

Within 24 hours of recording their first Super League victory, the players were preparing to fly out to Paris on a trip that created once again a little bit of club history. Some of our loyal spectators had already departed late on Friday night and another batch moved out on Saturday morning.

In all, a total of seven coaches took supporters to the French capital. More went by plane and I'm sure a few made their own way by car.

Memory Lane

Don Yates Looks Back To A Match From Yesteryear

Two weeks today, the Empire Stadium, Wembley stages what could be the last final of what has been the most glamorous competition on the Rugby League calendar. The final of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup is invariably a sell out and even in these days of Super League and World Cup Challenge matches, an appearance at Wembley is coveted by every player in the game.

During recent seasons Wigan have dominated the tournament. winning it every year since 1987. However, when the Rugby Football League decided to switch their National Cup Final to Wembley in 1929 Wigan were not quite the dominant cup fighters which they are today. They had appeared in only three finals, losing in 1911 and 1920 but lifting the trophy in 1924 when they beat Oldham 21-4 at the Athletic Grounds. Rochdale.

It was in February 1929 that 32 teams set out on the first road to Wembley. Oldham visited Bramley and won 16-0; Cup holders Swinton, who had appeared in the three previous finals but who have never played at Wembley, beat Leigh 5-2; Wigan beat Batley, the first winners of this competition, 25-0 and unfancied Dewsbury, a middle of the table club, had a comfortable 37-0 victory over Cottingham amateurs. Dewsbury made critics sit up and take notice in round two when they beat Swinton 14-7; Wigan beat Hunslet 16-0 and Oldham crashed out at Warrington 7-0. The guarter-final matches included a superb 10-4 Dewsbury win at Warrington whilst Wigan drew 2-2 at St Helens. Wigan won the replay 25-5 but then had to face the other pill town side. St Helens Recs, in the semi-finals. That match also ended in a draw 7-7, but Wigan won the replay although it was a close 13-12. By then Dewsbury had already qualified for Wembley with a 9-3 victory over Castleford.

Wigan were favourites to win the final which attracted a crowd of 41,600. The line up for that historic first Wemblev final was as follows:

Dewsbury

Despite starting as underdogs, Dewsbury began well and dominated much of the first half. However, Wigan not only kept Dewsbury at bay but fought back to score twice against the run of play. After just three minutes skipper Jim Sullivan landed a penalty and ten minutes later stand-off Syd Abram had the honour of scoring Wembley's first try. A dropped goal from Dewsbury full-back Jack Davies brought the first half scoring to a close. Wigan led 5-2.

After the interval Wigan got well on top. On the hour winger Lou Brown scored an unconverted try and ten minutes from time his centre Roy Kinnear went in under the posts. The simple conversion from Jim Sullivan left the final score at 13-2 for Wigan.

Since then Wigan have made a further twenty appearances at Wembley and have now won the trophy a record 16 times. In direct contrast. Dewsbury have never returned to Wembley whilst Oldham have yet to grace the Venue of Legends. Let us hope that this famous competition is allowed to continue so that one day Oldham can rectify that one glaring blemish on their proud history.



On this day....

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

It was on this day in 1955, Wednesday 13th April that Headingley staged a Services international between Great Britain and France. The match attracted a disappointing crowd of only 3,453 but it proved to be an entertaining encounter. The French led 7-2 at half time but the British boys staged an exciting recovery which saw them run out winners by 15-7. The British tries were scored by Phil Jackson (Barrow), Brian Howard (St. Helens) an Les Brookfield (Hull KR) whilst Laurie Gilfedder (Warrington) landed three goals.

Leeds also staged a big match five years ago today, on Saturday 13th April 1991. It was the televised Stones Bitter First Division match between Leeds and Wigan which attracted a much better crowd of 15,313 to Headingley. Wigan were facing their final league match of the campaign and their eighth match in 19 days. They had to win this match in order to pip Widnes for the League Championship. They did win, by 20 points to 8, crossing for three tries one of which was scored by our current coach Andy Goodway.

