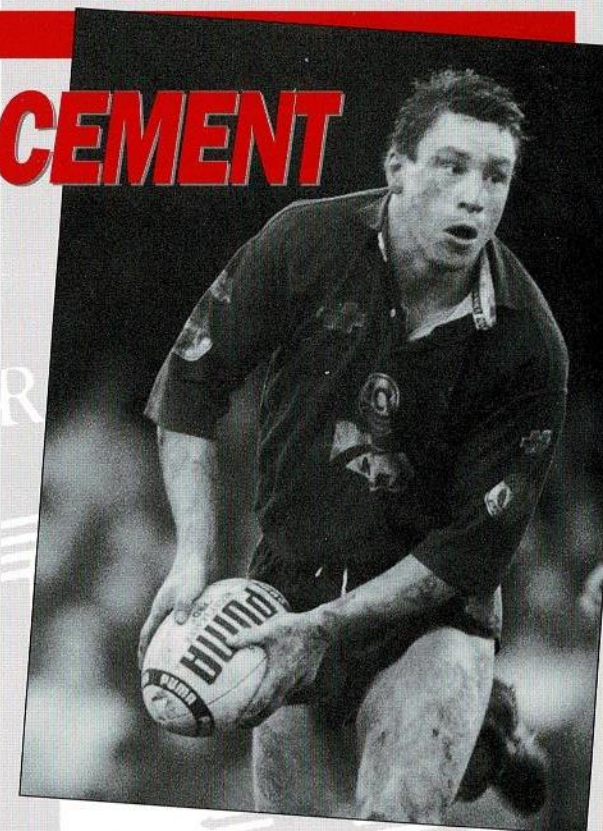
GUTSY REPLACEMENT

■ Replacing popular players who have left the Club is always a difficult task, supporters are always quick to compare the replacement. The popular Andy Collier who joined Widnes in the close season from the crisis torn Club Leigh has done much to soften the blows of the departures with gutsy all action performances we expect here at Widnes. The B&W spoke to Andy recently about his season here at Naughton Park.

"Leaving Leigh my hometown club after eight seasons with them was probably the right thing to do, they were having problems financially and with the future of Hilton Park itself not certain. I did feel genuinely sorry for the supporters of the Club, they certainly did not deserve all the problems they were having.

At the end of last season one or two Clubs did show an interest in me, Workington and Keighley made very good offers for me to join them but I did express a wish to stay within the region, so as not disrupt my studies too much. I am in my final year of BEd. course at a college near Southport and when Widnes came in for me I was delighted to sign for them.

There were a couple of players here already that I knew quite well such as David Ruane with whom I played at Leigh. Darren Wright and I go back quite along way as youngsters playing in the same school teams to joining the amateur club Leigh Miners before going our separate ways in the professional ranks. Then of course there is Lee Hansen who later followed me to Naughton Park. I am really enjoying myself here at Widnes, they are a great set of lads with a sense of humour to match. I won't try to kid anybody that it as been something of an



easy time here, completely the opposite. It has been a very tough campaign playing some good sides along the way and not getting the results which were warranted by the spirited displays Widnes have given. Believe you me it is as much frustrating for the coaching staff and the players as it is for the supporters, who incidently have been absolutely magnificent this season, playing their important role of lifting the side vocally home and away. At Leigh I was given a lot of responsibility because at twenty seven I was the oldest player. I played out of position quite a lot especially in the pack, I even played quite few games at prop forward, which when you consider I first joined as a fullback could have had a damaging effect on my personal game. Since arriving here at Widnes I have been mainly selected in the much preferred second row position.

We have been winning a few league games recently, hopefully we can consolidate on those encouraging performances with some good results against sides who are also at the wrong end of the league table. We certainly have the class and the players here at Widnes to do just that".

With all due respect to Garry

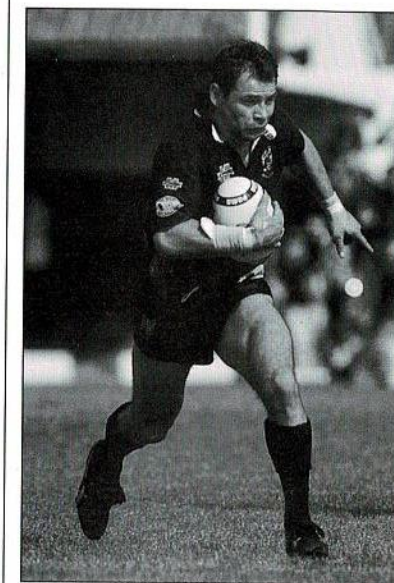

David can look back on many glory filled days in a glittering career with the Chemics and quite rightly he possesses a cupboard-full of awards and medals. But it is his displays in the last two Widnes games that has prompted me to put pen to paper.

Against Sheffield Eagles and Wigan in the Challenge Cup he produced two super displays, making hard yards which completely vindicate those earlier words of David Creasser.

The records will show that David Hulme has scored over 100 tries for the Chemics, but I wouldn't mind betting he has saved another 400 with his awesome cover tackling.

