





n Sydney earlier today, the Winfield Cup reached its climax with the Grand Final between Manly and the Sydney Bulldogs. In a season that has been largely overshadowed by the bitter wrangling of the Super League dispute, it was time for football on the field to take centre stage.

Some commentators may see the game in terms of Australian rugby league versus Super League with Manly in the ARL corner and the Bulldogs batting for Murdoch. Several players from each camp have decided to play for their rivals in 1996. The Bulldogs were one of the first clubs to sign up with Murdoch's venture but when the contract wars began, several players jumped ship back to the ARL. The chaos and acrimony has somehow remained off the field as the Bulldogs recovered from a run of five defeats in eight games after the April announcement of the Super League to make the play offs and eventually the Grand Final itself.

The game marked the retirement of Terry Lamb after 328 matches in the Winfield Cup for Western Suburbs and the Bulldogs. Since his debut in 1980, Lamb has represented City, New South Wales and Australia touring with the 1986 Kangaroos and becoming the only player to play in every match on tour. He also collected a record five tries against Hull KR on that Tour.

The Doggies have been playing on emotion over the past three weeks hoping to give their captain the best possible finale to his career. Having finished sixth in the table, they have been playing sudden death matches all the way to the final. Lamb's men disposed of St George and an out of sorts Brisbane before seeing off Camberra in last week's semi-final.

Manly, meanwhile topped the table with just two defeats in their twenty two matches and were favourites to reach the Australian game's showpiece event. The Sea Eagles had to come from behind to


defeat Cronulla and earn a week off to rest injuries to key players. They came back to tough it out with Newcastle for a Grand Final place and the score to 12 pts-4

suggests a dour, physical contest. Manly have their own elder statesman at stand off in Cliff Lyons and it may well be his contest with Lamb that could decide the wider issue of which captain lifts the J.J. Giltinan Shield at the conclusion of the match.

The Sea Eagles beat the Bulldogs 26pts-0 in May thanks to a fine display from Steve Menzies. Terry Lamb was out injured that day and the Dogs looked to be missing him. Manly have not been to the grand final since they won the Winfield Cup at the Sydney Cricket Ground in 1987 while the Bulldogs were premiers the following year and runners up to a dominant Camberra side twelve months

The Sea Eagles will start as favourites but much of the sentimental money will be on the Bulldogs and Terry Lamb. Can he produced one last minutes of magic?

On the colder side of the world, the Centenary

following their last quarter revival against a Wigan side that failed to impress Graeme West that much during that period.

St. Helens took advantage of Leeds' misfortune to move up into second place by beating Castleford comfortably enough 35ptsT8. On Wednesday they took on Warrington at Wilderspool and victory there would take them to within four points of the Champions. The Wire looked alarmingly listless in defeat against Workington who did the basic well and seemed to have few more ideas in attack. Kurt Sorensen's side host Halifax today looking to build on that result.

Warrington's difficult start to the season continues following the St. Helens match as today they travel to Castleford who have yet to lose at home. This fixture is

usually an attractive one with plenty of points and a regular in the Sky schedules.

There is likely to be just one remaining 100% in the First Division after Wednesday clash between Salford and Keighley at the Willows. This afternoon, Salford make the short journey to Rochdale while the Cougars host Whitehaven.

There was a full programme of fixtures in this section during the week with the big clash at the Willows the highlight, Widnes continued their challenge with a victory at Post Office Road. In the week, Andy Platt was due to make his home debut against Batley. The Chemics could move to joint top with a win in that match and victory over Huddersfield yesterday.

Featherstone have now lost their last two home matches and travel to Batley having had the luxury of a rest in midweek while the gallant youths were in action in Cheshire.

Swinton were still the surprise leaders of the Second Division taking advantage of Hull KR's inactivity to take out a two point lead with a win over Hunslet whose three match unbeaten run has now been matched by three consecutive defeats.

Leigh moved into second place with a win over Barrow which was their fifth in a row. Today Ian Lucas's men have the day off while Swinton meet Hull KR at Gigg Lane.

Victory Park host an intriguing game as Chorley meet Doncaster. Chorley put together a run of two consecutive victories recently but crashed a heavy defeat at Bramley last week undoing much of Bob Eccles' good work. The Dragons meanwhile have struggled following their eleventh hour admission to the League winning just once in half a dozen games.

