six jersey for Oldham after signing from Leigh in the summer of 1993. Oldham's top points scorer last season, he made a remarkable recovery after surgery on a groin injury which gave him problems last season. Topping started his career as full back with Swinton and although he is happiest at stand off he can play full back, centre, or even loose forward and is Oldhams goalkicker. Martin Crompton was Oldham's star buy last season at-£35,000 from Wigan. Crompton is one to be watched, he gained a drop goal in the game against Hull and is best known for his tacticle kicks, after regathering his own 'bomb' against Doncaster to score a try under the posts. Oldham have a wealth of players who can perform in their pack but at the moment their current prop forwards are Chris Parr and Ian. Sherratt. Parr began his professioned career with Huddersfield where he gained GB U21 honours. From there he moved to Swinton where things didn't work out but he moved to Oldham in exchange for John Maxwell and has held a regular first team spot since then. Ian Sherratt is a a hard working prop forward, originally with Salford he returned to Oldham in the 1991/2 season and was voted players player of the season last season. Oldhams hooking spot goes to John Clarke, he came straight out of BARLA youth rugby last season and made the number

player of the year award more than once, he also gained international experience with the BARLA young Lions who toured Australia in 1993. Gary Lord and Joe Faimalo are in the second row for Oldham they are both newcomers to the club, and have both made a big impact on the side. Gary Lord has played at Castleford and Leeds before being signed from Halifax for £35,000 after the fee was fixed by tribunal. Gary is the brother of former Oldham player Paul Lord. Joe Faimalo is proving to be a powerful strong running forward. The Kiwi joined Oldham this year and is the younger brother of Esene Faimalo who is currently at Leeds. Mike Kuiti is a New Zealand International of great repute who deserves great respect. The strong running loose forward played in GB and France in 1989 with the touring Kiwis and has been selected eight times in his career. Kuiti has played for Swinton, Leeds and Rochdale twice. He has a good eye for taking and making scoring opportunities and has been a great asset at Oldham, being able to turn games with his powerful runs, Oldham, then have the likes of Jason Temu, Steve Gartland, Paul Davidson and Craig Richards all queuing up for that first team spot.

After their draw against St. Helens, Oldham are currently 11th in the league table with 5 points from 7 games, two places above us with 4 points from 7 games. Last season we managed a last gasp victory here at Belle Vue 22-21 in front of 3882 supporters, with the return match at Oldham ending in a draw when in the last minute of the game Andy Wilson latched onto a long pass from David Hobbs and screamed down the touch line to score beneath the sticks. Henry Paul missed the conversion and the points were halved after the twenty all draw. This season the points are just as important for both sides and a tight battle is expected from both sides.

MARTYN SADLER, THE EDITOR OF LEAGUE EXPRESS, CONSIDERS THE IMPLICATIONS OF A PREMIER LEAGUE.

At a time when the game is awash with talk of a Premier League and threats of a breakaway movement by the game's leading clubs, any Trinity supporter would have to ask what the future is likely to hold here at Belle Vue.

Although I am writing this column before the crucial meeting of the clubs which was due to make this decision about

meeting of the clubs which was due to make this decision about the future of the game last Wednesday, only a fool would fail to recognise that Rugby League itself is at a crucial crossroads.

For 99 years we have failed to break out of our heartland. For most of the game's existence that didn't matter. Sport was a localised pastime. In fact there were certain advantages in being a Rugby League fan when the farthest journey you ever had to make was to Cumbria or, if you were lucky, to Wembley. It would have been inconvenient and expensive if we had had to travel to places like Bristol, Birmingham and Southampton. It's much easier to travel to Castleford, Featherstone and Batley. But these days professional sport is played on a national and international scale. Whereas at one time there were few sports that were worthy of widespread media coverage. Nowadays the sporting world is a very competitive market. Our young people can choose to play and watch many games other than rugby, soccer and cricket. Rugby League, unfortunately,

Rugby League, unfortunately, fails to register much of a presence in the national media. There are many reasons for the game's limited impact, but one of the most important must be the fact that League is still limited to the North, apart from

the London outpost in Barnet.
If the game is really to develop an elite competition that the media will take an interest in, and that sponsors will support, we ultimately must have clubs in that League from all over the country.

In that case, it's easy to imagine that there may be no more than four or five teams from West Yorkshire. Leeds will be there as will Bradford. Huddersfield, playing in the new Alfred McAlpine Stadium would be another logical choice. You might also include Halifax. although they would need a better ground. If they couldn't get one they would probably merge with Huddersfield. Then there would be one club in the Wakefield district. Would that club be Trinity? It would certainly carry the Wakefield name, but it may not play at Belle Vue. It may be a new club resulting from a

Match Reports

WAKEFIELD 15 FEATHERSTONE 0

Trinity's run of four successive losses in a row ended on Sunday 25th September with a magnificent win over Featherstone Rovers. Not only did Trinity win but Featherstone were nilled, in an encounter which saw Aaron Whittaker, celebrating his New Zealand call up, scoring 10 of Trinity's 15 points. Wakefield began the game as underdogs according to BBC Radio Leeds, and Steve Martin, the Featherstone coach said he was 'confident of taking the two points'.' In the eleventh minute Whittaker opened the scoring after Gunn was penalised for punching in the tackle. Soon after Whittaker was on hand again to take Trinity further into the lead. The ball was handed to Whittaker on the last tackle and he made as if to kick down field, but a 'nifty' side step saw him round the charging Gary H Price and dash fifty vards to the try line for the first touchdown of the game. The angle of the conversion was too great but Wakefield had a 6-0 lead. Rovers had a chance to equalise in the 26th minute when Aston and Divet combined offloading the ball to Butt giving him another chance to go over in the corner. Big Bob' Piva had other ideas and launched a bone crunching tackle on Butt which almost put him in the stand! Either side could have scored on the run up to half time but Trinity's defence stood firm under pressure and they maintained their six nil lead, The Featherstone following were expecting better things in the second half and Wakefield were waiting for Rovers to go on the rampage after the team's roasting in the dressing room by