During the glory days of the 1970s

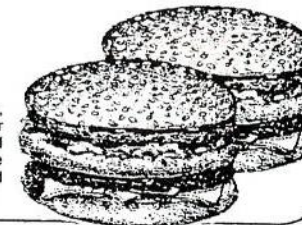

Records come and records go, but there's one still standing at Widnes from almost 30 years ago. Robin Whitfield's 11 goals in a game against Oldham on October 28 1965. "I remember it as if it was only yesterday," said Robin, who is now helping out in the coaching of our referees after proving to be one of the best officials in the world himself.

"That Oldham game was one of those days when everything went just right," said Robin. "Oldham had a good team in those days including South African full back John Winton, who later played for Wigan. "We were expecting it to be hard to win the game never mind beat Oldham. But we just went out and threw the ball around. It was like Harlem Globetrotters and we won 49-5."

"The one disappointment about that game was that I hit the posts with two other kicks and was also recalled for a forward pass when I was going from half way towards the posts. Perhaps the ref couldn't keep up with the play!"

Had any of those points counted he would have beaten Harry Dawson's record of 27 points in a game scored against Liverpool City on Easter Monday in 1957. "I changed my kicking style for the game. I had been having a few problems with kicks and instead of lying the ball down in the old torpedo cannon style, I stood the ball up straight and it worked."

The try scorers made interesting reading: Brian Winstanley (2), Vince Karalius, Tony Karalius, Alan Walsh, Ged Lowe, Wally Hurstfield, Dennis Ward and Robin himself.

Dennis Ward went on to be capped by Australia and he is still involved in country rugby over there.

The Widnes team at the time was just beginning to break up after the 1964 Wembley triumph and Robin, who played at Widnes from 1960-69, had

taken over the No 1 spot from Bob Randall. Randall was the Wembley full back but Robin almost got into the team. Bob had an attack of yellow jaundice and had only got back into the side a week before Wembley.

"You could say I missed out by a week, but I have had some great experiences as a referee at Wembley and in Tests.

"The biggest memory was refereeing at a full Sydney Cricket Ground. Not even Wembley can compare with that. I did three Winfield Cup games there, and then Australia-New Zealand Test in 1986. That really was something!" Robin deserved his success. He was always a good clubman and my everlasting memory of him was going round to Naughton Park one day to see if the pitch was fit after snow. And who should be on the terraces with a shovel in his hand but Robin Whitfield. How many would do that today?

Although it was disappointing to miss out on this season's Silk Cut Challenge Cup semi-final, it's nice to see Oldham within striking distance of a first Wembley.

They ought to have played Widnes in the 1964 final but for a bungle by the game's administrators at the time. Oldham and Hull KR drew in their semi-final and when the replay kick-off time was announced, everyone knew that if extra time were needed, there was no way the game could be completed. That's exactly what happened as the game was abandoned with Oldham 17-14 ahead.

Hull KR emerged triumphant 12-2 in the third game.

Had Oldham made it they could have had the unique distinction of being Division Two champions and finalists. They certainly had some good players like Frank Dyson, Trevor Simms, hooker Len McIntyre and the one and only Peter Smethurst.