The Halifax Centenary World Cup is now just a fortnight away. There have been letters in the trade papers regarding the publicity (or lack of it) for the competition. The BBC has, so far, been very quiet about an event they are keen to get exclusive right to. Sky has been running adverts mainly the sports channels and mainly during league programmes which state that ticket application forms are available in the national press but only in the northern editions. I would hate to be living in the South trying to get information and tickets for what is after all, the only sporting World Cup this country this year.

On October 11th, England take on Fiji here at Central Park. The Fijian side, known as the Batis, is coached by former Illawarra boss Graham Murray and captained by Lee Nelagilagi. The Penrith centre is one of 13 overseas based players including Jon Dakuitoga (Penrith) and Noa Nadruku (Canberra). One disappointment the absence of Workington and Sydney Bulldogs prop James Pickering through injury.

The Fijians have beaten Papua New Guinea in Port Moresby and France during their preparations and could be handful for an England side coming off the opening game with Australia. The Batis fare South Africa on October 8th at Keighley and England may well be looking for their first victory of the tournament. Either way, it should be an entertaining evening.

IAN GILDART

Hard working and experienced forward. A product of Wigan Colts who turned professional here at Central Park during October 1986. Made his debut the following January in the 68-0 demolition of Workington Town in the Challenge Cup. Went on to make 139 appearances for Wigan including an outing at Wembley in 1990 and also appearances in the Regal Trophy and Premiership Finals. Also represented Great Britain at under 21 level whilst at Central Park. After eight years with Wigan Gildart was transferred to Wakefield Trinity in August 1994. Moved back over the Pennines to Oldham for £45.000 last June.

JOE FAIMALO

Hard working second row forward who has just enjoyed his best ever season. A product of the Eastern Suburbs club in New Zealand, Faimalo had brief spells with Workington Town, Oldham and then Swinton during the 1991-92 season without impressing. He returned home and enjoyed success with Hawkes Bay which prompted him to return to Oldham last September. His determination and stamina last season made him one of the mainstays of the Roughyed pack.

JASON TEMU

Hard running prop who has enjoyed a tremendous run of form during the past 18 months. A product of the Marist club in New Zealand, he joined the Counties-Manukau outfit for the NZ Lion Red Cup of 1994. Temu was a revelation for Manukau in July 1991 he toured Australia with the New Zealand residents squad. Is expected to eventually win full Kiwi test honours. In September 1994 Temu flew to Britain and straight into the Oldham team where his good form continued.

CHRIS PARR

Hard working prop. A product of the Wigan St. Patricks junior club who began his professional career with Huddersfield in 1990. Won Great Britain under 21 honours whilst at Fartown. Moved back over to this side of the Pennines in 1992 when he joined Swinton. Oldham signed him in October 1993 and he has continued to show good form at Watersheddings.

Experienced professional. A product of Stanley Rangers juniors (Castleford) who joined the senior Castleford club in 1984. Appeared at full back for Castleford at Wembley in 1986 but has since developed into a hard working second row forward. Was transferred to Leeds in 1988 and then on to Halifax in 1991 before joining Oldham during the summer of 1994 for



FRANCIS MALONEY

Powerfully built stand off and accurate positional kicker. A product of the St. John Fisher junior club (Dewsbury) who turned professional with Leeds in 1990. Moved to Featherstone Rovers in 1992 and won Great Britain Under 21 recognition whilst at Post Office Road. Moved to Warrington during the summer of 1994 but did not settle at Wilderspool so transferred to Oldham last May for £50,000. Much is expected of Maloney during the forthcoming season. First team goal kicker at Watersheddings.

MARTIN CROMPTON

Scrum half captain and the orchestrator of most of Oldhams attacking play. A former Wigan St. Patricks junior who began his professional career with Warrington. Moved back to Wigan in July 1992 when he joined the senior Central Park outfit. Made his debut in the Charity Shield defeat against St. Helens at Gateshead when he was at scrum half. Also made a number of his 20 Wigan appearances at hooker before he moved to Oldham for a bargain £35,000 fee in September 1993. Duiring his 12 months at Wigan was substitute in Wigan's World Club Challenge defeat against Brisbane Broncos. A brilliant tactical kicker who has been included in the English squad for the forhcoming Halifax Centenary World Championship.

