FROM THE BOARDROOM

BY CHAIRMAN JIM QUINN

Congratulations to Andy Goodway and his coaching staff, and to all the players, for their magnificent performance in beating Warrington at Wilderspool last Saturday in the fifth round of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup.

It was a terrific achievement by an injury hit Oldham squad, watched by millions on nationwide television, and the coaches, players and directors hope you all enjoyed it. As a bonus, it would be nice to think that our little bit of glory in the Challenge Cup so far will have a positive affect on attendances for the rest of the season.

A word of warning, however. We must not flatter to deceive. Too often in the past we have built up the hopes and aspirations of spectators only to disappoint them badly in the next match. We are alive to that situation and will be doing all we can to ensure that we get some consistency over the remainder of the season.

consistency over the remainder of the season. By the way did you notice the extremely heavy conditions of the Wilderspool pitch? Those who saw it in close up on television probably got a better idea of how heavy it was than those who went to the game. Two things sprung to mind. It made us realise once move how well our own pitch is standing up to the winter. It also made me think, yet again, of the benefits of playing in a season which avoids the worst of the winter in

December, January and February.

The summer rugby debate is once again gathering momentum, but unfortunately, there have been one or two unsavoury incidents on our grounds in the past two or three weeks which have attracted the wrong type of headlines. In the main, Rugby League fans do the game proud. We are a family sport, and proud of it, but there is no room for complacency, as recent publicity shows.

I like to think the Oldham club can pride itself on its crowd behaviour. We all have a responsibility to see our good record maintained, both at home and away. There is no room in Rugby League for hooligans, foul language on the terraces or racial abuse.

On the field, Greg McCallum is now making a major impact and all power to his elbow. His latest idea of putting players "on report" is an excellent one. There have been several instances this season of dismissed players ultimately being found not guilty by the disciplinary committee. To try and avoid this, a referee who suspects a player is guilty of foul play, but might have been partially unsighted and less than certain, can formally place the player "on report" and examine the evidence on video later. If there is no case to answer, the "report' is dropped. If there is,



the usual disciplinary procedure will apply, even through the player concerned was not sent off

Our Referee's Coaching Director has definitely got the game moving in the right direction and I am sure we will see the benefits of his work during the rest of the season and in subsequent seasons. Finally, a big Watersheddings welcome to the Wakefield Trinity directors, coaches, players and fans for this afternoons Stones Bitter Championship game. Trinity and Oldham games are often high scoring matches in which the verdict is open until the final hooter blasts. Trinity will be anxious to pick up points to edge away from a heavily congested area in the lower reaches of the division. Oldham will be keen to stay on course for a place in the top eight. Our visitors in detail

MIKE FORSHAW

The first thing David Hobbs did on taking over was to make this 25 year old back row forward skipper. Signed from Wigan at the beginning of last season, Mike quickly established himself at Belle Vue, earning the plaudits of the fans with his dynamic, all action, style and his ability to pop up at vital times to score tries. Sidelined for a good deal of last season with a scaphoid injury. Mike will be looking to lead from the front in a much strengthened pack

AARON WHITAKER

25, ex Canterbury (NZ) and Illawarra half back, who ousted Gary Freeman from the scrum half spot in the third Test of last season's Kiwi tour. Impressed many with his performances on that tour, mostly in the "Wednesday" side, but most observers agreed that the Kiwis' fortunes picked up when Aaron stepped into the side. As a 19 year old, played for Chorley Borough, where he was known as

ROBERT PIVA

6'3" 18 stone second row or prop, "Oddjob" was signed from Lion Red League side Taranaki Rockets, where he built a reputation as a powerful forward with an impressive physique which belies his quiet person. Destined to become a firm favourite with the Belle Vue fans, he toured with the Kiwis last time round, but was unable to secure a place in the test side, and his talents were spotted whilst Trinity's scouts were watching Aaron Whitaker on video! Caused the club considerable problems pre-season, as they couldn't find a shirt big enough to fit him!

STEVE DURHAM

Ex Stanley Rangers amateur and Hull FC prop, Steve's low

signing last season was another of former coach Dave Topliss' shrewd acquisitions, originally to provide forward cover in an injury crisis, but Steve's performances were so impressive that he became a regular upfront. A hard working player, capable of unloading in the tackle, he is a high quality squad player.

