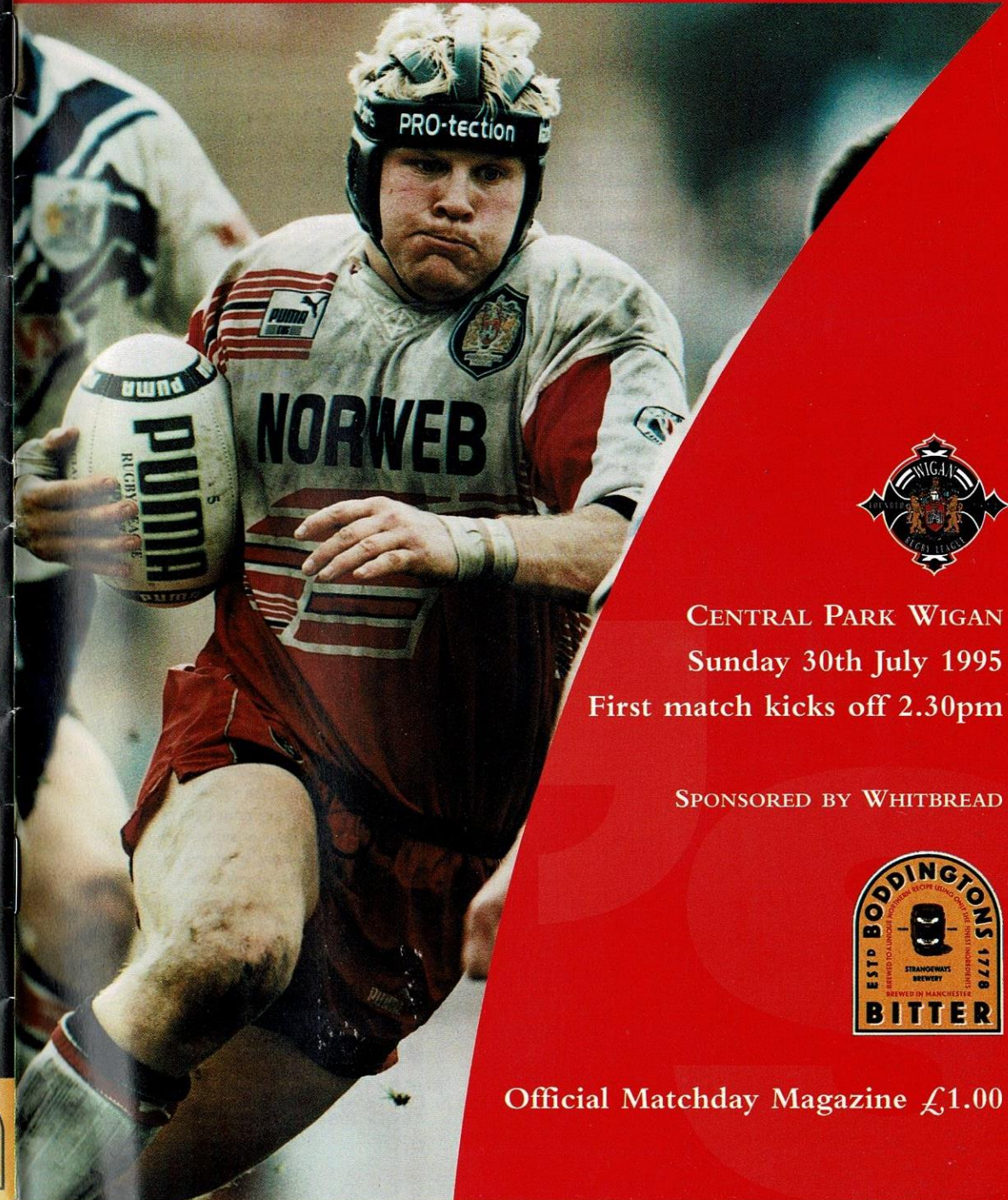




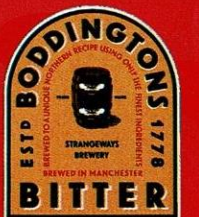

wilson's WORLD

...a look around the League with Chris Wilson

Welcome to the beginning of what should be a great season of celebration for the game of Rugby League in this country. It was one hundred years ago that a group of far sighted club secretaries voted to split from the shackles of the Corinthian idealists in London to form the Northern Union. The game of rugby thus became a sport played by men with completely different outlooks on life. These outlooks have seen the hugely different games of rugby league and rugby union emerge. While one can bring the might of the world media machine to trumpet its spurious claim to be 'amateur', the other makes no bones about its professionalism on the field but consistently fails to show professionalism off it.

