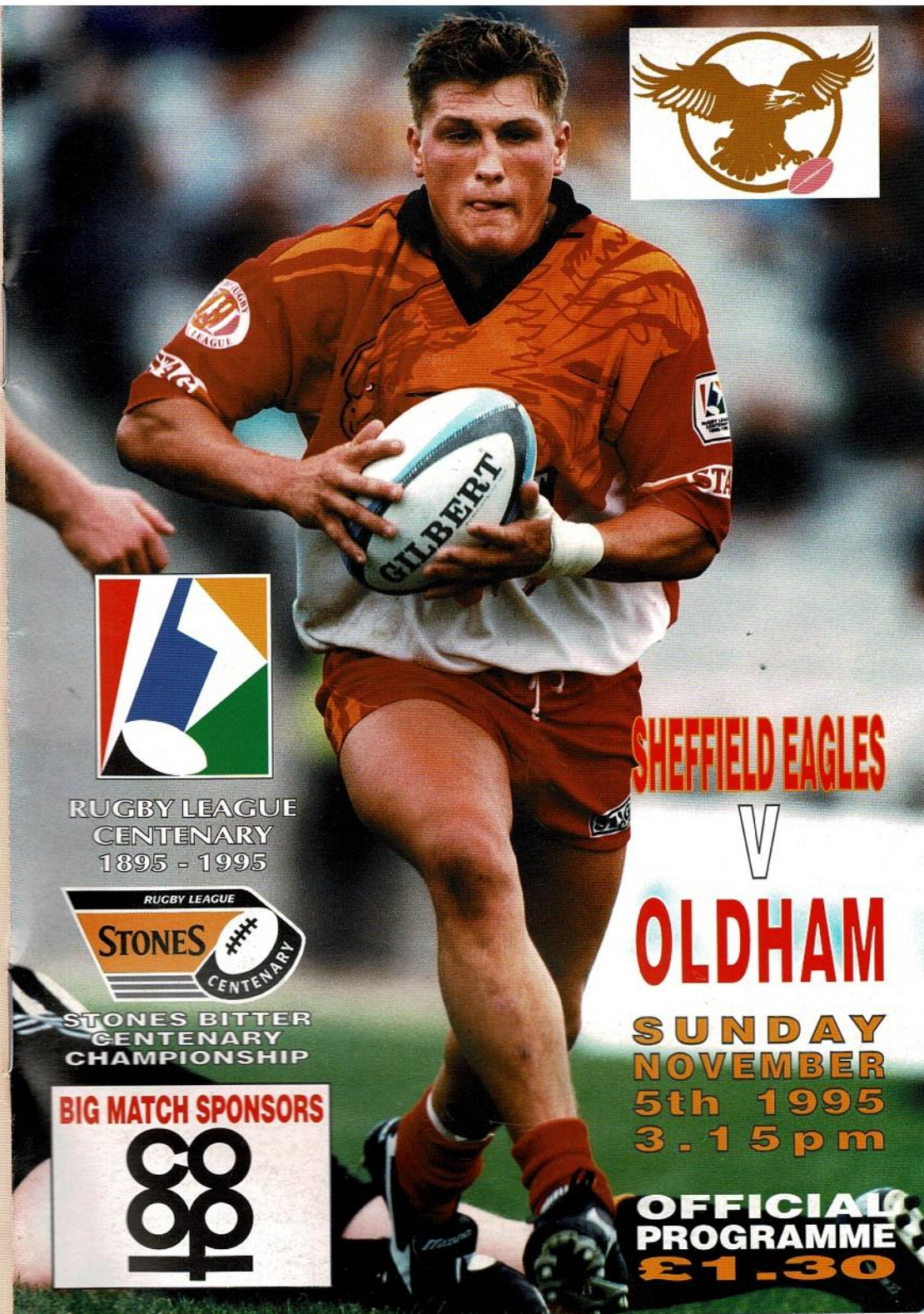

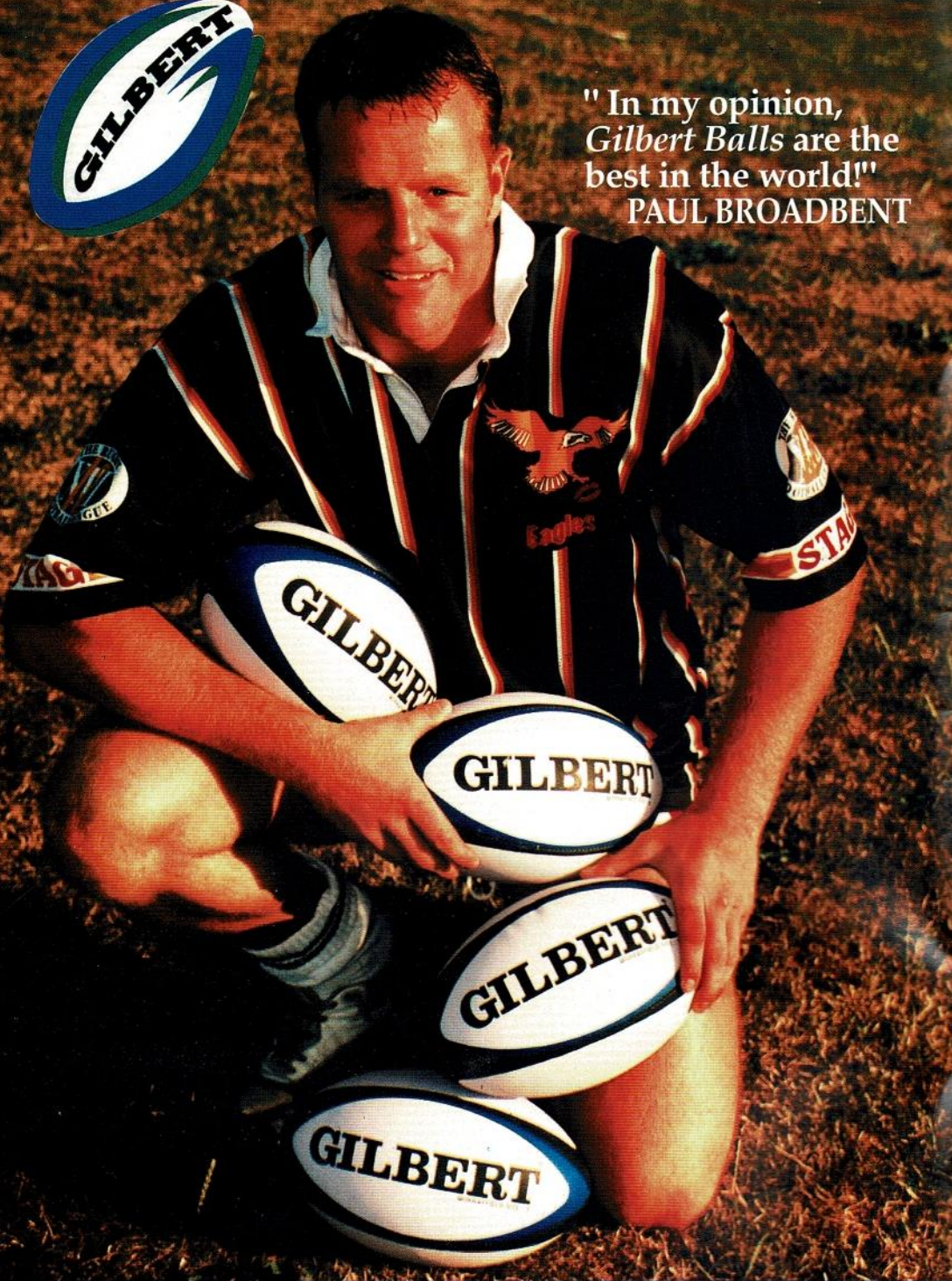

Yet another Frenchman, JEROME VINCENT has also agreed to join us on a permanent basis.

These additions have certainly added quality and strength in depth to our squad and the move towards full time status for the players gives us a much better chance of competing successfully in the Superleague.

