1994 Silk Cut Awards

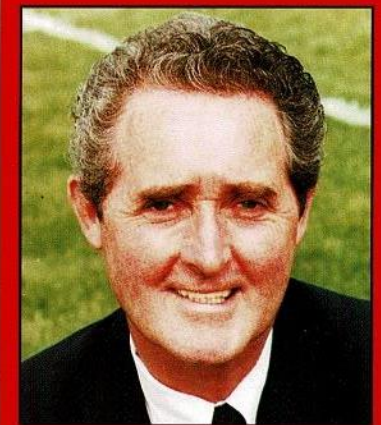
Silk Cut Awards will again be presented to the adjudged Man of the Match in each tie from the first round onwards. In each case the winner will receive a commemorative medallion, plus a cheque for £150 (from the third round through to the quarter finals). The Man of the Match at both semi-finals receives a cheque for £300 plus an engraved silver plated replica rugby ball.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

BY CHAIRMAN JIM QUINN

Our appearance today in the quarter final of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup will inevitably revive memories of the frustrations suffered by the Oldham club on its abortive Wembley campaigns of the last 35 years or so. I remember going along to Swinton in 1960 only to see the great Bernard Ganley, of all people, sent off as a great Oldham team of that era crashed to Hull in the semi-final. Four years later, in 1964, one of Huddersfield's greatest rugby league sons, the late Frank 'Spanky' Dyson put enough grit and determination into a second division Oldham side that, under his leadership as player-coach, we reached the semi-final again, this time to meet Hull KR. You will have heard what happened many, many times over, I'm sure Len McIntyre's long range drop goal in the first match at Headingley forced a draw. A Dyson penalty from half way in the last minute of normal time denied Hul KR a second time in the replay at Station Road. Denied twice, Rovers were emotionally and

physically drained and it was no surprise when Geoff Robinson crashed over for a try in the first period of extra time to put Oldham in front. What happened next? The referee, the late Dennis Davies, abandoned the tie because of bad light (these were the days before floodlights) and it was Oldham's turn to be psychologically shattered. In the third clash at Fartown, Oldham were never really in contention and were well beaten after an early injury blow to full back Dyson, the team's inspiration. It was 22 years before Oldham were to appear in the semi-final again, and yet, again there was another controversial incident which went against us as Castleford booked their place at Wembley. This time Bob Beardmore scored a crucial try that swung the game only to be shown on television afterwards as having his feet over the dead ball line at the time he touched down. So to 1990 and our semi-final clash with Warrington. Martin Crompton played for the



Wires that day and scored a try which everyone in the Oldham camp was convinced followed a forward pass. But worse was to come in the dying minutes when Paul Lord followed Mike Ford's kick to the corner. He touched down for a try which would have levelled the scores, but referee John Holdsworth ruled Lord fractionally offside. A year later we were in the semi-finals again. This time we were well beaten by Wigan at Burnden Park, Bolton as Oldham fans had their great Wembley dream shattered again. We often seem to be the bridesmaid, never the bride, or groom for that matter. But it might happen one day. Until it does, we won't talk about it. We will just wait and see what happens. It is good to see such a famous club as Huddersfield getting a share of the limelight in the game's centenary year. The great days at Fartown are legion, but Huddersfield have now shown conclusively that our great game is on the move and up for change with the opening of the Alfred McAlpine Stadium. It is a magnificent stadium and one which will clearly become widely used in the future for big Rugby League occasions. We give a big Watersheddings welcome to Huddersfield today, to chairman Bob Scott, the board, coach George Fairbairn, players and fans. A special welcome, too, on their return to Watersheddings for our former players Steve Kerry and Mick Taylor. I am sure they will get a warm reception. Whatever the result, we look forward to a first class cup tie in the great traditions of Oldham versus Huddersfield games. May the better team win.

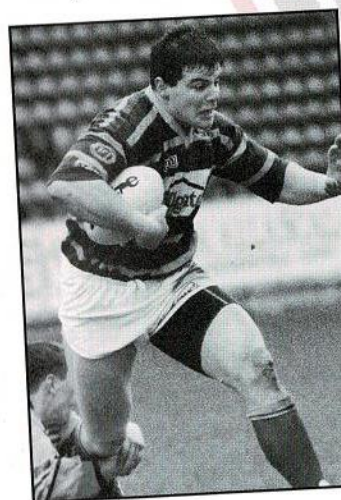

GRASS ROOTS

A LOOK AT THE LOCAL AMATEUR RUGBY SCENE

The standard of amateur rugby during the past twenty years or so has improved beyond recognition. So too have the social and changing facilities whilst the rewards for the top players are now extremely attractive.

