



Spent the 1992-93 season with Leeds before returning to Watersheddings in September 1993. Was assistant coach to Bob Lindner in 1994 and took over as head coach in June 1994. Last month was appointed assistant coach to the English World Championship squad.

PAUL ATCHESON

Outstanding attacking full back. A product of Blackbrook juniors (St. Helens) who turned professional with Widnes in 1990. Moved to Wigan and then joined Oldham last May for £50,000. Has represented Great Britain at academy and under 21 level and was a member of the Welsh team which lifted the European Championship earlier this year. Scored a try at a vital time in the 22-10 victory over France at Carcassonne. Versatile player who can play in any back position as well as the back row of the pack. HALIFAX SUPPORTED CUP

The countdown to the Halifax Rugby League Centenary World Cup has started.

After two years of preparation the big day when the most spectacular competition in the history of the sport kicks off with England facing reigning champions Australia at Wembley is now in sight.

Players from the ten competing nations are now anxiously waiting to find out whether they have a place in the final squads of 25 which will be named on September 1.

named on September 1.
England have appointed Keighley
Cougars boss Phil Larder as coach in
place of Ellery Hanley, who has
decided to continue his playing career
abroad, while Oldham's Andy
Goodway and Castleford chief John
Joyner have joined him on the
coaching team.

The Welsh returned from their summer tour to the United States in great shape and as well as the return of Jonathan Davies from his summer stint with the North Queensland Cowboys they are also expecting to have Alan Bateman back from Sydney-club from Cronulla-Sutherland. The French, boosted by that 16-16 Test draw in New Zealand and the start of Jacques Fouroux's new national super league, have named an impressive 40-man training squad including at least five players with British first division experience last season.

Australia have more than their fair share of domestic problems to solve before Bobby Fulton can name their 25-man squad but after their 3-0 whitewashing of the Kiwis demonstrated they can be counted upon to make a strong defence of their title.

New Zealand have regrouped after their Test defeats in Australia and coach Frank Endacott has called up an impressive group of players from

which they can select what is certain to be a competitive team.

Tonga, now coached by former St. Helens boss Mike McClennan, have been fighting off a bid from Australia to include Manly winger John Hopoate and Sydney Bulldogs loose forward Jim Dymock in the Kangaroo squad. But McClennan believes that the Tonga's will be the surprise package of the Centenary competition.

"People in the southern hemisphere have been impressed by the speed at which the Tongan's have adapted to the game," he said.

"I realise that New Zealand will start favourites when we face them in our opening match but I believe that with the commitment my players have shown we can surprise everybody." Former Wigan coach Graeme Lowe, now thankfully restored to full health, is warming up for his return to club coaching with North Queensland Cowboys by being in charge of the formidable Western Samoan team. The Samoan's clash with France and Wales in Group Three is the most evenly matched of the tournament and it is difficult to predict a potential winner.

Lowe said: "There is enormous pride at being involved in the Western Samoan team and our preparations for



the competition are well advanced". Australian Graham Murray who left Illawarra Steelers has joined Fiji as World Cup coach.

The Fijians impressed many respected League judges by reaching the finals of the Coca-Cola World sevens in Sydney last February and if they can translate that ability into the full 13-man game they will prove a major threat. British fans are excitedly waiting for their first glimpse of Papua New Guinea's scrum half talent Adrian Lam who has been playing for Sydney City Roosters. He made a big impact playing for Queensland in the State of Origin series triumph over New South Wales and has been rated as a world class performer.

Lam played for Queensland because that was where he first played Rugby League and he will certainly add fire power to the Kumul's bid to qualify for a semi-final place.

Welshman Tony Fisher has been drafted in to bring South Africa up to speed at Rugby League.

The Dewsbury coach has been impressed by what he has found on the Dark Continent. "Their tackling has to be seen to be believed," said former Welsh international Fisher, who was no mean defender when he played.

"They even make me wince when they go into tackle," added Fisher as he put the finishing touches to the Rhino's training.





THE 1973-74 CAPTAIN MORGAN TROPHY

Played for only one season, the Captain Morgan Trophy had an unusual format but gave Wire their first knockout cup success of the seventies. To qualify for the first round of the sixteen team tournament it was necessary to win the first round tie in the County Cup competition.

