

Statement

Welcome to Boundary Park on this historic occasion for Oldham Bears and for Rugby League. As the game kicks off into a new era of Super League and summer rugby, it is fitting that our club is, as Eddie Hemmings put it the other night 'among the chosen 12."

Not only were Oldham founder members of the organisation we now know as the Rugby Football League, but a local man, Joseph Platt, was its first secretary and one of its most influential administrators in the early years.

A century on, the club is still going strong. It has survived deep

and damaging recession, two world wars and hardships which could easily have floored it, but it it still there, still alive and kicking and now part of Rugby League's elite.

Those of us who are close to the club and all it stands for are very proud men and women indeed as we await Super League's big kick off and the wonderful opportunity it provides to take the game to new heights. But I speak from the heart when I say, without fear of contradiction, the club is nothing without its public and without its supporters.

Its success in Super League will depend on the backing it receives from the town and the local community and I have every confidence in Oldham people to hitch a lift with us on a journey into the unknown that will be as exciting as it will be unpredictable

This evenings' pre-match entertainment was due to start an hour before kick off and a feature of all our Super League games this summer will be the quality of the pre-match build up and the entertainment that the warm summer evenings will enable us to provide.

By playing in summer of course, we are hoping to attract the attention of sport enthusiasts who, for a variety of reasons, were unable to watch rugby league on a regular basis during the winter months.

Perhaps their leisure time was taken up playing or watching soccer, amateur rugby league or rugby union, but now comes the opportunity for these lovers of winter sports to sample Super League in the summer.

To those of you who may be watching rugby league for the first time this evening, or for the first time in several years, I hope you enjoy the game and appreciate the skill levels and the high levels of fitness of the modern day rugby league players. Rugby League people have confidence in the quality of their product, but there was a need to dress up the shop window and present it to the discerning customer in a new package. Hence our occupation of Boundary Park this evening thanks to the co-operation and assistance of lan Stott and the Oldham Athletic board. These are excellent facilities here at Boundary Park a fitting stage for Sky Sports to begin their coverage of Super League in the UK (last night's TV game came from Paris) and first rate surroundings to host a first rate sporting event. Thank you again, Oldham Athletic.

Of course, our experience here this evening will inevitably whet

the appetite for the time when we can enjoy the delights of the new stadium just across the road. These are exciting times make no mistake about that.

There is such a lot to look forward to, not least the switch to summer rugby. I have long campaigned for a switch of seasons and, like those with similar views, I can merely hope that the influence we brought to bear will prove to be beneficial to the game.

It will be a tough season for all teams in Super League and, in closing, I would like to make the point that it is at the time of greatest challenge that a rugby team most needs its support and most appreciates it. If anything is designed to make a team dig deep when the going gets tough it is the knowledge that there are thousands of folk

out there in the grandstands who are willing each player to strain every sinew and test every muscle.



Have you got any ideas, or maybe you want to let off steam, please write to Ray Hill, at the club address on page 2 to air your views.

Dear Sir.

I am writing to you as a loyal Bears fan to express my concern for the future of the club. Whilst congratulating you and your staff on your achievements over the last few years, I feel that the way in which the club has been marketed leaves a lot to be desired. I am an 'A' level student at Oldham Sixth Form College, and recently as I was conducting a questionnaire on the effectiveness of marketing. I decided to use rugby league as an example. I interviewed one hundred pupils. I asked them if they knew of the forthcoming Superleague and of Oldham's inclusion in the new competition. Out of the whole one hundred people, only seven knew anything of Oldham rugby. I feel that if the marketing of the club is not stepped-up soon, there will only be about two thousand fans at the Wigan game.

I am also a supporter of Manchester Storm Ice Hockey Club. The only reason I became a supporter of them was due to their impressive marketing.

In little over six months, their attendances have increased from two thousand to around twelve thousand. This has been achieved through advertising on radio, in the newspapers and on the GM Buses as well as in local schools and colleges. May I suggest that similar marketing is done for your club, and soon, otherwise I cannot see our stay in the Super League being anything but a brief one. I hope you listen to my comments, and I would be grateful if you can send to me some promotional posters which I could distribute around my college.

