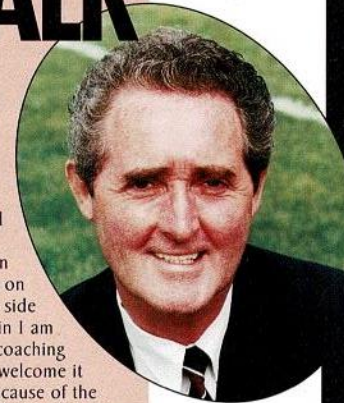

BOARDROOM TALK

BY OLDHAM RLFC CHAIRMAN JIM QUINN



Jean-Marc Bosman's victory in the European Court last week could have repercussions for our great game of Rugby League, but I am not one of those people who believe that an end to our transfer system would necessarily be a bad thing. League and club officials will be closely watching what happens in soccer. It may be that, eventually, clubs will be not be able to demand transfer fees for out of contract players and if the Advocate General's decision becomes law in football, as seems likely, it is difficult to see how the present system could be retained in other sports. A lot of people are worried that smaller clubs would suffer because they would no longer be able to raise vital revenue, often needed for survival, by selling promising youngsters they have produced themselves. It is true, of course, that when clubs pay a transfer fee for a player, the money is staying within the game for the benefit of the clubs. It is a valuable source of self financing for the game, whereas money spent on contracts for players goes out of the game and, as such is not available for recirculating within the game. Having weighed everything up, however, I believe the advantages of abolishing transfer fees could outweigh the disadvantages. The players would benefit, especially those in the top bracket, but I think there would be substantial benefits for the clubs as well and as such, for the game as a whole. Look at it this way. While clubs would not be able to cash in on the sale of their best youngsters, they wouldn't have to pay transfer fees, which are often inflated, in the first game and I am sure this would help in a more even spread of talent throughout the game.

As things stand now, clubs wishing to obtain the services of a top player from another club must pay a huge transfer fee and also take on board the players contract demands. When you add the two together the deal is often a non-starter for clubs such as Oldham which do not have a vast reservoir of money available. With no transfer fee to pay and only a contract to worry about, clubs like Oldham could find that they were in a position to attract and recruit some star material. At least, it's food for thought and offers some points for consideration in opposition to those who have thrown up their hands in horror at the current noises coming out of Europe. Today's game is our last before the close down for the Halifax Centenary World Cup and in welcoming Leeds to Watersheddings for the first time under the stewardship of Dean Bell and Hugh McGahan, I would like to thank all our sponsors, fans and helpers who have stuck with us during the first few weeks of the season. It has been a difficult period for us, but we finally got on the winning track when we got the better of London Broncos only a few days after their surprise win over Leeds at Brentford. It was perhaps always going to be difficult for them to repeat that form so soon afterwards, but that should take nothing away from our guys, who were under a lot of pressure to get their first win and went out and did it. I didn't see the game because I was out of town for the week, but everyone I have spoken to both in and out of the club was happy at the way we played and we went on to produce a spirited display in defeat at Wigan. In some respects it is a pity the month's

World Cup shut down has coincided with our upsurge in form, but on the other side of the coin I am sure the coaching staff will welcome it if only because of the number of injuries we have picked up in the last two or three games. By the way, I watched the Oldham Academy side beat Sheffield Eagles on Monday and I must congratulate the boys on a marvellous display which earned them their first win of the season. Sheffield were worthy opponents, and together, the two sides produced a great game which was a terrific advertisement for Academy football. If you ever get the chance of popping in to watch our under 19 side do take it. I am sure you will like what you see. They are next at home on Monday October 23 when they play Hull KR. Enjoy the game today, give England a cheer in the World Cup (best wishes by the way to Andy Goodway in his new post as assistant coach of the national side) and don't forget that our next home game is on Wednesday, November 1 when we entertain Workington. This game will coincide with the annual ex players reunion. We extend an open invitation to the match to all our former players, who are asked to report to the pavilion by 5pm if they wish to attend the official opening of our Hall of Fame. See you that night.



JIM FALLON (Winger)
 Jim joined Leeds Rugby League Club four years ago from Union glamour club Bath. Many regard last season as Jims best since his transition to Rugby League. His sheer physical presence and dynamic strength and pace has caused havoc for every defence in the land. Fallon finished second in Leeds try-scorers chart with twenty four touchdowns. The powerhouse winger is looking forward to the new season where he most certainly continue his excellent progress made in the game.