No longer the endless round of local derby matches broke up by the odd Cup trip over to Humberside or up to Cumbria. Nowadays the Conference teams travel to every corner of the Rugby League regions whilst BARLA squads have visited South Africa, Morocco, France and the South Pacific during the past twelve months alone.

Local enthusiasts will be able to judge for themselves just how much improvement has been achieved in recent seasons if they attend any of the big matches which are scheduled to be staged in the town during the next couple of weeks.

Top match next week is the delayed BNFL National Cup-tie between St Annes and Walney Central. Because Walney Central have three players involved in the highly successful BARLA tour of South Africa, this tie is now to be played next Saturday. This match is one not to be missed. Saints go into the match as slight favourites having defeated Walney both home and away this season. In September they scraped home 18-17 before pulling off a magnificent 12-4 victory

at Central Park in early January. But Walney have an outstanding cup pedigree and are current holders of the Cumbria Cup. They beat the powerful Hensingham outfit 18-16 in the final of that competition but a more impressive result was their 11-6 win over Millom in the quarter-finals. Local followers who intend watching this match should look out for the three tourists, centre Ronnie Kettlewell, back-row forward Ian Devlin and utility back Darren Wilson.

Of course, Saints have a few stars of their own, so it certainly should be a great game. Seven days later, on Saturday 25th March, Saints are at home again when the visitors are Leigh East in a National Conference First Division fixture.

Another big match in the town next week is Saddleworth Ranger's game against Mayfield. Rangers are still battling against relegation and go into the match anxious for victory. They should achieve that objective although when Mayfield last visited Shaw Hall Bank Road for a Lancashire Cup-tie in October 1992, a late try from winger Jason Diamond enabled Mayfield to win 12-11. Another close match is in prospect. Seven days later Rangers visit Leigh Miners Welfare for yet another crucial Premier League fixture.

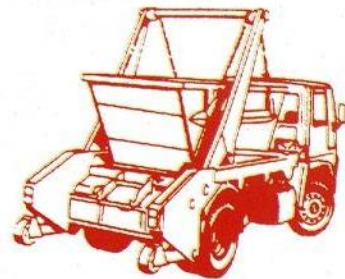

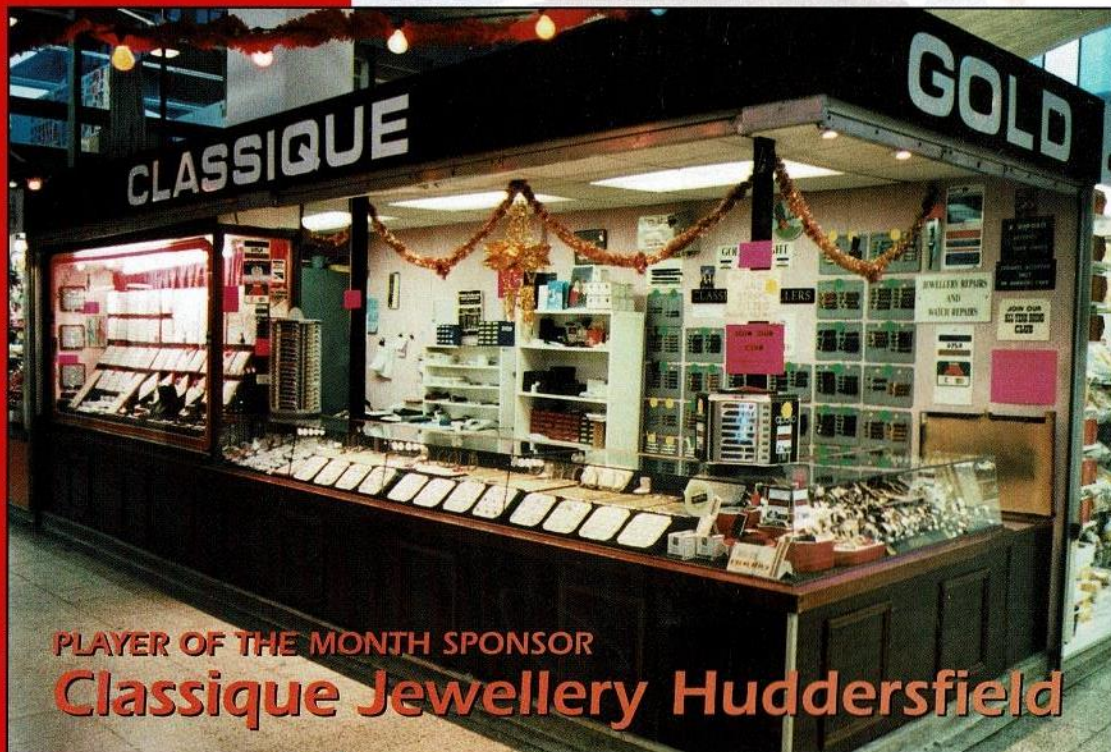

like Bradford Northern and Castleford and these are the same players who have allegedly been training almost every night of the week for weeks now under their new coach Ian Lucas.

