

An historic twelve months is in the offing for Rugby League as 1995 heralds the codes
Centenary year and more than £1 million has already been pledged by the sports three long standing main sponsors; Silk Cut, Regal and Stones Bitter.

In addition, John Smith's will be backing England and Wales in the Centenary World Cup as part of their three year £1.3 million deal.

Centenary events will span the ten months of the 1995-96 season culminating in the G.B. visit to Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea, which will be billed as the Centenary

There will be the unveiling of a Centenary plaque at the George Hotel, where the breakaway meeting from Rugby Union was held, followed by a service at the Town Hall, a civic reception at the new Kirklees Stadium and a Centenary Carnival parade through the town, involving every sector of Rugby


Back in the stadium there

will be an Olympic style opening ceremony crowned by a Founders Day Concert featuring a top line artist and firework finale. The memorable launch day will be rounded off by the opening night of the Centenary Nationwide tour production of John Godber's stage play "Up 'n' Under" in what will be the newly built Lawrence Batley Theatre.

During the Autumn there will of course be the much publicised Centenary World Cup and there are proposals for a series of commemorative stamps issued by the Royal Mail. The Story So Far

founder member of the breakaway Northern Union, Oldham's history goes back to September 1876 when the Club were formed at a meeting in the Prince Albert Hotel, Union Street West.

Their first ground was a field at the rear of the Glodwick Spinning Company's Mill, the players having to change in the nearby Shakespeare Hotel.

The very first game played there was against Stalybridge on October 21st 1876.

A move to the sloping ground at Clarksfield preceded the switch to the site at Watersheddings where the opening game against Swinton on September 28th 1889 unfortunately ended in defeat in front of a 7000 gate.

On that occasion Oldham sported a new strip of red and white hoops, a sharp contrast to the previous colours of black and amber.

When the "split" occurred in 1895, Oldham were one of the pioneer members and in the first season they finished fourth behind Champions Manningham, Halifax and Runcorn, (a powerful side in those days.)

Two seasons later, Oldham were Champions of the Lancashire Senior Competition.

In 1899 they won the N.U. Challenge Cup, beating Hunslet by 19 points to 9 at Fallowfield, Manchester. In doing so they became the first Lancashire Club to lift the trophy.

Although, Oldham have subsequently won the Challenge Cup in 1925 and 1927 and been runners up on four occasions, they have never appeared at Wembley.

The first occasion that Salford and Oldham met was during the 1896-97 campaign at New Barnes, the visitors winning by 9 points to 0. At the end of that season Oldham finished next to top whilst Salford ended up next to bottom!

It was in the 1930's that the roles were reversed of course. Whereas Salford swept all before them in a golden decade, Oldham languished in mid-table.

However, their glory days were on the horizon and in the 1950's it was they who were the King pins of the league. They were constantly high in the league table and in 1956-57 they ended the season with a commanding six points lead over Hull, a side they also defeated in the Championship play off. Their 15-44 win was achieved in front of 62,000 spectators at Odsal.

Oldham won the league the following season and went on

to land a hat-trick of successive Lancashire Cup victories.

During 1957-58, Bernard Ganley set up a new goalkicking record with 200 for Oldham and 19 for G.B.

Stars of the time were Internationals Frank Pitchford, Syd Little, Charlie Winslade, Alan Davies, Derek Turner, Ken Jackson and Ike Southward who was a record signing of £10,650 from Workington Town.

The first floodlit match at Watersheddings took place on October 20th 1965 when G.B. under 24s beat France by 12 points to 5.

In 1969-70 the club suffered a set back when they were relegated, the team failing to secure a victory in five months of rugby!

Although Oldham have since bounced back into the top flight with a couple of Division Two Championship and Premiership wins, the fact remains that they have not landed a major trophy since 1958-59 when they won the Lancashire Cup.


It was during the 1987-88 season that his career really took off at the Willows and he was Salford's try scorer in their 34 points to 4 Challenge Cup semi-final defeat at the hands of Wigan in front of a near 21,000 crowd at Burnden Park, Bolton. Two Lancashire Cup Final defeats followed but his crowning glory came in the 1990-91 season when as Team Captain he led the side to the double of the Second Division League title and Premiership at Old Trafford. Ian scored 13 tries that season, his best so far which included a rare hat-trick of tries in the Reds 50 points to 6 home victory over Runcorn Highfield. That same season he broke his collar bone at the Don Valley Stadium, helping Salford gain a shock victory over Sheffield Eagles in the Second round of the Challenge Cup but he came back to skipper Salford to that magnificent double.

Ian gained BARLA Lancashire Under 19 honours as an amateur and in the Professional code his one and only reward has been a call up for Lancashire v. Yorkshire in the War of the Roses clash at Leeds. Team mates that day were Paul Topping and David Jones who will be in Oldham's side this afternoon.







The Reds seemed to be on their way into the Quarter finals at the halfway stage of this pulsating tie but they lost their composure against the wind in the last forty minutes when Wire took a stranglehold against a disorganised Salford.

It was end to end stuff from the kick off but Brown wasted a good opportunity by hanging on the ball with men outside him. In the 32nd minute, Salford hit back in the best possible way when Brown won a scrum and fed Ford who raced away down the touchline and provided RANDALL with a peach of a pass for the second row man to race behind the posts leaving BLAKELEY with an easy conversion. (14-10). The Reds now hit a purple patch and in the 36th minute Williams broke down the left and switched the ball inside for Panapa to send CRITCHLEY in for a fine touchdown but BLAKELEY missed the conversion. (18-10). Three minutes later a great move involving Williams, Critchley and Forber saw teenage centre McAVOY sprint to the line and BLAKELEY added a goal.

The second-half saw Wire make full advantage of the wind and within four minutes Maloney set up MACKEY for a try goalled by HARRIS. (24-16). The referee then saw fit to sin bin Mackey and a minute later, Eccles, for lying on at a play the ball situation. Warrington were now in full flow though and in the 59th minute SHELFORD took Barlow's pass to score in the corner and HARRIS added a touchline conversion. (24-22), Three minutes later and it was all square when HARRIS landed a penalty goal after Lee was adjudged to be offside. (24-24). Oldham have certainly made a lot of people sit up and take notice over the last few weeks with some notable performances against the top sides in the First Division.

Andy Goodway has continued the good work put in by Bob Lindner and he has moulded together a side bristling with a combination of experience, power and pace, the necessary ingredients for the top flight.

It was Lindner's spell of 3 months as player/coach that helped Oldham stave off relegation last season culminating in the Roughyeds winning five and drawing one of their last eight fixtures including a last gasp 26-23 victory at Salford. This season began badly with 4 successive heavy defeats in which they conceded 189 points but since

for them in September 1990 from Wigan St. Patrick's A.R.L. club. Ranson is a tremendous finisher and came from Swinton in exchange for Oldham trio Simon Longstaff, Richard Irving and Tony Barrow. He scored 2 tries for Oldham in the corresponding fixture last season.



then record fee of £65,000 in July 1985. A Down Under Tourist in 1984, Andy went on to make another dozen appearances for G.B. whilst at Central Park and also played for Wigan in four

Wembley winning sides. He returned to Watersheddings at the start of last season and played 30 games for Oldham scoring just one try.

CONNECTIONS

Several players have been involved with both clubs over the years. The great JAMES LOMAS spent over nine years aat Salford in which time he played in three Challenge Cup Finals although on each occasion he finished on the losing side. He captained the G.B. side on their first ever Tour of Australia in 1910 before being transferred to Oldham for a record £300 fee.