CRAIG INNES (Centre)
 An unselfish centre who works hard for his winger. Struck up a clinical combination with left winger Francis Cummins during last season. Innes signed for Leeds in January 1992 after an outstanding career in Rugby Union which included a regular place in the formidable New Zealand All Blacks side. He has been a consistent performer for the Loiners and he is one of the top centres in the Championship.

FRANCIS CUMMINGS (Utility back)
 Francis Cummins is a Rugby League teenage sensation. He holds the record as the youngest player to play and score in a Challenge Cup final, at 17 years and 200 days during the 1994 final against Wigan. Last year he represented Great Britain at three levels, academy, Under 21's and full during the World Sevens in Sydney, Australia. He also scored against France in his full England debut during the European Championship match at Gateshead.

GARRY SCHOFIELD O.B.E.Í (Stand off)
 Leeds veteran half back signed for the Loiners for a then World Record transfer fee of £155,000 in 1987, scoring two tries on his debut against the Auckland Touring side. During last season Schofield equalled the World Record for international caps with league legend Mick Sullivan. Both players have represented Great Britain on forty six occasions. Schofield has captained his country thirteen times, with his greatest achievement defeating the Australians 33-10 at Melbourne in the 2nd Ashes test during the 1992 Lions tour.

NEIL HARMON (Prop forward)
 The powerhouse frontrow forward has been a consistent performer for the Loiners since he signed for Warrington in 1993. His current form has been justified by his selection in the England Rugby League Train on squad for the forthcoming Halifax Centenary World Cup Tournament. Harmon has represented Great Britain at Under 21 level five seasons ago. Neil is looking forward to playing under Dean Bell and Hugh McGahan and he is ready to fight for a regular spot in the Leeds starting line up this coming season.

MICHAEL FORSHAW (Loose Forward)
 A summer capture for the Loiners from Wakefield Trinity. A talented Loose Forward who started his professional career at Wigan. Over the past year he has worked hard on his game and many Rugby League critics rate him as one of the best Lock Forwards in the Premiership. Always giving 100% commitment and with his wealth of knowledge and experience he will prove to be a good asset for the Leeds squad.

JAMES LOWES (Hooker)
 Local lad signed from near neighbours Hunslet after an outstanding Yorkshire Cup performance against Leeds in 1992. Initially was signed as a half back, however, the Leeds coaching staff moulded the South Leeds junior into a hooker. A tremendous grafter who never takes a backward step. During last seasons Challenge Cup final he managed to score a try on the hallowed Wembley turf the first time a hooker had scored in a Challenge Cup final since 1987

when Halifax and current Leeds Physiotherapist Seamus McCallion scored against St. Helens.

GEORGE MANN (Forward)
 The former St. Helens forward was a fine capture for Leeds last season. A tremendous powerful forward with great all round skills and good mobility. Dubbed Mr Versatile by his colleagues because he can play in a variety of positions including prop, second row, hooker and stand off. Has represented New Zealand on eight occasions from 1990 to 1991. Represented Auckland during their tour of Great Britain in 1987. This season he will turn to his native Tonga where he hopes to play in the Centenary World Cup.

GARY MERCER (Second row)
 Gary Mercer is probably Leeds most consistent performer week in week out. He has won the Supporters player of the season award in successive seasons (1994 & 1995). The typical modern day forward with plenty of pace and power. His main attribute is busting the line out wide. Gary started his career in New Zealand before signing for Bradford in 1987. Initially he was a flying winger who toured with the Kiwis to Great Britain in 1989. During that tour he was awarded the Man of the Series. Immediately after the tour he signed for Warrington where he stayed at Wilderspool for three seasons before making the journey to Headingley. Now a well equipped forward, he has represented New Zealand on twenty one occasions. He will be without doubt a vital member of the Leeds squad as they hunt for honours in 1995-96.

ADRIAN MORLEY (Second Row)
 Made his Leeds debut last season at the tender age of seventeen years old. An outstanding prospect with fantastic ability. He plays in the style of a modern day second row running wide of the rucks managing to off load and burst tackles with great power and a fine turn of speed. He was an ever present member of the Leeds Alliance and Academy championship winning sides of last season. He will almost certainly figure in Leeds first team plans this season.