Experienced prop. Represented Oldham and Lancashire schoolboys, Played for the Waterhead (Oldham) junior club before turning professional with Bradford Northern in 1982. Transferred to Oldham in 1987 and then moved to Salford in 1989 before returning to Watersheddings in November 1991. Under rated forward who has been unlucky not to gain representative recognition.

PAUL TOPPING

Utility player who is equally effective whether at centre, stand off or loose forward. Outstanding defensive ability. Oldham's top points scorer during the past two seasons. Topping is a product of the Wigan St. Patricks junior club who turned professional with Swinton in August 1985. He had a spell on loan at Mansfield before joining Leigh in 1990 and then transferring to Oldham in September 1993. Topping made one appearance for Lancashire in 1991.

Powerful three quarter and another former Wigan player although Neal was unable to break into the first team squad here at Central Park. Was with the Parkside junior outfit (Leigh) before turning professional in December 1989. Scored eight tries from 14 appearances whilst on loan at Doncaster last season but in March moved to Oldham where he is now a useful member of the first team squad. Cost a bargain

DARREN ABRAM

Prolific try scoring centre who has been Oldham's top try scorer during the past two seasons. Has also been club top try scorer during his spells with Rochdale Hornets and Trafford Borough. A product of Thatto Heath juniors (St. Helens) who won BARLA international honours before turning professional with Warrington in 1985. had a spell on loan with Swinton before moving to Chorley Borough. Was with Borough when the club switched to Altrincham and changed name to Trafford Borough. Abram then had a spell with Rochdale Hornets before joining Oldham in February 1993.

PAUL ATCHESON

Outstanding attacking full back and one of four Oldham players who have played here at Central Park. A product of Blackbrook juniors (St. Helens) who turned professional with Widnes in 1990. Moved here to Wigan in October 1992 and made his debut the following January in the 19-4 Regal Trophy semi-final victory over Hull. Made 62 appearances for Wigan before transferring to Oldham last May for £50,000. Whilst at Central Park represented Great Britain at academy and under 21 level and was a member of the Welsh team which lifted the European Championship earlier this year. Scored a try at a vital time in the 22-10 victory over France at Carcassonne. Versatile player who can play in any back position as well as the back row of the pack. Member of the Welsh World Championship squad.

WALLY GIBSON


Talented Australian full back or stand off whose unpredictability makes him a dangerous attacker. Played for the Tunnicliffe club in Australia before joining Huddersfield in 1989. Became a firm favourite with the Fartown followers who were bitterly disappointed when he moved to Oldham in September 1992.

SCOTT RANSON

Fast and elusive winger. A product of Thatto Heath juniors (St. Helens) who turned professional with Swinton in 1987. Was top try scorer at Swinton during his last two seasons with the Lions, joined Oldham in February 1992 and has continued his prolific try scoring feats at Watersheddings.



his afternoon's game is the last Wigan match before the Rugby League Centenary World Cup takes over the fixture list and we can have a rest from the rigours of the Stones Bitter Centenary

Stones Bitter Centenary Championship. At least the spectators can have a break from watching their club and put their energy into supporting England or perhaps another country of their choice. There will not of course, be any sort of rest for the Wigan players as the vast majority will be on international duty for England, Wales, Western Samoa and New Zealand, Have I missed any out? I really do hope that the World Cup is a great success particularly in attendance terms and there will be a late surge to buy tickets especially for the opening game at Wembley in a fortnight. I suppose that it is natural to wait and see who will be in the semi finals and final before buying tickets. Experience shows that Old Trafford can attract a good crowd with short notice and I know that the Sir Alfred McAlpine Stadium at Huddersfield should be easy to fill who ever reaches the semi final to be played there. The one big worry is having an acceptably big crowd at Wembley for the final. There is only a six day gap between the second semi final and the final and although tickets will be available on the day, I am sure that the League officials would sleep easier if a good crowd was assured well before the two finalists or even the four semi finalists are known. It would be interesting to know how

many coaches have been booked to travel from Wigan and surrounding areas for both Wembley games as this would give a good indication of the probable crowd. If there are any budding entrepreneurs in today's crowd, a coach (non executive) will cost between £500 and £550 for a 53 seater, what could you charge and what profit could you make. It is better than going down to Calais and bringing back fizzy French beer though perhaps not so lucrative.