We've also made quite a lot of changes to our team management. PETER REGAN has left to take charge at Doncaster and I am sure that all our fans will wish him and his team the very best of luck. GLEN KNIGHT will continue to coach our Alliance side, but he will now assist myself with coaching on a full time basis and MICK COOK has been appointed as Player/Assistant Coach. MAGGIE KENNETT, a sports masseur and TONY OBRIAN, a sports scientist will assist our new full time conditioner, SIMON WORSNOP to prepare the player's minds and bodies.


Last week's World Cup Final outcome was a big disappointment but it should not overshadow a marvellous tournament. Despite the BBC's abysmal coverage, crowds exceeded all expectations and the quality of entertainment from such as Fiji, Tonga, Papua New Guineau and the Cook Islands not only enthused everyone but I believe left us with a lot of lessons which should be heeded. PAUL ATCHESON - Outstanding attacking full-back. A product of Blackbrook juniors (St Helens) who turned professional with Widnes in 1990. Moved to Wigan and then joined Oldham last May for £50,000. Has represented Great Britain at Academy and U21 level and was a member of the Welsh team in the 1995 European and World Championships.

WALLY GIBSON - Talented Australian utility back whose unpredictability makes him a dangerous attacker. Played for the Tunnicliffe club in Australia before joining Huddersfield in 1989. Became a firm favourite with the Fartown followers who were bitterly disappointed when he moved to Oldham in September 1992. Can play in any back position but has been playing on the wing in recent matches.

ADRIAN BELLE - Powerful, determined winger who forced his way into first team contention earlier this year. A product of the Oldham St Annes junior club, he turned professional with Rochdale Hornets in 1990. Moved to Watersheddings in October 1993.

ROB MYLER - Versatile back equally at home either at full-back or on the wing. A product of the Widnes St Maries junior club who turned professional with Warrington in 1989. Had a spell on loan at Salford last season when he played for them at the Don Valley Stadium and scored a try. Transferred to Oldham last May for £50,000.

PAUL TOPPING - Utility player who is equally effective whether at centre, stand-off or loose-forward. Outstanding defender and also Oldham's top point scorer during the past two seasons. Topping is a product of the Wigan St Patricks junior club who turned professional with Swinton in August 1985. He had a spell on loan with Mansfield before joining Leigh in 1990 and then transferring to Oldham in September 1993. Topping made one appearance for Lancashire in 1991 and represented Ireland in the 1995 Emerging Nations World Championship.

MIKE NEAL - Speedy three-quarter. A product of Parkside juniors (Leigh) who has also played with the Wigan St Patricks junior outfit. Turned professional with Wigan in 1989 but was unable to break into their first team squad. Had a spell on loan with Doncaster last season before joining Oldham last March.

DARREN ABRAM - Prolific try scoring centre who has been Oldham's top try scorer during his spells with Rochdale Hornets and Trafford Borough. A product of Thatto Heath juniors (St Helens) who won BARLA International honours before turning professional with Warrington in 1985. Had a spell on loan with Swinton before moving to Chorley Borough. Was with Borough when club switched to Altrincham and changed name to Trafford Borough. Abram then had a spell with Rochdale Hornets before joining Oldham in February 1993.

SCOTT HANSON - Fast and elusive winger. A product of Thatto Heath juniors (St Helens) who turned professional with Swinton in 1987. Was top try scorer at Swinton during his last two seasons with the Lions. Joined Oldham in February 1992 and has continued his prolific try scoring feats at Watersheddings.

FRANCIS MALONEY - Powerfully built stand-off and accurate positional kicker. A product of the St John Fisher junior club (Dewsbury) who turned professional with Leeds in 1990. Moved to Featherstone Rovers in 1992 and won Great Britain U21 recognition whilst at Post Office Road. Transferred to Warrington in May 1994 but did not settle at Wilderspool and so he moved on to Oldham last May for £50,000. Took over the goal kicking duties at Watersheddings.

MARTIN CROMPTON - Scrum-half, captain and the orchestrator of most of Oldham's attacking play. A former Wigan St Patricks junior who began his professional career with Warrington. Moved back to Wigan in 1992 when he joined the senior Central Park outfit. Oldham snapped him up for a bargain £35,000 fee in September 1993. A brilliant tactical kicker who represented Ireland in the 1995 Emerging Nations World Championship.

