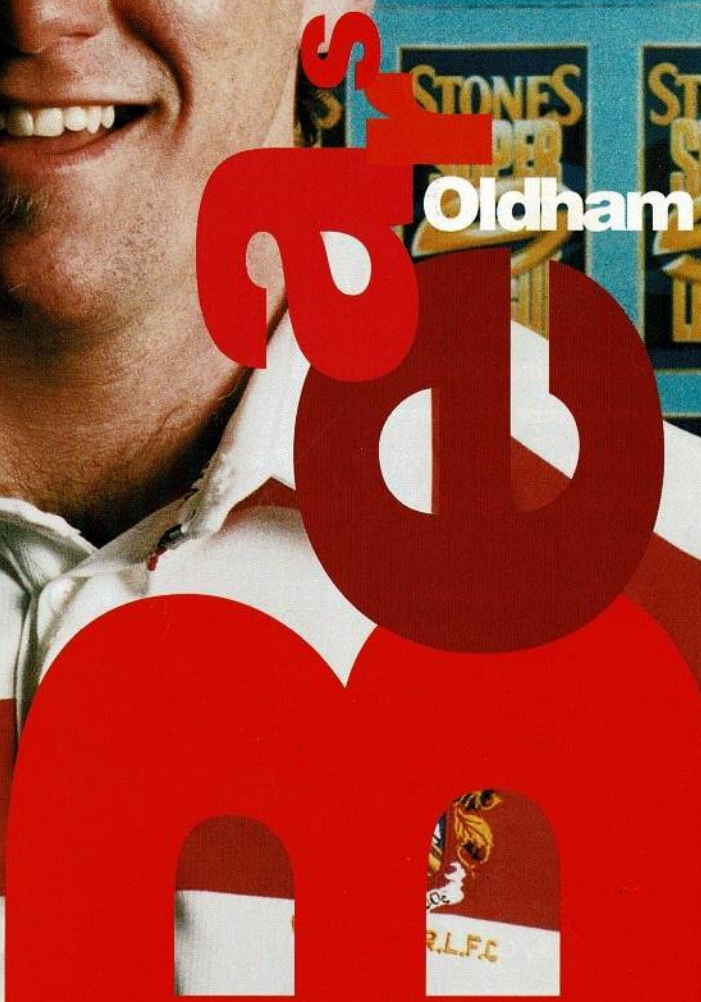

Statement

OUR big entrance into Super League at Boundary Park last Saturday didn't go according to plan, but we were encouraged by our second-half performance and by the attendance of almost 8,000.

A lot of people made the effort to turn out and support us in Super League and I feel sure they must have enjoyed the big build-up and the pre-match entertainment, culminating in the arrival of the sky divers and those rip-roaring fire-crackers as the teams came out, introduced individually by Mike Stephenson, better known as Stevo of Sky Sports.

These pre-match entertainment packages do not end, of course, just because the Sky cameras are not here today. At each home game throughout the summer there will be something to catch the imagination of fans in the couple of hours or so before kick-off.

Starting at today's game against Halifax there will be an Academy fixture as a curtain-raiser, followed by more fun and games, including our Bear, our new cheer-leader girls (a Watersheddings welcome to them) and youngsters from local junior sides doing their races in front of their mums and dads and a lot of interested spectators.

Ray Hill and David Hughes put in a lot of work to prepare the entertainment package at Boundary Park and I thought it all went off exceptionally well.

It was a pity our performance on the field didn't match up, but I remain convinced that we are a much better side than we looked on Saturday and I am sure we will prove it conclusively before the season is much older.

We were unfortunate to meet Wigan on a day when they had a few things to prove to a lot of people. By their own admission a few people were suggesting they were on the decline and they set out their stall, in the words of Sean Edwards, "to make a statement to the rest of the league". They are a fine side at any time. But when they are in the mood for vengeance, as they were on Saturday, they can

be awesome.

Edwards, Farrell and Connolly would grace any world side. We didn't do ourselves justice in the first half and that may have had something to do with the big occasion and all the hype.

The Wigan players have been used to it for years. After eight Challenge Cup finals on the trot, more big cup matches than one can care to remember and that epic World Club championship win over Brisbane Broncos in Australia, Boundary Park last Saturday would be just another game to them.

Perhaps the sense of occasion, and the importance of doing well, got to some of our lads, but we improved as the game went on and I am sure that we will eventually confound a lot of our critics, who wanted to write us off before we even started. Believe me, this is going to be a terrific summer season and I hope the fans who did us proud at Boundary Park will stay with us because we badly need that backing both on and off the field.

