





Team Talk

Back in the spotlight at both Club and International level is Lee Harland – who took advantage of fellow Great Britain under-21 second -row Mark Perrett's absence last Sunday, to register his first try of the season – although it would surely have been his second had he been able to hold John Bentley's pass with the line open at Featherstone the other Tuesday.

Struggling for the latter part of last season with a series of niggling injuries, Lee was well aware that his form wasn't that impressive at the time when the Board were handing out contracts for 1994/95, and, had the asking price of £45,000 not been a touch steep for the handful of interested clubs, Lee may now have been regaining his confidence, and his effectiveness, at another Club.

Perseverance usually pays off in the end however, and the arrival of Steve Simms gave Lee the opportunity to start afresh as it were. And knowing that Simms was an admirer of the 'mobile' breed of forward gave him a head start. Injury to Michael Jackson and Paul Round was the other factor which plunged him into the reckoning for Steve Simms' first game in charge, and solid performances from the bench against Wakefield, Salford, Australia and Doncaster paved the way for a start against Featherstone and Sheffield, when the resident duo of Perrett and Moriarty were called up for the Welsh side.

Meanwhile, Lee settled his contract differences and committed himself to Halifax until the end of this season – time enough to re-prove his worth to the side. Lee himself is under no illusion about the task ahead, as

he now faces competition for a regular place from a recovered Michael Jackson, new Ioan signing (and fellow Great Britain under-21 prospect) Simon Baldwin, Paul Round – who also returned to action with a try last week – besides the duo of Perrett and Moriarty, who were getting better by the game prior to last week's hiatus.

This week's call up to the Great Britain under-21 training squad has done no harm to his confidence, and he sees getting into the final 17 to face the Australians at Gateshead as his next international goal - for that. and a regular spot in the Halifax first team squad, Lee's working harder on the training field than ever and he's gone on to a strict diet, a regime which he hopes will bring results that will not just benefit himself - but, through improved quality in depth, will benefit the team as a whole.



JOHN CLARKE

A sturdy little hooker who came straight out of BARLA Youth Rugby last season, and made the Oldham No. 9 shirt his own in the First Division of the Stones Bitter Championship. From Leeds, John is the only player ever to have won BARLA's 'Young Player of the Year' award more than once. He toured Australia with the BARLA Young Lions of 1993 and quickly signed for Oldham on his return from Down Under. Just selected for under-21 Great Britain Squad.

MARTIN CROMPTON

A £35,000 buy from Wigan early last season, Martin was troubled by injury in the early part of the campaign, but

came through magnificently last season to play a crucial roll in Oldham's team which saw off the Watersheddings via his home town club Wigan.

PAUL DAVIDSON


Joined Oldham this summer in £17,000 deal with Widnes. A Cumbrian who formerly played with Hensingham. Paul signed for Widnes three years ago and has had considerable senior experience at Naughton Park. Can play either prop or second row with equal ability.

STEVE GARTLAND

Needs no introduction to league fans in the Oldham-Rochdale areas. A clever stand-off aged 23, he signed for Rochdale from Oldham Amateur Club St. Annes in 1990 and established a Rochdale club record of 276 points in a season in 1992/93. A useful goal kicker he is the son of Brian Gartland, Oldham's town team coach and former member of the Watersheddings coaching staff.

WALLY GIBSON

On his day one of the finest attacking full backs in Rugby League. Wally



made his name with the Huddersfield club, ripping Second Division defences to shreds in his three years at Fartown. Joined Oldham two seasons ago and quickly became a firm favourite with the Watersheddings crowd thanks to his uncanny ability to turn defence into attack.

NIGEL HESLOP

Former England Rugby Union winger who won 10 caps for his country. Signed for Oldham from Orwell Rugby Union club in February 1993 after losing his place in England's five nation cup squad for 1993.

Represented England in the World Cup 1991 and was a member of two grand slam winning squads.