PAUL COOK (Utility back)
 Signed by Leeds from the Hull & District Amateur Rugby League scene in the summer of 1992. Paul possesses exceptional pace and a superb sidestep. Ever present member of the Leeds squad during last season, can always be relied upon to do a good job. He captained the Leeds Alliance side to the Alliance First Division Championship last season. A current Great Britain Academy International who toured with the Academy to Australia during the summer of 1994. A great prospect and future international in the making.

NICHOLAS FOZZARD (Prop Forward)
 The Wakefield born teenager is into his third year at the club. At 6'3" and weighing 17st 7lb it was obvious that he would get his first team opportunity at an early age. He made his first team debut at St. Helens two seasons ago as a sixteen year old amateur and turned professional in July of 1994. Last season he was given added experience by lining up in the Leeds first team squad on three occasions. The coaching staff believe he has the physique and ability to become a regular in the first team.

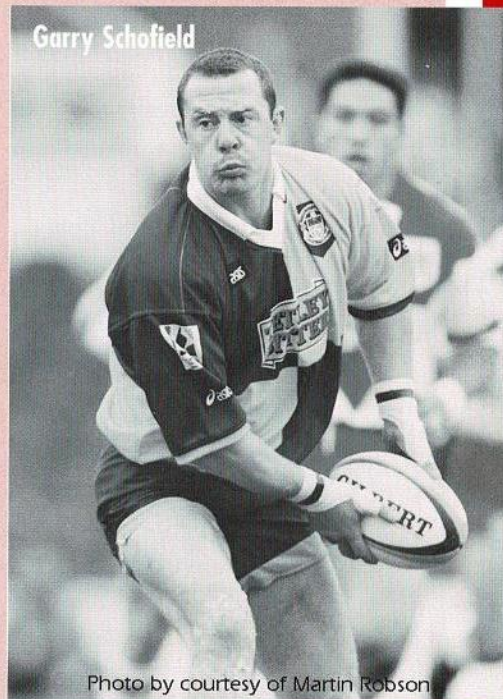
TONY KEMP (Stand Off)
 Kiwi stand off signed for Leeds from near neighbours Castleford during the summer of

1995. Rated as one of the best half backs in the British game. Kemp has a great knack of sucking defences towards him, thus, enabling him to penetrate defences with his accurate long splitting passes. He also possesses a natural kicking game second to none. Kemp has represented New Zealand on eighteen occasions which included the tour of Europe in 1989. He has experienced the toughest competition in the world, the Australian Winfield Cup with the Newcastle Knights, and during the summer of 1995 he was a massive hit for the Brisbane based South Queensland Crushers. In his early years he had a short spell with Doncaster. The Loiners will benefit from Kemp's wealth of knowledge and depth of talent this season.

DAVID GIBBONS (Half Back)
 Another product of the famous Leeds scouting system. David has come through the ranks of Academy and Alliance teams respectively. He made his first team full debut last season at Halifax. The former East Leeds Junior is a gifted half back and a fine athlete. He has great awareness, top class handling skills and he can also turn his hand to goalkicking. This season he hopes to be given regular chances to stake his claim in the Leeds first team. The quicksilver half back was a vital member of the Leeds Alliance Championship squad of last season. David's twin brother Anthony, also plays in the Leeds Alliance side.

MICK SHAW (Hooker)
 Signed from the Siddal Amateur Rugby League Club three seasons ago. Last year he made his first team debut against Swinton in the Regal Trophy. The livewire hooker had a superb season for the Leeds Alliance side in which he was awarded the Alliance player of the year, voted by the First Division clubs.

MARVIN GOLDEN (Winger)
 Marvin Golden is a product South Leeds Amateur Rugby League scene. He joined Leeds three seasons ago and has served on the Club's Apprentice Scheme. An elusive player with fine Rugby League skills. He has good pace and is a difficult player to bring down. His usual position is on the wing but has played in the centres both at Academy and Alliance level. Last season he made his first team debut against Swinton in the Regal Trophy tie at Headingley where he scored a try. He played the majority of last season in the Leeds Alliance side which won the League title and he also played numerous matches for the Leeds Academy who also won their respective League title. A future star in the making.