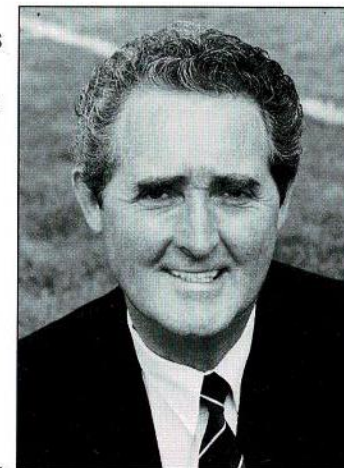
Until we can generate the sort of income Wigan get it is difficult to match them, but I was pleased with the

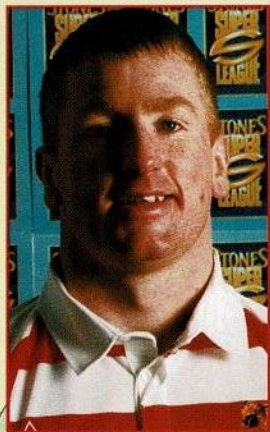
way we stuck at it in the second half, played some good rugby and scored three tries.

Simon Barnes sees a new competition follow a familiar rugby league script

Oldham rugby league team the artists formerly known as the Roughyeds (a dialect term for hard-men, harum-scarums and lar-rikins), have reinvented themselves in response to the challenges of the game in its new avatar as the Super League. They are now Oldham Bears.

What bear did they have in mind, I wonder? Sooty, perhaps? Yet they lacked Sooty's certainty of his own identity. On reflection it was apparent that their ursine role model was Paddington, who as all lovers of literature will recall, makes his first appearance wearing a luggage label on which are encribed the unforgettable words: "Please look after this bear."

Wigan looked after them, alright. They went to Boundary Park on Saturday night to instigate the new era of rugby league, and left after winning 56-16, and now for some thing completely the same the utter dominance of Wigan in the sport of rugby league.

How else could we tell that this was a thoroughly modern occasion a great move into the future, an example of sparkling marketing? Simple there were cheerleaders. A macho nickname and cheerleaders, two snippets of paste-on Americana. Modern? It is the America of the Fifties, bobby soxers and rah rah bears. If this is the cutting edge of the sporting post modernism, then Grease is a biting satire on contemporary mores.

Yet cheerleaders are sine qua non of modern sporting life in this country. They are required not to cheer, but to deliver the message that the marketing department is really trying awfully hard. Cheerleaders are an aspect of sporting America's ancient history. Yet, after the bear bit, yes, there was a man dressed up as a bear, and

the cheerleaders and the other bits of outdated Americana, there was, yes, rugby league. What we had was tripe and onions in a sesame seed bun garnished with to-may-to and thousand islands dressing. Good sport is not about buns and garnish. It is about meat, the "mad cow" disease of competition. Wigan showed all that. A pair of second half tries from Edwards said more about sport than a thousand pom-pom waving little girls or a million marketing men.

The occasion was not really about the ringing in of the new, nor even about the distinctly useful, novelty of judgement by television replay. The first try of the night was, historians, the first to be confirmed by television. Offiah touched down and after replay officials decided that Quinnell had not, after all knocked on, he had his score.

The real drama of the occasion was Wigan's search for a new certainty after their shattering Challenge Cup defeat. On Good Friday, they have a rather more searching task when they play St. Helens, fancied by many as inaugural Super League champions. It needs no garnish to make that encounter look appetising.

The point is not the new dawn, it is that rugby league is and has always been, whatever time of year you play it a bloody good game. Or product as we are supposed to call it these days. Exit Wigan pursued but not terribly closely, by a bear.

Talks...



Don't write us off as Super League no hopers... that's my message to all those people who will want to read too much into our heavy defeat by Wigan at Boundary Park last Saturday.

If some scribes and punters think we will be holding up the rest come the end of the season, on the strength of what happened last weekend, that's up to them. They are entitled to their point of view.

But I know, and I am sure the players know, that we can perform to a much higher standard than we attained at Boundary Park.

The truth of the matter is that we didn't play well. I am not going to get involved in such things as the decisions of the 'second referee' and the TV replay.

It has been introduced to make things more efficient, but difficult decisions will always go against one side or the other whoever makes them.

My only complaints about last Saturday concern the way Oldham Bears played... or didn't play, if you like. Wigan played very well indeed, especially in the first half, but we played poorly and got what we deserved, although I am sure we will bounce back.

We never got going right from the kick off. We missed a

certain try, conceded penalties and made handling errors, whereas Wigan set out their stall to dominate us from the word go.

It was always going to be difficult, but we let ourselves down in certain areas. We seemed to freeze on the big occasion, although I must say there were some good individual displays, led by Paul Atcheson and Martin Crompton.

Atcheson was outstanding. Crompton tried hard and there was a lot of hard work done in the forwards by men like Joe Faimalo and Ian Sherratt.

Individually, our performances were not bad at all, but collectively there is still a lot of work to do. You can take it from me that that work will be done.

