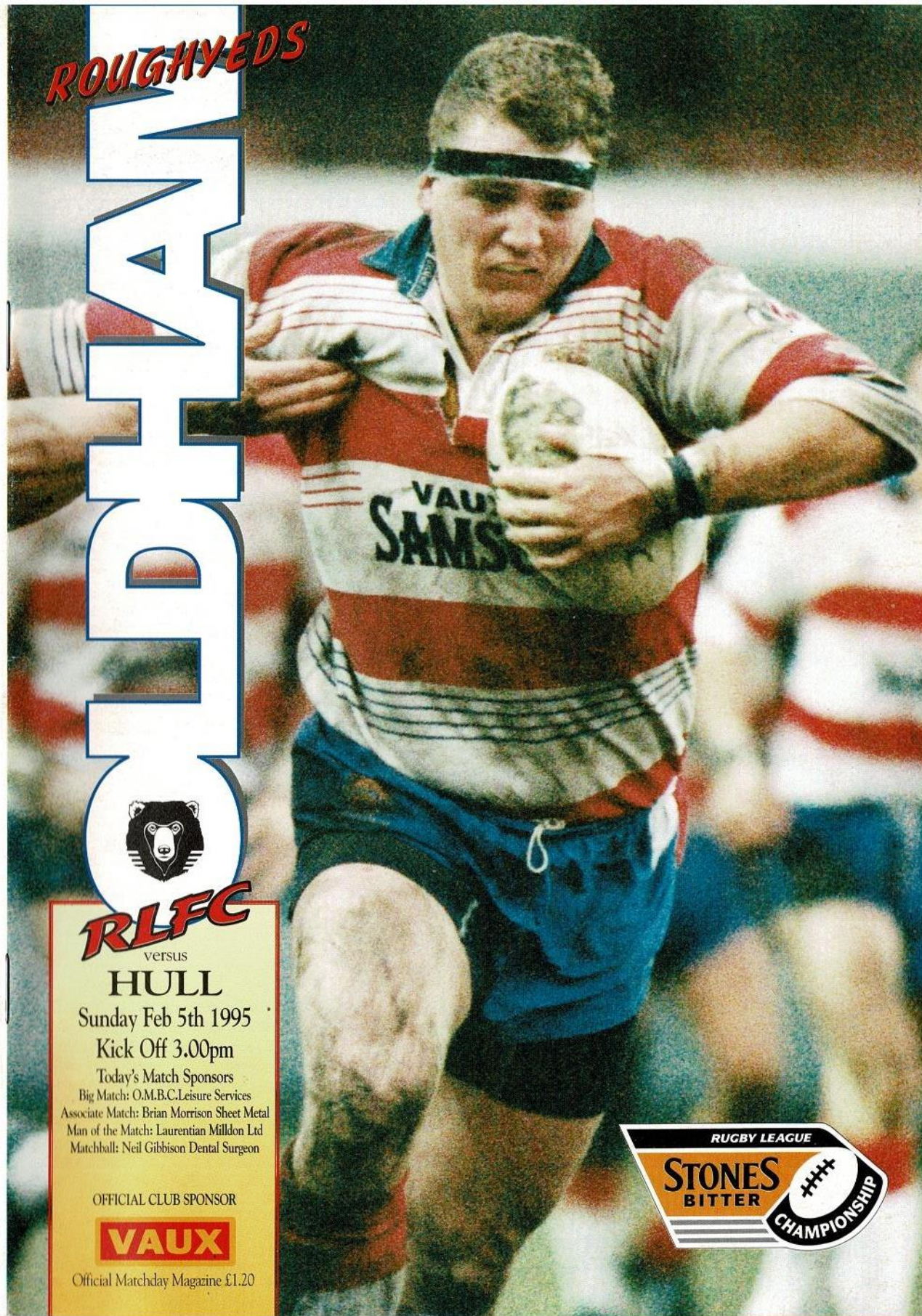

# FROM THE BOARDROOM

Like everyone else who has visited the Alfred McAlpine Stadium in Huddersfield, I was most impressed with its facilities when I went there last Saturday for the Regal Trophy final between Wigan and Warrington.

It really is a superb piece of civil engineering, providing a facility which must rank as one of the best in the United Kingdom.

The pitch, shared by Huddersfield Town soccer club and Huddersfield RL Club, was in beautiful condition considering the terrible weather we had had and the fact that it is jointly used.

