

# AWARD WINNING QUALITY



Terry Mullaney writes ...

As the game prepares to enter the rugby revolution called 'Super League' I have to admit to being still in a dazed state of mind as I suspect most of you are out there. Who could have envisaged

that within a week of

experiencing that special feeling of pride at what our team had achieved in playing in a Challenge Cup semi final, we would be faced with the nightmare of this very great club becoming extinct - gone forever after all that it has given to the cause of Rugby League football.

If ever a club has been a role model to other more affluent members on what can be achieved on very limited resources, then it has to be Featherstone Rovers. A complete Roll of Honour, together with a list as long as your arm of home-spun international players is included elsewhere in this programme. It is doubtful if more than a handful of clubs throughout the leagues can come anywhere near us. We have won every major honour in the game. Featherstone has been an uncomparable 'hot bed' of Rugby League, supplying many players to other clubs as well as our own, over many years. Will the conveyor belt now grind to a halt? And what about this marvelous little stadium with its social facilities that are perhaps second only to Leeds. Has anyone at RL HQ given a thought to that or about the kids. scores of them, that use the brand new changing rooms that have been purposely built for their benefit. The subsequent healthy future of the game that their current participation secures, appears to have been completely overlooked. Can you imagine all of those youngsters suddenly accepting that they can no longer realise their dream of one day playing for Featherstone Rovers and instead, change their allegiance to a new, stupidly named, Calder side for which neither they nor their parents can enthusiastically evolve any affinity. The future development of the game in this area, as well as Castleford and Wakefield, is in serious jeopardy. The longterm casulty is the game itself.

The reply to that from HQ would, I suspect, be that the game is crumbling anyway and that

only a huge injection of cash such as this from Murdoch can save us from oblivion. I can see the merit of such an argument. What baffles me is that we are entrusting this new found fortune and restructured format for the game to the same people who got us into this mess in the first place. Doesn't inspire much confidence to my mind.

Where is there an organised criteria for entry into the Super League? Is it catchment area that counts? If so, why have St Helens, Warrington and Widnes been allowed entry individually. Widnes weren't even in the running as a club worthy of even merging at the initial meeting of chairmen. Within twenty four hours of that they had become first reserve for Super League status and a couple of days later, low and behold, they're in! I can't explain it and neither can anyone else. If it comes down to the type of ground, then Huddersfield ought to have had a strong case, not to mention Hunslet! The ground you're stood in today could be developed on three

sides to become a fabulous stadium worthy of any super league. The trouble is that a lot of people seem to be running about like headless chickens and that's what's causing anger amongst the fans. We need to be told what's happening. Come Tuesday evening the most important decision in the history of Featherstone Rovers will have been made by the club's membership. It isn't up to me to try to

influence you one way or another in the club magazine. As I write, news has broken that Wakefield are overwhelmingly in favour of biting the bullet and merging, while Castleford have said that they are seeking to go it

Having asked the question myself to the powers that be, you can take it from me that if we choose to go into the new first division and win every game for two years. Featherstone Rovers chances of promotion to Super League status are virtually nil. That's what I was told by the Super League Committee at the recent meeting at Manchester Airport Hilton, A future of second rate football is what you would have.

CW: It is now the last game of what can only be described as a momentous season, one way or another for Rugby League. What message do you have for the Rovers fans to finish our series of interviews off with?

DW: "It's been eventful to say the least, both from the point of view of the club and Rugby League in general. I must express my admiration for the way the club has tried to place itself on a higher level. Unfortunately, we have been let down. I get the impression that perhaps most of the money to finance the club's ambition has come from the guarantees of individuals, rather than the club itself. So now we are in a position where we have to take stock, regroup...start again as the Featherstone Rovers of old. I don't know what all the goings on are or have been, especially in terms of the club's financial structure, but it's the old story of cutting your cloth according to your means. From now on, whatever happens, we must produce our own talent from the grassroots up and take it

from there.