One thing that we won't do is panic. That achieves nothing. In team meetings leading up to last week's big kick off we promised ourselves we would make a conscious effort to stay calm and retain our self belief if things started to go wrong for us early on.

To panic would be counter productive. To remain calm, while acknowledging what went wrong at Boundary Park and working hard to put it right is the way forward.

That's our plan and we stick with it.

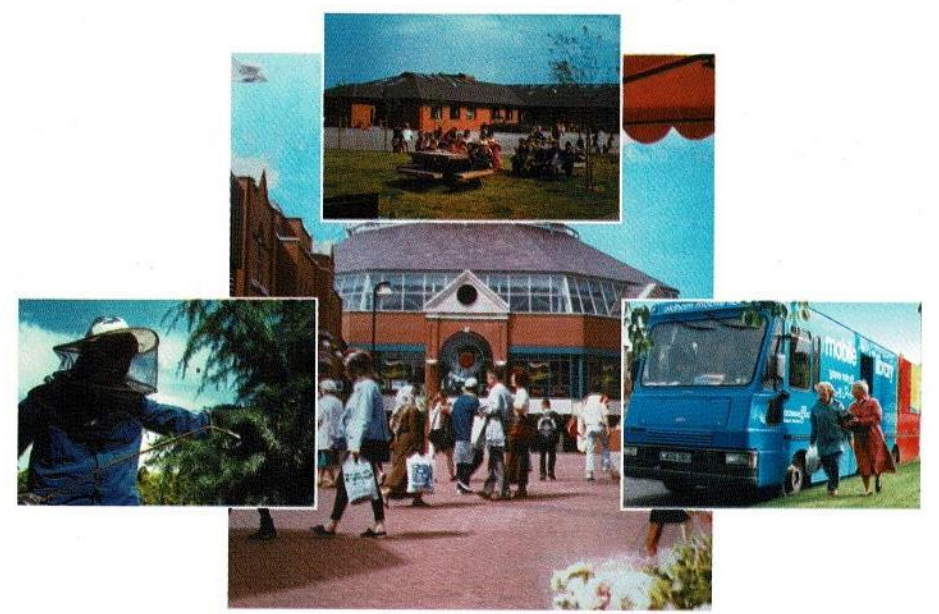

Memory Lane

Don Yates Looks Back To A Match From Yesteryear

Rugby League's bright new era began with last week's Super League spectacular over in Paris and it is set to continue here today with the visit of Halifax. As founder members of the Rugby Football League, both Oldham and Halifax have enjoyed a number of triumphs but both sets of fans will agree that further success for both clubs is long overdue.

Oldham's last major trophy success was way back in 1958 when they won the Lancashire Cup. Halifax do not have to go so far back but their Challenge Cup victory of 1987 must seem a lifetime away to their demanding followers. Halifax began that memorable cup campaign with a visit to Fulham and a 38-10 victory. Round two saw Halifax beat Hunslet 29-10 at Thrum Hall and when Hull Kingston Rovers visited Halifax in the quarter-finals the result was another comfortable victory, this time by a margin of 35-7. Widnes were favourites to beat Halifax in the semi-finals but not all semi-finals go to plan and the Chemics were eliminated 12-8.

Halifax's opponents at Wembley were St. Helens who disposed of Swinton (home) 18-16, Dewsbury away 48-12, Oldham away 24-14, Whitehaven home 41-12 and Leigh 14-8 in a tough semi-final at Wigan.

Wembley was its usual colourful occasion on Cup Final day as a crowd of 91,267 assembled to watch the following two teams do battle:

Halifax: Graham Eadie; Scott Wilson, Colin Whitfield, Grant Rix, Wilf George; Chris Anderson, Gary Stephens; Ben Beevers, Seamus McCallion, Keith Neller, Paul Dixon, Mick Scott & John Pendlebury.

St. Helens: Phil Viewers; Barry Ledger, Paul Loughlin, Mark Elia, Kevin McCormack; Brett Clark, Neil Holding; Tony Burke, Graham Liprot, John Fieldhouse, Andy Platt, Roy Haggarty & Chris Arkwright.

Substitutes - Paul Round & Paul Forber.

This final turned out to be a tremendous advertisement for our game. It was full of incident and produced a nailbiting finish which included two late disallowed touchdowns by St. Helens centre Mark Elia which would have taken the trophy to Knowsley Road. Halifax won the trophy by virtue of a superb first half performance which saw them turn round 12-2 in front. Tries by Wilf George and Seamus McCallion, both converted by Colin Whitfield, put them firmly in the driving seat. Paul Loughlin had landed a penalty for Saints and when he converted Mark Elia's try early in the second-half, Saints were back in it at 12-8. Lance Todd Trophy winner Graham Eadie interrupted a superb defensive display to score a try on 51 minutes and Whitfield's conversion left the score at 18-8. Paul Loughlin then reduced the deficit to six points with a try which he failed to convert but fifteen minutes from time John Pendlebury had the good sense to drop a vital goal which increased the Halifax lead to a decisive seven points. Four minutes later Paul Round stretched over for the try which, with Loughlin's conversion, set up a pulsating closing 11 minutes in which Halifax just managed to hang on and register a thrilling 19-18 victory.