The banqueting and corporate hospitality facilities were first class, and spectators were well looked after in a dry, safe, comfortable state-of-the-art arena which I am sure will serve our game admirably for many years to come.

It made me realise what we are missing here at Watersheddings, but hopefully it will not be too long before we hear what Oldham Council has in mind for rehousing us in a more modern stadium, probably on the other side of town.

The experience of a lot of fans who travelled to the Regal Trophy final underlined how important it is to have adequate access to modern-day sports stadia. Take Watersheddings, when the old ground was constructed more than a hundred years ago, most people would travel to it on foot.

Even as recently as the 1950s, when we regularly drew crowds of 15,000 plus, the majority of fans came by bus. Remember the football specials? A ground like Watersheddings was not designed to cope with all the cars that come to a match these days.

New grounds HAVE to accommodate thousands of cars and coaches, but apparently a lot of fans hit trouble when leaving the M62 last Saturday. Even those who were leaving the

motorway more than an hour before kick-off had trouble getting into the stadium for the start and many missed the kick-off.

I kept off the motorway and used the Stanedge road, planning to arrive early so that I would have time to look at all the stadium's facilities. I arrived on the outskirts of Huddersfield in good time, but I only just got into the ground as the teams were coming out.

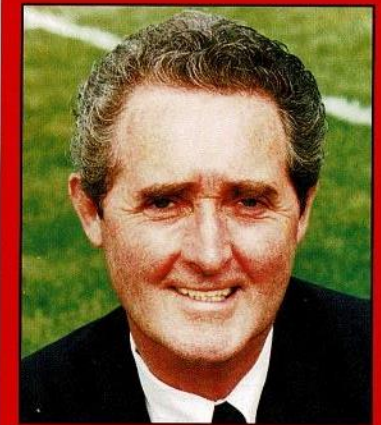
Perhaps this is something the authorities need to look at before we next have a big Rugby League occasion there. It is certainly something we have to bear in mind in Oldham when we are considering plans for future development of a new stadium.

Access is all-important in this age of the motor car. It's like the corner shop, which has had double yellow lines painted on the road outside. No facilities for parked cars means no business. The super-markets cottoned on to this years ago and moved to the edges of towns where there is ample space for parking. Sports planners need to think on similar lines, always bearing in mind that thousands of fans will be converging on one spot within an hour or so of a big event kicking-off.

As far as the Regal final was concerned, Wigan were in a class of their own. Their 40-10 win over Warrington was an outstanding exhibition of first-class Rugby League football. Who will stop them?

It doesn't seem too long ago that Hull and Hull KR were winning the games major honours, but Rovers have slipped into the second division and Hull FC, today's visitors, are toiling at the wrong end of the first division.

They badly need some quick points to lift them off the bottom, their position having been made more acute by the way in which Wakefield

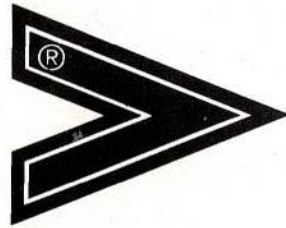


and Workington have made advances in the past few weeks. We extend a real Watersheddings welcome to the men from the Boulevard, chairman, fellow directors, coaching staff, players, fans and all and wish them well in their battle to retain their first division status after today's game, of course!

One of the sad things in Rugby League just now is the way the game seems to have slipped into decline on Humberside. The city of Kingston-upon-Hull, divided as it is by the River Hull and the catchment areas of the two city clubs, needs a good Rugby League rivalry, just as Cumbria would benefit enormously if Whitehaven, Carlisle or Barrow could push up into the first division and offer some local rivalry to Workington Town.

I am not qualified to comment on the causes of such a decline on the east coast of Yorkshire, but you can gamble that a shortage of club income has played a big part. I think it further strengthens my argument for a switch of seasons. I think all clubs would benefit from a season running from March to November. I'm sure it will come eventually, but I would like it to happen sooner rather than later.

**MARK HEWITT**

**Height 5ft 7in Weight 11st 5lb**  
Scrum-half. Another signing from Northern Dairies. Hewitt is developing into a solid scrum-half. Useful around player.

**CHICO JACKSON**

**Height 6ft Weight 14st 10lb**  
Forward. Plays prop or second-row, but has played on the wing. A spell in Australia did him the power of good and last season he emerged as one of the most improved players in the club.