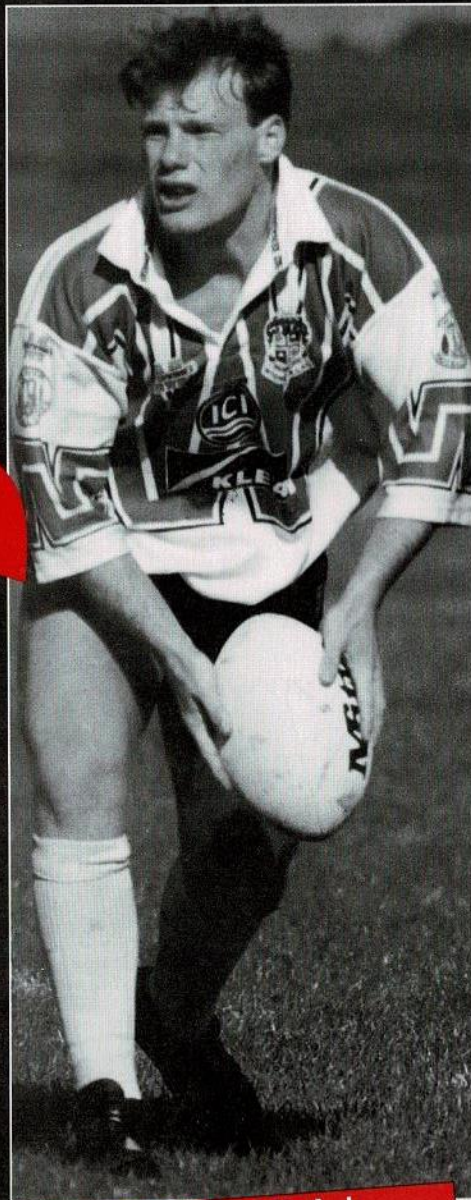

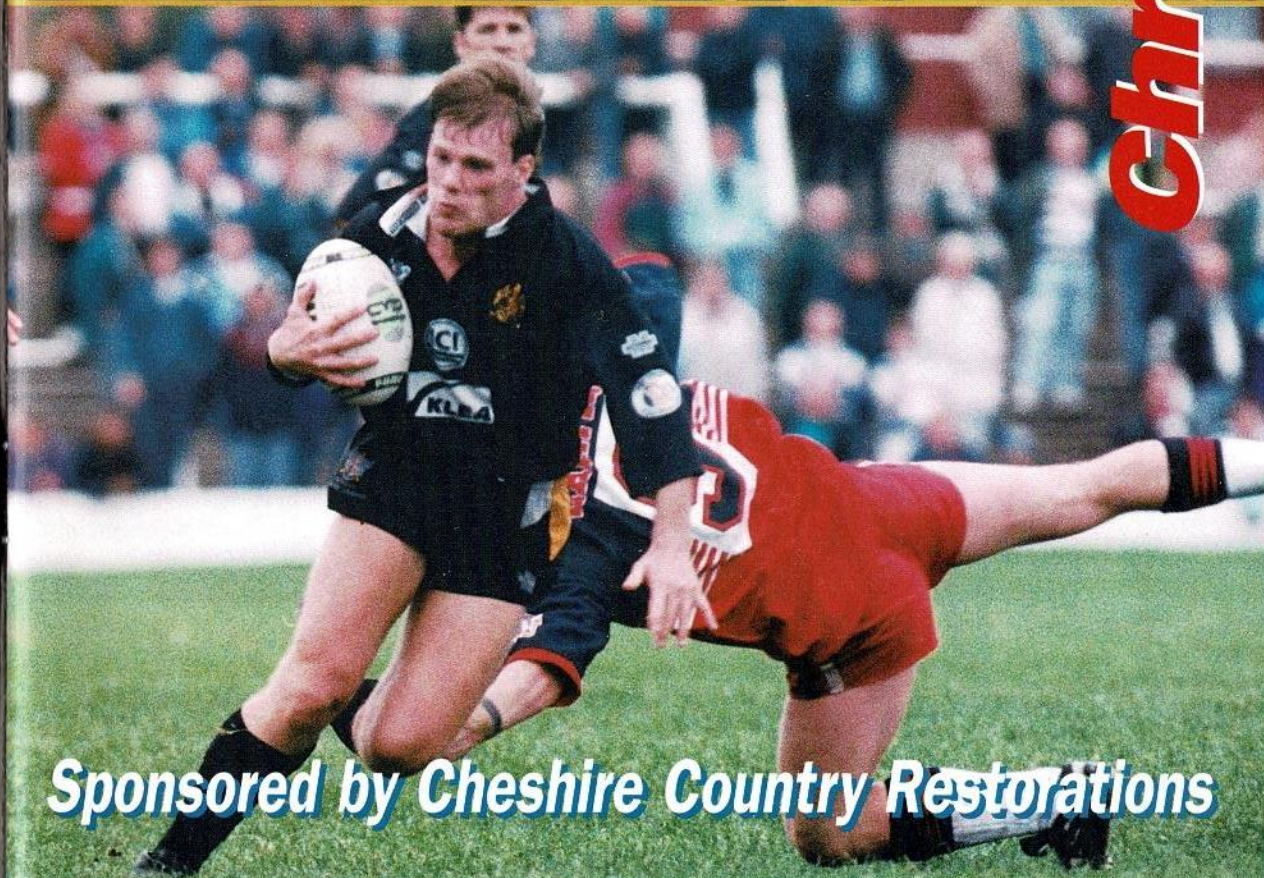
RUGBY TOPICS

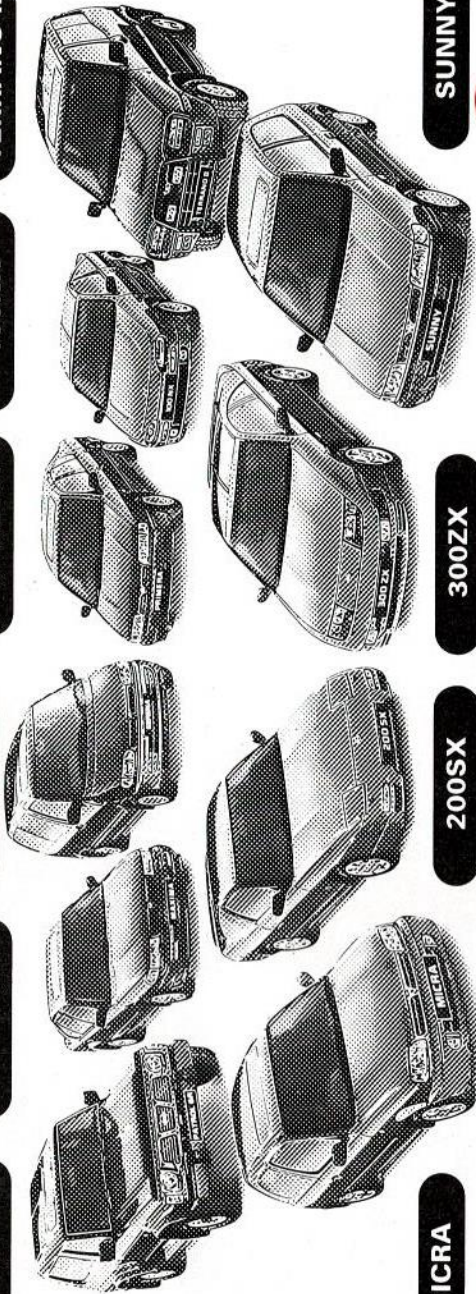

programme notes

Over the past fifteen years or so Oldham have earned themselves something of a reputation as a yo-yo side, one which skips frequently between the divisions, and so it was when they visited Naughton Park in early October 1990. They had started the new season well after being promoted the previous April, winning on two of their first three outings in the top flight, but were unfortunately destined for the drop again.