It was a magnificent performance from both teams and one which we hope to see repeated over again as the Super League action moves on into the summer months.

On this day....

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

It was on this day in 1994 that one of Rugby League's legends, top Australian forward Artie Beetson, rejoined the Sydney Eastern Suburbs club as recruitment officer. Beetson had previously played for and coached the Roosters who are now known as Sydney City. As a player, Beetson was regarded as being one of Australia's finest front-row forwards. He played in 29 internationals, four World Championships and toured Europe with the 1973 Kangaroos.

Another of the game's legends, utility back Gus Risman had a successful evening on Wednesday, 5th April 1933. That day he turned out in the centre for Salford who entertained Bramley at the Willows. The Red Devils won 74-3 and Risman clocked up 32 points from 13 goals and a brace of tries.

It was on this day in 1988 that Mark Aston, the record breaking Sheffield Eagles half-back, returned to Owlerton after spending a month on loan at Bramley. Aston was eventually transferred permanently to Featherstone but he is now back with the Eagles and at the start of this campaign had scored a career

total of 1,428 points for Sheffield, a club record.

On Sunday, 5th April 1959 Great Britain met France in Grenoble. There were no Halifax players in the British line-up but three of the team were from Oldham second-row forward Charlie Winslade and the right flank of winger Ike Southward and centre Alan Davies. Britain had put fifty points past France the previous month but in this match they were unable to cope with a whirlwind start by the French who led 19-0 at half-time. France held on to win 24-15, their hero being Gilbert Benausse the Lezignan stand-off who scored two tries and three goals.

It was exactly twelve months ago today that the Rugby League Council met at Headingley, Leeds. Top of the agenda was a proposal to switch to summer rugby but it was during this meeting that Maurice Lindsay was involved in telephone conversation with News International. It was later revealed that arrangements were made for talks involving Rugby League's Board of Directors and News International and these talks eventually led to the formation of the European Super League.

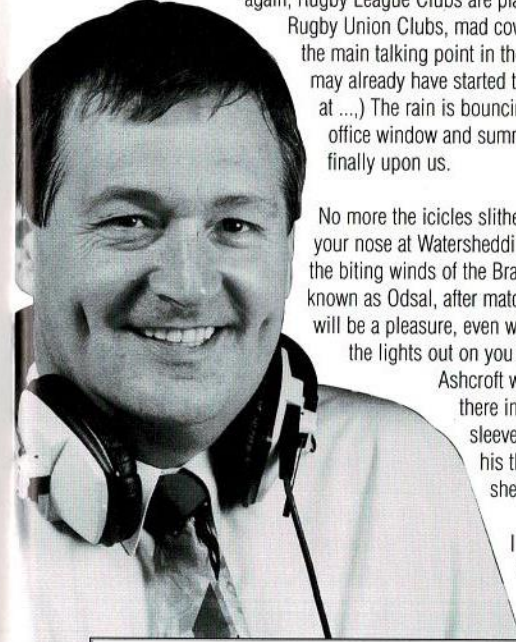

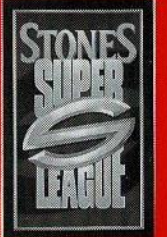

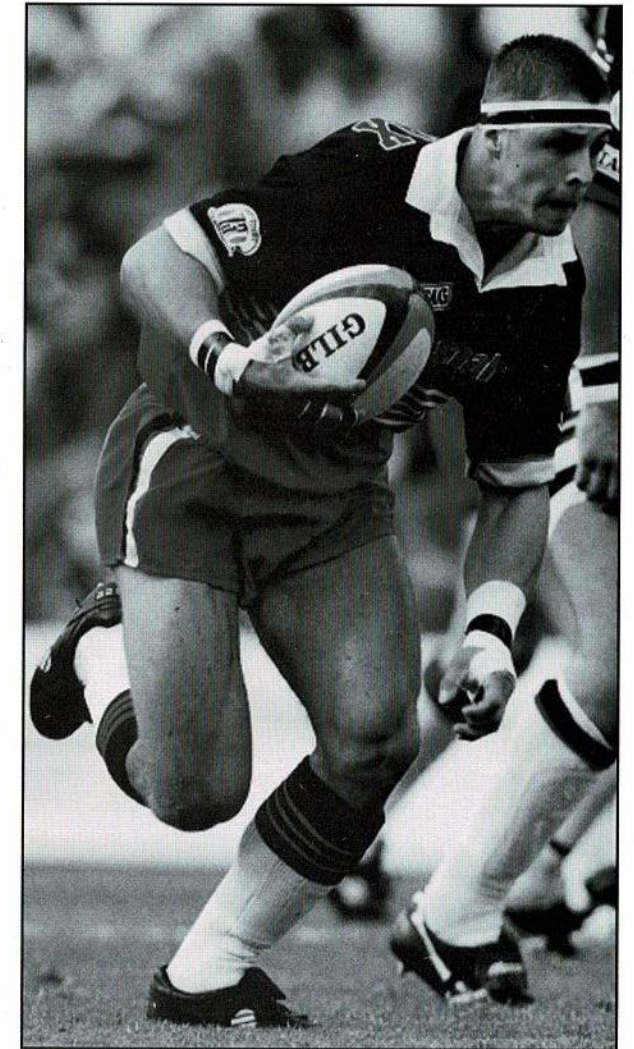
The Stones European Super League kicked off with the best average attendance for an opening weekend to a season since the one division set-up was scrapped 23 years ago.