I know one thing for sure

and that is that Rugby League in this country will never die whatever happens... not whilst there are thousands of kids out there who are desperate to become Rugby League players; not whilst there are people like Howard Cartwright and me who gain so much fulfilment in coaching them; not whilst there are people like the Featherstone Rovers fans to support their club and the game. I get more of a kick out of bringing on young players, coaching them to become professionals than any amount of glory. The glory trail is a bandwagon that people jump



One of the problems at the moment is that it's so hard to think about the future, but it's impossible not to. Things are changing so rapidly, dramatically and radically every day. I find myself just waiting for the next news bulletin.

Right now all our futures are at stake. The worrying part for me is that I'm in no position to have any influence on that future. Whatever shape the future eventually takes, I know that the supporters of Featherstone Rovers are fantastic and we will all just have to see where we all fetch up... together."

It has been one hell of a season, largely for the wrong reasons. But don't forget that the Rovers were eighty minutes from Wembley! Throughout all this. David Ward has shown patience, enthusiasm and candour in our interviews. Even when he must have been under enormous pressure he has been more than willing to give us, the Rovers fans, facts....as well as his thoughts and feelings about all aspects of coaching our team. Thank you David, for all that and plenty more besides.



Out on our ear with a lump in our throats and breaking hearts

It's got to the stage now where I don't know what to write for fear of it being outdated before the ink dries.

What can I say? 'It seems that if we refuse to merge we'll not have a team playing in the top flight. If we do merge we'll have lost our identity and if, as seems likely, Cas go for the Super League on their own we'll be out on our ear anyhow. My belief is that you support your team choose what. It is not supporting your team to opt for a merger. Salford and Oldham have been brave enough to stand up and say "No" to merger, perhaps if all the other clubs did it we might start to make these tampering fools sit up a bit.

It was a marvellous expression of the link between the community and the men that represent them. "This is Clayton again", I hear the cry, "tugging on people's emotions without having any sense of responsibility for the practicalities of the situation." Perhaps that would be fair comment, after all these so called 'visionaries' talk figures and statistics don't they? Well let me throw a few figures your way then; Keighley is held up

in the successful running of a club that is rooted in the community. They have tried to follow "Framing the Future" (remember that bright idea) to the letter. Juvenile crime has decreased by 11% in the last two years in Keighley. On Easter Monday, Keighley attracted nearly three times the spectators as Sheffield did. My advice to followers of this club, for what it's worth, is go with neither head nor heart. Go with your conscience.

Born in Featherstone and taken to my first game at six weeks of age, I have been supporting the Rovers for 49 years. Suffering the agonies of semi final losses and relegation, experiencing

Rugby League is inevitably etched on my soul, indeed a part of my lifeblood. Living and working in Boston South Lincolnshire I have a 200 mile round trip for home games, and often double that for away games.

I take friends who have never experienced live Rugby League. They love it, they love the passionate support generated and are amazed at the amount of people at the games. They quickly understand my passion for my club and why I wear my club clothing with pride in an area that knows little about Rugby League. I was asked in my local the other night what I thought of the proposed Super League and what I thought of losing my club in the merger. They said "You must be gutted". I could not have chosen a better adjective. But what really struck home was, here were people in rural South Lincolnshire who, with little knowledge of our game, understanding how I and thousands of other supporters feel, and treating those feelings with genuine sympathy and consideration. Oh that the money grabbing mandarins at Rugby League Headquarters who purport to be the experts on our game and on what supporters want, were as understanding and considerate as these people. Being so far away, I have to rely on the media for news and updates. It was while watching Maurice Lindsay giving a TV interview that I was finally convinced that my beloved game was going to be stripped of all that is good. He said words to the effect that this is the golden opportunity to spread our wonderful sport throughout Britain, Europe and the World. When concluding the interview he said what everyone should realise, is that Rugby League is a business. From a sport to a business in one interview says it all. I may be far away but my heart is in the heartland of Rugby League and my support is with all those supporters who are fighting the mergers and are resolved to fighting the money maniacs who seek to rape our sport.