Signed in the close season from Wigan, where he was a vital squad member, this 6'4" 16 stone packman began his career with Leigh Rangers, before being signed by the all conquering Wigan side, were he gained GB honours at colts and U21 level. All too frequently on the bench at Central Park, Ian comes to Belle Vue with a point to prove. and his demon tackling combined with powerful running will add much needed firepower to the Trinity pack.

DAVID BAILEY

Aged 24 and from the same Waikatere City club as Henry Paul, David is New Zealand's leading try scorer, including a hat trick scored when playing for New Zealand residents versus Western Samoa, and is tipped by many to be a future Kiwi stand off, though he can operate in the centre as well as in the half backs. Trinity have high hopes that he can fill the problem stand off berth vacated when Nigel Wright signed for Wigan last season.

FRANCIS STEPHENSON

Son of former Trinity and Bradford Northern star, Nigel, Francis has an impressive pedigree, and chose Wakefield despite being pursued by all the top clubs. A strong running forward, fierce tackler and skilful hall player, he earned a place in the first team towards the end of last whilst still only 18, and many around Belle Vue feel that he has the ability and dedication to go right to the top, a feeling backed up by his effortless step up from Academy

A teenage prodigy signed around the same time as the now departed Gary Price, John's early career as a teenage second rower was blighted by a series of injuries which would have ended the careers of less determined characters. Now in his early twenties, he has almost reinvented himself as a centre, and still has the potential to make it in the top flight.

IAN MARLOW

Experienced, ex Beverly RU and Hull FC prop, lan was acquired last season along with Steve Durham in a bid to bolster an injury hit pack, and fitted in so well that he

earned an international call up when he played against the Kiwis last winter. Another bargain buy who is a valuable

GARY CHRISTIE

21, 5ft 11in U21 International secured in exchange for Gary Price from Oldham, only took up the game aged 18 with amateur club Widnes Tigers yet within 18 months had achieved representative honours. Seen by many as one of the game's brightest young prospects, Trinity snapped him up in the face of intense competition from several other top clubs, and this summer he turned down an offer from hometown club Widnes, preferring to remain at Belle Vue.

MARK SHEALS

27, 5ft 11ins, 16 stone 4 prop, a terrific crowd favourite at the Watersheddings, where he was voted supporters' player of the year last season, as well as being voted top prop in Division 2. His departure, in exchange for Trinity winger David Jones provoked such an out cry amongst the Oldham faithful that a petition was instigated by fans incensed at the move. Renowned as a hard working pro's oro, whose workrate and consistency earned him selection for Lancashire. Desperately unlucky to break his leg in a pre-season friendly, during an impressive debut las season, he will be looking to make a big impact this

Ex-Yorkshire county under 19 star, turned pro with Hull from Middleton amateurs, failed to break through on Humberside, in the face of intense competition from werseas stars like Mackey, Entat and Gale, being snapped up by Trinity during the close season. After some nervous performances, became a big crowd favourite last season, earning the nickname "Psycho" with his non-stop effort and fierce defence. 



ON FIELD REPORTING

For your information, here is an explanation of the latest initiative by Greg McCallum the referee's coaching director. a. What is on-field reporting?


It is when the referee is not too sure (or is unsighted) of something that may have happened involving foul play. Instead of sending a player/s off the referee can leave them on the field but puts in a report for the video to be viewed by an Executive Committee after the game. The signal for this will be the referee crossing his arms straight above his head with fists clenched for three seconds.

b. Who looks at the video?

A special Executive Committee of the RFL, will study the referees report and view the video

c. What happens if the video shows the player/s did

The player will be charged under the International Laws of the game and will have to attend the Disciplinary Committee hearing who will decide if the player is guilty. If the video



shows the player didn't do anything illegal then the report is

d. Is this system used anywhere else? Yes in Australia since 1987. About 50% of the players reported in Australia are sent to the Disciplinary, about 90% of those players who have been sent to the Disciplinary are



A LOOK AT THE LOCAL AMATEUR RUGBY SCENE

It has been an important weekend for our two Conference sides, Saddleworth Rangers and St Annes. Yesterday they were both involved in the fourth round of the BNFL National Cup competition. Both sides were drawn at home to Cumbrian opposition. Saddleworth met LOWCA whilst Saints entertained Cumbrian Cup winners Walney Central in what should have been a cracking tie. Victories in those matches would put the clubs into the last 32. There is still a long way to go but local officials are hopeful that the trophy will remain in the town.