A total of 54,059 watched the six matches, producing an average attendance of 9,009 and so beat the record average of 8,440 when seven Division One matches totalled 59,082 in 1989.

The crowd of 17,873 who watched the inaugural Stones Super League match between Paris St Germain and Sheffield Eagles on Friday evening was the biggest open day crowd since before 1973.

OLDHAM BEARS V HALIFAX BLUE SOX

Hooker Paul Rowley was the two-try star of Halifax's 21-4 defeat of Oldham at Watersheddings last August, allowing the Yorkshire side to claim their third consecutive win on the ground and a sixth success in seven visits to Oldham over the past decade. Oldham only managed to interrupt that sequence with a 14-3 Second Division victory in October 1989, when Paul Lord and John Fairbank were the home try scorers. The Bears managed a 12-4 win over Halifax at Thrum Hall in January with Paul Crook scoring a debut try.

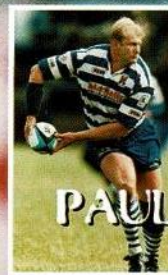

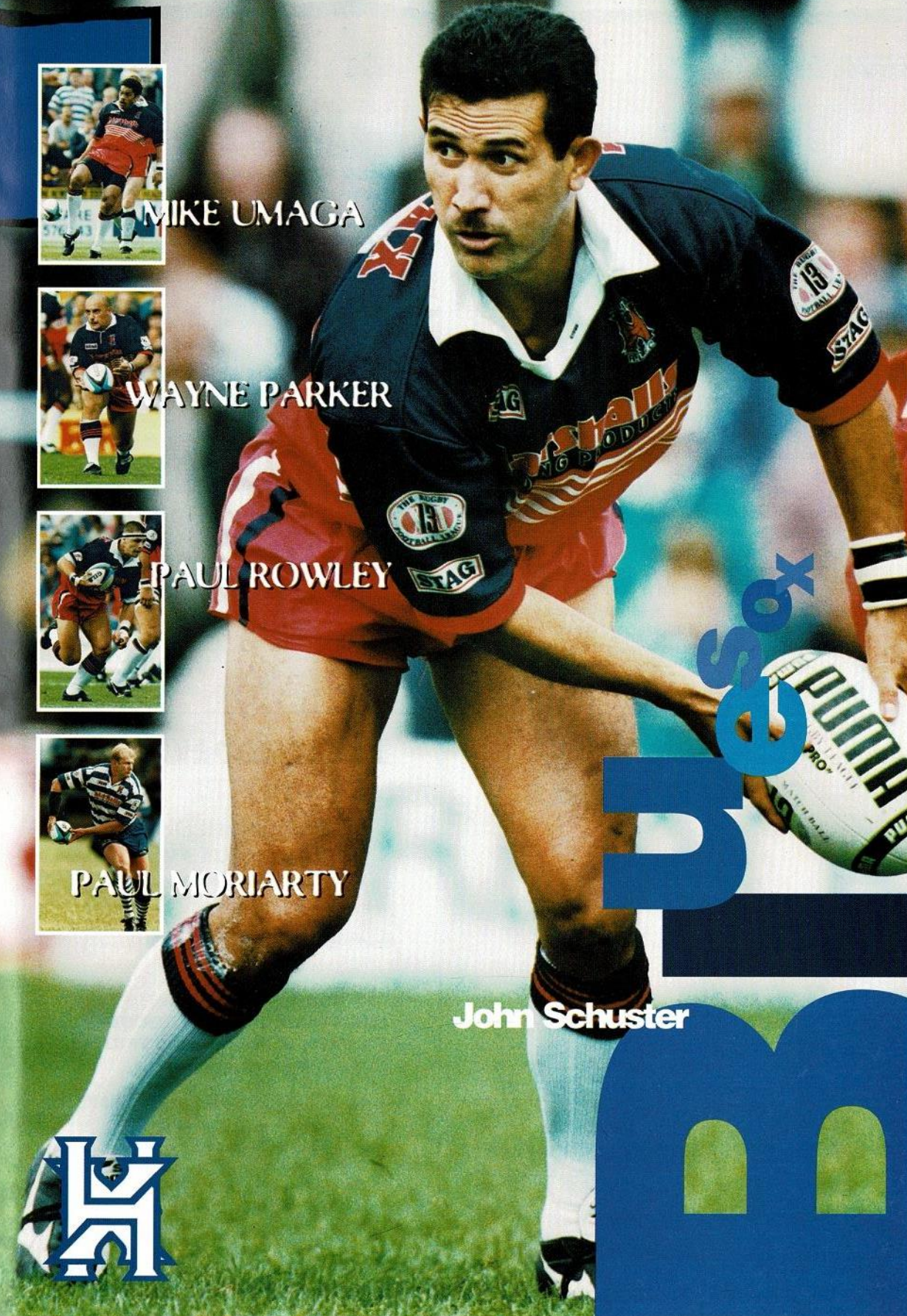

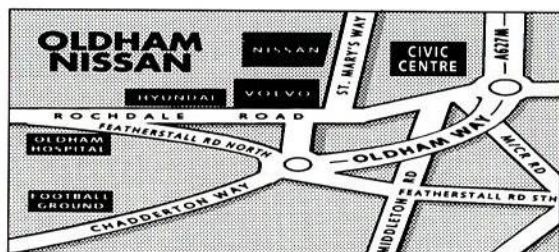

Thoughts from the Terraces...

What a cracking first round of Super League results. There wouldn't have been many betting on a Paris-London double, I suspect. I thought that the Paris performance was superb, both in their defence commitment and in the heart and fitness they showed in the last quarter of the game. Speaking to someone who was there, too, it was apparently a fantastic atmosphere with a crowd of nearly 18,000 absolutely loving what was the first experience of the 13-a-side game for many of them. Roll on Monday! And London's surprise win at Halifax sets up the prospect of real challenges from the game's new outposts. European Super League indeed!

At a more familiar if mundane level, perhaps the wins for Bradford, Warrington (over a Leeds club which seems to have real problems) and Saints were not surprising. But the margin of Workington's defeat, at home, although it confirms their tag as relegation favourites, is a bit depressing. I feel a Super League surely should contain a strong Cumbrian Club. I wonder if merger talks might re-emerge?

In the lower divisions, Leigh and Swindon will both be very disappointed to begin with defeats, although Ray Ashton's Bramley and York will be delighted to have wins under their belts. Rochdale were at least competitive at Featherstone, but Salford were apparently very lucky to get away from the McAlpine Stadium with an injury-time win. The score which raised alarm bells, though, was Hull K.R.'s 70 points in South Wales. I fear that another