Martin. Only Ropati and Divet showed


signs of improvement in the second half

whilst Trinity looked confident both in defence and attack and tackled Rovers out of the game. Featherstone made repeated handling errors throughout the second half, mainly forced through the ferocity of the Trinity tackling, which gave Wakefield most of the second half possession. Lee Hanlan continued making darting runs from dummy half and was a thorn in Featherstones' side for most of the afternoon, throughout the final forty minutes Wakefield played safe rugby slowly chipping away at the Featherstone game plan and were happy to take a drop goal from Bailey on the 56th minute meaning that Featherstone had to score twice. Minutes later Gary Christie missed the line by inches after a flying tackle by Gibson denied hier the try, and if Wakefield had scored here then surely the floodgates would have opened However, Featherstone stuck to their defensive task and the next score for Wakefield came from a Whittaker penalty on the 72nd minute which sealed the game. Three minutes later Adrian Flynn went over for another try effectively burying Featherstone hopes of a last minute victory. Wakefield gave everything as a team and the effort was superb all round. The crowd were delighted with the two points which shot us up the League table into tenth place and gave us a much needed confidence boost before our trip over the Pennines to Central Park and our first meeting of the season

WIGAN REPORT

Things didn't go exactly as planned at Wigan, in fact things didn't go at all. The poor weather conditions made the going hard for both sides but Trinity seemed to suffer more, giving up too much possession at crucial times throughout the game. Two minutes from half time the defence was stretched again and Offiah went over for his first try of the afternoon. The half time score stood at 18-0 and Trinity looked a little hard done by due to the good defence they had put up but at 18-0 the task ahead made a win look out of reach. During the second half Wigan ran in another five tries, Henry Paul scored twice. Offiah claimed his second and Connolly notched up a further two to give him his hat-trick. Wigan didn't look to be firing on all cylinders, but there again they didn't need to. Trinity didn't get out of 'neutral' all afternoon and although no team in the League would expect to travel to Central Park and win. it would have been nice to score at least one try. Being nilled is not an experience I wish to repeat and I now know how Featherstone felt two weeks ago but at least we have the 'excuse' of being nilled by the champions. The League Express said the game breaker was Botica's second minute penalty which put the result beyond doubt." This is not the case but I did have a little titter at it as did most folk. Basically it was a game to forget and least we can say we've been to Wigan and don't have to go again for another year - unless we are lucky enough to draw them in the cup again!

He was chosen to represent Lancashire Schools at County level for the U13 and U16 age groups and picked for the England Schoolboys U16 team against France who won all their games. He played for this age group twice at lifteen and once

Turning professional on his seventeenth birthday, Ian was signed on by Wigan R.L.F.C. and he had his debut with the Wigan first team whilst he was still only seventeen years old. Throughout his younger years from 17-19 Ian played with the Colts team at Wigan and was also asked to represent his country again in the Great Britain Colts U19 against France when Great Britain won.

During this tour he was playing alongside Mike Forshaw, Denis Betts, Gary H. Price and Paul Newlove. In the Great Britain U21 age group Ian represented his country no less than six times, each time against France and each time coming away victorious

victorious. His experience in the Colts side both for Wigan and Great Britain earned Ian a full time place in the Wigan first team and during his spell there he won numerous medals, including a Challenge Cup winners medal when Wigan beat Warrington at Wembley in 1990. He also has Regal Trophy medals, Premiership medals and numerous Charity Shield medals. He was also pan of the Wigan party to Australia last summer who beat the Brisbane Broncos in the World Club Challenge. Ian had an operation on his achilles tendon only a week before this game and unfortunately was unable to play, but the choice had been have the operation and miss the Bronco's game or play the game and miss the start of the season. With a move in mind, Ian opted to have the operation early knowing the first few weeks at a new club are very important in the "settling in period*,

Ian has been a life long friend of Mike Forshaw and a training partner and with Mike's involvement with the club he learnt of the new set up and coaching staff and recognised that Trinity were building a team for the future which he wanted to be part of. Not everyone can understand a player moving from a club like Wigan to a lower placed club like Wakefield. The advantages of playing for Wigan are immense as long as you are playing, but it is no good having the credentials of Ian and sitting on the side-line. Nigel Wright was Trinity's star player but a move to Wigan has seen him play only a handful of first team games and the rest in the 'A' team, and although the Wigan 'A' team is outstanding not surprisingly, it still hasn't got the bite of first team rugby which every player needs. This being the case Ian decided to join Wakefield on a one year contract and is confident about the future. The start may look a little bit rocky with two wins from six but teams like Bradford. Wigan and Halifax were never going to be easy and the only big disappointment this season is the loss against Doncaster. The team has strength in depth and Ian is confident that things will start to improve shortly.






