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

ne hundred years ago this evening the organisation we now know as the Rugby Football League was three days old and a man of Oldham, Joseph Platt, was already established as a leading figure in the battle to establish the breakaway Northern Union in the industrial towns of Lancashire and

In recalling with pride the men from Watersheddings who had the vision and foresight to join those pioneers who laid down the roots of our great game, I think we should also pay tribute to the club officials, players and supporters who have carried the Rugby League flag in Oldham for more than a century.

Not only in Oldham but throughout the North West, the game has been handed down through the decades from generation to generation, creating a deep-rooted culture which hundreds of thousands of people cherish dearly and guard jealously. That was never more in evidence than in those dramatic weeks of last April and early May when the game was passing through its biggest upheaval since that night in August 1895 when Oldham and Halifax, our opponents this evening, were among the clubs which gathered at the George Hotel in Huddersfield to break away from the Rugby Football Union over the issue of bona fide payments for broken time.

Nearly 100 years on we were not discussing six shillings a week to compensate footballers for time lost at work, but an offer to the game of £87 million from media baron Rupert Murdoch's massive News Corporation organisation.

As part of the original deal there were plans to merge many of the best-known clubs.

Oldham and Salford were to form one club and so were Halifax and Bradford or Halifax and Huddersfield. There were plans to merge the Hull clubs and, among others, Wakefield. Castleford and Featherstone.

staggering and so intense that, as we all know now, there was a major rethink at the top and the formulation of a new policy which led to a three-division split, to be headed by Super League, and a more widespread circulation of the available money from News Corporation.

revealed how so many supporters cherish their club and their heritage, if you like, with heart and soul, not to mention pounds and pence. Perhaps the message to people charged with the responsibility for running the clubs is that the strength of our game lies in the determination of its supporters to work for its continuing security as we look ahead towards the turn of the century and the great unknown




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

1994 close season capture from Hull Kingston Rovers, where Wayne had followed brother Frank into the 1st team. Suffered injury problems towards the end of last season after forming a fine partnership with the now departed Mike Hagan, but is now back fit and raring to go!

KARL HARRISON

Club captain now back to his best after a serious knee ligament injury cut short his 1994/95 season. A 1992 GB tourist, Karl (or 'Rhino' as he is known to his colleagues) is the cornerstone of the Halifax pack. Previously with Bramley and Featherstone, he was a record signing from Hull, and the clubs first major purchase following promotion in the summer of 1991. He has become the most capped Halifax player of all time (with 22 GB caps) thanks largely to his performance in the 94 Ashes series, and has again been called into the England squad for the World Cup.

PAUL ROWLEY

Followed coach Steve Simms from Leigh last November where he had been a first team regular since signing for the Leigh Academy at 17. Now a regular GB Academy international (he was a toursit to Australia last summer) Paul has shown again and again why many are tipping him as the next Great Britain booker.

JOHN FIELDHOUSE

Veteran' star previously with Warrington Widnes, St. Helens and Oldham (where he was player coach) before joining 'Fax in 1992. John is as fit and tough as ever and he has put in some of the best performances of his career whilst setting a fine example to the youngsters at the club. Never gives less than 100%.

WAYNE JACKSON

Humberside based prop forward signed in May this year from the old Doncaster club where he enjoyed a successful first division season. Started his career at Hull KR.

SIMON BALDWIN

Another Leigh youngster who followed Simms across the Pennines in October 94. Just 20 years old, 'Sid' had played in the first team at Hilton Park since he was 17. He toured Australia last summer with the Great Britain Academy, and has two ipternational caps (v France) at that-level. Played for England in last seasons European Championships.

PAUL MORIARTY

Swansea and Wales RU international who turned pro and signed for Widnes in February 1989. His league career has been jinxed by injury. Which saw him miss the 1993 Challenge Cup final, but his capture by Halifax last summer following a tribunal valuation was inspired, and he was to reward Fax with some of the best Rugby of his career. 'Mozza' has represented both Great Britain and Wales since switching codes.

MICHAEL JACKSON

Major 1993 signing from Wakefield Trinity (for an undisclosed fee reputed to be near the £100,000 mark), who had beaten 'Fax to his signature two years earlier pace when Michael joined them from Hunslet. 'Jacko' has outstanding pace and strength, but bad luck with injuries prevented him attaining the consistency which will undoubtedly bring him further recognition in the future. Despite this however, Malcolm Reilly showed no hesitation in including him in the GB side for the 2nd and 3rd Tests against New Zealand in 1993, and his form towards the end of last season shows why.