If they lose, Leigh players take home some £28.00 and there are no expenses payments to top it up - it's feasible that some of them may even finish out of pocket.

These men are committed, they are dedicated and however indiscreet and OK, un-professional, some may have appeared, taking their club blazers away (with the badges that the players paid for) and publicly humiliating them will not do them or Leigh any good at all.

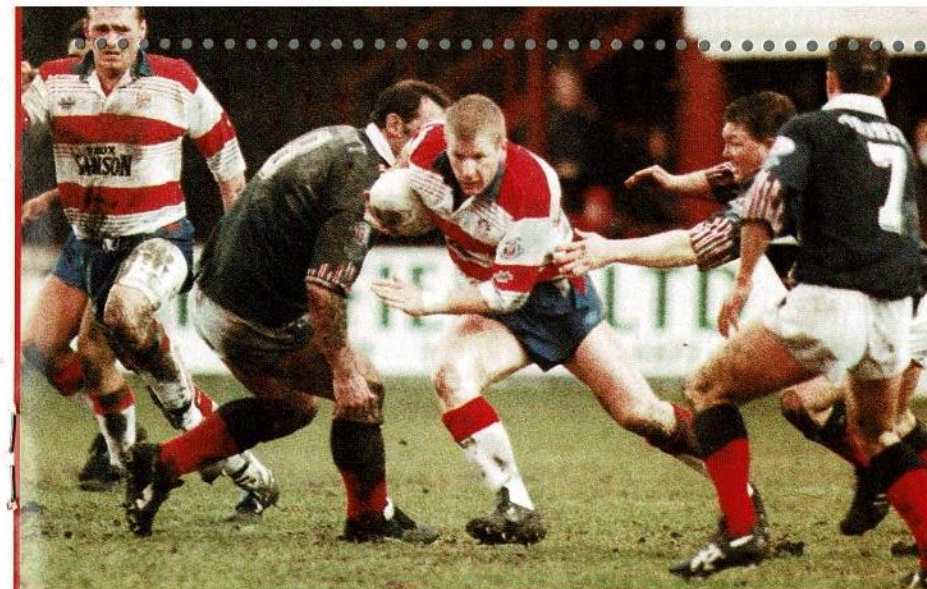
The players have two rights - a right to consistency and a right to expect good leadership.

I don't think they're getting either at the moment and until they do Leigh will go nowhere.

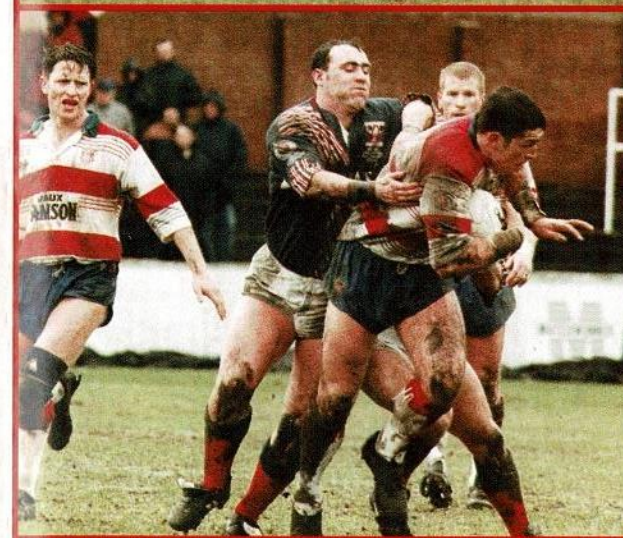
There's enough sleaze around at the moment, enough muck being flung in all sports and washing dirty linen of any kind in public is always an unsavoury tactic.