Wire had defeated Leigh at home in the first round Lancashire Cup tie by 20pts - 15 to earn a first round Captain Morgan Trophy tie at Wigan. A typically hard fought local derby featured excellent goal kicking by Derek Whitehead but no tries in the 12pts - 4 victory. Wire lost two league fixtures prior to their second round tie against Castleford at home but they took early control of the game for a 10-2 half-time lead. Conroy, Brady and Cunliffe scored tries with Whitehead kicking three goals as Wire eventually gained a 15pts - 7 victory. Poor league form again proceed the Semi-Final tie at Leeds, with Wire having lost a home fixture against Whitehaven. Not given much hope at Headingley, Wire gave a top class display in front of the

TV cameras. Down by 7pts - 11 at the break, Wire dominated the second half for a tremendous 20-13 victory, with debutants Ian Mather and David Wright outstanding. Ashcroft

and Gordon collected the tries with Whitehead again in good form, adding five goals. Ashcroft and Murphy kept the scoreboard moving with drop goals. The final at The Willows, Salford against Featherstone Rovers, was played on a cold, damp, January afternoon, accounting for a poor attendance of only 5,259. With conditions dictating the style of play, points scorer supreme, Derek Whitehead, kicked two first half goals to take Wire into a 4-0 half-time lead. Few chances were created throughout the game and Wire managed to hold onto their lead with no real scares. Not surprisingly, Derek Whitehead was voted man of the match and the Wire fans were in good voice as captain Kevin Ashcroft collected the Trophy. Having won the League Leaders Trophy the previous season, Wire were clearly on the right track and looked set to challenge for further honours in the very near future.



THE RUGBY FOOTBALL LEAGUE CHARTER TIME

In accordance with time hallowed custom it has been the practice of Rugby League to begin each season with instructions as to which rules are to be followed with enthusiasm and where necessary new interpretations. Each season supporters see a crackdown for several weeks then normality returns and everyone carries on as before.

Last season we had a much needed crackdown on head tackling, sadly towards the end of the season, tackles found unacceptable at the seasons' start

tackling, sadly towards the end of the season, tackles found unacceptable at the seasons' start went apparently unnoticed. 'Lying on' at a Play the Ball and playing the ball from a prone position also enjoyed hoots of derision from the terraces. Scrums, in years gone by a sure target for the legislators or enforcers, strangely, were allowed to disintegrate into the farcical, again greeted with groans of disapproval from the faithful followers and looks of bemusement from those less attuned to the vagaries of the game.

All that is to end, we now have a Charter of rule interpretations, surely not a Government intervention, we've already got Charters for everything else, or so we thought...

The ignoble art of ball stealing,

penalised heavily for the last two seasons, comes under the scrutiny with the new wording 'players must exercise some degree of ball security whilst taking the ball into a tackle. The referee must be convinced that the ball has been stolen to award a penalty.' One is left to muse that Lee penny might get a refund off his ten minutes in the Sin Bin late season at Wigan.

THE OTHER DIRECTIVES ARE:

Players are expected to be behind the line at all restarts ie. halfway line, 20 metre line, goal line.

Contact must be made with the foot at the free kick.

Players must make contact with the ball while playing the ball.

Players must stand outside the goal posts while a conversion attempt is taking place.

Touch Judges must make independent decisions at kicks for goal. (No more looking at each other before raising limp flags.)

No attacking player other than the two players involved in the play the ball can take up a position around the play the ball. Referees will be directed to keep the area around the play the ball clear. (Players were gaining advantage by not retiring 5 metres whilst their team was in possession.)

AT THE SCRUM:

- A Referees will enforce correct packing procedures including the loose forward packing into and remaining in the scrum until the ball emerges.
- B The half back will stand square at the tunnel and feed the ball so that it passes the foremost foot of the front row forward.
- C The defending half back will be onside at all times ie. behind his last row of forwards.

The interpretations at the play the ball adapted in season 1994/95 will continue to be enforced in the coming season: ie. no flopping, no holding down, no leg pulling, ball must be lifted clear of the ground, markers square, defenders hands off the ball.

It seems that goal kickers are in for a record season but should these rules not have been enforced last season?