Please could you note the few ideas I have listed below for possible use at press and publicity events to promote the club, especially in the new Superleague season.

Would it be possible to have a large paper screenprinted sheet

made - (or perhaps a local college could paint for you)- on a large sheet of paper the club logo design etc. Have the paper stretched over the tunnel entrance, so that when the players run out they burst through the paper screen - it should create excellent visual impact at your home games.

I suggested this to Keighley Cougars last season and they used it and felt it was a good effect.

You could also use the above for newly signed players to burst through at their debut press events.

A polystyrene sheet painted up to look like a brick wall could also be good for the players to break through at matches. For press photos players could appear in their kit and also wear boxing gloves and declare they will be "knockout" at a particular game or this season. Or simply say they will deliver a tough game to their opponents.

For best effect, it would be best for your players to wear 16oz gloves, they are big and would look good in press for this reason.

And for use with the above you could have a cake iced in opposition colours/team logo and have one of your team hold it up and then another don the gloves and punch the cake - and say "we'll 'crush' the opposition," etc for a gimmick.

Alternatively your team players could hold up an opposition team shirt and say we'll tear a strip off the opposition and tear the rival shirt in two.

Finally, you could possibly have a couple of standard black leather blouson jackets bought for the players and have a local painter/art college paint the club logo on the back for your team players to wear at promotions etc.

I do hope you can note and use a couple of my ideas for use in the forthcoming season to give Superleague and Oldham Bears R.L.F.C. good publicity events to promote the club. Do please let me know your views.







Don Yates Looks Back To A Match From Yesteryear

After all the uncertainty surrounding events in Australia during the last few months, we are now able to put legal arguments behind us and look to the future as Wigan visit Boundary Park this evening in the first European Super League match to be staged in Britain.

It is hoped that the leading European Super League clubs will be allowed to challenge the cream of Australian talent in the autumn for the proposed World Club Championship. It is appropriate therefore, that Wigan are involved in this historic occasion because it was Wigan who first instigated the idea of a World Club Championship with their promotion of the World Club Challenge in October 1987.

As British champions they threw down the gauntlet to the Australian authorities who allowed Australian Premiers Manly Warringah to visit Wigan for that momentous meeting. The match created tremendous interest and there was a terrific atmosphere as the following two teams trotted out on to Central

Wigan: Steve Hampson, Richard Russell, David Stephenson, Joe Lydon, Henderson Gill, Shaun Edwards, Andy Gregory, Brian Case, Nicky Kiss, Shaun Wane, Andy Goodway, Ian Potter and Ellery Hanley. Substitutes Ged Byrne, Graeme West, Ian Gildart and Ian Lucas

Manly: Dale Shearer, David Ronson, Darrell Williams, Michael O'Connor, Stuart Davis, Cliff Lyons, Des Hasler, Phil Daley, Mal Cochrane, Ian Gately, Ron Gibbs, Owen Cunningham and Paul Vautin. Substitutes, Mark Brokenshire. Jeremy Ticehurst, Mark Pocock and Paul Shaw.

The confrontation proved to be a thrilling encounter. Defences were on top but there was enough action to satisfy the 36,895 spectators crammed into Central Park. Manly began well and

took the lead after just two minutes when Michael O'Connor landed a penalty after Wigan were caught offside. The Australian lead lasted only a matter of minutes before David Stephenson equalised after Des Hasler was pulled out for an assault on Shaun Wane. The tough tackling continued with Cliff Lyons being dispatched to the sin bin after ten minutes. Before he returned Wigan went in front after an incident involving Dale Shearer and Shaun Edwards. So Wigan led 4-2. a lead which they held at half time although Manly were unlucky when Shearer crossed just before the interval but he was unable to ground the ball.

The second half followed in the same pattern as the first. Tough-as-teak tackling which just kept at bay a series of attacking charges which would have breached most defences in the game. David Stephenson extended the Wigan lead immediately after the interval with another penalty and then completed the scoring with his fourth penalty five minutes later as Manly suffered a major blow as second rower Ron Gibbs. was sent off. Gibbs dismissal came on the intervention of a touch judge who spotted an off-the-ball incident involving Joe Lydon. Although the scoring had finished, the action certainly hadn't.