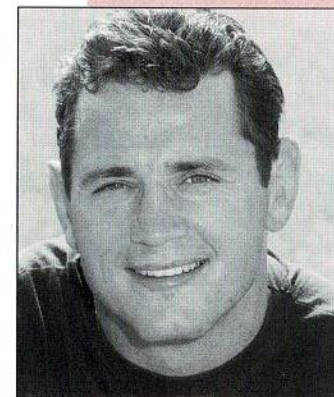

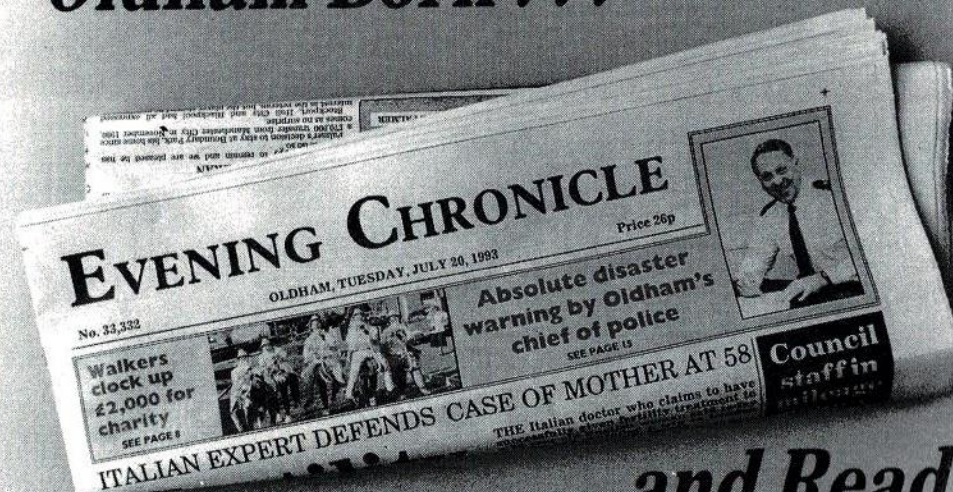

Don Yates looks back to a match from yesteryear

The visit of Leeds to Watersheddings this afternoon takes me back to an epic encounter between these two clubs which took place almost 39 years ago towards the end of the 1956-57 season.

Those were heady days for both Leeds and Oldham. Both clubs had defeated the touring Kangaroos and Oldham had lifted the Lancashire Cup as they swept to the top of the Championship table with a playing record which read: won 33, lost 5. Leeds ended that campaign in fourth position in the table and so were called upon to visit Watersheddings in the Championship semi-final. That semi-final took place just seven days before Leeds were to meet Barrow in the Challenge Cup Final at Wembley.

Barrow had also enjoyed a successful league campaign and they too were involved in the Championship play-off. They had to visit Hull and so with Wembley on their opponents minds, it was generally agreed that Hull and Oldham would enjoy relatively easy passages into the Championship Final. Leeds, of course, have always been one of Rugby League's leading clubs and when they travelled to Watersheddings for that early May meeting in 1957 they had already won the Yorkshire Cup seven times and the Challenge Cup on six occasions. Surprisingly, they had never won the Championship.

Watersheddings was packed to the seams with a crowd of 23,000 to watch two clubs who lined up as follows:

Oldham: Bernard Ganley, Dick Cracknell, Alan Davies, Denis Ayres, John Elty; Frank Daley, Frank Pitchford; Ken Jackson, Jack Keith, Don Vines, Sid Little, Charlie Winslade & Derek Turner.

Leeds: Lewis Jones; Pat Quinn, Keith McLellan, Jack Lendill, George Broughton;

Gordon Brown, Jeff Stevenson; Tony Skelton, Bernard Prior, Ernie Hopper, Bernard Poole, Don Robinson & Harry Street.

Leeds began the match as if Wembley one week later was the last thing on their minds. During a tense, thrilling opening half the Loiners were slightly the better side and as half-time approached they led 7-2. Jeff Stevenson had scored their try and Lewis Jones had landed a couple of goals whilst Oldham's reply had come

from a Bernard Ganley penalty. Then, on the stroke of half-time, Dick Cracknell made a superb touchline run up to the pavilion corner, rounded Lewis Jones and touched down under the posts to give Ganley the type of conversion he never missed. Seven each at half-time but Cracknell had given Oldham the psychological boost which enabled them to turn in a second half performance which was as good as any seen on this ground. Alan Davies scored a couple of tries and put Denis Ayres over with a superb reverse pass which fooled not only the Leeds defence but half the paying customers as well.

Ganley converted all three and Oldham were home and dry 22-12 - Lewis Jones had converted Keith McLellan's second half try for Leeds.