I happen to be a prison governor and often see at first hand the result of thoughtless actions, greed and inconsideration for others."

I think you'll have read by now about the book I helped to co-ordinate as part of the fans fightback. This faxed message from Mel Moxon in Lincolnshire seems to say it all, particularly the last line. A message from nearer home from Alan Tennant whose family have been involved with playing and watching the Rovers for the biggest part of this century had this to

"Life has always been a struggle down at Post Office Road but the supporters have always banded together to help the team. All that will disappear with a team who doesn't play in their home town. I will never go and support a merged team. I'm Featherstone born and bred, a true Rover and that's the way I'll stay."

The talent on view this afternoon is of such a standard as to be almost unreal. David and Andy are almost too lucky to be true...having such talent in their squads. From 1-13, the Roughveds ooze class, aggression and scoring power. The fullback spot almost selects itself with goal kicking machine and record breaker Bernard Ganley, an automatic choise. Ganley holds the points in a season, goals in a match, goals in a season, goals in a career and points in a career records. Ganley's three international caps are an inadquate reflection of this great fullback's abilities. Oldham's three quarter line has that threatening look as well, with Billy Hall and James Lomas forming a crackerjack centre partnership. Lomas, a Cumbrian from Maryport near Carlisle, is short and stocky for a three quarter but certainly knows the way to the line. Jim was the first player to be transferred for £100 when he moved to Salford from Bramley earlier in his career. The Cumbrian

connection is continued

with Ike Southward on the wing. Ike is in stark contrast with his compatriot, big, direct running and strong, as capable of running through players as he is of running round them. On the other wing, yet another international - Alan Davies who holds his club's tries in a career record with an awesome 173. Also in line for a wing spot is the skilful, deceptively fast John Etty, a true gentleman of the game.

For Rovers, it's great to see Gary Cooper at full back. Incidentally, Gary's sister Cath is a big Rugby League fan and has a big career ahead of her as a Rugby League adminstrator if you ask me. Cyril Woolford, not the fastest winger you've ever seen, is strong and determined near his opponents goal line and makes a hard hitting partnership with centre Paul Newlove. The same goes for goal kicking ace Steve Quinn, a faster but less robust player than Newlove, but an intelligent player who gives great service to his wing partner Gary Jordan.

What do you say about Joe Mullaney? This man is the 'stand off's stand off', lethal in broken play running and intelligent at set pieces. Joe complements scrum half Steve Nash perfectly. There is a strong body of opinion that says that Nash is the best






number 7 that Rovers have ever had, or indeed ever will have.

### Featherstone Rovers Great Britain Roll of Honour

**TOMMY ASKIN:** Tommy played six Tests, three against Australia and three against New Zealand in 1928.

**CHRIS BIBB:** Chris played one Test against New Zealand in 1990.

JOHN 'KEITH' BRIDGES: Keith played for Great Britain three times in 1974. Twice against the French, once against Australia. TERRY CLAWSON: Terry gained a total of 14 caps, two as a Rovers player in 1962 against France.

MALCOLM DIXON: Mal gained two caps against France in 1962 and 1964.

STEVE EVANS: Steve played for Great Britain seven times plus three as substitute between 1979 and 1982, two of these caps were gained as a Hull player. Whilst at Rovers he played once against Australia, four times against New Zealand with two games as sub against Australia and one against New Zealand. **DERYCK FOX:** Deryck played for Great Britain ten times with four tests on the bench. One of these Tests was the 1992 World Cup final as a Bradford Northern player. Deryck's international career began in 1985 with two Tests against France and three against New Zealand. He started two Tests against both the New Zealanders and the Australians in 1986. DON FOX: Don played one Test against the Australians in 1963.

DAVID HOBBS: From a total of ten starts and three as substitute, David played seven games against France, Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea as a Rovers player with one Test as substitute. **GARY JORDAN:** Gary played once against France in 1964 and once against Australia in 1967.


**ARNOLD MORGAN:** Arnie played for Great Britain four times in 1968, three times against France and once against New Zealand.