PAUL DAVIDSON - Hard working prop or second-row forward. A product of the Hensingham junior club (Whitehaven) who turned professional with Widnes in 1990. Joined Oldham in July 1994 for £17,000. Has a fine turn of speed which has enabled him to turn out at centre in the Alliance outfit.

IAN SHERRATT - Experienced prop. Represented Oldham and Lancashire schoolboys. Played for the Waterhead (Oldham) junior club before turning professional with Bradford Northern in 1982. Transferred to Oldham in 1987 and then moved to Salford in 1989 before returning to Watersheddings in November 1991. Under rated forward who has been unlucky not to gain representative recognition.

STEVE GARTLAND - Talented utility player who has made steady progress settling into Super League rugby. He is a product of the Oldham St Annes junior club who turned professional with Rochdale Hornets during August 1990. Gartland was a prolific point scorer at Spotland where he notched up what was then a club record 276 points during season 1992-93. He was transferred to Oldham in July 1994 and has developed into a valuable member of the Roughyeds first team squad. Although normally a stand-off he has appeared at hooker in recent matches.

JASON TEMU - Hard running prop who has enjoyed a tremendous run of form during the past 18 months. A product of the Marist club in New Zealand, he joined the Counties-Manukau outfit for the NZ Lion Red Cup of 1994. Temu was a revelation for Counties and in July 1994 he toured Australia with the New

Zealand Residents squad. In September 1994 Temu flew to Britain and straight into the Oldham team where his good form has continued. Captained the Cook Isles in the 1995 Emerging Nations World Championships.

CHRIS PARR - Hard working prop. A product of the Wigan St Patricks junior club who began his professional career with Huddersfield in 1990. Won Great Britain U21 honours whilst at Fartown. Moved back over the Pennines in 1992 when he joined Swinton. Oldham signed him in October 1993 and he has continued to show good form at Watersheddings.

IVAN GREEN - Hard working utility forward with a tremendous appetite for defence. A product of Golbourne juniors (Leigh) who turned professional with St Helens in 1988. He was unable to break into the first team at Knowsley Road and so he moved to Oldham on a free transfer in August 1993. Can play in any back-row position as well as cover for the hooking spot.

IAN GILDART - Hard working forward. A product of Wigan Colts who turned professional at Central Park in October 1986. Although he made 139 appearances for Wigan he failed to gain a regular first team spot and so moved over to Wakefield Trinity in 1994. Moved back over the Pennines to Oldham for £45,000 last June. Represented Great Britain at U21 level during his Central Park days.

JOE FAIMALO - Hard working second-row forward who is enjoying his best run of form. A product of Eastern Suburbs club in New Zealand, Faimalo had brief spells with Workington Town, Oldham and then Swinton during the 1991-92 season without impressing. He returned home and enjoyed success with Hawks Bay which prompted him to return to Oldham in September 1994. His determination and stamina last season made him one of the mainstays of the Roughyed pack.

GARY LORD - Experienced professional. A product of Stanley Rangers juniors (Castleford) who joined the senior Castleford club of 1984. Appeared at full-back for Castleford at Wembley in 1986 but has since developed into a hard working second-row forward. Was transferred to Leeds in 1988 and then to Halifax in 1991 before joining Oldham in July 1994 for £35,000.

HOWARD HILL - Outstanding young back-row forward. Joined Oldham in July 1994 from the Hensingham junior club of Whitehaven. Made steady progress and broke into the first team at the beginning of the season. Has given some mature performances and seems certain to win representative honours in future seasons.

COACH ANDY GOODWAY - A product of the Redhill amateur club (Castleford) who turned professional with Oldham in June 1979 and won Great Britain recognition before transferring to Wigan in 1985. Won every domestic honour with Wigan where he began his coaching career with the Academy side during a lengthy playing absence caused by a broken arm. Spent the 1992-93 season with Leeds before returning to Watersheddings in September 1993. Was assistant coach to Bob Lindner in 1994 and took over as head coach 15 months ago, one of the games top coaches, he is engaged on the coaching staff of England and has been involved in the recent World Championships.