It was on this day in 1990, Good Friday, 13th April that Swinton

defeated Oldham 15-12 in a Second Division match at Station Road. Scott Ranson scored one of the three Swinton tries prior to his move to Watersheddings.

Two years ago, on 13th April 1994, the Halifax and former Leeds winger John Bentley signed for a summer season of Winfield Cup rugby when he joined the Sydney based Balmain outfit. Although Bentley enjoyed his stint in Australia he failed to produce the high scoring feats which he has been able to achieve in the British game, scoring just one try from 10 outings.

Dewsbury winger Dai Thomas produced a far better scoring ratio in season 1906-07 when he crossed for a club record 40 touchdowns. Eight of those tries were scored on 13th April 1907 when Dewsbury ran in 16 tries as they demolished Liverpool City 60-0.

Finally, this time last year the Rugby Football League were involved in the major upheavals which were necessary to bring in Super League. It was on Thursday 13th April 1995 that Keighley's application to join the Super League as First Division Champions was rejected by the Rugby Football League. The Cougars then indicated that they would sue the League Management but despite their protestations Keighley remain in Division One.



EASTER BONANZA FOR STONES SUPER LEAGUE

It was a bumper Easter weekend for the Stones Super League as crowds rocketed.

This year's 11 Super League Easter holiday matches brought 88,236 fans streaming through the turnstiles at an average of 8,021, compared to an average of 6,242 from 16 matches in the old Stones Bitter Championship 12 months ago.

This follows just eight days after the Rugby Football League announced record attendances for the opening weekend of Super League - the best since the one division fixture set up was scrapped 23 vears ago.

Rugby Football League Chief Executive, Maurice Lindsay, said: "Super League is continuing its healthy trend even though the weather is yet to turn into the warmth of the summer.

"Another aspect of Super League which, in my opinion, is important is that the players are becoming better. The pace of the game has dramatically increased under the new rules and that will lead to prime fitness levels."

Congratulations to St. Helens teenage wing star Danny Arnold, who currently heads this seasons try scoring chart with 13, including nine in the Super League plus four in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup. The winger, who celebrates his 19th birthday on 15 April, has scored 3 hat-tricks, including one four try

His centre team-mate Paul Newlove is the only other player into double figures with 11, including four Super league touchdowns.

Saints captain Bobbie Goulding heads both the points and goal scoring charts with 99 from 50 goals, including one drop. He is the top Super League kicker with 25.

POINT SCORING RUN

Chris Wilkinson of Leigh Centurions has the current longest pointscoring run covering 25 matches, beginning with two goals in a 28-18 Division Two win at home to Swinton on 27 August 1995.

The Stones Super League player with the best pointscoring run is Wigan's Henry Paul, who has scored in 14 successive Cup and League matches, starting with four goals and a try in a 32-18 home defeat of Halifax on 13 December 1995.

WINNING RUN

St.Helens have the current longest winning run, having won all seven matches this season - four Silk Cut Challenge Cup ties and three Stones Super League games. Their last defeat was 32-24 at Halifax in their final Centenary Championship match on 21 January 1996.

LOSING RUN

Prescot Panthers ended a run of 37 matches without victory - including 18 successive defeats - with their 20-8 defeat of Barrow Braves, the previous last club to lose to them back in January 1995.

It was also the former Highfield club's first home win since 28 March 1993 when they beat Blackpool Gladiators on their old Hoghton Road ground. The run without a home win had covered 42 matches, including two draws.

Workington Town and Chorley Chieftans now share the longest losing run of six matches, stretching back to last season.

MILESTONES

Eddie Rombo of Featherstone Rovers reached a career century of tries with one in the 52-12 Division One home defeat of Dewsbury.

