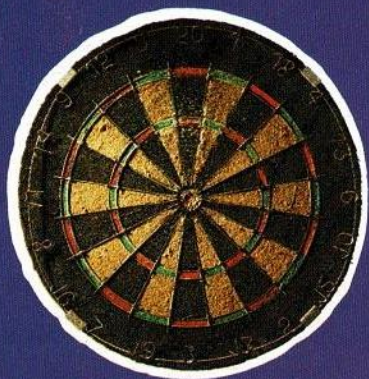

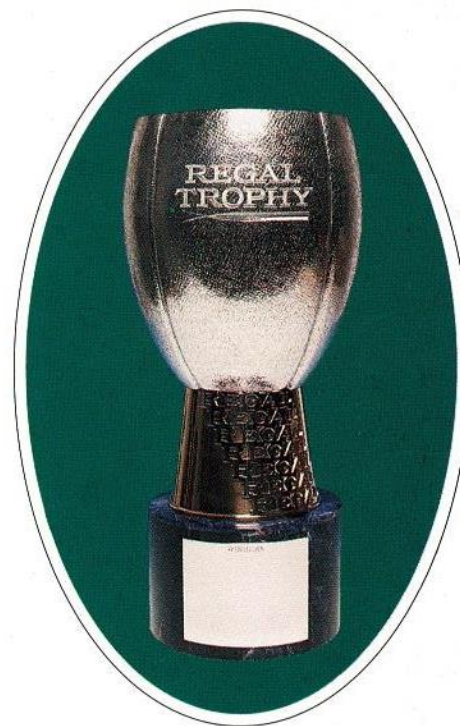

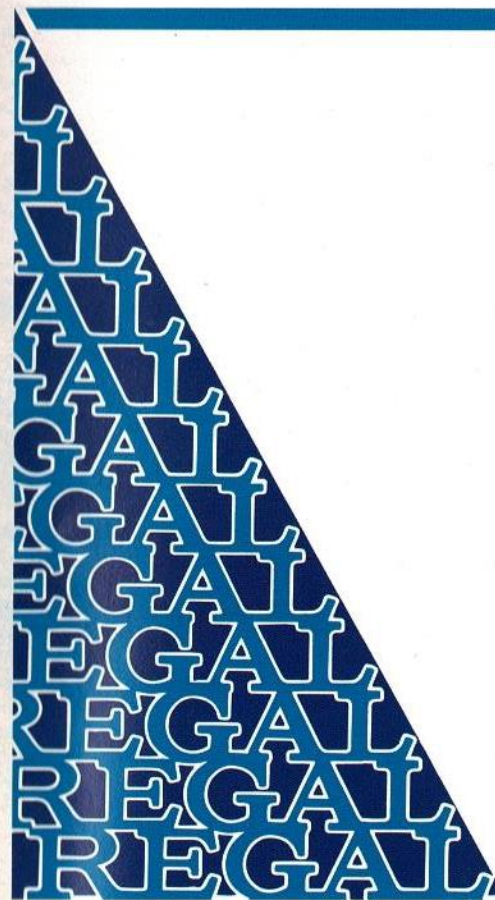

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Today we take a rest from the pressures of the Stones Bitter Championship and turn our attention to the Regal Trophy with the visit of our old friends from Hull Kingston Rovers in the second round.

I would like to formally welcome the Robins' officials, coaches, players and supporters to Watersheddings and, in so doing, extend the hand of friendship to two Rovers officials whom I have come to know well over the past few years, chairman Phil Lowe and the long serving Colin Hutton.

Like ourselves and many other clubs, Rovers have had considerable financial difficulties in the past year or two and have, of course, moved out from their old ground and settled into New Craven Park, a similar move to that which the Oldham club might have to make within the next five years. Like us, they will have been focussing their attention on the game's current problems some of which we sampled at first hand last Sunday when we went to Wigan and lost 46-0 as the Central Park men moved a step nearer their sixth consecutive cup and league double.

That cannot possibly be good for the game as a whole and I would like to add my voice to the growing support for the introduction of legislation which might produce the possibility of a more even spread of talent throughout the game.

Those who read this column regularly know that I am not one of those people who believe that merely because the Australians do something it has to be right and good for the game here, too. However, one of the first things the Aussies did when they set out to revamp their game was to bring in a salary cap to prevent a couple of clubs hogging all the limelight and all the trophies.

I am convinced that we must take a similar route. Any moves must benefit the game as a whole, not merely the chosen few and if all clubs in the first division were given the same salary

cap and all clubs in the second division the same salary cap, we would be well on the way to establishing a more even spread of talent throughout the game.

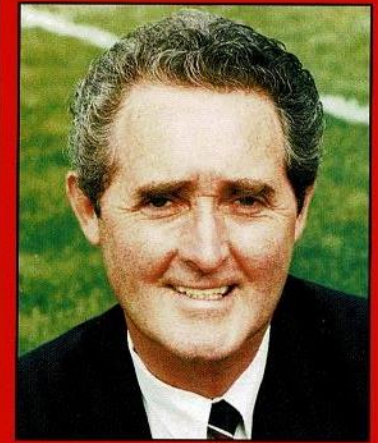
It would be no good to give individual clubs individual salary caps, based on their projected income, because that would merely retain the status quo, certainly in terms of trying to give all clubs an equal chance of equal competition on a level playing field. No, I think there should be the same maximum figure for each and every club in the first division and, to my mind, there would be several benefits to be gained, although I agree that a lot of thought would have to be put into it and, once established, it would have to be well policed.