The following Saturday Leeds duly won the Cup with a thrilling 9-7 victory over Barrow who had crashed 45-14 at Hull. Oldham went on to beat Hull in the Championship Final but that is another story and the subject of a future Memory Match.

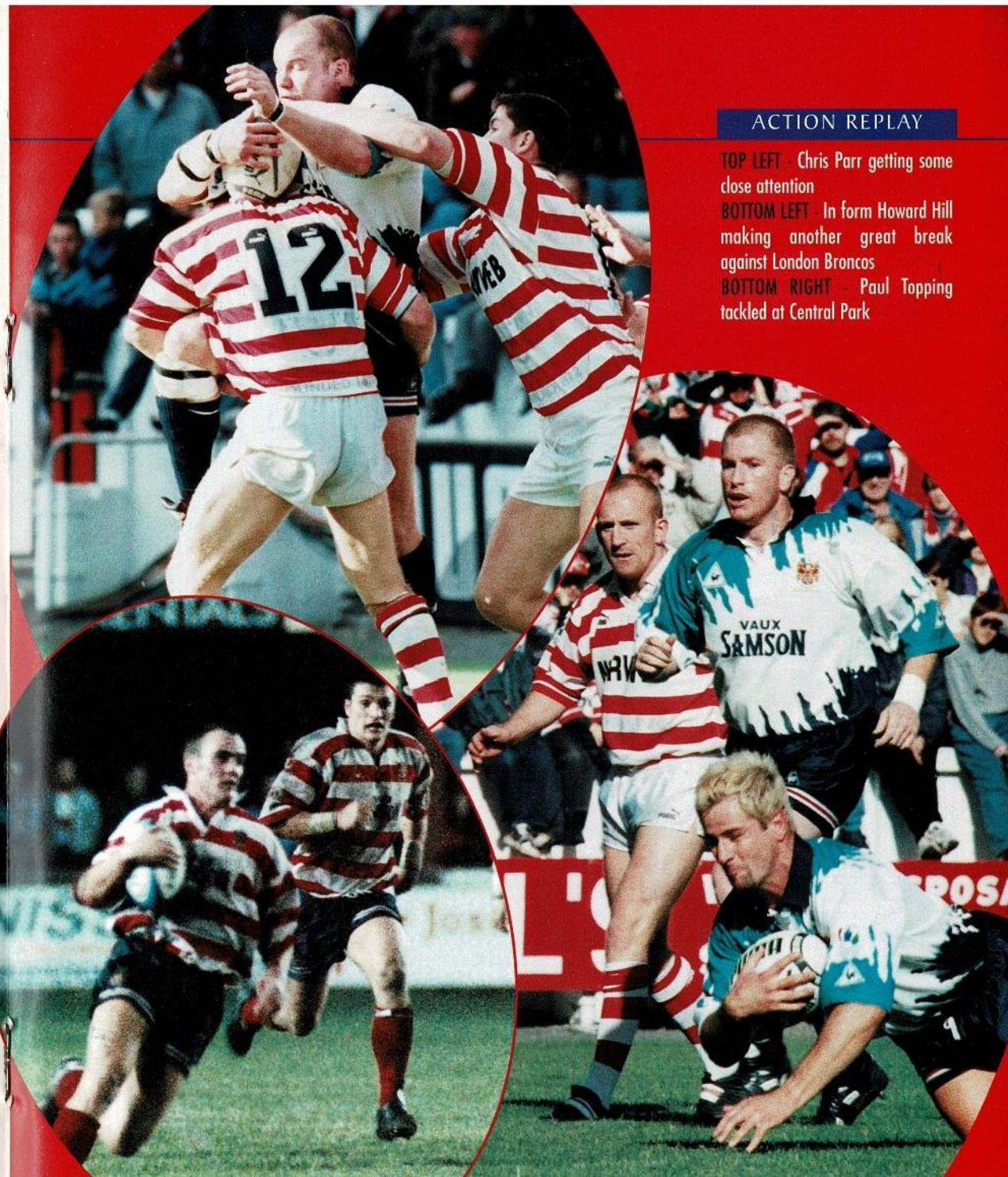

On This Day...