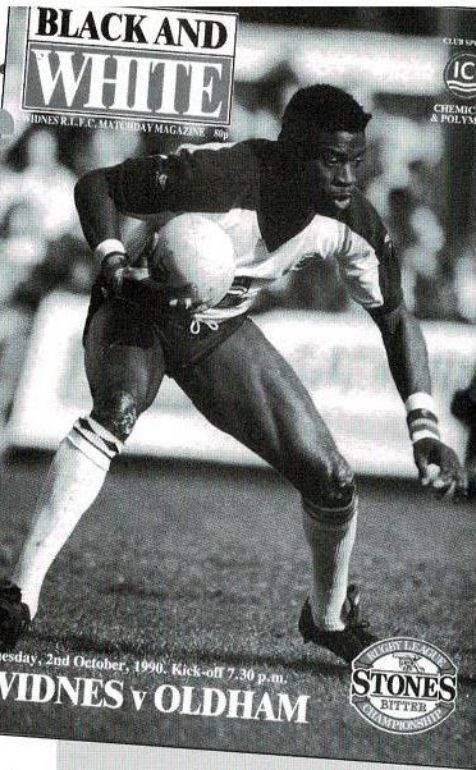
The game had been put back to midweek to accommodate our Lancashire Cup final with Salford the previous Saturday, but even so the evening kick-off did not prevent a crowd of 7361 watching the Chemics pip the Roughyeds by 24 points to 16, tries by Devereux, Currier, Tait and Offiah and four Davies goals being too much for the visitors for whom Ford, Lord and Donegan touched down, with Platt goaling twice.

The Oldham players featured on the In Town Today pages of the programme give an indication of the sheer turnover of personnel at Watersheddings in recent times. Tommy Martyn, Mike Ford and John Cogger were the three stars pictured, but others mentioned included John Fieldhouse, Paul Round (top scorers for them that season, with a total of 19 tries), Richard Russell and many more who have since moved on to pastures new.

Not that there are many of the Widnes line-up still here, either! According to the teamsheet we were due to turn out as follows: Tait, Devereux, Currier, Davies, Offiah, T.Mylar, D.Hulme, Grima, McKenzie, D.Smith, Koloto, Eyres, Holliday, Subs. Wright, Ashurst.

The Oldham fifteen was announced as: Platt, Francis, Martyn, Duane, Lord, Clark, Ford, Pyke, Russell, Fieldhouse, Round, McAlister, Barrow. Subs. Fairbank, Donegan.

Elsewhere in the programme club skipper and beneficiary, David Hulme, commented that our recent 32-6 defeat at Hull should not a cause for panic stations. It was, after all, our only reverse so far in league and cup football. He also looked forward to the arrival of the Australian Tourists who were due to reach these shores soon, and he predicted big things from Brad Fittler and Greg Alexander in particular. This game took place at a time when the inauguration of the Widnes Hall of Fame was imminent and Ron Girvin devoted his page to a Chemic of Yesteryear, Nat Silcock, who was sure to be included in the list of Widnes greats. Nat played the game at a time when the football was often brutal and



the facilities primitive and Ron reminds us that the giant forward suffered badly with arthritis in later life. He quotes Silcock's words which must make modern professionals, hard men that they are, feel that they are well done-by. "The conditions we played in were terrible sometimes" he said. "You couldn't get a proper bath and often only in cold water. There are times when I wished I had never played the game."

With a first Wembley trip only eighty minutes away, but with the might of Wigan standing between them and the twin towers, the Watersheddings outfit might be excused if they were to keep a little in reserve for that big day to come. But ultra-professional coach, Andy Goodway will no doubt be trying to banish thoughts of cup glory from his player's heads as he aims to consolidate their highly creditable eighth place in the table.

PAUL DAVIDSON

Joined Oldham this summer in a £17,000 deal with Widnes. A Cumbrian who formerly played with Hensingham,

Paul signed for Widnes three years ago and has had considerable senior experience at Naughton Park. Can play either prop or second row with equal ability.

MICHAEL EDWARDS

Signed from Parkside Goldbourne at the age of 17 after receiving honours from Lancashire and England schoolboys. Now at the age of 20 deservedly retains his place after performing consistently in our Alliance team.

STEVE GARTLAND

Needs no introduction to League fans in the Oldham or Rochdale areas. A clever stand off aged 23, he signed for Rochdale from Oldham amateur club St Annes in 1990 and established a Rochdale club record of 276 points in a season in 1992/93. A useful goal kicker he is the son of Brian Gartland,

ripping Second Division defences to shreds in his three years at Fartown. Joined Oldham two seasons ago and quickly became a firm favourite with the Watersheddings crowd thanks to his uncanny ability to turn defence into attack.