JAMES FALLON (Winger)

Jim joined Leeds Rugby League Club four years ago from Union glamour club Bath. Many regard last season as Jim's best since his transition to Rugby League. His sheer physical presence and dynamic strength and pace has caused havoc for every defence in the land. Fallon finished second in Leeds' tryscorer's chart with twenty four touchdowns. The powerhouse winger is looking forward to the new season where he will most certainly continue his excellent progress made in the game.

KEVIN IRO (Centre)

Iro signed for Leeds in the Autumn of 1992 after a stint with Australian side Manly-Warringah. He scored two tries on his Leeds debut against Widnes. The giant centre has represented New Zealand on twenty four occasions, which included a tour of Europe in 1989. Leeds is not the only British club Kevin has played for. He had an illustrious five year spell at Wigan where he won nine trophies in all including four Challenge Cups. Iro will be a major force in Leeds' Championship bid and he is looking forward to teaming up with his former Wigan and New Zealand teammate Dean Bell, now Leeds Football Manager.

HARVEY HOWARD (Prop Forward)
Joined Leeds from Widnes for £110,000 in January 1994. Had an impressive season in the front row for Leeds last season, which earned him his first representative honour when he played for England against Wales in the European Championships. Harvey has played in three successive Wembley Finals in the last three years. This season he has firmly set his sights on helping Leeds lift a major trophy. He has also played for Australian club Eastern Suburbs during the 1993 Winfield Cup.

FRANCIS CUMMINS (Winger)

Francis Cummins is a Rugby League teenage sensation. He holds the record as the youngest player to play and score in a Challenge Cup final, at 17 years and 200 days during the 1994 final against Wigan. Last year he represented Great Britain at three levels, academy, Under 21's and full during the World Sevens in Sydney, Australia. He also scored against France in his full England debut during the European Championship match at Gateshead.

Francis is a product of the club's Apprentice Scheme signing from local amateur side St John's Fisher in 1993. Still only a teenager he has appeared for Leeds on over sixty occasions since his debut in 1993, a phenomenal career in such a short career.

GRAHAM HOLROYD (Half Back)

The Leeds half is another product of the now famous Leeds scouting programme. Still only a junior he has played over seventy times for the 1st team. Holroyd, a classy individual half back with lightning pace off the mark, a superb bullet like pass and his main attribute being a fine goal kicker. Last season Holroyd put his name into the Leeds history books by becoming only the fifth Leeds player to score 300 points in a

Graham started his Rugby League career at Halifax amateur side Siddal before the Loiners lured his services to Headingley. He has represented Great Britain at Academy and under 21 level. During the close season Graham pledged his long term future to the club by signing an extension to his contract until 1999

ANTHONY GIBBONS (Full Back)

One of the main components in this season's Leeds Alliance side. A

quality full back with all round skills. His main attribute being his defensive skills and a quick eye for the gap. Anthony is also Leeds' regular goal kicker. Along with his brother David, they are the first twins to play for the Loiners since the Rayne brothers in the mid eighties. The talented full back also made his first team debut in the Centenary season, representing the first team on eight occasions and scoring three tries.

PHIL HASSAN (Centre)

At twenty one years old many say Phil Hassan is the experienced campaigner in the Leeds ranks. A superb defensive centre who loves pulling off the big tackles. Has a fine turn of speed and knows exactly when to release his wing partner. A vital member of the squad and all round quality player with first team experience.

MICK SHAW (Hooker)

Signed from the Siddal Amateur Rugby League Club three seasons ago. Last year he made his first team debut against Swinton in the Regal Trophy. The livewire hooker had a superb season for the Leeds' Alliance side in which he was awarded the Alliance player of the year, voted by the First Division clubs.