Thus, we have before us a season which should have the highest profile yet but which seems to be content to preach to the converted. The World Cup begins in ten weeks and the publicity machine has yet to be stoked with coal. A season which, due to its brevity, ought to be a special event with a special format will become a standard procession of league games which could easily become meaningless for many clubs. The Centenary World Cup should be on occasion of national importance. Only in the game's heartland does any recognition of the event to come exist. This saddening state of affairs must change quickly if the game is to be taken seriously by the national media.

Another blot on the World Cup horizon has been the bitter dispute between the ARL and Super League camps in Australia which could see the game's

premier tournament deprived of some of the world's best exponents of the arts and crafts of the game.

The Australian game is still at war with itself with "compromise" a word bandied about but left on the table at the end of the day. Ken Arthurson seems to be protecting 'his' game like a mother hen, unable to let it go into the big world and fend for itself.

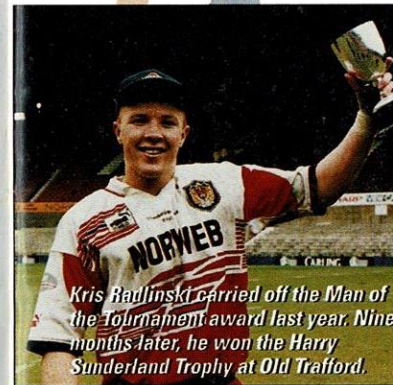
Regrettably, the close season has been littered with stories of clubs throwing money at rugby union players who may or may not make the grade. For every Tuigamala or Davies, there is a Gallagher, an Evans or a Carrington. A lot depends on whether the buying club is willing to forgo instant dividends to spend time with their signings, grooming them to what is, after all, a different game.

Looking on the positive side, March 1996 should see rugby league emerge into the summer sun with a leaner, fitter more financially aware attitude. The number of clubs going full time is increasing. The number of clubs appointing Chief Executives to look after the business is also increasing. The game is slowly coming to terms with the fact that sport, whether we like it or not, is a business. With the amount of money now available to the game, the chance for consolidation and expansion should not be missed. That money must be sent wisely. The change to summer rugby (incidentally, whatever happened to the RFL's report on summer rugby?) and the influx of Murdoch's millions is

all about spreading the game nationally. Only if new clubs from non-traditional areas are in it after five years can the Super League be said to have been a success. After a hundred years of trying and

failing, the next five years will be critical for the game of rugby league in Great Britain.

Clubs are building squads to take them to the new Super League with business being brisker on the white rose side of the Pennines, Castleford, Keighley and Sheffield being particularly busy. Both Leeds and Workington have lost their coaches. Dean Bell and Hugh McGahan form the new team at Headingley. Both come with high reputations but are untried in the coaching role. They are

fortunate to have five months of competitive fixtures to get it right before Super League gets underway. The Cumbrians meanwhile have yet to appoint a successor to Peter Walsh who has taken them from the Third Division to the Super League. Brian Smith has replaced Peter Fox at the new look Bradford Bulls. Smith's return is a welcome addition to the game in this country and a damning indictment of the strife in the Winfield Cup.

On the field during the summer, the Australians proved that they could field two Test match sides by thumping New Zealand with a virtual

second team. The Kiwis were unable to break down the well organised Aussie defence making just a handful of clean breaks in the three match series. They also conceded points at the end of each first half allowing the Australians to enjoy a psychological advantage over the oranges. Wales enjoyed a good squad bonding Tour to the United States where the comfortable wins were secondary to giving new players a taste of International football.

France enjoyed a successful tour of New Zealand suffering a narrow defeat in the first Test but recovering to force a draw in the second meeting. Their World Cup group features Wales and Western Samoa whose squad has a sprinkling of experience and without doubt will be competitive.

This afternoon's Summer Sevens features Oldham, Salford and St. Helens from the red rose county while Yorkshire's representatives include Halifax, Keighley and Dewsbury. The main attraction is a New Zealand squad likely to feature Tuigamala and Henry Paul. Unfortunately, they have been drawn against the home side in the first round so the Wigan fans may be switching their allegiance early in the piece.

This time last year, Kris Radlinski carried off the Man of the Tournament award. Nine months later, he won the Harry Sunderland Trophy at Old Trafford capping an incredible season for himself and his club. The shortened version of the game gives a chance for players to show their skills and we are likely to be treated to some fine football from some of the country's best young players.