half hearted effort to launch a professional side in the valleys will set the prospect of a genuine Super League club in the principality back years.

What of our Boundary Park experience? Good facilities, good atmosphere, shame about the score! I thought Maurice Lindsay's snide comment about our pre-match entertainment was a bit unnecessary. But Wigan were clearly determined to prove that they were still top dogs, and we copped for it on the chin. Our two Easter games will show whether the effect is going to be long-lasting, or if we really think in terms of a mid-table position.

There are two things that I found particularly disappointing on Saturday - apart from the embarrassing attempt to introduce the players as if coming out of Noah's Ark. One was the lack of Wigan spectators. They seem to be increasingly content to watch their side on TV these days - which is very sad. More serious, though is the use made of the video replay screen. Most people in the ground felt that Quinnell knocked on before Offiah's first Wigan 'try', and I suspect Mr Campbell would have disallowed it if he hadn't had the screen facility available to him - as he would probably also have disallowed Francis Maloney's. The fourth official then got it wrong - and when you learn it was ex-referee Stephen Haigh, you may not be surprised at that! Then, on Sunday, the in-goal touch judge allowed a try that a video replay facility would almost certainly have chalked off. Greg McCallum clearly has some serious thinking to do.



This afternoon's match is the 144th meeting between the Roughyeds and Halifax. Of the previous 143 clashes, Oldham have won 72, the Thrum Hallers have won 64 and seven matches have ended all square. As far as league matches are concerned, these teams have met on 130 occasions. Oldham's fine win at Thrum Hall last January was their 67th success whilst Halifax have 59 league wins to their credit and four matches have been drawn.

Oldham's biggest home win over Halifax came way back in season 1923-24 when they romped home by 33 points to nil. Halifax, on the other hand, have won at Watersheddings by a 20 point margin on two occasions. In 1978-79 they won 25-5 and in 1994-95 they won 40-20. That 1978-79 season must have been something of a disaster for Oldham who also suffered their worse away defeat against Halifax that term. They lost that match 32-2. The previous season, 1977-78, Oldham pulled off their biggest win at Thrum Hall when they defeated Halifax 24-3.