Capping across the board would stop the top couple of clubs signing all the best players and would provide a more even competition. Inevitably, that would lead to a more even spread of club representation in the Great Britain side and I think that has to be good for the game, too.

A maximum figure would stop clubs going heavily into debt in their frustration to try and compete and it would also stop the wealthier clubs, or at least those with a steady and reliable cash flow, signing up players whom they might or might not accommodate in their senior side and hoarding them in the Alliance team, thus weakening the clubs they have left and adding to the lack of competition.

It is obviously desirable for clubs to work on youth development, but there is little future in signing youngsters, developing them, working hard and spending money on turning them from fledglings into first-teamers and then seeing them depart to the glamour clubs, often for a poor return.

It is not the end of the world to lose to the Australians. It will take long-term planning to catch up and I don't think it is something we should panic about. Of more immediate concern, in my opinion, is the need to attract the fans



back to our domestic competition and I back the calls for two major changes in the pursuit of that goal, the introduction of a salary cap and a season running from March to October, or thereabouts.

Finally, I would just like to refer to the late Fred Howarth, our honorary club secretary for many years, whose funeral was held on Monday. He was 84. The Oldham club has lost a tried and trusted friend and a loyal servant with the passing of Fred, whose popularity all over the town was reflected in the large attendance at the Crematorium.

It was also a reflection of the esteem in which he was held in other parts of the rugby playing world that high ranking officers of the French RL are to send us a commemorative plaque to place in our boardroom. Over the years Fred became a close friend of the late Gilbert Dautante, President of the French RL, who himself passed away several months ago.

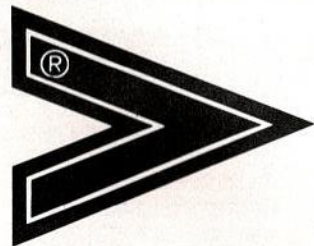
The vicar who conducted the funeral service urged us all, in Fred's memory, to renew and strengthen our commitment to the things which mattered so much to him, rugby league football and the Oldham club in particular. That's exactly what Fred would have wanted us to do.

GRASS ROOTS ROUGHYEDS

A LOOK AT THE LOCAL AMATEUR RUGBY SCENE

The long trek to Wembley begins next weekend when 64 amateur clubs kick off the 1995 Silk Cut Challenge Cup Competition.

Clubs who successfully negotiate the first two rounds meet professional opposition at the third round stage on 22nd January but it is not until 12th February that the First Division giants join the fray.

Local interest is focussed on National Conference clubs St. Annes and Saddleworth Rangers both of whom are at home in round one. St. Annes face Kells of Whitehaven whilst Saddleworth entertain Humberside opposition in the shape of Skirlaugh.

Kells have a fine cup tradition which includes appearances in ten of the past twelve Cumbria Cup Finals. They have also qualified to meet professional opposition on six occasions, five teams in the Challenge Cup and once in the Regal Trophy. In

1987 they almost caused an upset when they drew 4-4 with Fulham up at Whitehaven but lost the replay in London by 22-14. They are sure to provide tough opposition to Saints but a home win is the likely outcome.

The meeting of Saddleworth Rangers and Skirlaugh gives the Rangers an opportunity to avenge an 18-16 defeat which they suffered at Skirlaugh in the National Cup three years ago. Skirlaugh went on to reach the National Cup Final that year but with Rangers having won that prestigious competition during each of the past two seasons I go for another home win and the prospect of two Oldham clubs entering the hat for the second round draw.

Other ties of interest see Rochdale based Mayfield at home to Park Amateurs of Halifax and Littleborough travelling over to York to face Heworth. Whilst Mayfield should win it looks too big a task for

Littleborough. Ovenden, who almost won at Highfield in the Regal Trophy last week, face a difficult trip to Oulton and Leigh Miners Welfare who took Leigh so close last week take on Wigan St. Judes in what should be a close tie.

Arguably the best tie of the round will be staged in Barrow where Walney Central take on Hensingham. The following Wednesday these two meet again under the Barrow floodlights in the final of the Cumbria Cup.

St. Annes Lancashire Cup final opponents Woolston Rovers face a virtual derby match at home to Eccles. That should result in another cup win for Woolston but the beauty of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup lies in its uncertainty and there is sure to be an upset or two on this rocky road to Wembley.

THE GROWING GAME

Development News Supported by P.Casey and Co and Sportsmatch

Welcome to today's Regal Trophy game against Hull KR. “ Lets have no more guff about the superman qualities of Aussie referees, after the performance of Harrigan at Elland Road. As it happens, whenever I have seen him on Sky, he's seemed OK to me. “ It seems difficult to believe that Fred Howarth is no longer with us. His contribution at Watersheddings and to RL in

general has been well documented elsewhere. We will not see his like again, sadly, and he leaves a gaping hole. ”

Congratulations to Wigan on yet another remarkable achievement. Their whitewashing of Oldham confirming their 5 points lead at the top of the Stones Bitter Championship and setting up the tantalising prospect that they could go through the season undefeated. There is a long way still to go though and Leeds might have something to say about the Championship after moving into 2nd position following their fifth win in a row. The first round of the Regal Trophy brought no shocks but creditable performances for many amateur clubs notably Leigh Miners Welfare and Saddleworth Rangers. Castleford signed him for the same amount three years later and he made his debut at prop in a 39-12 Silk Cut Challenge Cup preliminary round defeat at St. Helens on 30 August 1990.

Crooks scored 947 points for Hull and 104 for Leeds plus 71 in representative matches, including 365 in Test matches for Great Britain.