A VIEW FROM THE STAND

In Defence of the Human Frame.

It's not fair! To us or to them. It may be O.K. for golfers, cricketers, snooker and tennis players to play every day. It appears that footballers can manage it twice a week without discomfort, but Rugby League is not like that. It just does not lend itself to frequency. Midweek matches sandwiched between Sundays harm the game itself as well as the players.

One of the most endearing features of our game is that it is so honest and wholehearted. No 'neshers' could ever play League. Where would a 'skiver' hide to take it easy? We expect two teams to hurtle at each other wearing only minimal protection on the highest impact areas. And they do. But what about after the game?

The pounding, crushing and twisting take their toll and the risk of damage will only be increased by the harder pitches of Summer Rugby. Give these guys a break. Even a full week is not always enough to give Mother Nature and the Physio time to do their work. To ask hurting players to return to battle within two or three days is *not* on. Are you listening Maurice?

The players are the games natural resource and must be used sparingly and carefully if they are not to be exhausted. Let's hope that the special circumstances of this Centenary Season will not be repeated at the start of Super League. It does not need to kick off with too many matches too soon.

There is nothing wrong with a seven day interval between games. Given a week to recover, there is clearly more chance of teams being able to field full strength squads. That is what the fans pay to see. The power imbalance within the league is only exaggerated by the loss of first teamers through injury. The teams with bigger squads and a deeper pool of talent (guess who!) gain an even bigger

advantage over the likes of the Eagles. A team forced to play too many youngsters, together and too often, becomes vulnerable. Nor is it fair on the kids, who need experienced support around them as they take their first steps.

The last thing the League needs to promote interest, expansion and credibility, is a rash of thrashings. This just emphasises the concentration of the top players in an elite within an elite. I was under the impression that Super League was going to give more teams a chance to be truly competitive.

Maybe we can learn a lesson from our cousins in the toughest contact sport in the U.S.A. No, I am not suggesting suits of Gridiron armour, just the fixture list. Sixteen matches make up the whole season for the teams who do not make the play-offs. Every game, everywhere is a virtual sell-out. There are no mid-week matches and each team has one weekend off at some stage, presumably to regroup and heal-up. I don't believe we need to go all the way down that road, but with sensible planning it should be possible to fit in all the competitions and still play at weekends only.

Apart from the short term benefit of seeing more even handed contests now, there is the longer term prospect that the lads who are giving their all to entertain us will remain in some sort of working (and walking) order when they hang up their boots. They put their bodies on the line for the sport; the sport needs to draw some lines to protect them.

Eagles were victims of a bizarre try as they lost at St Helens after an inspired first half display. Sheffield deservedly led 11-10 until the match turned on an amazing 55th minute incident.

John Harrison, Saints 6' 7" prop, deliberately headed the ball forward near the Eagle's line. The bemused defence was left stranded as Kiwi forward George Mann, looking suspiciously offside, pounced on it to score. Stunned Eagles then conceded tries to Bailey, Loughlin and Forber to slide to a defeat which did not do them justice.

The Eagles, with Sonny Nickle outstanding on his comeback after a six week lay-off, dominated the first half. Hugh Waddell grabbed their try after a typical Nickle burst but Nelson and Russell both had tries disallowed. Nickle and Halafihi were only prevented from scoring by last ditch tackles from Connolly. Gary Pearce dropped three goals to put Eagles ahead before Harrison's header proved the turning point.

Kevin Ward was named as Saint's best player but Sonny Nickle was the most dangerous attacker on view and deserved his 69th minute try.

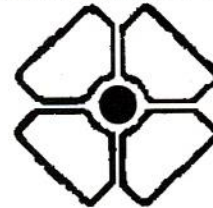

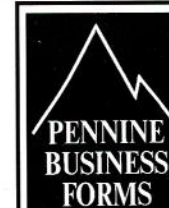

NOSE TO THE GROUND - with GROUNDHOG

After the desperately slow build up, the Halifax Centenary World Cup proved to be a mammoth success.

That success wasn't just because of the superb entertainment throughout, or the huge crowds in the closing stages; nor because of the creation of new heroes who will enter annals of Rugby League World Cup history alongside such as Dave Valentine and Clive Sullivan.