We do not know the score of last Wedneday's game at Watersheddings between Oldham and London Broncos but after last Sunday's Bronco's win at home (Brentford FC) against Leeds the side from the capital must be far more confident for the future than they were earlier in the season. There is still debate going on as to where they will finally settle but we do know that their game against Wigan on December 1st will be played at Brentford. I do not really fancy a 7.05pm kick off on a Sunday night but once a year is not too bad is it?

Next Sunday, the 1st of October, there will only be one place in the world to be. Where? Here at Central Park when nostalgia and excitement will merge together when a team of Wigan all time greats will play against the rest of the world all time greats. Just imagine the hairs on the back of your neck standing up at the sight of your favourites from the past, the lumps in a thousand throats at memories of the distant and not too distant past come flooding back. How can you miss it? How old or young do you have to be to be an all time great?

There were two articles in the Rugby League press this week on very similar subjects but with totally opposing opinions. In League Express Martin Saddler, comparing the teams of the 1960's to those of the 1990's made the comment that 'Today's Wigan team would run up 100 points against the great Wakefield Trinity side of the 1960's. There's simply no comparing the skills, conditioning, speed, stamina and strength of modern day players with even the top players from those days.'

Ray French in the rival publication, the Rugby Leaguer, asks "How many times have we heard the myth of those pot bellied, round, slow moving forwards of vestervear who, today, would supposedly be hard pressed to catch the attention of any self respecting coach? How many times do we here the claim that today the game and its players are much faster than of days long ago? Ray names players such as Nat Sulcock, Ken Gee, Dick Huddart and Alan Prescott and points out that the likes of Huddart and Prescott could keep up with modern forwards in fifty yard sprints. What do you think, are modern day players way ahead of the players of the past or would the greats of thirty, forty or even a hundred years ago be able to compete in today's game. Given todays training and coaching conditions, no doubt many of the old stars could star in the modern game, Billy Boston could star anywhere, but taking the game as a whole, there is no comparison. In the early sixties, the game was generally so slow that a referee could wear a blazer as he trotted round the pitch. I think that today's Wigan side could probably rattle up a hundred points playing against any side from 30 years ago, don't you?

GROUND COMFORT & SAFETY NOTICE

Certain standards of behaviour are expected at Rugby League grounds and they are required from all spectators whether they are 'home' or 'away'.

They can be found, as a reminder on the Ground Regulations Board in the vicinity of each group of turnstiles as follows:

- 1. You must not invade the players area
- Cans, bottles, klaxan horns, dogs and dangerous articles must not be brought into the stadium.
- 3. You must not use obscene or offensive language.
- Persons seeking admission may be required to submit to a search so as to uphold the regulations.
- The club reserves the right for its servants/agents/Police to remove any person contravening these regulations.

These requirements are fairly standard to all grounds, but fortunately because of the high standards and good record of Rugby League followers they do not usually cause much of a problem.

To enlarge a little: the contents of cans or bottles is not important, whether it be beer or pop, a full container thrown can be just as dangerous! (Are RL spectators daft enough or wealthy enough, to spend good money and then throw it away?) Some people have objected to having 'sticks' removed from flags being taken onto the ground, in the excitement of a game such a small stick can become lethal if it pokes someones eye out!

Believe me the club is simply aiming at a happy, safe environment for all.



> Wales. New Zealand and Papua New Guinea have all announced their final squads for the Halifax Rugby League Centenary World Cup.

And reigning European Champions Wales have handed giant Wigan forward Scott Quinnell the chance of becoming a dual international at both League and Union within 14 months.

Scott, the former Llanelli star, turned professional and joined Wigan in a world record switch in September last year. Wales will be skippered by Warrington's goal-kicking star Jonathan Davies, who plays his last International on Welsh soil in the World Cup against Western Samoa at Swansea on Sunday, October 15.

The dazzling Davies hopes to sign off his international career in style, but says: "Both teams in our group, Western Samoa and France, will be extremely tough to beat, but I think we are good enough to win the group and, when it gets to the semi-finals, anything can happen".