Don Yates looks at this day In history
With the World Championship due to start in just six days time, it is appropriate to recall that on this day, Saturday, 1st October, Great Britain met France at Station Road, Swinton in the 1960 World Championships. It was an incident packed match thoroughly enjoyed by a crowd of 22,923. Britain won 33-7 with Oldham centre Alan Davies scoring two of the

British tries. Vince Karalius and French skipper Jean Barthe were sent off after second half skirmish. Over at Headingley the same afternoon Australia defeated New Zealand 21-15. It was on this day in 1992 that powerful forward Emosi Koloto was transferred from Widnes to Halifax. The 1st October is a significant date in World history for it was on this day in 1938 that German troops entered Czechoslovakia, precipitating the outbreak of World War Two. On Sunday 1st October 1989 Oldham defeated Hull Kingston Rovers 12-4 at Watersheddings in a Second Division match. Paul Lord scored the Oldham try and Duncan Platt landed four goals. The attendance at this match was a respectable 5,797. On this day in 1975 Muhammad Ali defeated Joe Frazier who failed to come

out for the 15th round of their World Heavyweight Championship fight. It was an enthralling contest which lived up to the pre fight billing as the 'Thrilla in Manila' Older Leeds followers will recall that it was on this day in 1949 that scrum half Frank Watson made his debut for the Loiners. He had been signed from Hunslet and it was against Hunslet at Parkside that he made his first appearance for Leeds. Watson gave an outstanding performance as Leeds defeated their opponents 21-13. Finally, on this date next year, Great Britain meet the Australian under 21 team at Townsville. Be there, tour packages available from David Whitehead on 0161 627 4421.

It would be very interesting to know how Open Rugby magazine chooses its monthly player Ratings. The only two Oldham players in the current lists, which name five men in each position, are Adrian Belle and Craig Richards. Without wishing to minimise the efforts of these two, I am not sure that there would be many on the Watersheddings terraces, for example, who would feel that Belle, in just 3 games, should be higher-rated than, say, John Bentley or Joey Hayes, or Richards than Harrison, Hilton or O'Connor. Very interesting! There have been some cracking games recently on Sky, including two brave and successful fighting performances by underdogs London's great effort to overcome Leeds and Workington's non-stop battling to record a win at Wilderspool. What annoyed me, though, was the media response. The London Win, in front of over 4,000 spectators, at Brentford, should have been trumpeted loud and clear - but all was very low key in the papers next day. And Dave Woods

at Radio 5 could say nothing positive at all about Workington's win, telling the listeners that the 7,000 plus crowd must have been bored to death by the proceedings. It's no wonder that we have low national ratings when those closely associated with us can't say positive things about our own game. I believe also that Malcolm Lord was similarly critical on Radio Manchester of our match at Wigan. Whilst I agree that the atmosphere was a bit lacking, that surely is down to the inevitability of the outcome and the Wiganers rather patronising attitude both to their own side's skills, and to visiting supporters. I would have thought that Mr Lord could have concentrated more on the quality of some of the tries scored (including our second one), and the superb effort we made in getting back to 12-22 at one stage, and even in the final 10 minutes with only 11 men on the field. What a cracking game against the London Broncos. I know the Aussie composition of their team gets some Northerners very upset, but I don't subscribe to that view

at all. It must be in the game's interest to have a powerful London side in the Super League, and they can get their players from Timbuctoo as far as I am concerned, if that is what is needed. I thought that they played very well against us, in a highly competitive and well-contested match, which we thoroughly deserved to win. It was also very well refereed. I thought, certainly Mr Campbell's performance was in rather sharp contrast to that of Mr Morris at Central Park! Reverting to Sky, I bet Andy Goodway enjoyed Canterbury's win over Manly in the Grand Final. It showed what really committed defence can achieve, even against a team of supposedly superior superstars. I have always been a fan of Terry "Baa-Baa" Lamb - remember his performance at Watersheddings on that night in 1986 when tries by Des Foy and Colin Hawkyard enabled us to push the tourists closer than any other club on their second successive 100% tour. It was a great way for him to go out after a record-breaking career down under. Ian Wilson