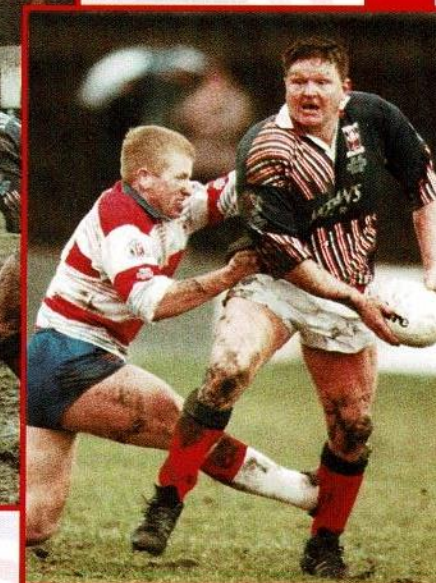
Top: Martin Crompton going through the gap.

RUFF E. HEAD THE MAN IN THE KNOW

“ What a good cup draw, again. Neutrals are probably pleased that the big two were kept apart, whilst those keen to see Wigan lose still have at least some hope, with Widnes showing some kind of return to form in recent weeks. Geographically the games are well spread, and both second division survivors have a realistic chance of a semi-final place. No-one particularly envies Featherstone their trip to Whitehaven, where Kurt Sorenson is receiving the same sort of plaudits as Andy Goodway as a potential future top manager. And Workington won't let Leeds have it all their own way either, I am sure. What of today's game at Watersheddings? The history of matches between the two clubs is a long one, of course. Although we have had the best of them in recent years, including hard-earned cup wins in both 1990 and 1993, no-one will need to tell the players that those are completely irrelevant come 3.00pm today. George Fairburn has put together a very useful-looking side, with real pace in the backs, Steve Kerry getting good reviews as a link-man, and a pack with both size and mobility. We shall soon see! Last Sunday was, of course, very disappointing. We had a few chances and failed to take them, certainly. But I must say that I was impressed by Wakefield. They made remarkably few errors in the second half in particular, and put in the sort of effort which

says a lot about the Harkin/Kelly duo's motivational powers. And why on earth are Wigan looking beyond Nigel Wright as their stand-off? If he hadn't made it back from France, I don't think anyone would dispute the likelihood of our having taken the points with some ease. He works hard on defence, kicks the ball beautifully, and has that something extra with the ball in his hands. Sheer class, in my opinion.

After a season which has been relatively free of injuries, I am sure everyone feels gutted for Shaun Irwin. He has been a real trier ever since he joined us, and has often been a contender for man of the match on days when we have lost heavily. Let us hope that he eventually makes a full recovery. As these notes are written, it looks as though Doncaster may not survive, after all. The main winners, strangely, would be Widnes who have conceded three of Doncaster's eleven points in the league so far. Oldham are one of four sides who stand to lose four points of the Dons go, the others being Leeds, Salford and Warrington. However, it looks increasingly that Doncaster would be playing in the Second Division next season, where of course they have always been prior to this season. It is generally fairly common knowledge that only five teams - Castleford, Leeds, St.Helens, Warrington and Widnes - have been permanent members of the First Division since the current

structure began in 1973, but is perhaps less well-known that only two current Division Two clubs have ever risen above that status - Batley and Highfield. It now seems strange to think that it is only 1990 since Barrow were last a top division side, and that Leigh, Hull and Hull K.R. shared the Division One championship during the years 1981-85. Will the onset of the "Premier League" result in a reduction in the chances of such a major swings of fortune for clubs, I wonder? Perhaps Mr.Lindsay and his men should bear in mind that it was only in 1980 that Wigan shared relegation with Blackpool Borough, when they are deciding league structures! I included Hull in the above because their home defeat by Sheffield last week makes it considerably more likely that they will be relegated come April, for the first time since 1978. No doubt there would ensure more talk of mergers as a result, on Humberside as well as in Calderdale, given the Halifax situation, and perhaps also in South Yorkshire. With such possibilities, not to mention moves to new grounds, talk of summer rugby, and world leagues, it is very clear that old certainties are dead. The long era of one division and unlimited tackles seems like ancient history!