**GARY NOLAN**

**Height 6ft 3in Weight 14st 10lb**  
Centre or full-back. Signed from Dockers, Nolan came to prominence in the premiership semi-final against Leeds when he scored the winning try. A strong player who looks better at full-back where he has time to bring the ball forward.

**CRAIG O'DONNELL**

**Height 5ft 8ins Weight 12st**  
Centre or full-back. Signed from Hull Boys Club, O'Donnell is developing well and had a couple of senior outings last season. He scored the match winning try in Hull's shock 14-13 league victory against Wigan at Central Park.

**JON SHARP**

**Height 5ft 10in Weight 14st 8lb**  
Loose-forward or second-row. Testimonial year. Signed from Featherstone in 1984. Has had a few injury problems, but when firing he is an influential part of the team. Has pace uses ball well and solid in defence.

**MARK JONES**

**Height 6ft 5in Weight 17st 12lb**  
Prop. Former Welsh RU international. He has had a few injury problems since turning professional, but when he's fully fit he is one of the most fearsome forwards in the game. Enormously powerful, Jones, when in full steam, has a good turn of pace to destroy defences. A lethal weapon.

**TERRY SMIRK**

**Height 5ft 6in Weight 11st 1lb**  
Scrum half. Local produced. Signed from Dockers. Hasn't been able to break into the senior side on a regular basis but an excellent stand-in.

**PAUL STERLING: 26**

Winger. Signed from Bradford and Bingley Rugby Union club. He had tremendous try-scoring record for Bradford. Has pace, strength and determination and is already a big favourite with the Boulevard fans.

**IAN STEVENS**

**Height 5ft 9in Weight 12st 11lb**  
Stand-off. Signed from Swansea RU, Welsh under-21 international. Has pace and good sidestep, but didn't get many chances to play in first-team last season.

**STEVE McNAMARA**

**Height 6ft Weight 15st 7lb**  
Prop or second-row. Like Gay he has had a summer spell with St. George in Australia. Earned representative honours at all levels and is currently the Great Britain under-21 skipper. Twice played for Great Britain senior side, and was a late call up for tour in Aussie. Regarded as one of the best prospects in the country and looks certain to be a regular in senior international side.

**ROB NOLAN**

**Height 6ft 1in Weight 13st 7lb**  
Utility player. Product of the Colts team, switched from forward to backs where he has played in just about every position. His ability to play full-back, centre or half-back has probably cost him a regular place in the side and he has spent a lot of his career on the subs bench.

**SCOTT SULLIVAN**

**Height 5ft 10in Weight 12st**  
Centre or wing. Signed from Crown Malet and has earned representative honours as a junior. Had a couple of runs in the first team last season.

Back-row forward, or prop. Excellent work-rate and solid defence. Sets a superb example for the youngsters to follow. A true professional and a dedicated player.