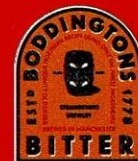

REVIEW Alliance

After six very successful seasons with Graeme West at the helm the Alliance team gained a new coach, John Pendlebury, for the 1994/95 campaign, and they got away to a flying start with big wins over Featherstone and Dewsbury in the first two games. Narrow defeats by Oldham and Hull spoiled the early part of September, but when the Lancashire Shield competition began with a 90-0 victory over Whitehaven. This signalled the start of a consistent run, and with wins against Salford, Swinton and holders Oldham the trophy went into the Central Park cabinet. The Final, on 12th November, was remarkable in that all Wigan's twenty four points came in the last sixteen minutes from two tries by Kris Radlinski and two tries from Andy Craig, all four of which were converted by Sean Long. As the season progressed several players caught the eye, with Long and Craig Murdock forming an excellent half back pairing and Andy Johnson completing the triangle with some excellent performances at loose forward. Scott Quinnell made his debut in the 36-16 win at Salford, a deliberately low key introduction following the glare of publicity over

his signing. All four of these players later got the chance to play a part in the first team success, but it was Radlinski who really made giant strides forward, culminating in his three try Premiership Final Man of the Match performance and his Young Player of the Season award. Another young player who came to prominence in the latter part of the season was Simon Haughton, who also scored a try in the Premiership Final.

The Alliance Challenge Cup was a big disappointment with defeat at the hands of holders Oldham in the first round, but several fine wins of

varying styles in the Championship led to a creditable third place in the table, just two points behind leaders Leeds. Matches that particularly come to mind are the 54-28 win at St. Helens in the penultimate fixture of the season, a game played against opposition which also still had designs on top spot, a tremendous 68-63 victory over Castleford and, for totally different reasons, the 10-6 win at Dewsbury which took place on a pitch which looked like a cross between Southport beach and an Irish bog!!

Andy Johnson finished top of the try scorers with 20, whilst Sean Long gained most points with 196 from 18 tries and 62 goals. Craig Murdock amassed 160 points from 15 tries and 50 goals. Most appearances went to Andy Craig with 28. There were several candidates for the Supporters Association Alliance Player of the seasons, with Craig Murdock taking the honour. He received a trophy from the Association and a watch from Sponsors Goldsmiths' Jewellers of Market Place, Wigan.

This season the majority of Alliance games will be played on Thursday evening, but there will be a pre season "warm up" against Leigh at Hilton Park on Tuesday 8th August.

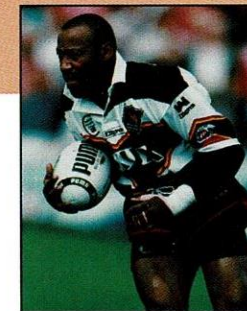

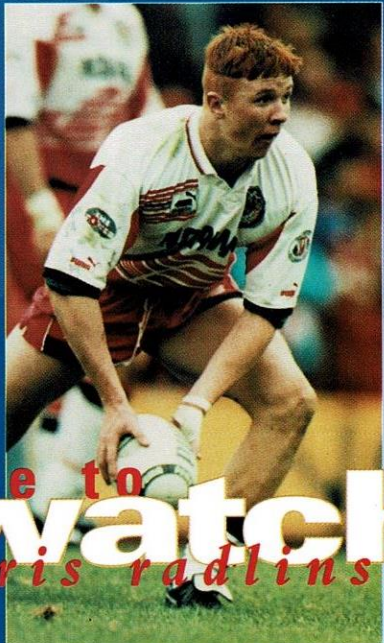
- 1 Games shall be played under the laws of the Rugby Football League EXCEPT:-
 - a At a kick off following a score, the ball need not travel ten yards forward.
 - b The three tackle rule shall apply.

- 2 Each side shall consist of seven players and one substitute. Unlimited substitution is permitted, at the touch line, with the consent of the touch judge.