**STEVE NASH:** Steve gained no less than 24 Great Britain caps, starting in 1971. As a Rovers player, he played four times against France, five times against New Zealand and seven times against Australia.

PAUL NEWLOVE: Paul has played for Great Britain 11 times, with four games as a substitute. Whilst at Rovers he was the youngest player to play international football when he played against the Kiwis in 1989. Between then and leaving Rovers in 1993, he substituted against New Zealand and Papua New Guinea, but started against New Zealand twice, Australia three times, Papua New Guinea and France once each.

PETER SMITH: Between 1977 and 1984
Pete was substitute for five internationals,
he started one Test against the
Australians in 1982.

JIM THOMPSON: Between 1970 and 1978 Jim started 20 internationals, one of these was as a Bradford Northern player. He also made one appearance as sub. With Rovers, he started nine Tests against Australia, seven against New Zealand and three against France.





# **An Independent View**

with... Dave Hadfield

I'm against imposing mergers on clubs without any consultation or consent...



Dave Hadfield, Rugby League correspondent of "The Independent", is without doubt the most respected and knowledgeable journalist in Rugby League. He has been present at the most important events in recent Rugby League history both on and off the field and, of course, he is a seriously committed fan. Dave has seen the recent radical and sudden changes in the game from close up so his thoughts need to be taken notice of.

"I applaud these changes if they are pushed by the right people. I am strongly in favour of a small elite League with intense, even competition. This improves playing standards. The money which is being put into the game will, I hope, be used to do something about many of our stadiums which, let's face it, are dumps....we need grounds that are going to take us into the 21st century. I think the idea of having a London side in the competition is a great move, it will provide it with a national dimension which is vital. In theory that goes for the inclusion of the French sides, although things look worryingly vague on that front However, I'm against imposing mergers on clubs without any consultation or consent and the thought of having a meeting on a Friday and taking such a major decision about the game the next day doesn't seem sound either. Because of this, there are some major loose ends. For instance, and these worry me lot; international football which has always been a weak link in Rugby League's credibility has been weakened even further. Great Britain can't play an Australian team which is under the auspices of the ARL and remember that Papa New Guinea and the teams from the Pacific Islands are affiliated to the ARL as well. There will be no more tours, which is tragic for people who have paid money to go in '96. There seems no sign of compromise, even though the situation changes almost daily. Remember


looks highly 'iffy' to me. The impact of the genesis of the British Super League has had an immense effect upon the southern media. Huge amounts of space are being devoted to it. It's just a pity that they can't devote anything like the space to the actual game and naturally the Murdoch controlled press is all for it. I worry about all aspects of this and other issues of Rugby League and this is reflected in my own journalism. I am able to call it as I see it, not having an official line to follow.

The real agenda has nothing to do with British Rugby League of course. The TV rights for pay TV in Australia are the real prize. On top of

that, however, is the fact that News International will become so powerful that they will be able to create their own TV friendly sport of 'World Wide Rugby'. The amateur(sic)edifice of Rugby Union has already almost crumbled totally in Australia and you can see some hybrid game emerging not

My personal feelings are mixed about the Super League. I just know that the sport is going to be even more exciting on the field, but I am worried about it. Other things worry me than the one's we've just talked about. I'm not convinced that the move to summer is well motivated. I've actually heard club chairmen say that they won't have to spend money on their stadiums on the strength of playing in summer. People have more options in summer. This is OK if you have the imagination and acumen to compete in this market, but clubs generally haven't shown much up to now. Although it's hard to criticise people who have put their own hands in their pockets to keep clubs going, the people who will be running the Super League clubs are the same ones that are running the game now. They aren't going to become financial wizards overnight are they? Realistically, £75 million isn't that much. It's a pump primer and some acumen is going to be needed to use it properly and make it attract more money. I can see a lot of it being wasted. None of us is seeing anything like the full picture and the situation is extremely fluid. It will be a few months before we see what's really going to