IYAN GREEN

A Wiganer formerly on St Helens books, Iyan came to Oldham as a free agent in the summer of 1993 and became a useful member of the squad, often showing his worth at senior level as a tough tackling hard grafting second row forward who also played a major roll in the Alliance team's remarkable unbeaten record throughout the season.

NIGEL HESLOP

Former England R.U. winger who won 10 caps for his country. Signed for Oldham from Orrell R.U. club in February 1993 after losing his place in England's Five Nations Cup squad for 1993.

Represented England in the World Cup 1991 and was a member of two Grand Slam winning squads.

SHAUN IRWIN

Shaun joined Oldham from Castleford in 1992 in the move that took Richard Russell to Wheldon Road. A former member of Mal Reilly's Great Britain squad. Shaun is a vastly experienced inside back, sound on defence and with a deceptive turn of pace as he proved when scoring a long range try at Featherstone in the 1993/94 season.

DAVID JONES

A strong finishing winger signed from Wakefield. A Wigan born St Pat's player and as an amateur gained county and international honours. Can quickly establish himself as a firm favourite at Oldham if he continues in his current form. Had a spell in Australia during the close season.

MIKE KUITI

A New Zealand International of great repute. Played in Great Britain and France with the New Zealand tourists in 1989.

Selected for the Test team eight times, playing Great Britain, France and New Guinea, but not Australia. A strong loose forward or second rower, at the pinnacle of his career. Has played for Rochdale, Swinton, Leeds and Rochdale again. Has a good eye for making and taking scoring opportunities.

GARY LORD

A newcomer to Oldham this year, Gary started his career with Castleford and moved to Leeds before Oldham signed him from Halifax for a £35,000 fee fixed by tribunal. The brother of former Oldham winger Paul Lord, Gary began his life as a full back but now plays in the pack mainly at second row.

PAUL TOPPING

Paul joined Oldham from Leigh in the summer of 1993 after starting his career as a full back with Swinton, Oldham's top point scorer last season he is a useful goal kicker who can play equally well at full back centre or even loose forward. A groin injury caused him problems last season but he has recovered remarkably well after surgery.

IAN SHERRATT

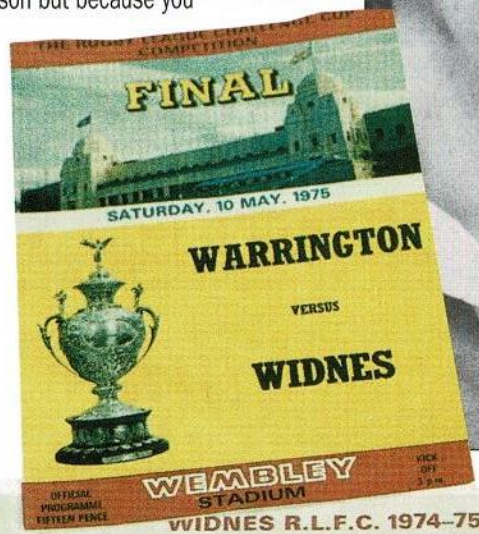
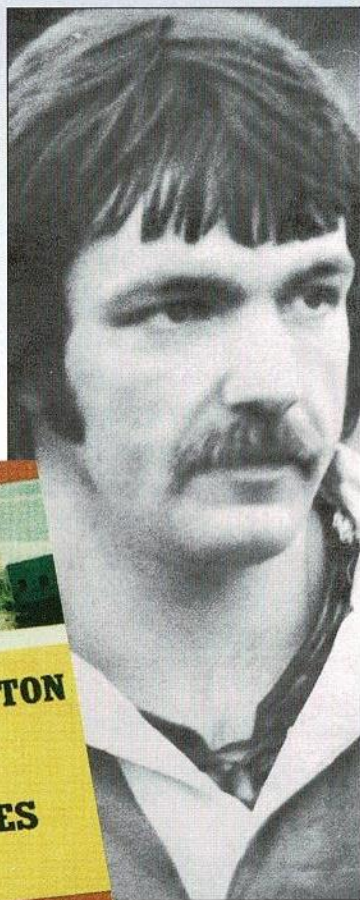
**TAURUS REMOVALS ARE PROUD TO SPONSOR

■ Alan Prescott was probably the envy of most rugby league players in this Country, why? do I hear you ask, well after Widnes won the Challenge Cup in 75 Alan was featured on the B.B.C's "Grandstand" programme every Saturday afternoon in the opening credits, running down the wing on a glorious seventy yard run. It was a pleasure not to miss the short film clip of Alan in all his glory.

Alan now recalls those memorable days and his life today working alongside another Hero of "75". "It was coach Bob Harper who signed me for Widnes back in January 1970 from West Park Rugby Union Club in St. Helens. Surprisingly I went straight into the first team. I did however play in the "A" team which went on to the Championship that season but because you

needed to have played ten games to receive a medal, I missed out. I only managed to play in nine games for the reserves, the blow was softened by the fact that I was a first team regular. The side in those days was not that good but there was plenty of spirit and a feeling that the good times were not that far away.