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
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ROOTS A look at the local amateur

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

Obviously the advent of Super League will require a greater number of full time professional players who spend their working life training and playing. This represents a real employment opportunity for youngsters and I anticipate most Super League clubs starting up some form of apprenticeship scheme. Significantly Wigan and Leeds both have these in place.

The talent spotting network will become even more sophisticated and players will be monitored in much greater depth. In order to stand out and gain one of these prized apprenticeships the young player will have to have a "professional" approach from a much earlier age. I think the current batch of Under 15's will be the first to really reap the rewards but players at an even younger age can aspire to a lucrative career - as they have done in soccer for 30 years.

Our Junior Clubs need support in supplying this constant flow of talent . and they need to serve a dual purpose of supplying leisure opportunities for the many people who will be attracted to an even higher profile game.

In Oldham we have a network of six

youth rugby league sections. Shaw, Royton, Saddleworth, St Anne's, Waterhead and Salem. All of these clubs run a number of teams and at least two other clubs, Higginshaw and Watersheddings Wanderers, are keen to run Junior teams. These clubs need support from BARLA, RFL, Oldham RLFC, Oldham Amateur League and in fact all of us. They are the lifeblood of our game in the new century and I hope we never forget that or we can forget a third century.



I would be very interested to hear how the players reacted to having to play in the tropical conditions which prevailed last weekend. The water bottles were used very liberally of course, but I suspect pounds in weight must have been shed. Ian Wilson



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

MEMORY MATCH

DON YATES LOOKS BACK AT A MATCH FROM YESTERYEAR

During the 100 years this game has been played there have been a number of permutations involving the League Championship. Since 1973 it has been a straight forward championship with each club playing every other club both home and away. But for many years there was an unwieldy single division when Clubs played only a limited number of the other clubs and the Championship ended in a play off between the leading contenders. The 'top four' play off proved a most satisfactory and popular finale to the season but on nine occasions the play off has involved no fewer than sixteen clubs and in 1965 the Championship was won by the club who finished that season in seventh position in the table.

That club was Halifax who during the regular season lost 11 matches and so were rank outsiders to lift the title. Oldham, incidentally, ended that 1964-65 campaign in ninth position, visited Hull KR in the first round of the play off and lost 26-14. Halifax entertained Leeds and found the going tough but scored three late tries to run out winners by a flattering 28-11 margin. Under the rules which existed that year they then met the winners of the Wigan-Featherstone tie with the higher placed club having home advantage. Wigan completed a league double over Halifax that season so you can imagine the delight at Thrum Hall when news came through that Featherstone had won 15-8 at Central Park. Halifax registered a comfortable 31-6 home victory over Rovers in a fiery quarter final which saw three Featherstone men sent off.

The semi final at Castleford looked to be the end of the road for Halifax but up popped Oldhamer Terry Fogerty to spur on the Thrum Hallers to a tremendous revival and an eventual and eventful 26-18 victory. The final was staged at Station Road, Swinton and attracted a crowd of 20,776. St. Helens provided the opposition and they were firm favourites to win. They had ended the season top of the table and en route to the final and defeated Barrow 23-7 Hull KR 24-6 and Wakefield Trinity 10-5 all at Knowsley Road. The teams for the final lined up as follows: Halifax: Ronnie James, Duncan Jackson, Johnny Burnett, Alan Kellett, Johnny Freeman, Barry Robinson, Paul Daley, Ken Roberts, Dave Harrison, Jack Scroby Terry Fogerty, Colin Dixon and Charlie Renilson. St. Helens: Frank Barrow, Peter Harvey, Tom van Vollenhoven, Keith Northey, Len Killeen, Alex Murphy, Wilf Smith, John Temby (substitutes John Warlow), Bob Dagnall, Cliff Watson, Ray French, John Mantle and Doug Laughton. Saints lived up to their reputation and were the better side for long periods of this final. However, Halifax gave a fine all round team performance and played to their full potential. Skipper Johnny Burnett scored tries in each half at vital times and these were to prove decisive. Duncan Jackson scored the other Halifax try and the reliable Ronnie James tagged on three goals. Len Killeen scored all Saints' points with a try and two goals but Halifax had pulled off a shock 15-7 success to lift the title for the first time in 58 years.



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
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NEWS


style. I would also like to mention our prop forward