Last week Saddleworth Rangers produced one of their better performances of the season when they defeated title challengers Hemel Hempstead 36-12 at Shaw Hall Bank Road. Centre Shaun Cooper scored three tries in that win. However, Rangers still lie in fourth from bottom spot and are not completely clear of relegation fears. Next Saturday Rangers travel to Woolston Rovers, the Championship favourites. Last May, Saddleworth won 24-8 at Woolston and with Rovers having three players in South Africa, the BARLA squad, a repeat win is not that unlikely. they still have an outside chance of promotion. They lie in fifth position. just five points behind second placed Millom. Next Saturday Saints are at home to East Leeds, then visit Moldgreen before entertaining Leigh East on Saturday 25th March. The home matches should bring victories for St Annes but it will be difficult at Moldgreen who themselves are Championship contenders. The corresponding match last season ended in a 17-6 win for Moldgreen. We will have to see if Saints can reverse that scoreline in what is another vital game.





The very same night at Knowsley Road 17300 fans packed in and a few thousand were locked out that couldn't get in to see the St. Helens v Wigan replay and despite the


level of skill and entertainment served up, we saw a couple of instances were objects were flung onto the field and in one particular case a touch judge was hit and injured.


It doesn't matter why these acts occurred, because whatever the reason there can be no excuse!

A look at our Alliance team

crux. We seemed so composed and cold-eyed that I was confident, once we had survived that pressure, we would outstanding in both offence and defence most of the season. With Jason Temu now well established as a genuine 1st Division prop. and Wilson Marsh beginning to show his quality as a ball distributor as well as a goalkicker (if not, last week, as a sixth-lackle kicker!), whoever spotted them as a trio of overseas signings deserves big

Courtesy of last week's League Express, the statistics on the cup game provided fascinating reading. Missed tackles were quoted as 40 by Warrington, 13 by Oldham, for example. No Warrington forward achieved a successful offload in the tackle - that must be down to our swarming defensive effort - whereas Mike Kuiti alone made 4, out of our total of 13. "Hit-ups" (I presume we are in Aussiespeak) were three to two in our favour, reflecting our dramatically better control of the ball, especially in the last Topping's incredible 28 tackles as a centre. Jonathan Davies made 51

revealing. But one impressionistic use of figures annoys. me intensely - some newspapers attempts to 'mark' the How an individual reporter can claim to have observed all score each one baffles me. I only hope the players and

clubs don't take any notice of such rubbish. But I thought the 'marks' reported in last Monday's Manchester Evening News took the biscuit. The Leigh players (they lost by 90 points!) and the Salford players (described by the correspondent as "disjointed, disorganised and dispirited") both managed to accumulate higher scores than those of Widnes, who won convincingly at Sheffield! And Penny scored the same as Gibson, Mackey the same as Crompton, and McGuire more than Temu; I don't think Mr Dawson was at the same game as me!

Andy Goodway might be excused for having his head rather in the clouds this week. Wherever you looked, listened or read, he was being praised unmercilessly, and touted for Coach of the Season and Future GB Manager. I rather liked the down-beat after-match quote: "If anything keeps me in a job, it'll be our final league position". However, be that as it may, I rather suspect nothing less than a statue outside Oldham Town Hall if he turns out to be the coach responsible for the first Wembley trip! Watch out soon, too, for a major feature article on the Goodway-McCurrie-McHugh team.

How much practice do players put in on grubber-kicks into the in-goal area? In the modern game, it seems to me to be a crucial factor in determining the outcome of matches, how many times a side can force consecutive sets of six tackles. It was noticeable how well we did it at Wilderspool, in comparison to the number of misjudged kicks there were at St Helens the week before, when Martin Crompton of course was lacking match practice. In tight games, it has often been Wigan's most effective ploy over the years, and I think we have learned that lesson from them, at least,

Conflict with cricket has often been raised as a stumbling block to be overcome by the summer rugby school. In this context, a statement by Leeds last week is perhaps of some significance, stressing the impossibility of playing RL at Headingley in the summer because of established agreements with Yorkshire C.C.C. Maybe the mid-season break option is worth a harder look?