Those good times really started to become a reality when Vinty Karalius took over in 1972. He established much needed professionalism within the Club. The fitness campaign he introduced then is still being widely used by clubs today. Vinty was certainly a man way ahead of his time. It is no wonder that players past and present still have the greatest respect for the man who was initially responsible for bringing so much success to Widnes.

The 1975 Cup run was a tough one indeed, all of our games were away from home against sides like Swinton, Wakefield and Hull, who were no pushovers in those days. The Final saw Widnes get off to a terrible start, we conceded a try very early into the game scored by the Warrington winger John Bevan who followed up a little kick by the prop Dave Chisnall. I took personal exception to John scoring the try, I was supposed to be marking him and when he made his familiar one armed clenched fist salute, I just wanted to snap his arm off such was my displeasure.

That Bevan try spurred us on and with Ray Duttons magnificent goalkicking and Jim's try we went in at half-time 11- 5 in front. The half-time talk from Vinty was inspirational, he simply said you are 40 minutes away from history, his prophecy proved correct and the final scoreline

did flatter Warrington. My wing partner was Australian Chris Anderson. Vinty had christened us the "bookends" mainly because we tackled anything that moved. Chris had quite a good game that afternoon, I recall, and more than justified his selection. That 'Grandstand' run came about after we had been under some immense pressure on our line and the ball was whipped out to me by Eric Hughes and I set off and was just caught by the Warrington fullback

Derek Whitehead, strangely he was the one player I never seemed to get past on any occasion in my career. The 76 Final was a result that was hard to accept especially living in St. Helens, I was taken off the field suffering from concussion with us trailing 6- 5. I was amazed to hear that we had lost the game by that

incredible margin once my senses had been regathered. 1976 saw my departure from Naughton Park, I did not fit into the plans of coach Frank Myler and I joined Leigh in the November of 76. I

stayed with them until I broke my neck in 79 when I retired from the professional game. Once I had fully recovered from the injury. I played a little soccer with a side that I use to take for fitness

sessions and then the ex St. Helens player Kevin Whittle asked me to coach a local side Nutgrove which I did and then went to do something similar with another amateur side called U.G.B. Sadly I parted company after a season and half because of a lack of enthusiasm amongst the players.

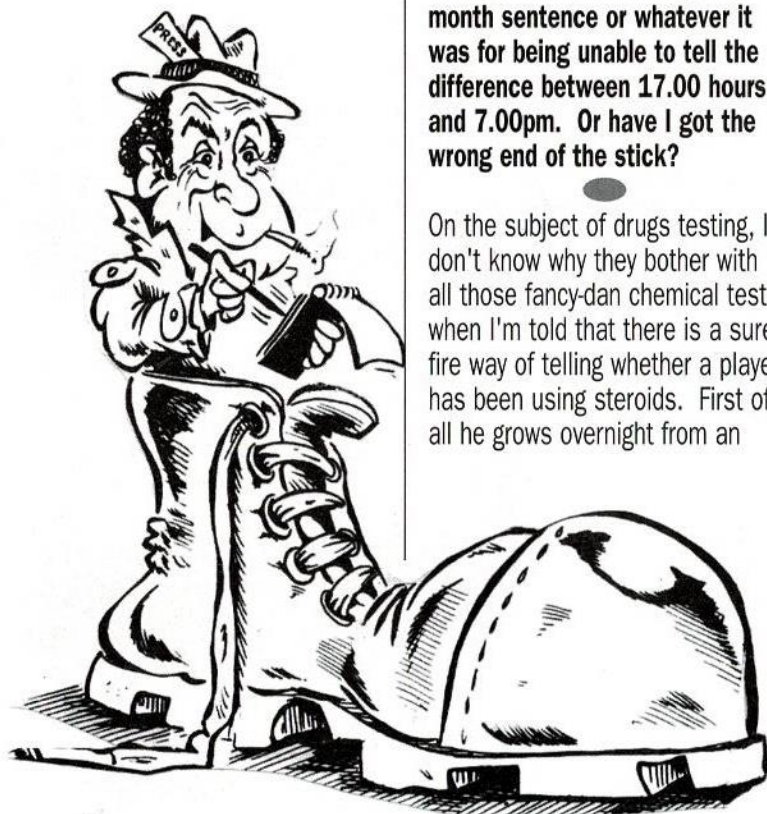
When it was announced that Eric Hughes would be taking over as coach at Knowsley Road I wrote to him congratulating him on his appointment and if he required any help with conditioning and

sprinting at the Club I was only to glad to help out. In January this year I received a phone call from Eric asking me I would be interested in doing the conditioning for the first team, I gratefully accepted the position and I am delighted to be involved with the professional game once again".