**PAUL EASTWOOD**

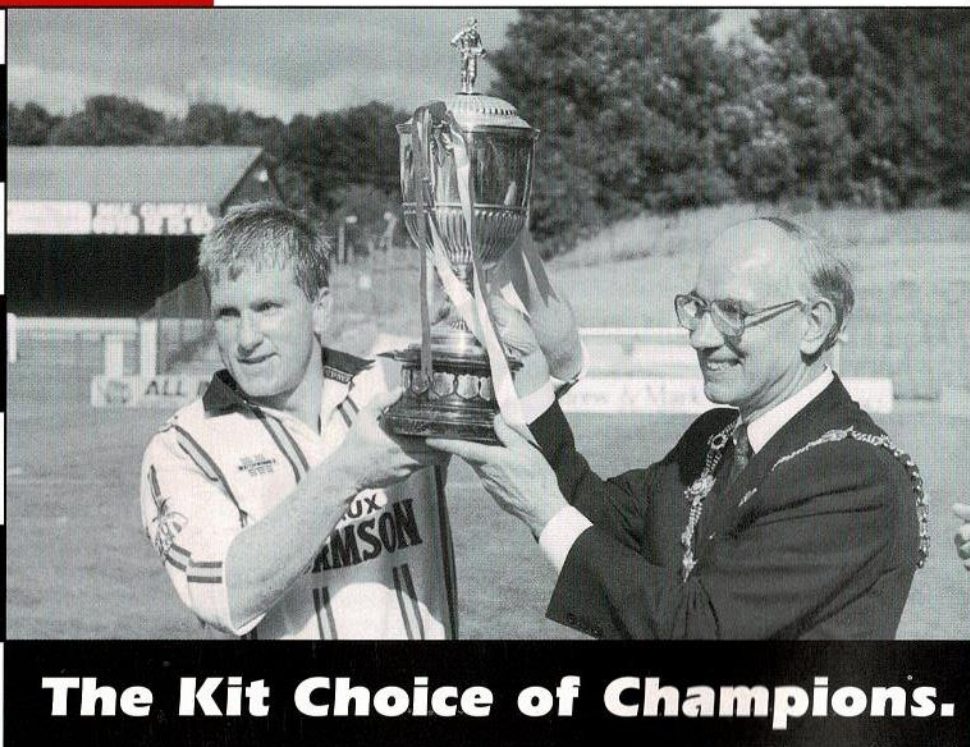
**Height 5ft 11in Weight 15st**

# GRASS ROOTS

## A LOOK AT THE LOCAL AMATEUR RUGBY SCENE

The snow storms which disrupted last weekend's programme of amateur matches have once again determined that Saddleworth Rangers' season will be extended until almost June. Rangers face a demanding four month schedule which includes ten Conference Premier League matches and at least two cup ties. Those two cup ties could be extended to eight matches so the simple facts are that Rangers now face between twelve and eighteen matches between now and the seasons end. Fortunately BARLA had the good sense to disband their Conference League Cup competition this season and with only 12 clubs in each division, the scheduled league programme ends on April 1st. This gives clubs six free weekends in which to arrange postponed matches before the season ends with the BNFL National Cup Final on the last weekend of May. Of course Rangers also have the Standard Cup competition to cope with, but more about those semi finals in next weeks programme. The league campaign has proved a difficult one for Rangers this season and they currently lie in next to bottom position. The ten remaining fixtures of Rangers involve matches against all four clubs immediately above them in the Premier League table. Unfortunately it also features home and away matches against Championship favourites Woolston

Rovers, a visit from the powerful Hemel Hempstead squad and also mouth watering home and away clashes against neighbours Mayfield, the Castleton based outfit who invariably lift their game when they meet Rangers. It is a tough schedule for Rangers but the Saddleworth outfit have proved in the past that they are capable of meeting any challenge. It looks now as if Askam will be one of the two clubs who will end the season relegated. It is my assessment that it will be either Dudley Hill or Wigan St. Pats who join them leaving Rangers to enjoy another season in the top flight. The position with St. Annes is not quite as bad but they too are still involved in both the Standard Cup and the BNFL National Cup and have nine outstanding First Division fixtures to fulfil. Amongst those league fixtures are a visit from Beverley, the Challenge Cup giant killers, and a trip to Millom who gave Saddleworth their biggest hiding of the season. Saints are just three points behind Lock Lane and Millom who currently occupy the two promotion spots. Millom are enjoying an outstanding season and must be favourites to go up. However, Lock Lane face a difficult run in to the campaign and Saints are certainly capable of pulling back those three points which could take them into the Premier Division.

# RUFF E. HEAD THE MAN IN THE KNOW

“ So it's yet another cup to Wigan. Jack Robinson was understandably proud last week to see every possible trophy on the club's sideboard, four domestic plus the World Club Championship. Much as it pains me to admit it, they have got things right to a degree which the rest of the British clubs at least can only stand back and admire, enviously. And although it goes against what a lot of people must be hoping, there must be every chance that the loss of Botica, Betts and Clarke (and Skerrett? and Mather? and Dermott?) will be taken in their stride just as easily as was that of Hanley, Hampson, Bell and Platt. They have the Liverpool F.C. knack of picking, moulding and then integrating new players into the team with no discernable disruption to overall quality. Who would ever have thought to see Martin Hall one of the top hookers in the world? ”

“ The GMR phone-in last week, not to mention a series of letters in the RL press, was heavy with warnings about the growth of yobbish crowd behaviour at RL grounds. I don't think it is much of a problem at run-of-the-mill games, myself. But big cup games are a different matter. I well remember changing the direction of my family's exit from Central Park after our 1986 Castleford semi-final at the sight of a gang clad in yellow shirts and obviously looking for trouble. I hope the authorities take very quick action, not only via better stewarding at such games, but also by the use of crowd control cameras, and then individual bans, which have had such a beneficial effect in soccer. ”