Coach Clive Griffiths added: "We surprised a good many people by taking the European Championship title last season and I am sure we can do the same in the Halifax Centenary World Cup". New Zealand have included four English-based players in their 24 man squad for the Halifax World Cup.

The four are Leeds duo Kevin Iro and Tony Kemp, Wigan's brilliant utility back, Henry Paul and Featherstone Rovers loose-forward Brendon Tuuta.

Kiwi coach Frank Endacott has retained most of the squad that played in the recent Test series against Australia, but has handed debuts to Auckland Warriors' young half-back star Stacey Jones and dynamic Cronulla Sharks winger Richard Barnett. Endacott said: "We have chosen the squad from the best players

available and I believe that nine out of ten people would have come up with the same sauad.

"We have the skill and the players. What we need now is the attitude and the hunger to succeed in the Halifax World Cup". Matthew Ridge, the former All Black Rugby Union star, will skipper the Kiwis with the powerful John Lomax as vice-captain. Adrian Lam, the classy Sydney City Roosters scrum-half who helped Queensland to a shock State of Origin series victory over New South Wales, will lead Papua New Guinea's World Cup bid. Lam was hotly tipped to take over the Kangaroos No 7 jersey for the recent series against New Zealand, but he decided to turn his back on Australia and plumped for the land of his





Wigan RL legends Billy Boston and Graeme West will be attending Wigan Post Office, Wallgate, on Tuesday 3rd October 1995 to assist with the launch of a set of Royal Mail Commemorative stamps to be issued in celebration of the Centenary Year of Rugby League.

The stars will be present between 9am and 10am and will be signing philatelic items for collectors, souvenir hunters and rugby league enthusiasts alike. A prize draw will also be held during the day with a 'supporters kit' comprising various souvenir items as the main prize.

Official Wigan Rugby League 'Originals' Souvenirs will be available throughout the day.

RUGBY LEAGUE HEROES ON ROYAL MAIL SPECIAL STAMPS

Five Rugby League heroes feature on a Royal Mail stamp issue which marks the centenary of the sport as it moves to new world "super league" status.

The stamps celebrate the last historic changes made to the sport - the crucial meeting a century ago at the George Hotel in Huddersfield, which led to 22 northern clubs breaking away from the Rugby Union. The game of Rugby League was born out of the clubs' frustration at not being allowed to compensate their players for time lost from the mills, mines and factories where they worked.

The players depicted on the stamps are from Rugby League's Hall of Fame which enshrines the aame's areatest players and celebrates their contribution to it's history.

On the 19p stamp the "Prince of Centres" HAROLD WAGSTAFF (1891-1939) is seen captaining the British Lions in the legendary 1914 test against Australia. Lions won 14-6 despite being down to ten men and the victory was compared to one of the great battles of the Zulu Wars - the test was forever known as the Rarke's Drift test.

GUS RISMAN (1911-1994), one of only four living players inducted into the Hall of Fame at its inauguration in 1988, is featured on the 25p stamp in Salford's famous strip as he holds aloft the Challenge Cup. Risman was a scoring machine - by the end of his career, spanning 25 years, he had accumulated 1,678 goals and 4,050 points in 873 matches. Despite this it was as a creator of tries that Risman was renowned.

The game's most celebrated record breaker, JIM SULLIVAN (1903-1977), played more games and kicked more goals than any other man before or since and is pictured, in Wigan's strip, on the 30p stamp. "Sully" repaid the Wigan club's investment many times over when they signed the Welshman in 1921. As a goalkicker he was lethally accurate and topped the points-scoring charts mosts seasons.

BILLY BATTEN (1889-1959) was a player whose charisma and personality brought the fans flooding in. Batten shown in Hull's strip on the 35p stamp, signed for the side in 1913. One of his tactics - jumping clean over opponents after chargeing at them - had to be banned because of the risk of injury to tacklers.

No player has ever come near to Australian winger BRIAN BEVAN'S career total of 796 tries. Bevan (1924-1991) is shown on the 41p stamp playing for Warrington against Halifax in the Challenge Cup replay, 1954, on one of the electrifying runs which made him famous.