The goings-on at Doncaster seem very strange, and even the possibility that a First Division club might go out of business mid-season reinforces the need for the Rugby League to have a role in exercising some control over clubs' finances. Huge and obviously unrealistic contracts dished out at the start of the season, non-payment of players, sale of the ground (for what price? to whom?), the sacking of Tony Fisher; I suspect there is a rather murky story yet to be told. But what a tragedy it would be to lose the club

Still on the subject of finance, the comparison was made last week between Wigan and Oldham in terms of the possible effect of the introduction of the salary cap. With a maximum 50% of income to be spent on salaries, the implication is that the rich will simply get richer, and the divide between the elite and the rest will get greater. Last year, Wigan's wage bill was nearly 3 times Oldham's turnover! And how will Oldham achieve a reduction from 72% to 50% of income spent on wages, without a reduction in playing quality? There is only one possible way - a large rise in income - which is exactly what Mr Quinn and his board have been saying, and trying to achieve, since they took over. Taking into account the inevitable impact of the National Lottery, the fact that the average attendance was recently quoted as being 91 greater than in '93-94 is probably not a lot of consolation

REFLECTIONS

1946. A MOMENTOUS TOUR


A Rugby League tour must take some planning, but when the R.L. accepted the Australian invitation to send a team to tour there in the summer of 1946. little did they know what problems would arise. At one stage it looked like it may be called off, as transport was the difficulty, but the Royal Navy came to the rescue. The HMS Indomitable was sailing to Australia on April 4th, it was one of the fleet's aircraft carriers taking troops back home and they offered berths for the Lions party of about 32, and the R.L. gladly accepted. There was a rush to get organised, the tour managers were selected, Mr W Popplewell (Bramley) and Mr W Gabbatt (Barrow), it was agreed to play 3 tests and 17 other games and to go on to New Zealand to play 1 test and 6 other games. A provisional squad of 26 players was selected but difficulties arose when Ward (Bradford N). Phillips (Oldham) and White (York) were still in the forces and were refused leave. However, some Yorkshire M.P.s swung into action, made representations to the War Office and all 3 were granted leave. The Navy agreed to let the tour party have the Petty Officers quarters on board

ship, I suppose it was better than hammocks, but I bet the P.O.s were not pleased. Terms of pay were agreed with the players, these were £1-10 shillings per week whilst on board, (£1-50) present day equivalent, £2-10 shillings (£2.50), wives would receive £3 a week and 7 shillings and sixpence (37 1/2p) for each child, they would also receive a share of any profits at the end of the tour. The average wage in those days was about £4 per week, if you were lucky, when you consider that these fellows were top professional players, they must have been dedicated players who considered it an honour to play for their country. I know you can't compare those hard times with the present day remuneration our players get for touring, with all the luxury travel and accommodation they receive, plus well paid wages and a big bonus for winning a test match, I believe the latest G.B. squad got £2000 each for beating the Aussies at Wembley. The tour party duly sailed on April 4th on their journey to Freemantle, which took 5 weeks. When they had settled down it must have seemed like a long holiday, after war time rationing here. One of the party told me he had never seen as much food and they fed well, they


trained on the flight deck in tropical sunshine. they also developed a tremendous team spirit, but there was unexpected trouble ahead. When they arrived at Freemantle they found out that the Indomitable had been ordered elsewhere and it was planned for the aircraft carrier HMS Victorious to take them the remainder of their journey, but the ship had to go into dry dock for repairs after storm damage, which would take 3 weeks. This delay would put the tour plans all at sea, so to speak, so hurried arrangements were made to travel by train, a journey of 2700 miles to Sydney which would take 5 days, in what turned out to be more or less a cattle train with some passenger carriages, which were as packed as the cattle trucks. This took the smile off the players faces.

The train went miles and miles without seeing anything but bushland. It was steamy, hot by day and cold at night, they were pestered by flies, stations were few and far between, they had to get a good wash and brush up whenever they stopped and stock up with food. It was a very weary party that eventually arrived in Sydney but they were greeted by wildly enthusiastic crowds wherever they went, which lifted their flagging spirits. Then they had to get down to the real business of training and playing rugby league, with little time to prepare.