“ We didn't play well against Sheffield, certainly. But how annoying it is to have a player sent off, and then found 'not guilty'. Given the importance of Mike Kuiti to our attacking play, too, the odds must be that we

would have won if he had stayed on the field. The sooner refs. are allowed to take the name, and cite later, when in doubt about the severity of an offence, the better. ”

“ Is the yo-yo syndrome on its way out? Oldham and Sheffield, promoted in 1993, look safe middle-of-the-table sides after two seasons, and certainly Workington Town, and possibly Doncaster, may well stay up this season too. On the other hand, Leigh and Hull Kingston Rovers (relegated in 1994) don't look like promotion material this season - there were no sides relegated in 1993. Keighley look promotion certs., and with Phil Larder at the helm, and good crowds, show every prospect of becoming a real premier division side. The second place side, however, seems likely to be much more problematical; at the moment, any one of 7 sides could make it - but could they survive? ”

## REFLECTIONS

It is 72 years ago that, as an 8 year old schoolboy, I was taken to see my first R.L. game at Fartown, the home of the great Huddersfield team. From then onwards I was bitten by the bug. The game became my hobby. Eventually, when I was old enough (and big enough), I played for my village team in the under 21 league. After a mere two seasons I realised that I was not going to be the second Harold Wagstaffe, so I turned my attention to the administration side, followed, in 1943, by refereeing.

Little did I realise how far my enthusiasm for the game would take me. Indeed, looking back, I wonder how I found the time to go to work, especially in my 30 year spell as Director/Secretary of Blackpool Borough. It will be obvious that during my long spell in the game I have gained a lot of knowledge about it. I have seen a lot of changes, had good times and bad times and, for the rest of this season, I will be passing on to you some of the history of the game, some of which our younger readers will never have heard of. In the 1944/45 season the game was still under the shadow of war, but there was an emergency league, comprising 17 clubs (13 from Yorkshire, only 4 from Lancashire).

Players from clubs not in action were asked to guest with clubs of their choice. There were frequent changes in all teams as players who were in the forces could only play when on leave. Even so, there were some hard fought matches. Sixteen clothing coupons were required for a set of jerseys. Clubs relied on their supporters to give up coupons from their allowance to buy a set of jersey and pants. However, in September 1944, the Board of Trade came to the rescue and allowed the Rugby League an allowance of 870 clothing coupons, which eased the situation.

Clubs could not always fulfil their fixtures, for various reasons, players unable to get a pass, etc, so the League positions were decided by percentage. Bradford Northern won the League Leaders championship: played 17, won 13, drawn 1, lost 3, for 85%.

Halifax were runners up: played 16, won 13, drawn 1, lost 2, for 84%. There was a top four play-off. Bradford beat Wigan 18-15. Halifax beat Wakefield 17-11. The final was played in two legs, Halifax beat Bradford in the first leg at Thrum Hall 9-2, but in the return leg at Odsal, Bradford won 24-11, winning the championship on aggregate.

The Challenge Cup was also played this year, the final again being played in two legs. Huddersfield beat Bradford at Fartown 7-4, and then 6-5 in the return at Odsal. Huddersfield carried off the cup on a 13-9 aggregate score. I remember this well, being at both games and a guest at the reception to the cup winners at a Huddersfield restaurant. On a personal note, it was a good year for me, for in December 1944, after 12 months refereeing in the Huddersfield and District League, I was put forward for the official Referees examination in Leeds, which I passed. This enabled me to join the Yorkshire Society of Referees and to take appointments as an "A" team referee and as a first team touch judge, a career that lasted 16 years. On Boxing Day 1944, the game between St.Helens and Wigan had to be abandoned at 3/4 time after the crowd invaded the pitch to demonstrate against the referee. He was escorted from the field by police and players to protect him from the troublemakers. At a subsequent inquiry a St.Helens player, A.Davies, was suspended sine-die and the club were ordered to put up warning notices about the future behaviour of spectators. Leigh were looking for a new ground to restart after the war and Warrington were hoping to get their ground back for the next season.

## GOOD NEWS AND BAD NEWS

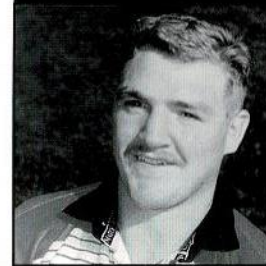