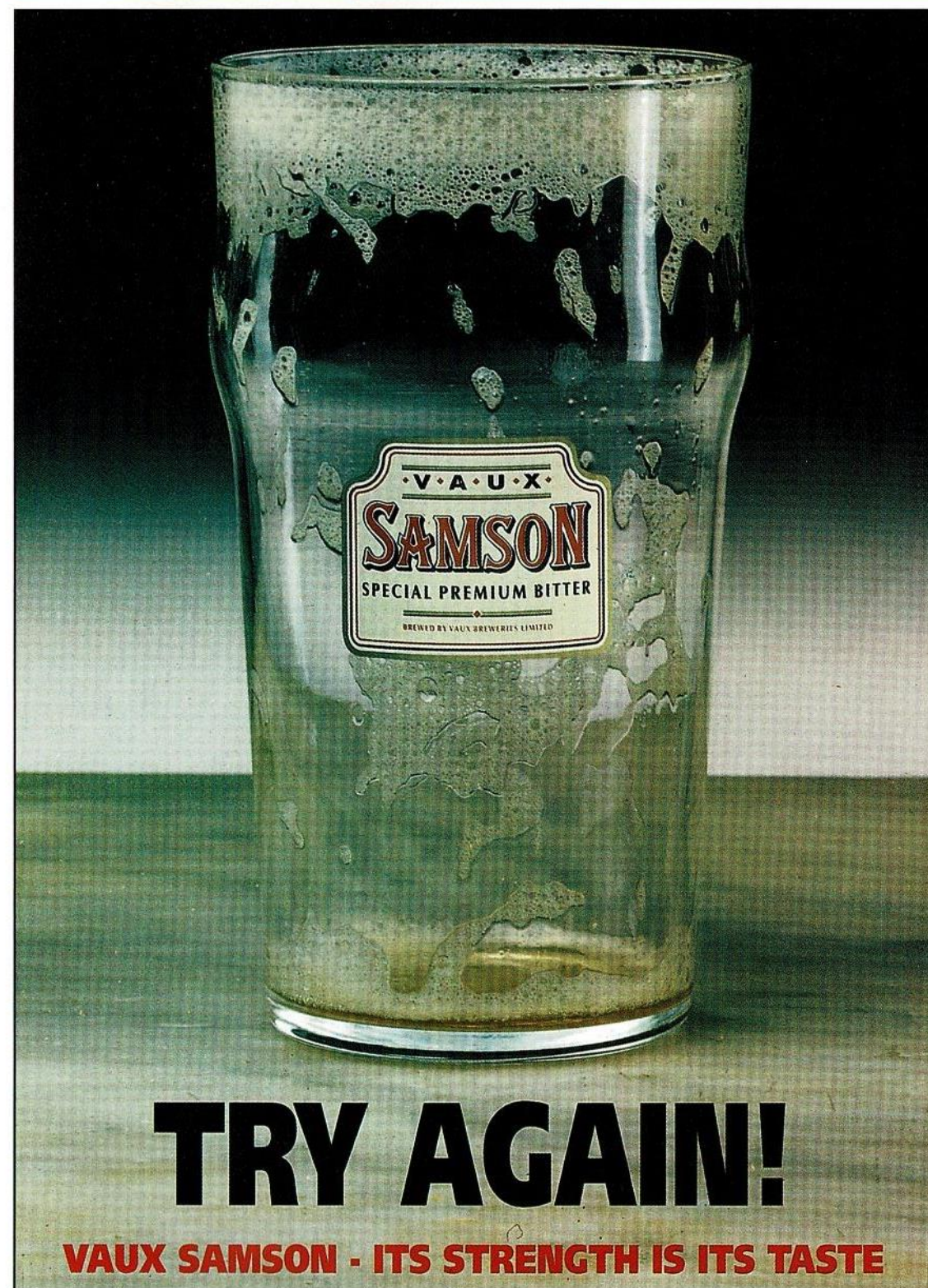

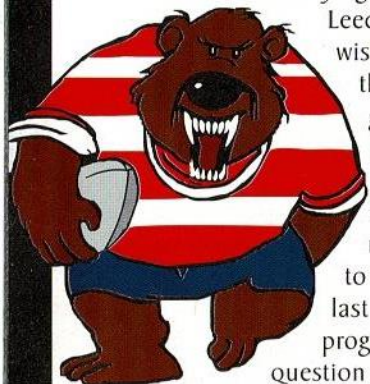

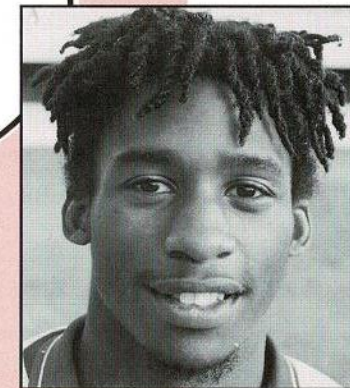
WITH BRIAN GARTLAND