REFLECTIONS

I make no excuse for continuing the story of the 1946 tour to Australia, as this was one of the most outstanding tours in the history of our game. After leaving here on the aircraft carrier, H.M.S. Indomitable on April 4th, it was May 22nd before they were able to play their first tour match against Southern Division, which they won, at a price, for loose forward Harry Murphy (Wakefield T) dislocated his shoulder after 39 minutes and took no further part in the tour. Remember, there were no substitutes in those days and no replacements could be sent for because of the long time it took to get there. They then followed with an even bigger win against Canberra, 45-12, they were running into form. However, they were brought down to earth 3 days later when they met New South Wales in Sydney, before 51,364 howling Aussies, they were held to 14-10. Such was the bad planning by the Australians of the hastily arranged tour that the G.B. team had to play again the following day against a Southern Division team and the leg weary team lost 15-12. Only 5 days later they had to meet the best of Australia in the first Test match. There were 64,527 spectators at Sydney cricket ground and they saw a titanic struggle. It ended in an 8-8 draw, but G.B. were unlucky, they had Jack Kitchen (Bradford N.) sent off in the first half and the usually reliable captain, Gus Risman, missed 8 out of 9 goal kicks. Outstanding for Australia was Lionel Cooper who scored a spectacular try, he

later signed for Huddersfield. I remember him well, he was outstanding for the Fartowners and was an idol of the crowds everywhere he played. After this game the tourists were badly hit by injuries, they had a very tight and unreasonable match schedule. They had to make a number of changes for the 2nd Test in Brisbane, this again attracted a full house, thousands were locked out. The G.B. team played brilliantly, the hero was Arthur Bassett, the big Halifax winger, who scored a hat-trick of tries. Cooper was the only Australian try scorer. The "Pommes" won by 14-5. The team went from strength to strength, setting up new records, running in big scores against most teams, their highest being 94-0 against Mackay in Queensland. In 1979 I was privileged to travel with the G.B. team and officials on the 1979 tour and I recall the first match was at Mackay and it took them all their time to win. The last match of the 1946 tour was the final Test in Sydney, the Ashes were at stake, G.B. had a poor first half and were losing 7-2 but they put their house in order at half time and shocked the Aussie team and spectators by a brilliant 2nd half performance, scoring 4 tries and Risman kicked 3 goals, thus winning the Ashes. Australian clubs approached several of the British players with long term contracts, none accepted. However, the following season it was our clubs who were offering contracts to the Australians, and some of them who accepted the bait and made a big

impact on our game were Johnny Hunter and Pat Devery (Huddersfield), Arthur Clues and Bert Cook (Leeds) and many others. When the tour ended they continued on to New Zealand, but by this time the players were just exhausted and leg weary. They only played 7 matches, including just one Test, but they never showed the sparkle they had in Australia, they still won 5 out of 7 matches but they lost the important test match, 8-13. They left Wellington to sail home on the S.S. Rangitiki on August 14th. After a most gruelling tour the players could sit back and enjoy the sail, via the Pacific Ocean, Panama Canal, and for some reason the ship was diverted to New York, causing a further delay and they did not arrive at Tilbury until Sept 23rd. They had been away over 6 months, no wonder they named them "The Indomitables", could you imagine the modern day players putting up with such a tour? Despite their success, there was no official reception for them when they arrived back in Leeds. Whilst on board ship the players had a meeting and agreed to send a letter to the R.L. Council about the poor conditions they had to endure - poor hotels, loss of luggage and clothing which had been stolen, some players said they were out of pocket. They agreed to ask for some compensation, they gave the letter to Mr W Gabbatt, tour manager, but the R.L. Council turned down their request, thanks for nothing. However, the Council awarded each player £123, their share of tour profits, as agreed in their contracts. After such a tremendous tour, that seemed very little reward, don't you think.

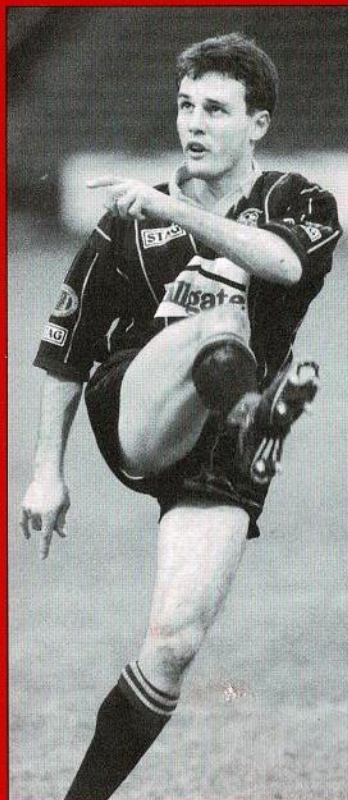

David Stephenson had a great game against Warrington



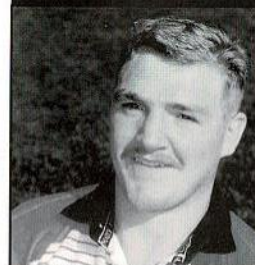