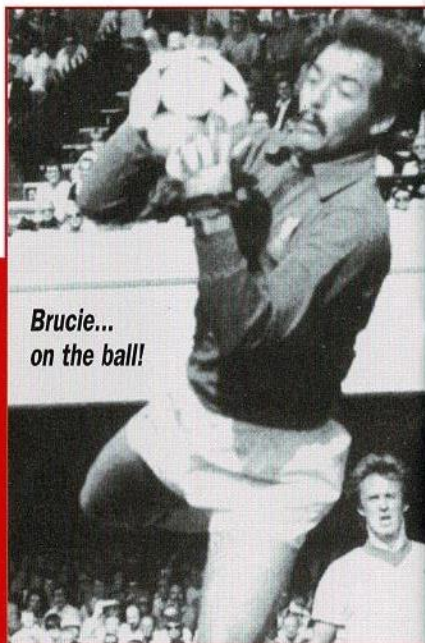

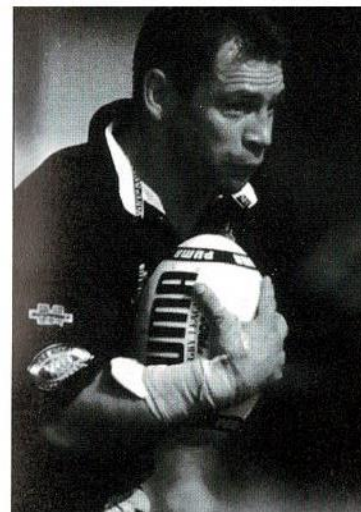

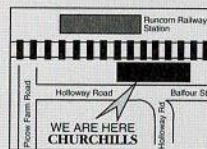

THE IRISH INITIATIVE

■ Congratulations go to the Welsh Rugby League team for their triumph in the revamped European Championship, the victories over England and France more than justifying their inclusion in the Halifax Centenary World Cup. The irony of their victory on a weekend when their Union counterparts were made to look decidedly second rate despite the hype and clamour surrounding the Five Nations was not lost.

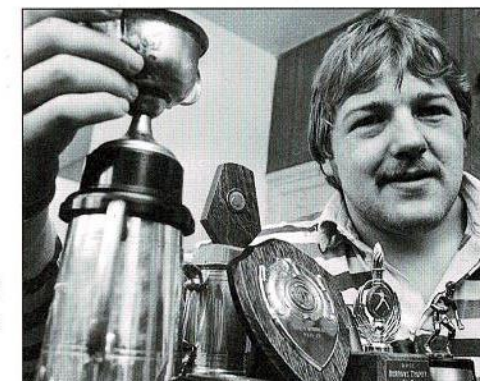
There are, however, discernable winds of change in the air and in the not too distant future our venture into European competition may well demand a share of the headlines the performances merit. The advent of an Irish side and the growing clamour for devolution into a Scottish team is gathering pace and their calls for inclusion in the forthcoming emerging nations Cup may prove to be increasingly irresistible.

On St Patrick's Day, the representatives of the Emerald Isle took a bold and pioneering step into the international arena with a hugely significant game in Washington against the American Eagles. The clash has generated real interest both over here, with Radio 5 carrying a prominent feature, and as importantly in the States where the game will

become the first of either rugby code to be screened live. The venue, the impressive 80,000 capacity RFK Stadium, illustrates the important attached to the day and the USA coach, former St George player David Niu believes that with the positive advanced publicity generated the crowd could be a significant one. The transition of the Irish from a predominantly student side built around the Dublin Blues Club, who performed creditably in their inaugural World Cup has been remarkable not least with the recent huge Businessmen's Lunch in Manchester that raised funds and backing for the trip. The reuniting of backroom team Terry Flanagan as coach and the irrepressible Alex Murphy as advisor looks inspired and whilst the line up contains no professionals, established players such as Joe Lydon, Steve Molloy and Neil Harmon are eligible. A major sponsor and development officer are already in place. With the Charity Shield also scheduled for the Dublin Showgrounds in August there is a real impetus behind the code at international level and now not just in the southern hemisphere.

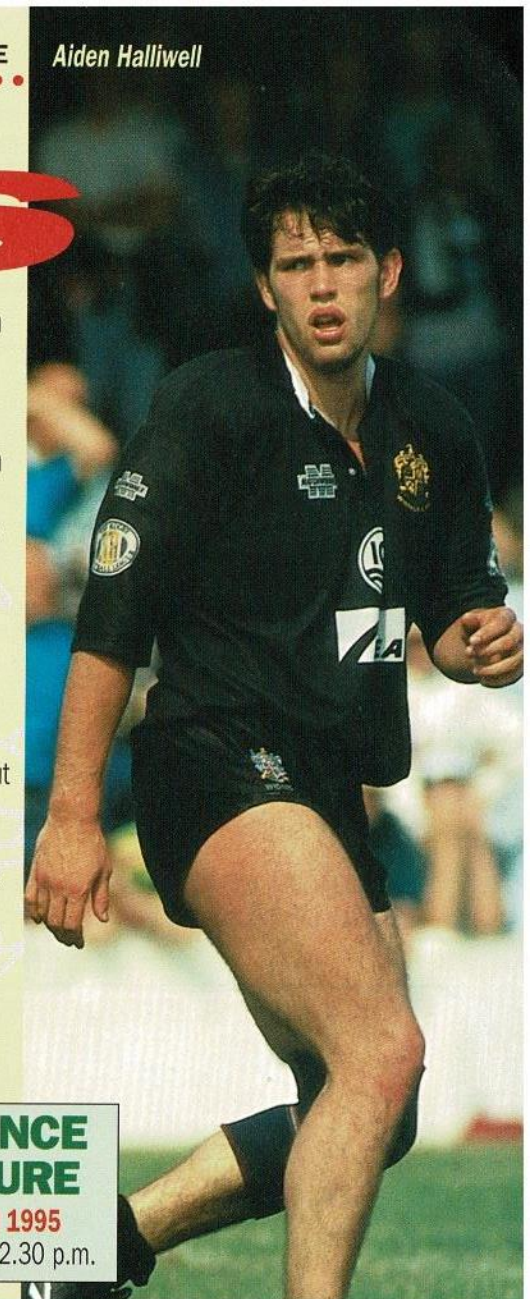

■ Do we want Rugby League to be played nationally in every town of every county or do we just want a super league of say ten teams who will contest all of the trophies and carve everything up between them?