SHAUN IRWIN

Shaun joined Oldham from Castleford in 1992 in the move that took Richard

Russell to Wheldon Road. A former member of Mal Reilly's Great Britain squad. Shaun is a vastly experienced inside back, sound on defence and with a deceptive turn of pace as he proved when scoring a long range try at Featherstone in the 1993/94 season.

DAVID JONES

A strong finishing winger signed from Wakefield. A Wigan born St. Pat's player and as an amateur gained country and international honours. Can quickly establish himself as a firm favourite at Oldham if he continues his current form. Had a spell in Australia during the close season.

MIKE KUTTI

A New Zealand international of great repute. Played in Great Britain and France with the New Zealand tourists in 1989. Selected for the test team eight times, playing in Great Britain, France and New Guinea. but not Australia. A strong loose forward or second

rower, at the pinnacle of his career. Has played for Rochdale, Swinton, Leeds and Rochdale again. Has a good eve for making and taking scoring opportunities.

GARY LORD

A newcomer to Oldham this year, Gary started his career with Castleford and moved to Leeds before Oldham signed him from Halifax for a £35,000 fee fixed by tribunal. The brother of former Oldham winger Paul Lord.

CHRIS PARR

A prop forward from the Wigan area. Chris began his professional career with Huddersfield where he gained Great Britain under-21 honours. A move to Swinton did not work out for him, but Swinton's loss was Oldham's gain when Parr moved to Watersheddings in exchange for John Maxwell.

CRAIG RICHARDS

Joined Oldham for £25,000 from Bradford Northern a year ago and produced a stunning debut to score two tries against his former club. Had spells on loan last season with Workington and Featherstone, but has prepared extremely well under Andy Goodway's coaching this summer and big things are expected of him in 1994/95.

SCOTT RANSON

Twenty five year old St. Helens Player and the top try scorer for his former club, Swinton, signed for Oldham in March 1992

IAN SHERRATT

Former Oldham and Lancashire schoolboy. Left Oldham for Salford and returned season 1991/92. A hard grafting prop-forward who won Oldham's 'Player of the Season' for 1993/94 and was also voted the 'Players Player of the Season'.

PAUL TOPPING

Paul joined Oldham from Leigh in the summer of 1993 after starting his career as a full back with Swinton. Oldham's top point scorer last season he is a useful goal kicker who can play equally well at full back, centre or even loose forward. A groin injury caused him problems last season but he has recovered remarkably well after surgery and is raring to go into 1994/95.




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
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True Blues Halifax R.L.F.C. Supporters Club

If you can't take a joke, so they say, you shouldn't have joined, and Rovers coach David Ward's first game in charge at Post Office Road turned out to be anything but a barrel of laughs.



FEATHERSTONE R. 14 **HALIFAX**

Post Office Road, Tuesday, 25th October 1994

The Rovers script called for a Featherstone win and a happy ending until Steve Simms got his hands on it and referee Graham Annesley called Advantage Halifax as the Thrum Hallers made it five in a row and set course for the first division's top four. Mark Preston's disputed match-clinching try made sure of that, and Shaun Edwards' favourite referee was escorted from the pitch at the end by one of Featherstone's Finest - a token presence perhaps, but big enough to deter the Post Office Road Mafia from a closer discussion on the marital status of Mr. Annesley's parents.

Rovers' fortunes went downhill. so to speak, in the first half when having already allowed a Wayne Parker bomb to bounce and got away with it, they stood and watched as the scrum-half took off from half way and disappeared into the night for the opening try. John Schuster goaled for a 6-0 lead after 15 minutes, an advantage wiped out by the latest argument for the introduction of in-goal touch judges with Carl Gibson's high-diving act beneath the Halifax bar.

John Fieldhouse redressed the balance on the half hour when he flipped the ball into the hands of Graeme Hallas as he fell and the centre set course for the back gardens of Post Office Road as Parker had before, a strike reinforced within four minutes when Iva Ropati was parted from his breath, and the ball, by a driving Halifax tackle, Lee Harland seized on the gift, and Mike Hagan sent Schuster sliding over for a 16-6 interval lead.