Those were, more or less, to be expected.

What really made the 1995 World Cup such a triumph - apart from the superb spectacle that is Rugby League - was the important role played by so called 'lesser lights'. Such as Tonga, Fiji and South Africa all played their parts in making the World Cup a competition to remember, and crowds of 26,000 at Wigan for England and Fiji, and 14,000 at Headingley for England and South Africa (both games with, realistically, only one winner) proved that the fans will turn up to watch exciting new faces in a structured competition.

South Africa, in particular, matured visibly in the space of seven days from a very limited-looking side against Fiji to one which looked much more organised against England. And, hopefully, the Rhinos will continue to improve.

There was criticism mainly from outside the game, of the inclusion of the 'minnows' in the competition. Those critics were either wholly misguided or

mischievous. World Cup in any sport, be it soccer, rugby league or rugby union, always have, and always will, produce the occasional hammering of the lesser lights by the giants, and one would have thought that would be accepted as par for the course.

The carpers should be ignored. The next World Cup, whether it be held in 2 years or 4 years time, should be extended rather than contracted; ideally to 16 teams playing in 4 groups of 4, with 2 qualifying from each group for the quarter finals.

That would give all sides an equal chance - it has to be said that the teams playing in the groups of 3 in the 1995 competition suffered from being allowed, in effect, just one bite of the cherry - and would in all probability create an extra interest as the real battle in each section would be for second spot.

Those countries which have provided such marvellous entertainment this time around would be allowed a little extra glory, the public would be able to see more of them, and one or two might even make the quarter final stage and hand out a shock or two.

On present form the four top seeds, headed each group, would be England, Australia, Wales and New Zealand: The second seeds could be four from Western Samoa, France, Papua New Guinea, Fiji and Tonga; and the remaining eight sides could be drawn from the 1995 Emerging Nations tournament - Morocco, South Africa, Ireland, Scotland, Russia, Moldova, USA and the Cook Islands.

Some eyebrows might be raised at the inclusion of Ireland and Scotland. But regular International competition is the only real way of developing Rugby

League in what, after 100 years, are still virgin territories; and, as proved by the big crowds in Wales for the taffs' group matches, folk will turn up in numbers to watch their own - even if the players' accents might not always be quite spot on.

These are exciting times for Rugby League and the World Cup has given all of us a massive boost after the occasionally depressing events of the past few months. Crowds have generally been excellent, and a worldwide television audience has been treated to the spectacle of sport at it's best. It's an exercise which must be repeated, and more teams included; whether every 2 years or every 4 years, we shall have to see.

Great Britain seems to be the ideal venue. It's comparatively small, we have plenty of suitable stadiums, and the support is there. Obviously however, the competition should also be held in other parts of the world; given the fact that Fiji, Western Samoa, Tonga and the Cook Islands seem to be developing at a fast rate and equally importantly, bringing their own superb styles to Rugby League, we could do worse than hold either the next World Cup or perhaps the one after, in South Sea Islands.

It's an exciting prospect; mixing top-class Rugby League with lying on the beach. And there are signs that those who make these decisions are thinking along the same lines.

It seems that international tours are now, sadly, at an end. But if regular World Cup competition, of the kind we have just seen, turns out to be the replacement, and if it can be held from time to time in paradise, then few will be complaining.

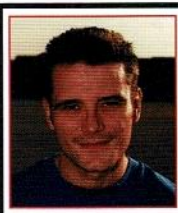

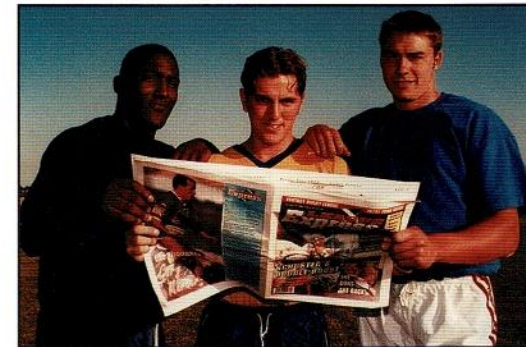