Manly exerted severe pressure on the Wigan line in the closing stages of the match especially on the hour when Brian Case spent ten minutes sat in the sin bin. However Wigan were able to hold out and so took the title with their hard earned 8-2

In all it was a great match, a great occasion and a great boost to the British game after the batterings which the home nation had suffered against Australian sides in the years leading up to this memorable encounter.

Let us hope that Anglo-Australian relations will resume later this year so that fans on both sides of the globe will be treated to matches as pulsating as that historic clash in 1987.



WELCOME TO BARRY AND HIS GUESTS - HAVE A GOOD DAY

On this day.

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

On this day sixteen years ago, Wigan and Oldham were not even in the same league. But it was the Roughveds who ended Sunday, 30th March 1980 in better shape for, as Wigan lost 16-5 away to Bradford Northern in the First Division, Oldham beat Doncaster 46-2 at Watersheddings in a Second Division match. Prop Steve Herbert and winger Geoff Munro each scored three of Oldham's ten tries whilst Eric Fitzsimmons, on the other wing, landed eight goals.

It was on this day in 1988, Wednesday, 30th March, that Halifax qualified for Wembley with a 4-3 semi-final replay victory over Hull before a crowd of 25,117 at Elland Road. Leeds. Winger Chris Anderson was the Halifax hero. He scored the only try of a hard fought tie which had ended pointless the previous Saturday.

Popular utility player Peter Smethurst gave many sterling performances for several clubs, including both Wigan and Oldham. It was on this day in 1973 that he made his debut for Wigan after being signed from Leigh earlier in the month. He turned out in the second-row and played a significant part in Wigan's 10-9 home victory over Swinton, the club with whom he had begun his career.

Still on the transfer front, it was on this day in 1985 that

Oldham strengthened their squad with a double swoop into the transfer market. They signed David Hobbs from Featherstone Rovers and Paul Dixon from Huddersfield. Neither player was to stay at Watersheddings for long. Hobbs made sixty appearances before moving to Bradford Northern two years later whilst Dixon's move was for a loan period which came to a conclusion four weeks and five matches later.

Another player to move on this date was Scott Martin, Salford's star centre who joined the Red Devils from Leigh exactly 12 months ago today.

It was on this day in 1933, Wednesday 30th March, that England met Other Nationalities in a high scoring international at Lonsdale Park, Workington. A crowd of 11,000 saw England race into a 21-5 interval lead and then fend off a determined come back by the exiles to eventually win 34-27. Neither Oldham nor Wigan had representatives in the England team but Wigan's Jim Sullivan landed six goals for Other Nationalities whose pack contained Len Mason (Wigan) and Trevor Thomas (Oldham).

Finally it was on this day in 1986 that Parramatta defeated Illawarra 12-8 in Australia's big Winfield Cup match of the day. Parramatta went on to lift the Australian Premiership during that 1986 campaign.



SIMON HAUGHTON - Forward







So here we go. And you can't say it is not different. Saturday evening with pre match entertainment, at Boundary Park! I cannot remember when we last kicked off a season against Wigan either, but I suspect their strength will be one aspect which is unchanged. Still, you never know. What a boost to the whole Super League it would be, not to mention to our prospects, if we could get two points out of tonights game. We shall see!

What a nightmare few weeks for the game there has been in Australia. By chance I have been speaking to a couple of Aussie Rt. fanatics recently, and it is difficult for us to understand the degree of depression, incomprehension and disillusion amongst our down under equivalents. There seems to be general sympathy for the ARt. Athurson-Quayle position, which I must admit I share, inspite of being strongly in favour of the general Super League philosophy. But there is also great, and entirely understandable, worry that their apparent intransigence has done irreparable damage to the 13-a-side code, at least in the Antipodes. Surely, they argue, some form of compromise could have been found in order to keep the ARL in control of the game, but also to accommodate both Packer and Murdoch desires to have RL on their TV networks? Eventually surely, this is bound to happen. So why allow millions to be wasted in court fees, and the 1995 season to be decimated? This is the charge which the ARL management will have to answer in the end.