Sensitive souls among the flies on the Featherstone dressing room wall probably covered their ears for the next 15 minutes as Ward set about retrieving what already looked like a lost cause, a task

made a tad more difficult by Mr. Annesley's speed on the whistle with the unfortunate Ropati headed for an open line.

Aston's offside penalty made it 16-8, rather than 16-12, but when Hallas did a Ropati and lost the ball, Danny Divet battered his way towards the posts where Graham Southernwood booked his aftermatch pint from brother Roy with the try Aston's goal cut the deficit to two points at 16-14, a margin restored by Gibson's superb cover tackle on Schuster and maintained until six minutes from time when the impressive Simon Baldwin drove hard for the Featherstone

Defensive niceties went out the window as the Rovers rearguard hauled the supporting Gary Divorty off the pass, the ball shot over the Featherstone line and Preston followed it in as Mr. Annesley applied advantage with a generosity unheard of in Post Office Road parts where no-one, but no-one - and especially visiting teams - ever got owt for nowt.

Schuster's goal made it 22-14. and David Ward made a mental note to cross Mr. Annesley off his Christmas card list.

HALIFAX 24 SHEFFIELD E. 20

Thrum Hall. Sunday, 30th October 1994

Halloween is the night when evil spirits roam abroad - 24 hours before the broomsticks were due out of the cupboard, Halifax served up a few horrors of their own.

Victory secured a sixth league win in a row, but not before the Eagles had ruffled a few feathers in their turn and proved that a Kangaroo stuffing isn't totally indigestible. Battered near-senseless by the Australians only three days before, a Lee Jackson inspired Sheffield side not only survived an opening Halifax assault which threatened to take up where the tourists left off, but came within three disallowed touchdowns of bringing the Thrum Hallers' victory roll to a grinding halt.

Act One went very much according to plan as John Fieldhouse and Lee Harland sailed over an Eagles line displaying the defensive qualities of a paper bag. Gary Hetherington's exact words are unrecorded, but 'here we go again' probably comes close, and Halifax followers sat back to enjoy the fun at 10-0 up after barely six minutes play.

So, unfortunately, did their team as the punch-drunk Eagles took a standing count and fought back led by Jackson whose reverse pass sent loose forward Anthony Farrell through a Halifax defence which never laid a hand on him and was still trying to work out why when the ever-thoughtful Jackson repeated the trick with scrum-half Wayne Sheridan - just in case the Thrum Hallers hadn't been watching the first time.

They might well have stayed there too had Halifax not regained control of the game just long enough to make it count, Hagan sending substitute Paul Round trotting through a gap similar to those left scattered all over the Don Valley Stadium by the Kangaroos earlier in the week.

Schuster goaled for a four point lead at 20-16, and when Parker, Roy Southernwood and Hagan again worked the ball right for Bentley to score on the hour, the Eagles' claws seemed finally to have been drawn.

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

Oldham's all right. I have always liked Oldham. I know we're Tykes and they are Lankies and that simply as a law of nature I should hate Owdamers. But I don't!

We have got a lot in common. For a start, there's Thrum Hall and Watersheddings. Most folk who hear the words Thrum Hall or Watersheddings suddenly come over all funny and assume a pained expression. You can see them wince and shudder. The very thought of winter afternoons freezing and getting soddened at Halifax or Oldham is more than most Rugby League fans can bear. They are not used to it, you see. We are, us Faxfans and Owdamers. Frequenting such high places, we have got used to low oxygen levels and extreme climatic phenomena. We are bloody hard!. Mind you, Oldham people think that Watersheddings is the highest ground in the Rugby League. They are wrong. Thrum Hall is but only by a few feet.

Another thing about Watersheddings and Thrum Hall. In these days of safety regulations and the drive for "upmarketability" we are in grave danger of losing two of the most atmospheric grounds in the game. Fair enough, we know conditions should be more user-friendly at our grounds but won't it be sad when Watersheddings and Thrum Hall with their imposing Victorian pavilions are just memories?