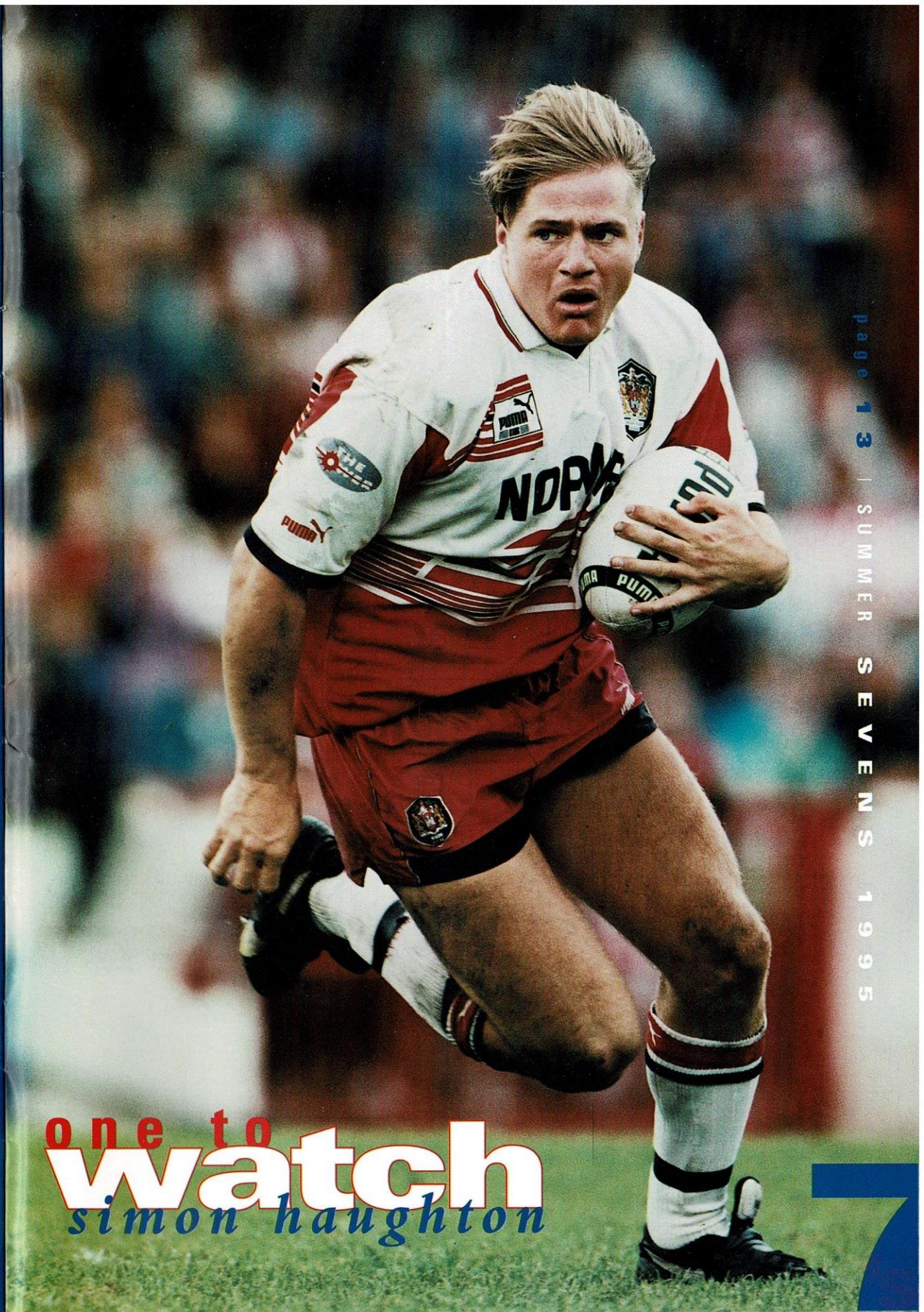
- 3 The duration of each game before the final will be seven and a half minutes each way with one minute interval. If the scores are level at full time, the teams shall change over and continue playing and the next score shall decide the winning team. Ends will be changed every seven and half minutes if necessary and there will be no interval during extra time.
 The final tie will be played for ten minutes each way. If the scores are level at full time similar arrangements to those for previous rounds shall apply, with ends being changed every ten minutes if necessary.

- 4
 - a Time is checked by independent time keepers and the "Klaxon" will sound at the end of each period, regardless of the state of play. Should a player be in the act of scoring a try, but not effecting the touchdown before the "Klaxon", this score is outside the time limited and is invalid.
 - b Injury time, as indicated by the referee will be allowed.
 - c A penalty awarded within the "Klaxon" time shall be permitted, to completion but only if an attempt to kick a penalty goal is elected.
 - d An attempt to convert a try scored within "Klaxon" time shall be permitted. The time keepers will cater for these situations before ending each session.

- 5 Rugby Football League disciplinary arrangements apply EXCEPT:-
 - a The "Sin-Bin" rule shall not be implemented.
 - b A dismissed player will result in the offending team fielding only six players and one substitute for the remainder of the competition.