Of course there is still a major southern hemisphere influence in our Super League, indeed, if anything, it seems to be increasing again. On the field, more sides, Oldham of course included, have been topping up their squads with Aussies, Kiwis and South Sea islanders. And off the field, the birth of the new era can hardly be said to represent a triumph for the emergent breed of British coaches. Counting Mr Murphy as a half, there are only three and a half, out of the 12 Super League clubs. Wouldn't it be good to see Sheffield, Warrington, Castleford and Oldham be the four teams contesting the World Club Championships (if they happen) in Septembert Mind you I should think the odds against would rival those on tonight's lottery jackpot winner being here at Boundary Park. The Observer last week predicted fourth, seventh, eighth and ninth places respectively.

I have a feeling that Super League crowds will indeed show the upward frend which, as they say, is devoutly to be wished, if our game is to stand any chance of prospering into the next millennium. What will be interesting to see, though is whether or not there is a similar frend in

Division One and Two. Looking at the clubs involved. Division One looks likely to be highly competitive, whilst Division Two might well see an early breakaway of two or three clubs at the top. I suspect. certainly the Swinton-Bury Lions look to have recruited well, and if Holliday stays fit, I wouldn't be at all surprised to see them just pipping Hull KR come the end of the season. However, given the record over many years of crowd apathy in Bury, it is difficult to envisage them averaging any more than a puny 1500 or so even then. On the other hand, I suspect that those who anticipate Saltord strolling away with the cherished Division One promotion spot will be sadly disappointed. Widnes' cup feats during the Centenary season showed what they are capable of when their motivation is right, and away trips to Whitehaven, Hull, Keighley, Wakefield, Featherstone and Huddersfield will not be easy ones for anyone. I wouldn't be surprised to see the sort of nail-biting fight to the finish for a Super League place in 1997 which should be guaranteed to raise crowds all round. Let us hope so.

Everyone has to be positive about Super League, I know. And I agree, really. But it would be wrong to ignore some of the clouds already looming. Season ticket sales are predictably down all round, and after Bradford's superb performance last week no doubt Leeds as well as Wigan will be bemoaning the loss of Wembley revenue. The Murdoch money seems not to be stretch ing as far as was first thought. And people suddenly seem to have realised that it is stupid to finish the season at the end of August. While eleven competitive home games Averaging, say, six thousand spectators generates more match day revenue than thirteen or fifteen averaging four thousand, it does not seem sensible to waste the six months of October to March completely. Surely this is where the Challenge Cup should come in? It would be criminal to abandon the tradition which it represents and sheer folly to throw away its revenue earning potential. And two months of winter RL starvation have already made me, and I know many others too, dread the prospect of a full five or six months of it each year. If Mr Lindsay ever returns from his new friends in Australia I suggest that this now needs to be his top priority in England. We need a meaningful new format for the single prestigious cup competition. How about a regionalised mini-league first stage in October, which could possibly be extended to finish with final group matches over the Christmas period, followed by March quarter and semi finals and the traditional end of April final? Over to you, Maurice!



STATISTICALLY SPEAKING

This evening's match is the 235th meeting between Oldham and Wigan. Of the previous 234 clashes, Oldham have won 86, Wigan have won 142 and six matches have ended all square. As far as league matches are concerned, there have been 170 matches. Oldham's memorable victory last December was their 66th such victory whilst Wigan have won exactly 100 league matches and four have been drawn. Oldham's biggest home win over Wigan came in season 1898-99 when the Roughyeds won 43-0. The best away performance came in 1955-56 when Oldham won 48-23 at Central Park. Wigan have twice defeated Oldham 54-2 at Central Park, in 1934-35 and then 1986-87. Oldham's biggest home defeat against the Riversiders came just two years ago, 1994-95, when Wigan won 58-10 at Watersheddings. 