Talking of memories, one of the reasons why I have always had a soft spot for Oldham is the fact that the first Halifax League fixture I ever saw as a nipper was against Oldham. It was 20 August, 1956. I know because I looked it up. Halifax lost 9-13. Theoretically we had a good team then having almost, won all four cups the previous season. The trouble was Halifax decided to go into rapid decline in 1956-57

whereas Oldham became the bee's knees and won the Championship that season. I do not, remember anything at all about the game except that it was an evening

fixture. What I do remember is going in the fish shop at the bottom of King Gross Street that night and the chippie talking to some blokes who were wonderlng if Halifax had won. It was the first time I realised that knowledge was power. Anyway, I never told them. They probably wouldn't have believed me anyhow.


For years after I started watching Halifax we could never beat Oldham. They did the double over us for five consecutive

seasons. Bernard Ganley just used to look at our posts and it was two points. He seemed to kick millions against us. I was beginning to think that Oldham beating Halifax was an immutable law of physics when on 9 September, 1961 we finally got the better of them at Thrum Hall. It was only 7-5. Frank Fox scored our only try - his solitary try of the season - but at last we had beaten them. It was a weight off

my young mind, I can tell you.
Since then we have beaten
the Roughyeds more often
than they have beaten us
which is another reason
why I like them.

The best reason for liking Oldham though came in 1963 when they sold us Alan Kellett (pictured). Kellett was one of the main reasons we used to lose so much to them previously. He generally had a field day against Halifax. We would not have minded so much if he had not been a local Halifax lad and had actually played a couple of trials for our first team back in 1954. We messed up then and Oldham cleaned up. Alan, partnering Frank Pitchford, became a lynch-pin at stand-off for Oldham, represented Yorkshire and was unlucky not to have got international honours. When we finally got him back home in 1963 for a fee of £4,500, things suddenly clicked. He and Ken Roberts made all the difference to a team which had begun to promise so much but had yet to deliver the goods.


With Alan at stand-off, or often enough at centre to accommodate Barry Robinson, we at last had a class act in the middle backs, someone who could get the best out of the rest, a natural footballer. Alan was a key figure in Fax's drive to the Championship in 1965 and in those other triumphs of the mid-6Os. It was probably the lack of oxygen that made him feel so at home. Thanks, Owdham!

REGAL TROPHY

Two top local derby matches involving clubs from the Leigh and London areas were the highlights of the 1994-95 Regal Trophy first round draw made in Leeds today (Wednesday, 26th October 1994. Leigh, one of the stronger Second Division professional clubs, have been drawn to entertain "across the road" amateurs, Leigh Miners, while the equally strong Second Division outfit, London Broncos, have been given a home match against their northern border amateur rivals, Hemel Hempstead. The two leading French teams face

tough tasks – League champions, Catalan XIII, having to visit Dewsbury and Federation Cup holders, St. Esteve, visiting Hunslet. East of the Pennines, professional club Bramley will not find an easy passage against amateurs, Mysons, one of the few clubs to have beaten a professional club in the competition. Likewise, Ryedale York will have to be careful against near neighbouring amateurs, West Hull, who under their previous name of Cawoods also claimed a professional scalp some years ago. The round has to be played by 27 November with

The round has to be played by 27 November with the matches involving the two French teams being played a week earlier.

The Regal Trophy, now in its 24th consecutive season of Imperial Tobacco's 28-year sponsorship of the Rugby Football League, is worth a record-breaking £410,000, broken down by prize money of £246,000 (including increases in every round) and contribution to the League's Capital Development Fund of £164,000. For the eventual winner their is a record prize of £36,000.

This is the second successive season that the Regal Trophy's first round has brought together leading teams from the British amateur game alongside the two leading French teams as opposition to the 16 Second Division professional clubs who were all given home draws. The 16 First Division clubs in the Rugby Football League are seeded through to the second round.

The full first round draw is:-