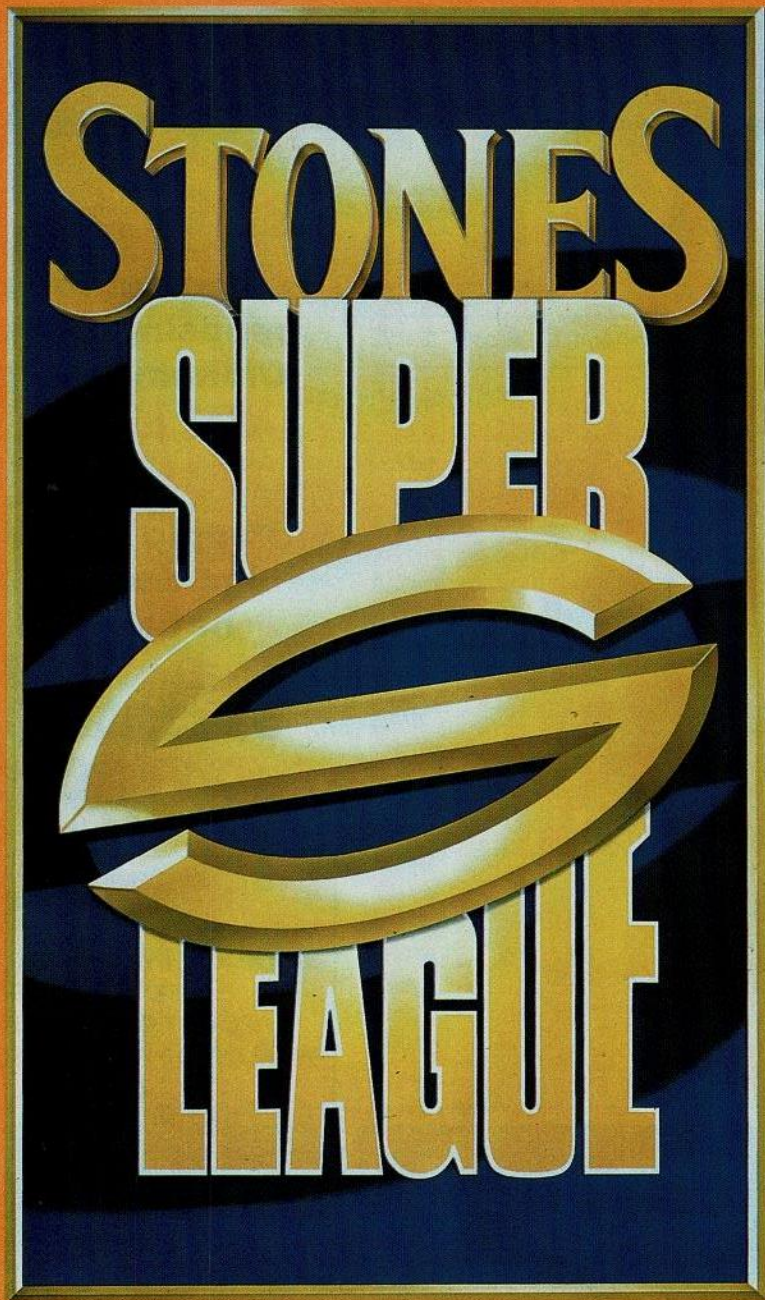

Down Under...

Aussie fans vote with their feet


Fans in Australia are asking what the future holds for Rugby League. The Super League clubs returned to the fold for the weekend's games. But few fans bothered to turn up to watch.

Last year all but one of Auckland's home games drew crowds of more than 20,000. On Sunday only around 14,000 bothered to turn up to see the Warriors. Up in Townsville there were several sell outs last year, with nine of the eleven home games topping 20,000. On Saturday night there were just 16,186 to watch the Cowboys take on a side many believe could win this year's Premiership, the Sydney City Roosters. It was the smallest crowd ever to watch the North Queensland side. And so it went on. In the Rugby League heartland of Sydney there were six games and the biggest crowd was the 9,722 who turned up on Saturday night to see the traditional local derby between Cronulla and St. George, which in good times would have been expected to draw almost twice that many. Yesterday the five games attracted a total of just over 30,000 an average of 6,000. And fans ringing talkback radio suggested a couple of the crowds were artificially inflated by well meaning club officials wishing to save embarrassment about revealing the true figures.