Although, as usual, we did it the hard way, what a crucial victory it was last Friday. An early win takes so much pressure off us and with a share of the points from Paris it means we are not down among the dead men from the start. If Martin Crompton and Paul Atcheson in particular can sustain this superb form, I don't think a top six place is at all out of the question. What I found particularly disappointing on Good Friday, though, apart from Mr. Kirkpatrick's now familiar lack of judgement, was what looked like a premeditated attempt to intimidate by Halifax. Dave Bradbury certainly now seems to be a target. Over the past few years. Fax have played some really attractive rugby. But this was more like the dour, physical Thrum Hall sides of distant times past. It was the case however I felt, that they lost primarily through

being reduced to 12 men. Some strange goings-on last week at Red Hall. The authorities want supporters through the turnstiles - and, incidentally, what an atrocious turn-out we had on Good Friday. But they don't seem too keen on sharing information with us. Last year, there was the strange affair of journalistic presence at disciplinary hearings, in the name of openness. It happened a time or two - and the journos were impressed by the fairness and thoroughness displayed - but then it stopped. A few weeks ago, League Express invited Maurice Lindsay to publish in full the News Corporation contract with European Super League clubs, so that we would all know its complications in the light of affairs down under. The response? Deathly silence. Then, last week, there was an apparently fairly ordinary business meeting of the RL Council. But the Chairman instructed those present not to talk to four named journalists, whose job it is to report the game, and undoubtedly have its interest at heart. Isn't freedom of speech part of our heritage?



This evening's televised match at Watersheddings is the 126th meeting of these two famous old clubs. The Loiners have had the better of the previous 125 matches, having won 69 to Oldham's 51 with five matches ending in a draw. A far as League matches are concerned there have been 107 previous clashes with Leeds having won the last five to take their total of League successes to 58. Oldham have won 44 with those previously mentioned five draws all being League games.

When Leeds last visited Watersheddings in October of last year. their 43-14 victory was their best ever at Watersheddings. Their biggest home win against Oldham came in a Challenge Cup-tie during January 1971 when they beat the Roughyeds 49-2. Oldham's biggest home win against Leeds came way back in September 1911 when the Loiners were crushed 27-9. Leeds were also beaten 26-8 at Headingley during April 1929 which constitutes Oldham's biggest away win over Leeds.

OVER To You

WITH Super League only a fortnight old, Oldham Bears will tonight play their third home game ... and if that doesn't tell you that 11 home games in a season isn't enough nothing will.

On the original fixtures schedule, Bears were listed to play Wigan at Central Park in round one, but the champions agreed to reverse the fixture at Oldhams request.

Nevertheless, the fact remains that after tonight's clash with Leeds, the Bears will have only eight Super League matches from which to draw vital revenue between now and next March.

It always struck me as odd that many of the game's leading players complained of too many matches, yet still did their utmost to land lucrative contracts in Australia during our close season.

And what's happening now? Are the players looking forward to next winter to recharge the batteries after a summer's slog in high temperatures and on hard grounds? The majority may be, that's true. But many are looking to play rugby all the year round by joining Union clubs during the winter. John Devereux (Sale) and Frano Botica (Orrell) spring to mind, but there are many more. It is all very well talking about quality rather than quantity, but how can any business fund

full-time staff and full-time players for 12 months of the year when it's only guaranteed income ... money through the turnstiles ... is restricted to a five-month period? In simple terms, it can't. Serious consideration must be given to extending next summer's Super League by two clubs and making sure that the Silk Cut Challenge Cup is retained, possibly with the Regal Trophy as well.

While they are at it, League officials might consider putting back the start of the 1997 Super League programme by at least two

As things stand now only the top four clubs will still be playing rugby in September, yet many of them have already played two of their 11 home games in conditions that could hardly be described as "summer rugby" and while the soccer and Rugby Union seasons are still in business.

We don't know what the situation will be in Australia 12 months from now. We will doubtless be influenced by what is going on there, yet the fact remains that in cutting it's teeth in 1996, Super League in this country has already thrown up a few talking points worthy of examination before the 1997 programme is finalised.