These questions form the basis of a dilemma that faces Rugby League today, a dilemma of such proportions that it makes Tolstoi's War and Peace look like a Mills & Boon paperback! There has, of course, been much speculation as to whether the 'top clubs' would at some stage not too far down the track go it on their own. This in theory at any rate has yet not materialised (although the voting structure at Board level

really batted an eyelid but it flagged up a warning that professional Rugby League is an expensive do. There are rumours that Brisbane Broncos are about to pull the proverbial plug on their London compatriots leaving them without a stable. Even the mighty Wigan have been reduced to including players assets in their balance sheet, a practice that seems flawed. If a club goes pop then its players become free agents! So is it inevitable then that the pro game will continue to shrink and contract rather than flourish and grow? Perhaps not. In Australia the new expanded national Australian league has just got underway. Here

clubs must show evidence of commitment to the community, to the spectators and to the interest of the game itself. They have managed to harness the popularity of the game and market it in a forceful and positive way.

"Framing the Future", the document prepared by our own RFL has gone some way down the same road as the Aussies, setting minimum standards for the member clubs and insisting on business plans, etc. My contention would be that it has not gone far enough, trying to please all of the people instead of getting to grips with the real thorny topics. The introduction of a salary cap, however well thought out, is at least a step in the right direction, let's just hope that the Board of Directors at Chapelton Road continue to make progress, I want all the existing clubs and more to be here come the bi-centenary!

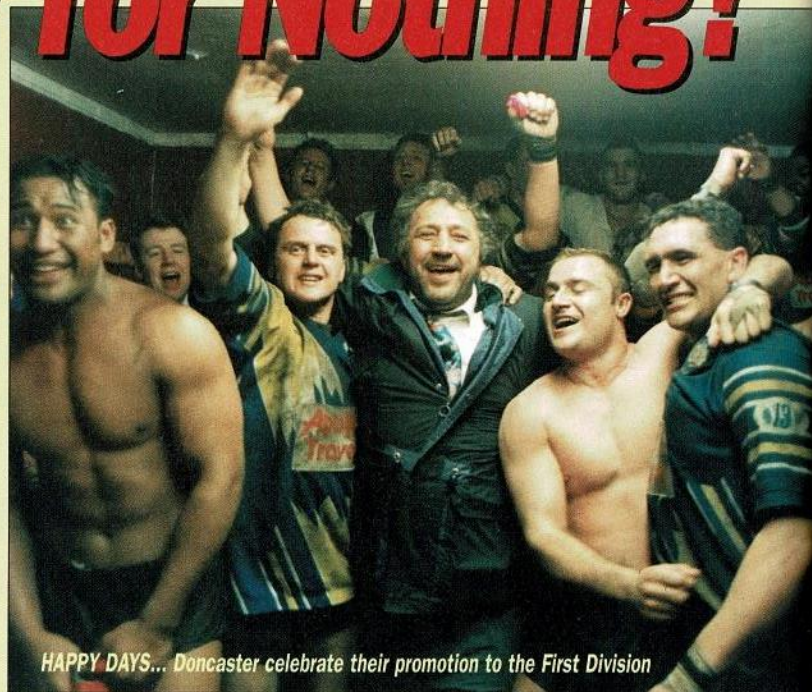

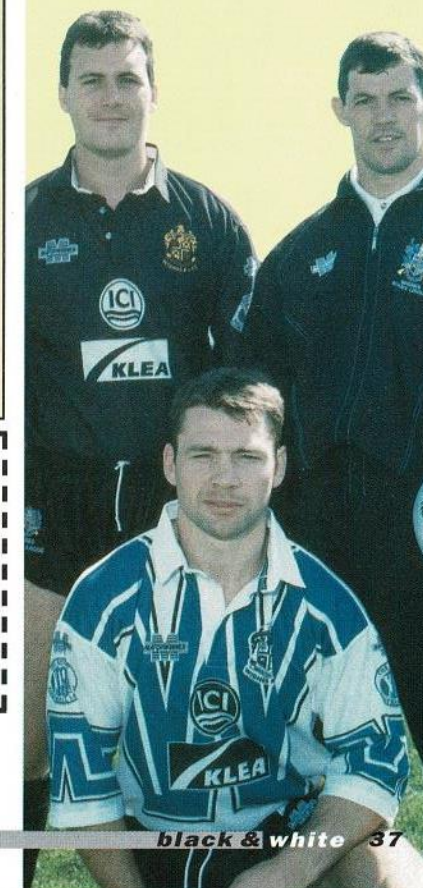