Oceania Cup

The Oceania Cup tournament, featuring Tonga, Western Samoa, the Cook Islands, Fiji, Papua New Guinea, and teams from New Zealand and Australia, has been postponed from its scheduled date in May and early June this year. The tournament has been put on ice until the outcome of the Australian Super League appeal against Justice James Burchett's Federal court decision, due to be heard on May 23rd, is known. Some observers are suggesting that there may now be doubt about the proposed tour of Europe by an Oceania representative squad this autumn. "Given the delicate situation in Australia it was considered inappropriate to stage the Oceania tournament before the judicial process was completed," said NZRL Executive Director Mike Knowles. NZRL Chairman Graham Carden insists that the tournament will go ahead later this year, however, and claims that the legal reverse for Super League in Australia will have no bearing on Rugby League in the rest of the world. Carden recently described the Australian situation as "a reverse in one country, which could not hide the fact that Super League was reality throughout the rest of the world. "We have a full international programme set in concrete until 1999, on which the Australian situation has no bearing," Carden added.

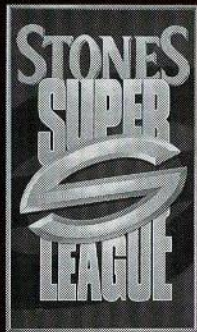

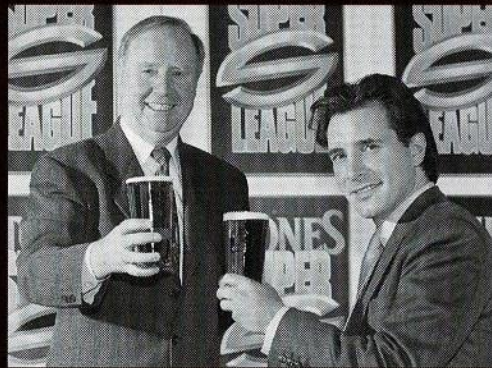

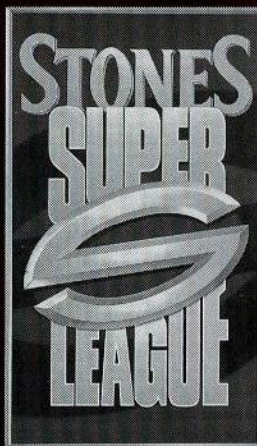

STANDARD CUP FINAL

Those supporters unable to follow the Bears to Paris this weekend would be well advised to return to Watersheddings on Sunday morning for the Standard Cup Final between Higginshaw and Saddleworth Rangers. It promises to be a tremendous match between two of the leading clubs in the North West. Higginshaw have carried all before them this season. They are favourites to lift the First Division Championship of the North West Counties League and fancy their chances against the superstars of the National Conference League after beating other Conference outfit, St. Annes, en route to Sunday's final.

Rangers will be making a record 25th appearance in the Standard Cup Final against a Higginshaw team who have lifted this trophy a record 13 times. Should Saddleworth win on Sunday then they would equal that Higginshaw record and also avenge four defeats which they have suffered at the hands of Higginshaw in previous finals. Those four defeats came in 1932 by 16-0, in 1952 by 10-9, in 1953 by 5-0 and in 1960 by 16-11. Rangers did beat Higginshaw in one final, the 1934 final going their way 5-4. As can be seen, all bar that 1932 final have been close fought affairs and Sunday's match should be just as tight and certainly one not to be missed.

BUSINESS BACKING SPORT

Some Bears fans may disagree, judging by their howls of anguish at Boundary Park last Saturday, but I am fully in support of the giant screen, the instant replay and the involvement of the 'second referee' or the 'third umpire' as they would say in cricket.

As luck would have it, we saw the best of the new system in the televised Paris versus Sheffield Eagles game from the Charlety Stadium in the French capital on Friday night. Referee Stuart Cummings called for assistance on several occasions and each time the action replay showed clearly, and without any doubt whatsoever, what the verdict should be. The use of modern technology ensured that each of those decisions in the Charlety stadium was the right one. Now, the fuss at Boundary Park had nothing at all to do with the rights and wrongs of "big brother's private eye". It arose purely and simply because the decisions on Martin Offiah's first try first try for Wigan and Francis Maloney's try for Oldham were still difficult to call even when studied on the action replay. Stephen Haigh, the man making the decisions, had a task which I, for one, wouldn't have fancied. But the point is he didn't have to make a split second judgement, as match referee David Campbell would have had to do, and he did have the benefit of camera assistance even if, in these two cases, it was still unclear what actually happened.

After watching the replay many times over I concluded that Haigh was correct in awarding the Maloney try. It wasn't a double movement, as I understand it. His own momentum carried him over. As for the Offiah try, I am still not sure, after numerous viewings, whether Scott Quinnett knocked on or not. What I do know is that:

- (a). The big screen gave the paying public a chance to make up their own mind and...
- (b). The match referee wasn't pushed into making a decision on which he was unsure.

No legislation in the world can cater for the occasions when there is still an element of doubt even with the assistance of the action replay. But by using the camera and the 'second referee' the League will reduce the number of wrong decisions and increase the percentage of correct calls.

The right verdict won't always be crystal clear... but it will more often than not.
